We, the authors, put forth the following questions to Mr. Bernhardt concerning this past year and the future years at Culver High School: What did you expect when you came to Culver?

"I expected basically what I got, because I've lived in the community for 35 years."

How does the student body at C.H.S. compare with other schools in the area?

"I think that Culver students display probably as good a spirit, if not better, than any other school."

How does our school sytem compare?

The only other home event of the week is a baseball game against LaPorte Tuesday at 4 p.m. The baseball team travels to Logansport for a doubleheader Saturday beginning at 12:30; the crew will race in the Central States Regatta in Chicago; the golf squad competes in the St. John's Invitational in Delafield, Wis.; the tennis team plays at Wabash at 1 p.m.; and the track team competes at Munster from 2 p.m. Saturday.

Culver canoeists swept their own High School Regatta Saturday by winning eight of the 10 events. Paddlers from Brookville, Ind., another strong canoeing area, won the other two events.

Canoe captain Jim Etchen and partner Bob Mitchell brought in four of Culver's eight wins. The pair is in strong contention for the state championship and the title of outstanding canoeist which will be decided after their final meet at Wabash, May 28. The underclass team of Lew Erwin and Steve Bachmann ran second in the number of mentions in the victory column during Saturday's regatta.

Rain interrupted play in the CMA-Goshen tennis match last Thursday, but Culver took the match with four wins from Tom Strong. Santiago Montufar, Lee Beckman and John Schumacher.

Saturday's Bishop Memorial Tennis Tournament ended with





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
