## C.M.A. Honors Convocation To Be Held June 5

Oliver C. Carmichael, chairman of the board of Associates Investment Company and a former college president, will deliver the main commencement address at 11 a.m. Monday, June 5, at Culver Military Academy.

Carmichael will speak to members of the graduating class, their parents, alumni, and guests at an honors convocation in the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium. The convocation is the most important academic assembly of the year when honors are paid seniors, faculty, and alumni for academic achievement.

Carmichael has been with the Associates continuously since 1960, when he was named chairman of the board. Prior to that time, he was involved with education in various executive positions.

In 1952, Carmichael was named dean of students at Vanderbilt University. Three years later he was commissioned to survey various universities for the purpose of devising a plan for the development program at Vanderbilt. The result of his work was the establishment of the Vanderbilt University Foundation, of which he was executive director.

Carmichael in 1956 was elected president of Converse College, Spartanburg, S.C. Though he returned to the Associates in 1960, he has remained vitally interested in education and many other civic activities. Along with his many business associations, Carmichael is a member of the lay trustees of the University of Notre Dame, St. Mary's College; chairman of the board of trustees of Converse College; a member of the Vanderbilt University Board of Trust; president of the Citizens National Committee for Higher Education, Inc., and general chairman of the Committee on Higher Education in Northern Indiana.

Carmichael has a bachelor's degree from Vanderbilt, a law degree from Duke University, a master's degree and a doctorate in public law and government from Columbia University. He has three honorary doctorates from midwestern colleges.

Carmichael's position as chairman of the board of the Associates includes its subsidiary corporations Emmeo Insurance Company, First Bank and Trust Company of South Bend, Capitol Life Insurance Company of Denver, and he is also chairman of the board of Marshall County Bank and Trust Company, Plymouth, Ind.

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## To Be Honored At Academy Convocation

A Michigan oil developer, an alumnus with an outstanding college record, and a faculty member who is a playwright will receive special honors Monday, June 5, at Culver Military Academy.

Named for election to Culver Chapter of the Cum Laude Society are J. Walter Leonard, chairman of the board of Leonard Refineries, Alma, Mich., and Harvey E. Firari, a member of the English department at the Academy.

Earl J. Breech, III, of Indianapolis, will receive the McDonald Watch for a superior college record. He is currently attending Princeton University on a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship for graduate study.

Culver, the nation's largest independent college preparatory school, is unable to confer advanced degrees but annually recognizes academic achievement in its alumni and faculty through election to Cum Laude and the awarding of the McDonald Watch. The ceremonies are at 11 a.m. June 5 during an honors convocation when academic achievement of the graduating class is recognized.

Leonard is a pioneer in the development of Michigan oil. He is a 1923 graduate of Culver and a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh. After positions with several firms, Leonard went to Mount Pleasant, Mich., to help organize the Leonard Drilling Company, a pioneer Michigan exploration and drilling firm he still serves as president.

The activities of Leonard Drilling Company and Rowmor Corporation, which Leonard formed in 1934, led to the development of Crystal Pool, a leading Michigan producing area. With the development of this pool, there came a need for economic marketing of a vast amount of crude oil leading to the formation of Leonard Refineries, Inc. in 1936.

Leonard is also active in many other business and civic projects. He is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Mount Pleasant Exchange Savings Bank, chairman of the board of Michigan State Accident Fund, and has been involved in various community activities such as United Fund, hospital campaigns, and youth activities. He is also past president of the Culver Legion, the Academy's alumni organization.

Firari has been a member of the faculty since 1952. Along with his teaching duties, he has been active as a playwright and has had many articles published on the theater and the teaching of English. Two of his plays were recently produced in England after successful productions two years ago at the Loeb Drama Center, Harvard University.

A graduate of Carroll College, Waukesha, Wis., Firari has a master's degree from Northwestern University and did summer study at Indiana University. He attended Yale Drama School for graduate study on a William Morris Agency Fellowship. Among his plays are the "Yew Trilogy," "Vagabond From Indiana," a production about journalist Ernie Pyle, and "Endiken and Reetchie," produced last winter in England.

## Rev. W. C. Klein Will Speak At CMA Baccalaureate

The Right Rev. Walter C. Klein, bishop of Northern Indiana, will deliver the baccalaureate address at 11 a.m. services Sunday, June 4, at Culver Military Academy.

The baccalaureate service for 200 members of the Culver graduating class will be conducted in Memorial Chapel by the Rev. Allen F. Bray, III, Academy chaplain. An earlier service at 9:30 a.m. June 4 will be for underclassmen.

Bishop Klein served churches in New York City, Newark, N.J., Norristown, Pa., and Philadelphia. He was also canon of Saint George's Cathedral in Jerusalem.

Bishop Klein became lecturer at Philadelphia Divinity School and chairman of the graduate department of the seminary. After World War II, when he was a Naval chaplain, he was professor of Old Testament literature and languages at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, Evanston, Ill. He also served Seabury-Western as assistant dean.

In 1959, Bishop Klein became dean of Nashota House, Nashota, Wis., and in 1963 was appointed bishop of Northern Indiana. He has degrees from Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa., General Theological Seminary, New York, Columbia University, and Seabury-Western. He holds two doctorate degrees, one in philosophy and another in sacred theology.

Bishop Klein is a recognized scholar in Semitic Languages and is the author of numerous articles and books in his field.

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## CMA To Eliminate Fourth Of July Fireworks Display

Culver Military Academy announced today a decision to eliminate its Fourth of July fireworks display.

Academy officials cited the rising cost of fireworks as the reason for the decision and added they feel the money can be put to more effective use.

"We have found that our fireworks display gets shorter and shorter each year," an Academy spokesman said, "and we feel we cannot justify sending more money up in smoke to pay the rising cost of fireworks."

The Academy announced it is investigating other types of entertainment for its nearly 1800 students in the annual Fourth of July ceremonies officially opening the Culver Summer Schools. It is hoped that whatever entertainment is booked will be open to the public.

Culver has sponsored fireworks displays periodically during the last several decades and has invited the public from nearby communities to attend the Fourth of July ceremonies. The display is one of a series of events including lectures, music recitals, theater attractions, military exhibitions, chapel services, sports and other events which the Academy opens to the public free of cost.

### Academy Sports

Members of Culver Military Academy's two new varsity sports brought in national and state wins to complete their seasons. Academy archers, coached by S/lt Richard E. Wright of the Army's military science detachment, won first place in the Junior Olympic Archery Development Program national male tournament in the 15-17 age group. Culver canoeists came out on top of the point competition for the Indiana State Canoeing Championship.

Seven Culver archers shot against approximately 40 teams in the postal tourney, scoring 3,704 out of a possible 4,320 points in team competition. James R. Eichen, Pittsburgh, Pa., and Robert C. Mitchell II, Camden, Ala., won the Indiana State Canoeing Championship in the junior division after races this weekend at Wabash, Ind.

The two young Academy paddlers beat John Sanker and Bob Englebrecht of Cincinnati, Ohio by one point, 60-59, at the Wabash River Race.

Saturday, Eichen won the junior C-1 or single paddler, the senior C-1, the junior C-2 with Bob Mitchell, the open C-2 slalom and the open C-4 with Steve Kling, Wayne, Ill., and Keith Oldham, Springfield, Va.

Oldham and Kling won the 15-mile marathon Sunday. The pair ranked third in the state with 57 points.

Culver's tennis squad secured a 7-1 season with a 5-2 win over Concordia Lutheran of Fort Wayne. Tom Strong, who was undefeated in match play all season, beat Gregg Fritz of Concordia, 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. Other singles winners were Lee Beckman, Santiago Montufar and Rick Hubble. Montufar and John Schumacher also won a doubles match.

The baseball Eagles beat Winamac, 3-1, but lost to LaPorte, 6-2, for an 11-3 record before their final two games of the season at home against Coldwater, Mich., 12:30 Saturday.

Academy golfers rounded out their season with a 14-4-1 record. Captain Bob Crosby, captain-elect Rick Durkes, Al Ranney and Tom McMillan were the stalwarts of the season.

The track team beat Gary Mann, 67-51, for an outdoor record of 6-3. The team had previously compiled an 8-2-1 record during the indoor season.

### Scrapbook PIONEER LIFE IN GREENSBURG

The early settlers in Greensburg were sturdy, industrious, religious and farsighted. They must have intended that their sons should grow up to be presidents, or at least politicians, for they provided log cabins for their children to be born in.

Let us not cast aspersions or other waste material on the simple life of those days. There was no snobbishness then — one man was just as good as another, if not better. A man who drove an ox cart was as highly esteemed as the driver of a Cadillac. There was no worry over seat belts, and back-seat drivers were not urged to "leave the driving to us." No one complained about his neighbor's radio or singing commercials on TV.

In those days nobody was denied the right to work.

Woman suffrage had not been invented. But women, while not permitted to vote, were allowed the special privilege of working on Sundays: The rigorous Bap-

tist, Methodist and Presbyterian rituals were abrogated to secure celestial immunity for housewives and chicken dinners for the preachers.

Pioneer ministers held a tighter rein on their congregations than they do now. Dancing was strictly forbidden, and very few places of worship tolerated any other than vocal music. The fiddle was considered an instrument of the devil. A girl who could do a tap-dance wearing the bull-hide shoes then available would have been a physical phenomenon. Preachers strongly condemned gambling, but they frequently gave reports on various "futures."

Women did not go in for clubs in pioneer Greensburg, although some were said to be skillful in the use of broomsticks and rolling pins. Styles were quite different from today's modes. Women wore their dresses much longer than — often as much as two or three years longer.

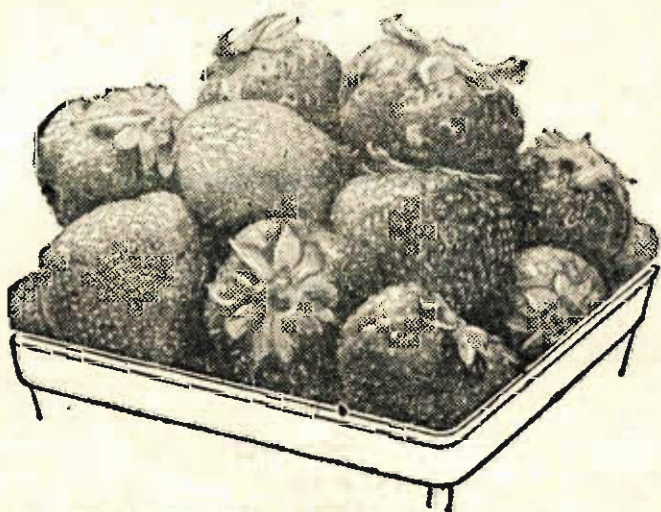
A great many of our modern improvements — mechanical and electronic gadgetry, educational, social and commercial marvels — had not been invented at that time, including the threshing machine, sewing machine, refrigerator, the telephone (it was believed sufficient to tell-a-woman), child psychology, Jack Benny, viruses, insurance agents, drag racing and potato chips.

In the pioneer cabins the latch-string was always out — in case Avon should be calling.
