Charles L. (Chic) Michels, 76, Route 2, Hawk Lake, Culver, died at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, March 18, at the Parkview Hospital, Plymouth, where he had been a patient for the past week. He had been in ill health for the past two years.

Mr. Michels was born in Rimini, Mont., on Sept. 6, 1890, to Peter and Pauline (Gesellen) Michels. He had lived in Chicago for many years prior to coming to Culver four years ago. He was a member of the St. Mary's of the Lake Catholic Church.

On May 31, 1952, in Chicago, he was married to Leona Riley, who survives with a son, Norman C. Michels, Culver, and two daughters, Mrs. Dorothy G. Thomas, Wauconda, Ill., and Mrs. Patricia A. ## Jaycees' Annual Easter Egg Hunt Set For Saturday

The fifth annual Jaycee-sponsored Easter Egg Hunt will be held Saturday, March 25, at the Culver Town Park, according to Co-Chairmen Lance Overmyer and Kenneth Miller.

Parents and their children are urged to meet at the south side of the Pennsylvania Railroad Station at 1:30 p.m. In case of bad weather, the Easter Egg hunt will be held at the same time on Easter Sunday, March 26.

Each parent is urged to bring some type of a container in which the child can place the eggs.

The Easter Egg Hunt will be divided into three age groups: ages 1 to 3 years, 4 to 6 years, and 7 to 10 years. The eggs will be identified either with pictures or numbers, signifying the type of prize won. The "Golden Egg" will receive the Grand Prize in each Division.

## Motor Vehicle Tax Funds Received For Street Repair In 1966

Marshall County and its incorporated cities and towns received \$696,268.12 in motor vehicle tax funds for road and street construction and repair during 1966.

An Indiana State Highway Commission summary distributed by the Indiana Motor Truck Association shows the county received \$568,843.53 and the cities and towns share was \$127,424.59.

These funds were paid by Indiana automobile and truck owners mainly in the form of motor fuel taxes and license plate fees. Trucks represented about 18 percent of the registered vehicles in Indiana although they paid 37.5 percent of the motor vehicle taxes in 1966, according to the Indiana Motor Truck Association.

Amounts representing truck-paid taxes distributed to Marshall County, therefore, were \$213,316.32 to the county and \$47,784.23 to cities and towns.

Truck-paid taxes amounted to 37.5 percent of these amounts also.	

Motor vehicle tax funds are distributed monthly by the state to the Indiana State Highway Commission, which receives 53 percent of the total; to counties on the basis of the numbers of vehicles plus miles of road, and to cities and towns on the basis of population.

During 1966 the highway commission received \$88,863,239.93; the counties, \$53,470,585.36 and cities and towns, \$25,149,973.57.

## Board Discusses New School Site Surface Drainage

Consideration of suggestions for an accepted means of drainage of surface and run-off water at the site of the new High School was discussed at the meeting of the School Board of Trustees of the Culver Community Schools here this week.

Thomas Russell presided at the meeting in the absence of Walter Johnson, President. Other members of the Board included Dr. Oscar Wesson, Everett Dowd, and Woodie McGlothlin. They were joined in the session by Attorney George Stevens; Engineer Ray Haller and Architect James Renard, both of Indianapolis; and Ralph Osborn, Jr., President, and Wayne Kline, Director of the Culver Holding Corporation.

Seven property owners in the immediate area of the new High School took part in the drainage discussion. Suggestions included: installation of a sufficiently large bell-ditch running from the site for an estimated 1500 feet to an open ditch west of State Road 17; an open ditch to carry off the water; and a system of impounding the storm water at the northwest corner of the school site to reduce

any heavy flash flow.

The Board requested that the school Architect-Engineer, M.W. Inc., submit a plan to properly drain the surface water.

Seeking clarification concerning a private road easement along the Houghton Street boundary on the south side of the 33 acre site, the Board discussed the easement in some detail with Mr. and Mrs. Antol Marton, who reside west of the school property. The Marton easement is said to extend from School Street on the east to the Marton home on the west. The problem involves a planned bus entryway to the school campus. The Superintendent was authorized to have the line surveyed.

In another area, the Board asked the school Attorney to take steps to carry out plans for annexing the new school site to the Town of Culver.

The Prospectus for the \$2,500,000.00 Holding Corporation Bond sale was presented in some detail to the Board by the Superintendent.

Requests for Mrs. Connie Ervin to attend the State Health Association, Indianapolis; Norman Tanksley, School Library Conference, Indiana University, April 21-22; Martha Ogden, Conference of Art Teachers, Anderson, April 28; Mr. Rust to Indiana State University, April 25 were all approved.

Legislative enactments were

discussed during the course of the meeting.

Among visitors attending were: William Millbrath, Mr. and Mrs. Antol Marton, Pat McCarthy, Jesse White, Allen Weaver and Paul Snyder.

## Notice To Dog Owners In The Town Of Culver

Dog owners who have not paid their Town of Culver Dog Tax are asked to please do so at once. Remit either by mail or pay at the office of the Clerk-Treasurer at 922 Lake Shore Drive.

The Dog Tax Assessment was Amended May 4, 1961 reads in part . . . "an annual tax to be levied and collected on all dogs six months old or older, in the amount of ONE DOLLAR for each male dog or spayed female dog, the sum of THREE DOLLARS for each male dog or spayed female dog and the sum of FIVE DOLLARS for each additional dog, male or female owned, acquired or harbored within the limits of said Town."

If paying by mail give breed of dog, color, name and whether male or female. If more than one dog, give information for each. Send with check made payable to Town of Culver to Mrs. Ruth B. Lennen, Clerk-Treasurer, 922 Lake Shore Drive, Culver Indiana and receipt and Dog Tag will be sent by return mail.

After allowing a reasonable length of time for dog owners to voluntarily comply with this Ordinance, Mr. Madonna, the Town Marshall will then be asked to call and collect this tax in person.

## TIME NOW TO FILE FOR TAX EXEMPTIONS

The Marshall County Courthouse, by order of the County Board of Commissioners, will be closed all day on Good Friday, March 24, and on Saturday, March 25.

Now is the time to file for tax exemptions-mortgage exemptions, Veterans service connected or non service connected disability exemptions and over age 65 exemptions for real estate owners

who meet certain qualifications, according to Glendyn Albright, auditor of Marshall County.

The time for filing these exemptions will expire on Monday, May 1. With the exception of the Good Friday weekend as mentioned above, the Courthouse is open every day from eight to four except Saturdays when it closes at noon.

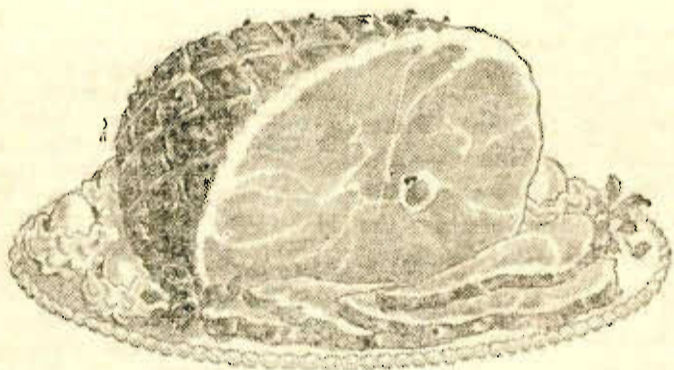

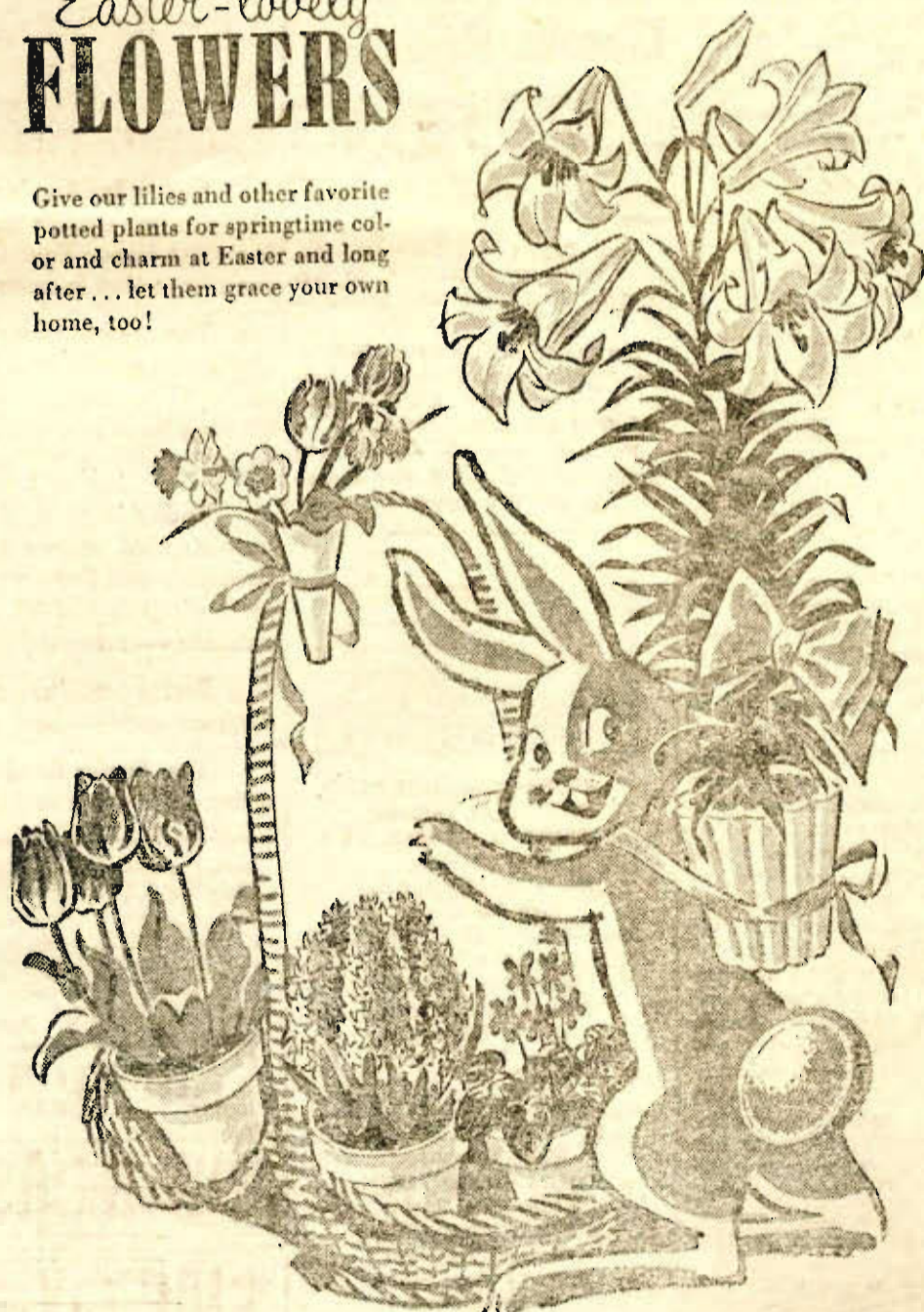

Mrs. Eleanor Liette won the mystery prize and Mrs. Jack Sanders won the membership prize.

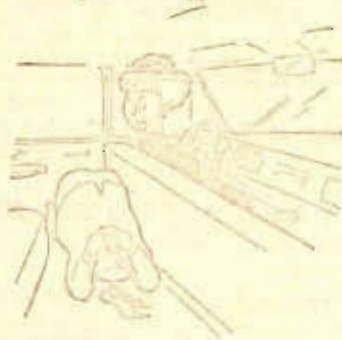

## Constitution

### PREAMBLE

We, the young adults of Culver, Indiana, feeling it our duty to help provide ourselves with constructive recreation of our own choosing, do hereby ordain and establish this Constitution of the Culver Center for Teens.

### ARTICLE I NATURE OF THE ORGANIZATION

Section 1 — NAME: The name of this organization shall be the Culver Center for Teens. Referred to hereinafter as C.C.T.

Section 2 — AFFILIATION: This organization shall be and hereby is affiliated with the Culver Jaycees. The purpose of this affiliation is to place the C.C.T. under the jurisdiction of an adult sponsoring organization.

Section 3 — PURPOSE: This organization shall be non-profit; it shall be organized for the purpose of providing teens with constructive recreation of their liking and to allow the teens of the community for whom this center shall be founded to assume responsibilities of young adults, a much needed experience.

Section 4 — LOCATION: This C.C.T. shall be located in Culver, Indiana.

### ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 — Any teen-ager attending the Culver Community School Consolidation and who is between the ages of fourteen (14) and nineteen (19) (both inclusive) may be eligible for membership in this organization with full privileges thereof. A graduate of Culver Community School shall be considered a member of that school until the beginning of the fall semester following his graduation.

Section 2 — Full privileges of membership shall be defined as the right to take part in all C.C.T. elections and to attend all events.

### ARTICLE III GOVERNMENT

Section 1 — The government of this organization shall be vested in a Board of Directors consisting of six (6) members. Who shall be the officers and two (2) adult advisors. Said officers shall be the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and the Treasurer.

Section 2 — The officers and advisors of this organization shall be elected in the manner prescribed in Article V of this constitution and shall hold office for a period of one (1) year, or until their successors are duly elected.

### ARTICLE IV OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1 — The President as Chief Executive Officer of the C. C. T. shall preside at all membership and Board of Director meetings. He shall supervise all organizational affairs and activities. He shall serve ex-officio as a member of all committees of the C.C.T.

Section 2 — The Vice President, who shall preside at membership and Board of Directors meetings in the absence of the President, shall also work with the President on such internal affairs as public relations and committee activities. He shall serve as chairman of the membership

committee.

Section 3 — The Secretary shall notify the Board members of all Board meetings and shall keep a permanent record of the minutes of such meetings.

He shall be custodian of all official records of the organization.

Section 4 — The Treasurer shall issue notices of dues payable and be responsible for the collection thereof, keep a book of the financial situation, disburse funds at the direction of the Board of Directors and shall report, in detail, on the financial condition of the C.C.T. when requested to.

Section 5 — Two (2) adult Advisors shall hold full voting membership on the Board of Directors of C.C.T. and may also attend ex-officio any and all C.C.T. meetings. The advisors shall provide suitable substitutes to chaperone in the event of their inability to serve at any activity.

### ARTICLE V ELECTIONS

Section 1 — To be eligible to be nominated for office in C.C.T., a member must meet the following requirements:

A He must be a paid-up member at the time of nomination.

B His status of membership must be such as to allow him to serve a full term of office.

C He shall be under no restriction by the Board of Directors for misconduct at the time of nomination or for one (1) year preceding nomination.

Section 2 — Not less than forty (40) days prior to the annual election, the President shall appoint, with the approval of the Board of Directors, a nominating committee of not less than four (4) or more than seven (7) members.

Section 3 — The nominating committee shall, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the annual election, decide and make recommendations to the members in writing, the names of the candidates for each office. This list must be posted ten (10) days prior to the day of elections. Nominations may be made from the floor at the Annual Election Meeting for these offices.

Section 4 — No member of the nominating committee shall be eligible for any elected office by action of the nominating committee.

Section 5 — The nominating committee shall conduct the election which shall be by secret ballot.

Section 6 — At the annual election there shall be elected, by a majority vote of the membership, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. There shall also be elected will be no restrictions as to how two (2) adult Advisors. There serve.

Section 7 — Nominations for adult Advisors shall be made by the adult sponsoring organization and this office shall not be open to nominations from the floor.

### ARTICLE VI ANNUAL ELECTION MEETING

The annual election meeting of the organization shall be held in April and the officers shall take office in August of each year. No-

lice of such meeting shall be posted in an appropriate and convenient place ten (10) days prior thereto.

### ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the annual meeting, or special called meeting, provided that written notice of the proposed amendment or amendments has been posted at least ten (10) days prior to the date of such meeting.

### ARTICLE VIII DISSOLUTION

Section 1 — Membership of less than twenty-five (25) persons for a period of three (3) months shall be considered cause for dissolution of C.C.T. by the Board of Directors and the adult sponsoring organization.

Section 2 — In the event of dissolution any monetary assets of C.C.T. remaining after all outstanding debts are paid shall be donated to the Culver Fire Department.

### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I DUES

Section 1 — The dues for members of this organization shall be two dollars (\$2.00) per year, payable before the first (1st) dance of each season.

Section 2 — Any member who does not pay his dues by the specified time shall be fined an additional one dollar (\$1.00) unless they are excused by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE II GOVERNMENT

Section 1 — The Board of Directors shall have control of the management of the organization together with the management of any and all property of said organization. Funds of the organization shall be withdrawn from the bank or banks with which they are deposited by the joint signatures of the President and Treasurer, or one of the two adult advisors in lieu of either of the first two.

Section 2 — Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by vote of the Board of Directors. Such appointees shall hold office until the next annual election.

Section 3 — The Board of Directors will meet at least once a month on every second (2nd) Wednesday. Emergency meetings may be called when necessary by the President or Vice-President in the absence of the President.

#### ARTICLE III COMMITTEES

Section 1 — The Board of Directors shall determine the committees deemed proper and necessary to fulfill the objectives and purpose of the organization.

Section 2 — All committee chairman, vice-chairman, and members shall be appointed by the President, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE IV RULES

Section 1 — Roberts Rules of Order shall govern all proceedings of all meetings of the organization and its constituent parts except as provided in the By-Laws.

Section 2 — Rules pertaining to conduct at C.C.T. functions are as follows:

A No drinking of alcoholic beverages on premises at any time

B Appropriate dress and conduct shall be required at all times

C Obscene language will NOT be tolerated.

D Four (4) adult chaperones along with the two (2) adult advisors will be present for all open functions.

E Closed functions have an age limit of twenty (20) years to guests of members.

F The premises shall be cleaned after all functions.

Section 3 — A quorum of members must be present for a membership meeting to be held. A quorum shall be defined as twenty-five (25) percent of dues paying members.

#### ARTICLE V PENALTY FOR BREAKING CONDUCT

### RULES

Section 1 — Misconduct by members at the C.C.T. functions, as reported by the chaperons, will subject the member to loss of membership from any or all of the C.C.T. functions, or probation, or any combination as determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2 — Misconduct by non-members may result in their being asked to leave that function and not to return to any other functions of the C.C.T.

### ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended by a fifty (50) percent plus one (1) vote of the members present at any regular or special called meeting.

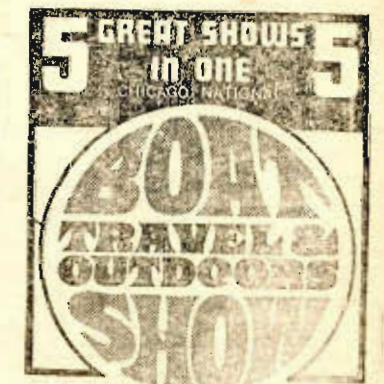

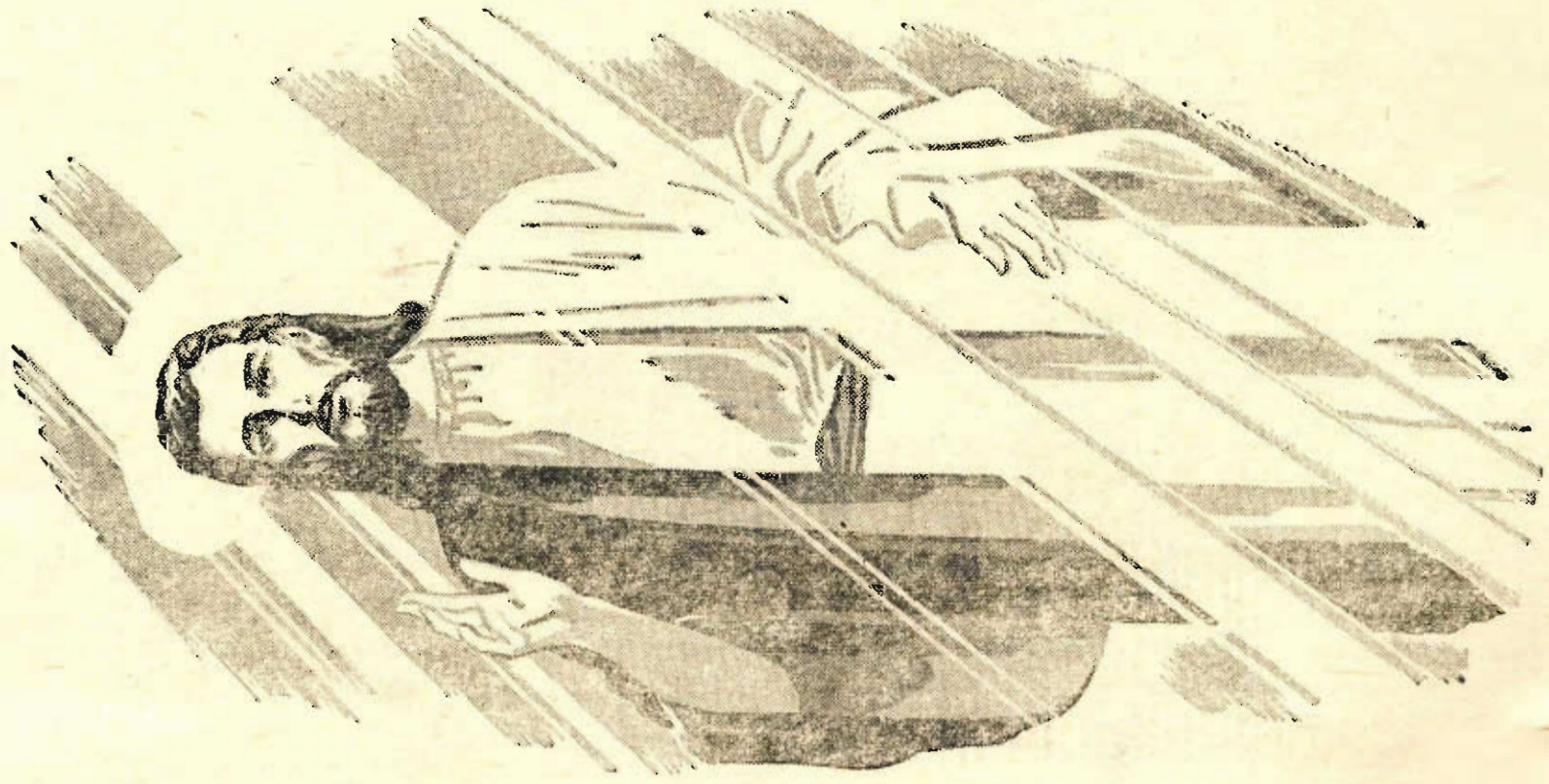

### SERVICE NEWS

Army Private Robert Rossow, III has been assigned to Fort Knox, Ky., in the United States Army Training Center, Armor (USATCA), to Company B, 11th Battalion, of the 3rd Basic Combat Training Brigade, for his initial eight weeks of military training.

He will spend the next two months learning all the fundamental skills of a soldier in today's modern, action Army, and will fire more than 500 rounds of live ammunition under simulated combat situations, including those en-

countered at night, during a three-week course with the soldier's basic weapon—the M14 rifle.

He will also be taught protective measures and first-aid for chemical, biological and radiological attacks and close-in combat, and will be schooled also in the use of the hand grenade, bayonet and hand-to-hand combat.

Much of this instruction will be vividly illustrated by the latest visual-aid techniques and live demonstrations, and by living under actual field conditions for several days.

Interspaced with constant emphasis on proper physical conditioning, diet, rest and health habits, will be ample opportunity to utilize USATCA's many and varied recreational and religious facilities.

Following the completion of his

basic training, PVT Rossow, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Rossow, Jr., of American Embassy, APO, New York, N.Y., and the grandson of Mrs. Robert Rossow of Culver, will receive at least an additional eight weeks of either advanced instruction or on-the-job training to qualify him in a specialized military skill.

### FEDERAL TAX

Q - To help my daughter and son-in-law out, I pay the mortgage payments on their house about 4 or 5 times a year. Can I deduct the interest and tax portions of these payments on my return?

A - No, these are not deductible for you. Only the person legally responsible for making the payments may take the allowable deduction, and then only if he actually pays them.

### TAXES

Q - My wife is filing her own return. Can I still claim her as a dependent?

A - No. When she files her own return she takes her own exemption. You may not take an exemption for unless you file jointly.

Remember that when separate returns are filed, each must handle his deductions the same way. If one itemizes so must the other. If standard deductions are used, both must use the same type, either the 10 percent or the minimum. The use of the 10 percent standard deduction by one spouse obligates the other to do so.

Also, be sure to use the tax table or rate schedule for married couples filing separately. An error frequently made on separate returns is to compute the tax using the rates for married couples filing jointly.

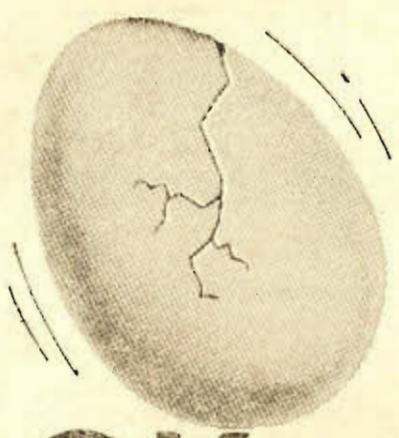

structor. Since Culver Latin classes, like most Latin classes the world over, read Caesar's Commentaries on the Gallic Wars, Roos felt it would be appropriate to pay tribute to their author on the anniversary of his death.

In times gone by periwinkles were used for making chaplets to be placed around the heads of important persons. In fact the name periwinkle comes from the Latin words for "bind" and "about." Nowadays gardeners find periwinkle a useful plant for hot spots in the garden as it tolerates heat so well.

Periwinkles are upright-growing, bushy little plants, most about a foot and a half high. All kinds have glossy leaves and large, single blooms. These are white, pink or rose often with an "eye" or center of another color.

Thus, the variety Bright Eyes has white flowers with rose eyes while Twinkles is bluish pink with a bright red eye, haloed with rose.

Periwinkles are easily grown from seeds, bloom all summer and fall and never are troubled by diseases or insect pests. Wouldn't they be a fine addition to your garden?

## Social Security Tax

The deadline for filing 1966 income tax returns is April 17, 1967. Mr. Charles E. Burke, Social Security District Manager in South Bend, Indiana, wants to remind all the self-employed people that the deadline for reporting self-employment income and paying the social security tax is also April 17, 1967.

The person in business for himself who has net earnings of \$400 or more in a year must report his earnings and pay the social security tax when he files his individual tax return. Even if you are not required to pay income tax, you must pay the social security self-employment tax that is due. The 1966 tax rate for self-employment income is 6.15% of reported net earnings.

Mr. Burke said that it is extremely important to make a

complete and correct report of all self-employment income because future social security benefits are based on the amount of net earnings reported for the self-employed individual and for his family.

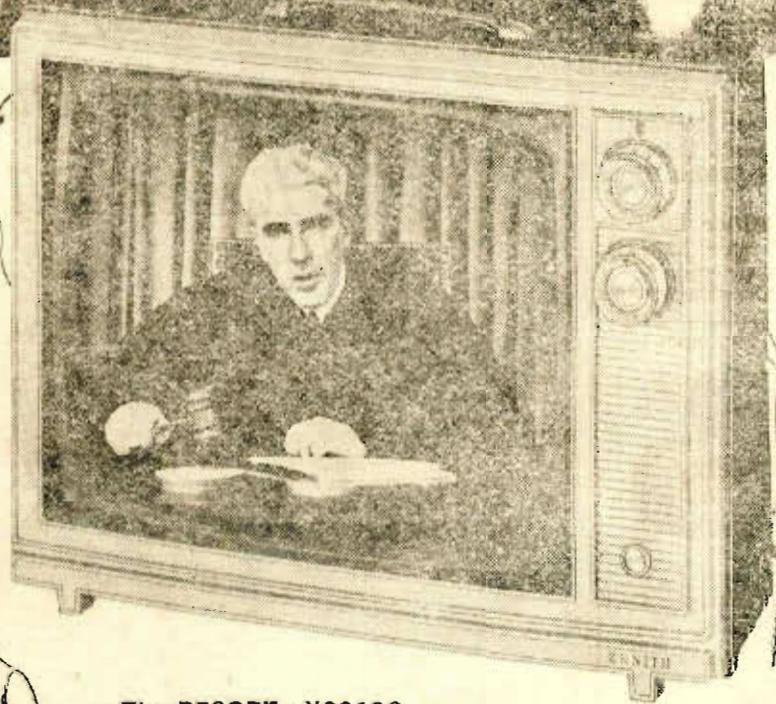
