Roy C. Ragsdale, 74, 510 College Ave., Culver, died Wednesday, May 10, at 11:30 a.m. at his residence, following a five-year illness. He was a member of the St. Mary's of the Lake Catholic Church.

Mr. Ragsdale was born Nov. 25, 1892, at Hunnewell, Mo., to Cornelius and Adelia Yowell Ragsdale.

For four years, he was a foreman of the chemical laboratory at the U. S. Steel Mills in Gary, after which he owned a drug store in the same city for five years. He came to Culver in 1921 and was a painter at the Culver Military Academy for 10 years. He then joined the firm of Crabb and Ragsdale, in partnership for 21 years in the painting business.

He was a pharmacist at the Culver City Drug Store and also Rector's Drug Store for seven years.

He was married to Mary Sester, who preceded him in death in 1937.

He then married Faye Grace at St. Michael's Catholic Church in Plymouth, June 8, 1938. She survives.

Services were held Saturday morning, May 13, at the St. Mary's of the Lake Catholic Church, with the Rev. Joseph A. Lenk, pastor of the church, officiating. Burial followed in St. Michael's Cemetery, Plymouth.

SAVINGS BOND REPORT

Harold E. Rose, Chairman of the Marshall County U. S. Savings Bonds Committee, has received a report revealing that the County's Savings Bonds sales for March were \$40,653 compared with \$14,031 for the corresponding period of last year. The State's sales for March were \$11,569,063 which is a loss of 5.3 percent compared with sales of last March.

Thirty-nine of the State's 92 counties reported sales gains for the month when compared with sales of March 1965.

Starting May 1, a 4½ year U.S. Savings Note, known as the "FREEDOM SHARE", will be offered for sale to individuals only, with the simultaneous purchase of Series E Bonds on Payroll Savings or Bond-A-Month plans. They will yield 4.74 percent compounded semi-annually if held to maturity.

David Gaskill Receives Fellowship For Summer Study At U. Of Minnesota

David Gaskill, supervisor of student publications at Culver Military Academy, has been awarded a Newspaper Fund Fellowship for summer study at the University of Minnesota.

The Newspaper Fund was organized by the Wall Street Journal to encourage more students to enter journalism. It annually operates journalism seminars and offers grants to student newspaper advisers for graduate study.

Gaskill will attend the University of Minnesota from June 19 to July 14. The Minnesota program is an intensive writing seminar and offers graduate credit.

Gaskill has been with the Academy staff for the past two years and supervises both the student newspaper and yearbook. Both publications have been highly rated by national critical services, and the student newspaper last year won a medalist rating from Columbia Scholastic Press Association, the oldest and largest organization of its type. Medalist is given to only one percent of the newspapers judged each year.

A native of Plymouth, Gaskill is a graduate of the Indiana University School of Journalism.

FORMER CULVER RESIDENT NAMED DEAN AT CLINCH VALLEY COLLEGE

The Board of Visitors of the University of Virginia recently announced the appointment of Richard J. McKay, a former Culver resident, as Dean and Associate Professor of Education at the Clinch Valley College of the University of Virginia at Wise, Va.

Dean McKay is a graduate of Bartlett High School and holds a B.S. from Springfield College; he also has an M.A. degree earned at Tufts University and did further graduate study at Clark University, the University of Connecticut, Indiana State University, and Boston College.

At present Mr. McKay is an instructor in the College of General Studies and is a full time doctoral student at the University of Virginia. Mr. McKay is a consultant to Project Opportunity, a Ford Foundation project for the culturally deprived, and he is varsity coach of crew at Virginia. He revived the sport of rowing at Virginia after a lapse

of some 30 years. Mr. McKay served on the faculties of Tufts University, Northport High School of Long Island, New York, Rectory School at Pomfret, Connecticut, Marianapolis Preparatory School, Amhurst College and Culver Military Academy. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, the American Personnel and Guidance Association and numerous professional organizations. He is married to the former Christine H. Leclair of Oxford; the McKays have six children.

Following his leave with Culver relatives and friends, Gary will be stationed again at the Quantico, Va., Marine Base.

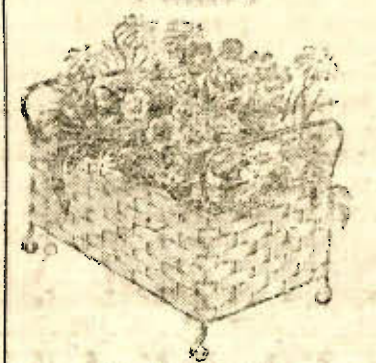

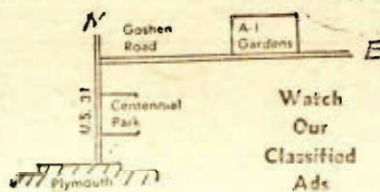
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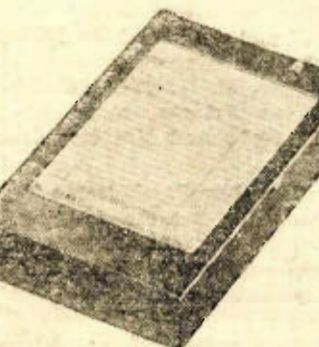
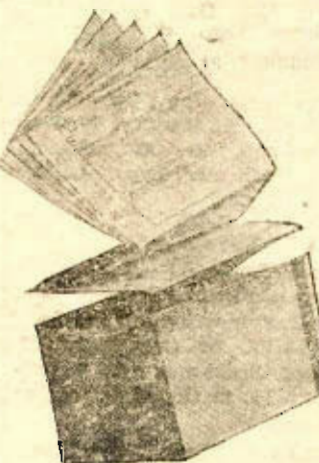
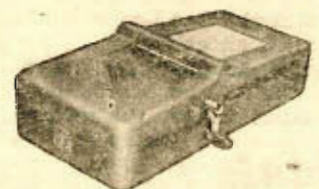
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Drivers Battle for "500" Starting Berths

One of the busiest week-ends of track action in the history of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway is expected Saturday and Sunday as the last of the 33 starting positions are filled for the 51st annual "500" on May 30.

This year's record-breaking entry list of 90 has intensified the steadily-mounting pressure on drivers and crews not included among the successful qualifiers last week-end. Many still are seeking additional speed in daily practice sessions and considerable "car hopping" is likely during the remaining 13 hours set aside for the official time trials. They'll be held Saturday from

11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on Sunday from noon until 6 p.m., with practice each day starting at 9 o'clock. The 33 fastest cars and drivers at the end of Sunday's session will form the field for the flying start on Race Day behind the Camaro pace car driven by three-time "500" winner Mauri Rose.

After the field is filled, any car crowded out of the starting lineup by a faster qualifier definitely is eliminated. The driver of the car, however, still has the privilege of attempting to regain a starting berth in another car which has not made its official run. Should this "bumping" pro-

cedure get underway early Sunday, the final hours of time trials may result in many drastic developments.

Several rookies, who didn't complete their required 100-mile driver's test until late last week, will be competing against their more-experienced rivals for the spots still open.

An added attraction during Saturday's program will be a balloon race involving some of the nation's outstanding lighter-than-air flight experts. The bags, approximately 50 feet in diameter, will be inflated by hot air at specified launching spots in the Speedway infield.

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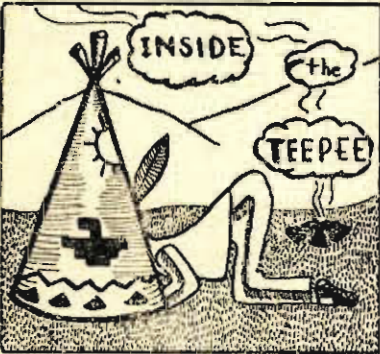

We, the authors, put forth the following questions to Mr. Bernhardt concerning this past year and the future years at Culver High School: What did you expect when you came to Culver?

"I expected basically what I got, because I've lived in the community for 35 years."

How does the student body at C.H.S. compare with other schools in the area?

"I think that Culver students display probably as good a spirit, if not better, than any other school."

How does our school system compare?

"I'd say that the Culver school systems compare favorably with other area schools."

What plans for change are being made?

"The specific curricular changes that will be made for the school year 67-68 will be the addition of shorthand, world history, and advanced mechanical drawing."

What kind of job is the Culver High School program doing in preparing its students for later life?

"I would say that academically we're doing a terrific job; but I don't feel that we're doing a sufficient amount for people who are not college bound."

What is being done to correct these faults?

"We're hoping to correct this certainly no later than with the new building. At present time we are undergoing a self-evaluation curriculum study with the help of Purdue's Dr. Nicholson and based on the needs of local and national societies, to develop a program which will meet these needs."

When asked about the extra-curricular activities of C.H.S. Mr. Bernhardt said that wrestling is tentatively on the agenda for next year as well as G.A.A. Long range plans include football, tennis, and intramural sports.

Mr. Bernhardt then made some general comments on the past year. They are as follows:

"I like Culver very much as is shown by the fact that I've been around here for several years. I think the student body and the patrons in the community are to be commended for their very loyal support of the school and the athletic teams. I believe there is some apathy on the part of some students in regard to the care of our present facilities. I've been pleased to see a fair amount of interest generated in the past weeks to better maintain our building. I think we should all take pride in our school and treat it with respect."
