# C.M.A. Honors Convocation To Be Held June 5

Oliver C. Carmichael, chairman of the board of Associates Investment Company and a former college president, will deliver the main commencement address at 11 a.m. Monday. June 5, at Culver Military Academy.

Carmichael will speak to members of the graduating class, their parents, alumni, and guests at an honors convocation in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium. The convocation is the most important academic assembly of the year when honors are paid seniors, faculty, and alumni for academic achievement.

Carmichael has been with the Associates continuously since \$260, when he was named chairman of the board. Prior to that time, he was involved with education in various executive positions.

In 1952, Carmichael was named dean of students at Vanderbilt University. Three years later he was commissioned to survey various universities for the purpose of devising a plan for the development program at Vanderbilt. The result of his work was the establishment of the Vanderbilt University Foundation, of which he was executive director.

Carmichael in 1956 was elected president of Converse College, Spartlanburg, S.C. Though he returned to the Associates in 1960. has remained vitally intersted in education and many ther civic activities. Along with Jils many business associations, Karmichael is a member of the lay trustees of the University of Notre Dame, St. Mary's College; chairman of the board of trustees of Converse College: a member of the Vanderbilt University Board of Trust; president of the Citizens National Committee for Higher Education. Inc., and general chairman of the Committee on Higher Education in Northern Indiana.

Carmichael has a bachelor's degree from Vanderbilt, a law degree from Dake University, a master's degree and a doctorate in public law and government from Columbia University. He has three honorary doctorates from midwestern colleges.

Earl J. Breech, III, of Indianapolis, will receive the McDonald Watch for a superior college record. He is currently attending Princeton University on a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship for graduate study.

Culver, the nation's largest independent college preparatory school, is unable to confer advanced degrees but annually recognizes academic achievement in its alumni and faculty through election to Cum Laude and the awarding of the McDonald Watch. The ceremonies are at 11 a.m. June 5 during an honors convocation when a cademic achievement of the graduating class is recognized.

Leonard is a pioneer in the development of Michigan oil. He is a 1923 graduate of Culver and a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, After positions with several firms, Leonard went to Monat Pleasant, Mich., to help organize the Leonard Drilling Company, a pioneer Michigan exploration and drilling firm he still serves as president.

The activities of Leonard Drilling Company and Rowmor Corporation, which Leonard formed in 1984, led to the development of Crystal Pool, a leading Michigan producing area. With the development of this pool, there came a need for economic marketing of a vast amount of crude oil leading to the formation of Leonard Refineries, Inc., in 1936.

Leonard is also active in many other business and civic projects. He is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Mount Pleasant Exchange Savings Bank, chairman of the board of Michigan State Accident Fund, and has been involved in various community activities such as United Fund, hospital campaigns, and

### Rev. W. C. Klein Will Speak At CMA Baccalaureate

The Right Rev. Walter C. Klein, bishop of Northern Indiana, will deliver the baccalaureate address at 11 a.m. services Sunday, June 4. at Culver Military Academy.

The baccalaureate service for 200 members of the Culver graduating class will be conducted in Memorial Chapel by the Rev. Allen F. Bray, III. Academy chaplain. An earlier service at 9:30 a.m. June 4 will be for underclassmen.

Bishop Klein served churches in New York City, Newark, N.J., Norristown, Pa., and Philadelphia. He was also canon of Saint George's Cathedral in Jerusalem.

Bishop Klein became lecturer at Philadelphia Divinity School and chairman of the graduate department of the seminary. After World War II, when he was a Naval chaplain, he was professor of Old Testament literature and languages at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, Evanston, III. He also served Seabury-Western as assistant dean.

In 1959, Bishop Klein became dean of Nashota House, Nashota, Wis., and in 1963 was appointed bishop of Northern Indiana. He has degrees from Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa., General Theological Seminary, New York, Columbia University, and Seabury-Western. He holds two doctorate degrees, one in philosophy and another in sacred theology.

Bishop Klein is a recognized scholar in Semitic Languages and is the author of numerous articles and books in his field.

Members of Culver Military 'Academy's two new varsity sports brought in national and state wins to complete their seasons.

Academy archers, coached by S/fc Richard E. Wright of the Army's military science detachment, won first place in the Junfor Olympic Archery Development Program national male tournament in the 15-17 age group. The two young Academy paddlers beat John Sanker and Bob Englebrecht of Cincinnati, Ohio by one point, 60-59, at the Wabash River Race.

Saturday, Etchen won the junior C-1 or single paddler, the senior C-1, the junior C-2 with Bob Mitchell, the open C-2 slalom and the open C-4 with Steve Kling, Wayne, Ill., and Keith Oldham, Springfield, Va.

Oldham and Kling won the 15mile marathon Sunday. The pair ranked third in the state with 57 poluts.

Culver's tennis squad secured a 7-1 season with a 5-2 win over Concordia Lutheran of Fort Wayne. 
