Marion E. Jones Dies After Long Illness; Age 78

Marion E. Jones, age 78, 504 East Washington Street, Culver, died at 3:05 p.m. Tuesday, April 18, at Parkview Hospital in Plymouth following a long illness.

He was a member of the Culver Methodist Church; the Henry H. Culver Lodge, No. 617, F.&A.M.; and the Culver Lions Club.

Born Nov. 25, 1888, at Culver, Jordan and Frances (McFarland) Jones, Mr. Jones had lived in Culver most of his life. He was a well-known representative of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States since 1932.

Mr. Jones was united in marriage Dec. 31, 1908, in Culver, to Susie Shilling, who died in 1949.

Surviving are two sons, Wendell M. Jones of Plymouth, and Jack T. Jones of Culver; a daughter, Mrs. Wayne (Mary Amanda) Kemp of Plymouth; a sister, Mrs. Mary Bloom of South Bend; seven grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. (CST) on Friday, April 21, at the Culver Methodist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Carl Q. Baker, officiating. Burial will follow in the Culver Masonic cemetery.

The Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home, Main and Lakeshore, Culver, is in charge of arrangements, where friends are being received after 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 19, until noon on Friday, April 21, and then at the church.

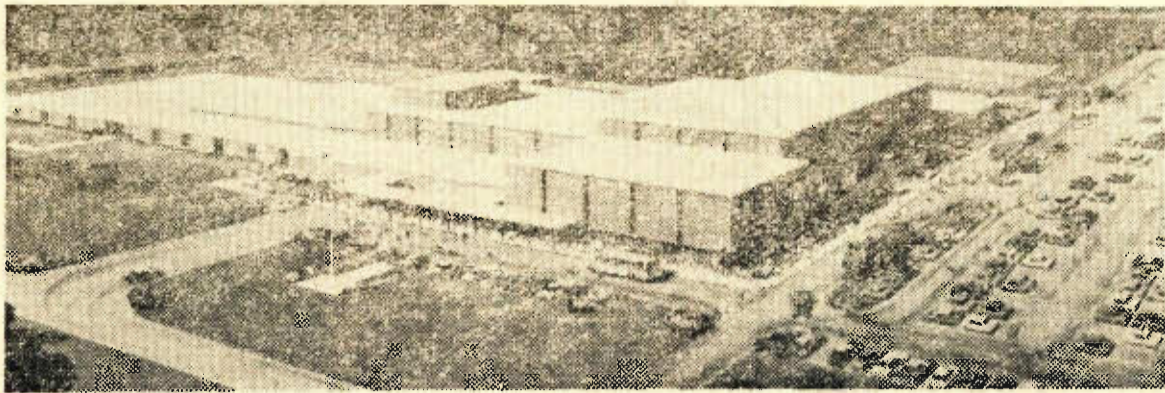
G.O.P. Lincoln Day Dinner Set For Tonight

New Culver Community High School Building



Artist's conception of the new one-story high school building which will serve the Culver Community Schools District comprised of Aubbeenaubbee Township, Fulton County, North Bend Township, Starke County and Union Township, Marshall County. The building is to be erected on a 33 acre campus at the intersection of Tamarack Road and State Road 10, just north of Culver.

Twenty-three classrooms including 10 laboratories for science, language, home economics and business feature plans which also include an 800 seat auditorium, a gymnasium and facilities for agriculture, industrial arts, drafting, music, art and ceramics and a cafeteria. The library provides for 7,000 volumes in perimeter shelving. An administrative guidance, health clinic center and new equipment throughout the school is planned.

Contracts have been let for construction subject to the sale of \$2,600,000.00 first mortgage bonds on April 20. Of masonry and steel construction, the plans and design have been executed by the architectural engineering firm of M-W, Inc., Indianapolis. Bond counsel for the Building Corporation is Ice, Miller, Donadio and Ryan, Indianapolis, Attorney for the Corporation is George Stevens, Plymouth.

General construction will be carried out by VanKeppel Construction Company, Demotte, Indiana; Mechanical, Burton Plumbing and Heating Company, Rochester, Indiana; Electrical, Hyre Electric Company, Highland, Indiana; Total Energy, MacAllister Machinery Company, Indianapolis, Indiana and Kitchen Equipment, Master Craft, Bellvue, Kentucky. A Clerk of the Works is to be named. Directors of the Holding Corporation are Ralph Osborn, Jr., President; Eldon Davis, Vice-President; Wayne Roe, Secretary; Don Taylor, Treasurer; Glen Overmyer, Wayne Kline and Cecil Lucas, Members.

Members of the School Board of Trustees are Walter Johnson, President; Thomas Russell, Vice-President; Everett Dowd, Secretary; Dr. Oscar Wesson, Treasurer; and Woodie McGlothlin, Member. Robert Rust is Superintendent of Schools.

C.M.A. To Hold Annual Inspection April 20-21

Culver Military Academy, an "honor" military school for half a century, will undergo its annual government inspection by the Fifth U.S. Army ROTC unit on Thursday and Friday.

A team of U.S. Army officers to make the inspection will include Col. Robert C. Ingalls and Capt. Ashton M. Haynes, both assigned to Wentworth Military Academy, Lexington, Mo. The inspection is conducted to determine the effectiveness of the military science program and determine whether or not schools retain their honor rating.

The visiting officers will tour facilities, attend military science and other academic classes, talk with Academy cadets and cadet officers, and review the cadet corps during a garrison parade. The parade is scheduled for 10:45 a.m. Friday, and there are exhibitions by Culver honor organizations at 1:30 p.m.

Culver offers an ROTC program conducted by regular U. S. Army personnel. The military science department is headed by Lt. Col. William D. Scruggs, professor of the military science.

Culver School Hearing Attracts Overflow Crowd

Remonstrators opposing construction of a new Culver Community School Corporation high school and a throng of Culver residents and businessmen who back the program filled the Culver Public Library auditorium Wednesday, April 19, and late-comers found standing room only.

The public hearing had been scheduled by the State Board of Tax Commissioners after 67 residents of North Bend Township in Starke County signed a petition opposing a lease-rental agreement by which the school corporation would pay annual rent of \$213,000 for 20 years for the high school.

Robert Rust, superintendent of Culver Community School Corporation, had received word of the petition from the state tax commissioners on April 12, the day after it was received by the tax commissioners from the Starke County auditor's office. Deadline for first filing of the petition with the Starke County auditor's office had been March 31.

John Palman, a 11-year resident of North Bend Township, Starke County, read at the hearing a statement which he said represented the opinion of 518 remonstrators who petitioned the school corporation last October. Several others from the same area were heard by tax commission representatives.

Majority of statements by the remonstrators did not refer to the lease-rental financing plan, although the petition responsible for Wednesday's hearing was based on objections to that plan.

Most objectors referred to circumstances leading to the establishing of the Culver Community School Corporation and its decision to build a new school.

Palman's statement charged a "waste of tax dollars" in construction of the school and "a poor consolidation to start with."

Palman, in his statement, said cost of the school would total \$4,260,000 over the 20-year payment plan.

Tax commissioner Ralph Meyer, who presided over the hearing, referred to objection of the lease-rental financing plan and asked if the remonstrators had costs of other plans. No comparison was made.

Superintendent Robert Rust, speaking for himself, the school corporation and reading letters from others in the district, said tax rates for the district are comparable to other school corporations in the state. He asserted that construction of the school "is still urgently needed, the lease-rental financing plan is fair and equitable and the cost reasonable." He turned over to tax commissioners copies of the surveys and studies that preceded planning of the new high school building.

Sale today of \$2,600,000 first mortgage bonds for construction of the school was expected to proceed as advertised, with final completion of such sale subject to the approval of the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

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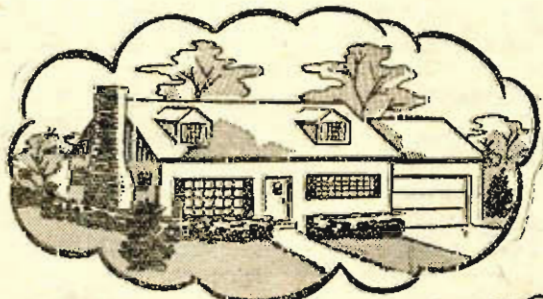

First Year From Seeds



These delicate sprays of bloom are those of a new foxglove, Foxy by name, which has won an All-America Selections silver medal for 1967. When properly handled, it blooms in 5 months.

The foxgloves that have previously been grown in gardens are biennials — that is the seeds are planted one year, grow and form leaves that year, but wait until the next year to flower. Not so a new foxglove named Foxy.

Foxy won an All-America Selections silver medal for 1967 because of its different flowering habit. Blooms can be expected only 5 months from the time seeds are sown.

In terms of plant breeding, these fewer months to flowering represent a great achievement. In terms of gardening they mean that gardeners no longer need think ahead a whole year in order to have the white, cream, yellow, pink, lavender, magenta and purple spotted blooms in their yards.

Foxy is a dwarf foxglove, averaging 2½ feet in height. In addition to the main bloom spike a plant may have as many as 9 branch spikes, all with florets closely packed along the top 6 to 12 inches.

Foxy has two foibles. Plants react adversely to being transplanted except when seedlings are very small. And plants need moisture at their roots all summer long.

If the gardener moves plants when half grown or neglects to water in dry spells Foxy will not flower in 5 months. Instead it will observe the usual biennial schedule and bloom the following year.

Indulge these two minor whims and treat your garden to Foxy's display of 15-inch-wide plants topped with delicately-colored flowers for weeks in mid-to late summer.

In all instances, the columns headed "True Cash Value" are intended for the use of the assessor only. If you wish to know the true cash value placed on your particular vehicles, please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope and this valuation figure will be sent to you.

All assessments must be returned to either Union Township Trustee Maurice Curtis, Route 1, Culver, Ind. 46511, or Deputy Assessor Harry Speyer, 416 Forest Place, Culver, Ind. 46511. Deadline is May 15.

Be sure to complete all interrogatories on back side of Form No. 101.

By the turn of the century, 300 million Americans may be living, working and playing in these huge, pyramid-like structures spanning the expressways.

The Vermiculite Institute in cooperation with W. E. Grace & Co.'s Zonolite Division, Chicago, commissioned noted architect Stanley Tigerman to design the project as a possible solution to problems that will face urban planners over the next forty years. By then, a booming birth rate will have doubled our population, and four out of five Americans will be living in cities and towns.

These self-reliant structures, called "Instant City," will provide residential, industrial, commercial, educational and recreational facilities at one convenient location. They would also take advantage of the previously unused air rights over our expressways.

The ambitious design of such a project requires a great reduction in weight loads without sacrificing structural strength.

One answer to this weight problem is found in the use of vermiculite (var-mit'-yoo-lit) building materials such as concrete and fireproofing. A rare mineral mined by Zenobite in Montana and South Carolina, vermiculite is used in a wide range of building products due to its light weight and insulating properties. According to the architect, the use of vermiculite concrete alone would reduce the weight of the structures by 35 per cent, while also helping to cut operating costs.

Whether or not Instant City ever becomes a reality remains to be seen. What is most important is that Instant City and other similar projects serve to illustrate that interested parties are working toward answers to this growing national problem of our cities and its people.

Major Diaz Lanz has filled hundreds of speaking engagements across the United States during the past several months. A born-again Christian with a tremendous testimony, he is a vibrant, dynamic, and articulate spokesman for a free America to stand against the Communist threat.

Open House At Ancilla Domini College Sunday

Ancilla Domini College will hold an Open House for neighbors, friends, and benefactors Sunday, April 23, between 2 and 5 p.m. Sister Joel, College president and dean, invites the public to tour the campus grounds and the new building. The latter includes the library, office areas, classrooms, and a greenhouse for experimental purposes.

Situated one mile south of Donaldson and eight miles west of Plymouth, Ancilla Domini College this year celebrates its 30th anniversary of accreditation with the Indiana State Board of Education. Prior to 1937, the College existed for 13 years as an extension of De Paul University, Chicago.

Only this past year have commuting students been admitted to the regular classes. Until this time, the Administration had concentrated upon educating prospective members of the religious congregation, the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ. Now it has opened its classes to other capable students with proper educational background.

Ancilla Domini offers students a choice of three programs. It provides terminal education for those desiring only two years of higher education following high school. Secondly, it gives transfer education — a two-year preparation for further studies in four-year colleges.

In addition, the College takes part in an enrichment program, whereby any individual may register for one or more courses which he sees as intellectually and culturally stimulating.

One of the few junior colleges in Indiana, Ancilla Domini concentrates on the Liberal Arts. This September it will offer its 67th class of freshmen a basic program of Co-ordinated Cultural studies that not only will introduce the student to all areas within the curriculum, but will assist him in exploring the relationships and inter-relationships of these various disciplines.

Experiences with the Humanities blends into an integrated whole theology and philosophy, art and music appreciation, world civilizations, historical and analytical literary studies in English, French, German and Spanish.

Experiences in Expression develops accuracy and effectiveness in "doing." The area includes fundamentals in speaking and writing the languages listed above, systems of logic, and techniques in the fields of art and music.

The final third of the program, Experiences in the Sciences, cor-

relates three branches: Natural Science (biology, chemistry, and math courses); Behavioral Science (psychology); and Social Science (government, economics and sociology).

Within this program of Co-ordinated Cultural Studies, certain subjects are basic and required; others are open and elected.

The Studies program, still emerging from the planning stages, will be presented to the student at the beginning of his first semester. This orientation in the form of lectures will have as its basis a synthesizing theme. During the next two years the student will study specific books on this particular theme in preparation for the discussion in the culminating seminar that will terminate the Co-ordinated Cultural Studies program.

HINTS ON HEALTH by the INDIANA STATE MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

DIPHTHERIA

DIPHTHERIA is a disappearing disease but it still exists.

With the effective control measures that exist, there should be no cases, and no deaths, from diphtheria. At the turn of the century, diphtheria was listed tenth in causes of death in the United States, and epidemics of the disease imposed a high toll in human life. There were as many as 40 deaths per 100,000 population in 1900, while today there are fewer annually than 40 in the country's entire population.

Most cases of diphtheria are acquired through droplets from infected persons or from carriers. Formerly, milk and milk products infected by a carrier or a diphtheria case were the vehicles of infection. Early symptoms may be a mild fever, sore throat and a general feeling of indisposition. There is often difficulty in breathing due to an obstruction from a pseudomembrane which forms in the throat.

Control measures are a test to determine the susceptibility of the individual to the disease; second, toxoid to create immunity and third, antitoxin for treatment. Infants should be immunized against diphtheria as soon as their inborn immunity has disappeared.

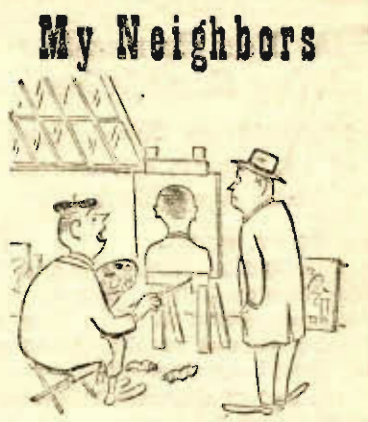

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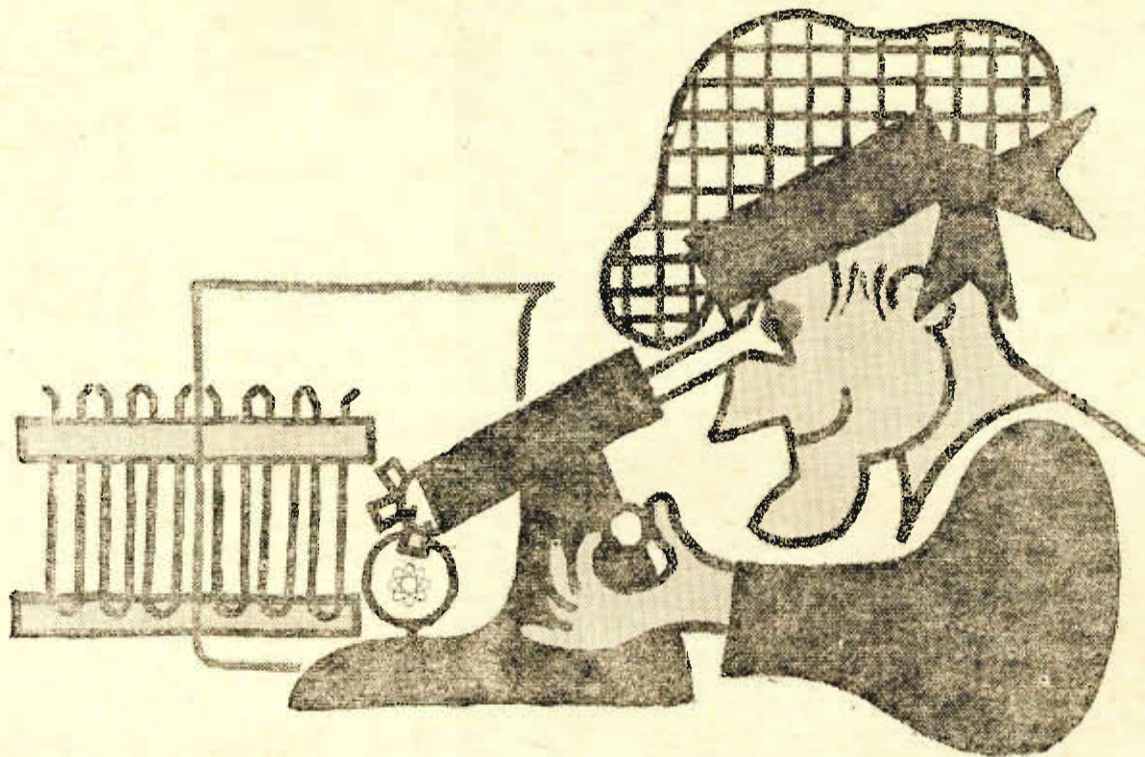

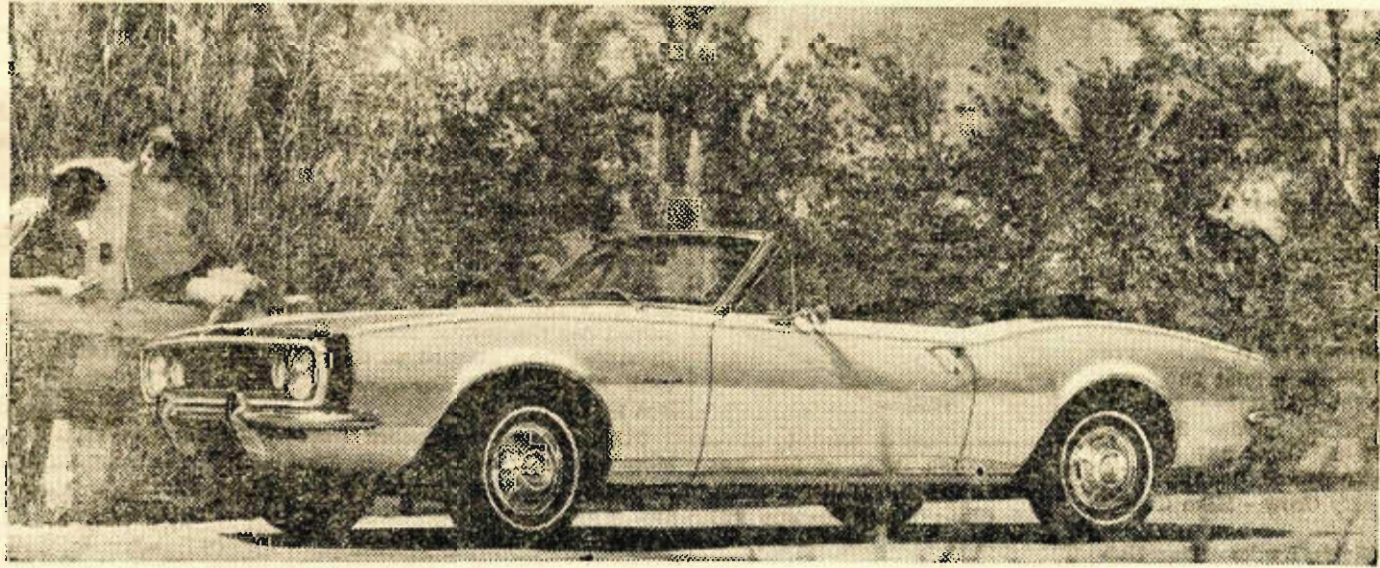
