

## Motor Vehicle Tax Funds Received For Street Repair In 1966

Marshall Country and its incorporated cities and towns received \$696,268.12 in motor vehicle tax funds for road and street construction and repair during 1966.

An Indiana State Highway Commission summary distributed by the Indiana Motor Truck Association shows the county received \$568.843.53 and the cities and towns share was \$127,424.59.

These funds were paid by Indiana automobile and truck owners mainly in the form of motor fuel taxes and license plate fees. Trucks represented about 18 percent of the registered vehicles in Indiana although they paid 37.5 percent of the motor vehicle taxes in 1966, according to the Indiana Motor Truck Association.

Amounts representing truckpaid taxes distributed to Marshall County, therefore, were \$213,316 .-32 to the county and \$47,784.23, to cities and towns.



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



ORGANIZATION

Section 1 - NAME: The name of this organization shall be the to hereinafter as C.C.T.

Section 4 - LOCATION: This C.C.T. shall be located in Culver, Indiana

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section I - Any teen-ager attending the Culver Community School Consolidation and who is between the ages of fourteen (14) and mineteen (19) (both inclualve) may be eligible for membership in this organization with full privileges thereof. A graduofe of Culver Community School shall be considered a member of that school until the beginning of the fall semester following his graduation.

Section 2 - Full privileges of membership shall be defined as the right to take part in all C.C.T. elections and to attend all events. ARTICLE III GOVERNMENT

Section 1 - The government of this organization shall be vested in a Board of Directors consisting of six (6) members, Who hall be the officers and two (2) dalt advisors. Said officers shall be the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary and the Trensurer.

Section 2 - The officers and advisors of this organization shall be elected in the manner rescribed in Article V of this constitution and shall hold office for a period of one (1) year, or until their successors are duly elected

Section 2 - Not less than forty (40) days prior to the annual election, the President shall appoint, with the approval of the Board of Directors, a nominating committee of not less than four (4) or more than seven (7) memhers.

Section 3 - The nominating committee shall, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the annual election, decide and make recommendations to the members in writing, the names of the candidates for each office. This list must be posted ten (10) days prior to the day of elections. Nominations may be made from the floor at the Annual Election Meeting for these offices.

Section 2 - In the event of dissolution any monetary assets of C.C.T. remaining after all outstanding debts are paid shall be donated to the Culver Fire Department.

BY-LAWS ARTICLE 1 DUES

Section 1 - The dues for members of this organization shall be two dollars (\$2.00) per year, payable before the first (1st) dance of each season.

Section 2 - Any member who does not pay his dues by the specified time shall be fined an additional one dollar (\$1.00) unless they are excused by the Board of

ARTICLE II GOVERNMENT

Section 1 - The Board of Directors shal have control of the management of the organization together with the management of any and all property of said organization. Funds of the organization shall be withdrawn from the bank or banks with which they are deposited by the joint signatures of the President and Treasurer, or one of the two adult advisors in lieu of either of the first two.

Section 2 - Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by vote of the Board of Directors. Such appointees shall hold office until the next annual election.

Section 3 - The Board of Directors will meet at least once a month on every second (2nd) Wednesday. Emergency meetings may he called when necessary by the President or Vice-President in the absence of the President. ARTICLE III COMMITTEES

Section I - The Board of Directors shall determine the committees deemed proper and necessary to fulfill the objectives and purpose of the organization.

Section 2 All committee chairman, vice-chairman, and members shall be appointed by the President, subject to the anproval of the Board of Directors. ARITICLE IV RULES

Section I - Roberts Rules of Order shall envery all pressent ings of all meetings of the organization and its constituent parts except as provided in the By-Laws.

Periwinkles furnish glossy leaves and large white, pink or rose flowers for that hot spot.

In times gone by periwinkles were used for making chaplets to be placed around the heads of important persons. In fact the name periwinkle comes from the Latin words for "bind" and "about." Nowadays gardeners find periwinkle a useful plant for hot spots in the garden as it tolerates heat

Periwinkles are upright-growing, bushy little plants, most about a foot and a half high. All kinds have glossy leaves and large, single blooms. These are white, pink or rose often with an "eye" or center of another color.

Thus, the variety Bright Eyes has white flowers with rose eyes while Twinkles is blush pink with a bright red eye,

haloed with rose.

Periwinkles are easily grown from seeds, bloom all summer and fall and never are troubled by diseases or insect pests. Wouldn't they be a fine addition to your garden?


The person in business for himself who has net earnings of \$400 or more in a year must report his earnings and pay the social security tax when he files his individual tax return. Even if you are not required to pay income tax. you must pay the social security. self-employment tax that is due. The 1966 tax rate for self-emplayment acome is 6.15% of reported net earnings.
