Walter Johnson Named President Of School Board

Walter Johnson of Culver was re-elected president of the Board of School Trustees of the Culver Community Schools Corporation at the annual meeting July 3.

Re-elected vice president was Thomas Russell of Leiters Ford, and secretary, Everett Dowd of North Bend Township. In keeping with the new Indiana statute which requires that School Boards appoint a school treasurer other than one of its own members or the superintendent of schools, the Culver trustees named the administrative assistant, Charles Downing as treasurer. It also recommended that Mrs. Wilma Grosvenor, school bookkeeper, be named deputy treasurer.

In other business the Board approved teaching contracts of Mrs. Martha Ogden, Art; Richard Aspen, Spanish, English; Mrs. Carita Brown, Home Economics; and Mrs. Marjorie Trulove, Grade 5.

Mrs. Ogden, a Culver resident, who taught Art part time at the Aubbeenaubee School last year is to be assigned full time at Culver during the 1967-68 academic term. With training at the University of Chicago and the Ft. Wayne Art School, she has taught at Albert Lea, Minn.; South Bend, Ft. Wayne, West Township, and Plymouth before joining the local school staff.

Richard Aspen, a native of Rosemont, Pa., completed his undergraduate work at Florida State University. He has completed graduate studies at the University of Delaware, University of California, Fresno and Pomona Colleges, and the C. J. Jung Institute, Zurich, Switzerland. He has taught in California and Aspen, Colo., and comes to Culver from Oklahoma City where he taught Spanish.

Mrs. Brown, a Purdue University graduate, taught at Caston and comes to her new post here at Culver and Aubbeenaubee Schools from North Miami high school. She resides near Rochester.

Mrs. Trulove received both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Indiana State University. She taught at Star City this past year and previously at West Lafayette, Terre Haute, and MSD and Decatur Township in Marion County. Her husband, James Trulove, is principal at Monterey. She is a member of Tri Kappa and the Methodist Church.

A number of teaching positions are open at Culver and Aubbeenaubee and if the Culver Community Schools District is to be the surviving corporation for the Monterey, (Tippecanoe Township, Pulaski County) School, the necessary staffing or position openings will be increased noticeably, Robert Rust, superintendent, pointed out in his review to the Board.

At Culver on the high school level, positions to be filled include: mathematics, assistant principal with mathematics, French with English, high school English, and Junior high school English. At the Aubbeenaubee School teaching positions include Girls Physical education, Art, English, and possibly one elementary teacher.

Positions open in the Monterey high school include: mathematics, Coach, with Boys physical education, math or science; Girls P.E. with Health; Music, Eng-

Doctor Wesson Seriously Hurt In Auto Crash

Culver veterinarian Dr. Oscar Wesson remains a patient in Room 719, Memorial Hospital, South Bend, where he was admitted on Wednesday, July 5, from Woodlawn Hospital in Rochester following a Thursday, June 29, auto accident after his car skidded and hit a tree in rural Fulton County near Kewanee, Ind.

According to the Fulton County Sheriff's department, Doctor Wesson was southbound on County Road 1000 W at 11:30 a.m. when a car driven by Jerry L. Brown, age 29, Kewanee, drove from a field onto the road. Brown had stopped his vehicle before pulling onto the road, officers said.

Wesson swerved his car to the right, skidding 25 feet on the gravel road and 47 feet on the road's shoulder before striking the tree.

No arrests were made and Doctor Wesson's auto was listed as a total loss by the sheriff's department.

Doctor Wesson suffered a dislocated and fractured right hip, broken right ribs, a compound fracture of the right jaw, fractured right wrist, and cuts and bruises in the accident. He underwent surgery on Friday, July 7, at South Bend's Memorial Hospital, and is convalescing satisfactorily.

Major General Delmar T. Spivey, who will retire Aug. 31 as superintendent of Culver Military Academy, will be honored by the Culver Chamber of Commerce at a testimonial dinner on Monday, July 17.

The 7 p.m. dinner will be held at the Culver Inn for Chamber members, their wives, and guests. Robert Rust, former director of public relations at the Academy and now superintendent of Culver Public Schools, will be the main speaker.

The Chamber committee planning the event is headed by Harold Fritz, plant manager for McGill Manufacturing Company. Dr. Joseph Howard, president of the Chamber, will preside at the testimonial dinner.

General Spivey has been superintendent at Culver since 1956, when he retired from the U.S. Air Force after an outstanding 30-year career. In the 11 years of his tenure, the Academy has grown in terms of number of students enrolled to the extent that it is now the largest independent college preparatory school in the nation. Among his many contributions, he has helped the Academy reach prominence on a national level in many areas and he has been instrumental in establishing various financial programs resulting in a \$308,000 scholarship program and other benefits to the school.

General Spivey has purchased a home in Winter Park, Fla., and will move there following his retirement shortly after the close of the current session of the Culver Summer Schools.

Robert W. Kurtz, Age 32, Killed In Vietnam War

Memorial Fund Established

Maj. Robert W. Kurtz, 32, a former Culver resident, was killed in Vietnam June 25 on a low-flying observation mission, the Army has announced.

Kurtz was a 1953 graduate of Culver High School and formerly lived with his aunt, Mrs. C. L. Shively of Culver.

Kurtz was born March 6, 1935, to John and May Warner Kurtz in Toledo, Ohio. His father, now of Adrian, Mich., is among the survivors.

Also surviving are his widow, the former Ann Pfister, and a son, Robert Carl Kurtz, of Lawton Okla.; a sister, Mrs. James Kowatch, LaPaz; and Mrs. Shively.

After leaving Culver, Kurtz graduated from Purdue University, Lafayette, in 1957. He had been in the Army for nine and a half years.

Mrs. Shively, Mr. Kurtz of Adrian, Mich., and Mr. and Mrs. James Kowatch of LaPaz attended the funeral services in the Post Chapel at Ft. Sill, Okla., on Thursday morning, July 6. Burial was made at Ft. Sill with full military honors.

A memorial fund in honor of Kurtz has been established at Culver Community Schools by his classmates and friends.

It has been called to the attention of the Board of Trustees that certain properties in the Town of Culver have been allowed to grow up in weeds and are badly in need of a general clean up.

For the health, safety and appearance of the Town, the Board is asking that these weeds be cut and cleaned up and that this be done within the next ten days.

The Indiana law gives towns the authority to require each owner of real estate to cut and remove weeds and if this is not

done within a designated time the town may then cause the weeds to be cut and removed with the property owner being billed for the costs thereof.

Alumnus Named One Of Top Ten Alumni Magazines

Culver Alumnus, official publication of Culver Military Academy, has won five awards and been named for the second year as one of ten best alumni magazines in the nation.

Announcement of the awards to the Culver magazine was made at the American Alumni Council's national conference in San Francisco, which concluded July 6.

Edited by Robert Reichley, director of public relations, the Culver Alumnus was again the only secondary school magazine to be named to the AAC's "top 10." The honored list included magazines from the University of California, Washington University of St. Louis, Yale University, the Yale University Medical School, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the University of Oregon, Wesleyan University of Middletown, Conn., and Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa.

"The California Monthly," representing the University of California at Berkeley, won the twenty-fifth Robert Sibley Award as the top magazine of the year.

A distinctive merit citation for the magazine's coverage of alumni highlighted by one article on Hal Holbrook, the Culver alumnus nationally known for his portrayal of Mark Twain;

One of the "best pictures of 1967," an action photograph taken by Reichley of the Academy's national champion war canoe team;

Honorable mention for the magazine's coverage of Academy students.

Of last year's top 10 magazines, only UCLA, Lehigh, and Culver repeated in 1967.

STUART LOWRY TO ATTEND MATHEMATICS INSTITUTE

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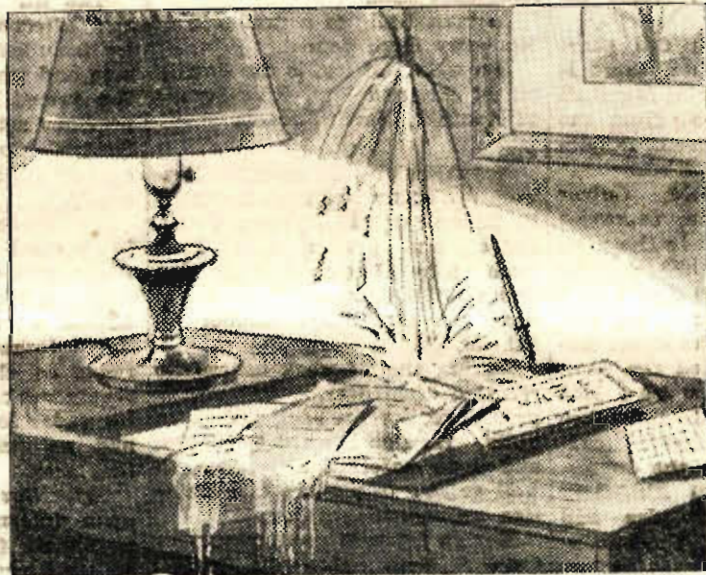

Air Force Opens Training Schools

The Air Force has announced that effective July 1st it opened its technical training schools to men and women of any branch of the Armed Forces who have had previous active duty service. Sgt. Sanford Corbell, Air Force recruiter in South Bend, said recently.

The move, the first of its kind in several years, means that many who separated from the gible to return and receive Air Armed Forces will now be eligible for technical training in such fields as electronic digital data repair work and automatic tracking radar repair, even if the man had no previous experience in that area.

Sgt. Corbell indicated that upon determination that a man is eligible for the new program he can immediately apply for any one of 37 Air Force technical training courses, at such loca-

tions as Denver, Colorado, Biloxi, Mississippi, and San Antonio and Wichita Falls, Texas.

Under the new program, once a prior serviceman is selected for a school he by-passes basic training and is assigned directly to technical training. After completion he goes direct to his duty location at one of over a hundred bases world-wide.

In many cases, a returning serviceman may be able to retain the rank he held when he separated and will receive all pay and allowances, including recent pay raises.

Sgt. Corbell cautioned that although the number of career fields eligible is large now, the new program will operate on a "first-come, first-served" basis.

Sgt. Corbell will be available for interviews at 204 S. Main St., South Bend from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday through Friday.

Purdue University supervised the production, weighing, and testing operations, in cooperation with the official breed improvement programs of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

This level of production may be compared to the average U. S. dairy cow's estimated annual output of 8,513 pounds of milk containing 315 pounds of butterfat.

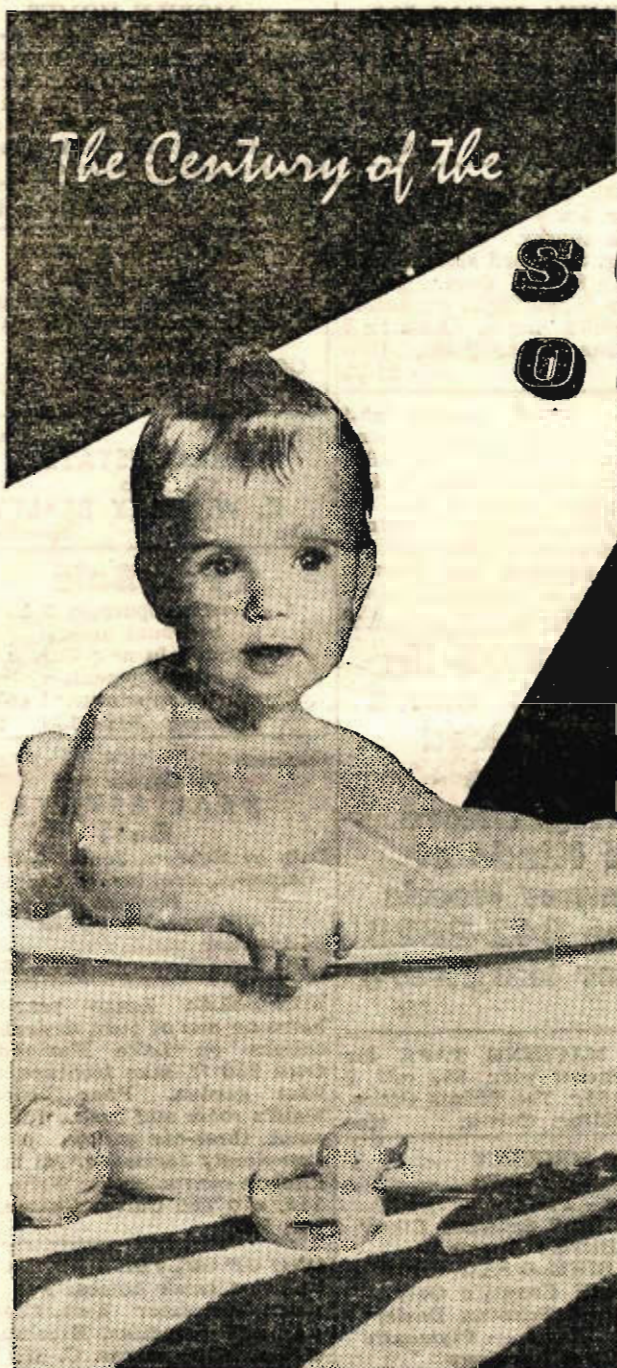

ROBERT SHIRRELL ENROLLS AT UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO

Robert Carl Shirrell son of Mr. and Mrs. Omer C. Shirrell, of Box 52, Ober, Ind; will enroll in the undergraduate College of The University of Chicago this fall.

A graduate of Culver High School, Robert will enroll in the University under its Small School Talent Search Program.

The Program, now entering its seventh year, is designed to encourage gifted students from small high schools, usually in smaller, rural communities, to enroll at the University.

The University provides financial assistance for each student based on need. The average financial aid for students enrolled under the Program in 1967 will be \$1,850.

Approximately 10 per cent of the 2,500 students enrolled in the University's College are in the Small School Talent Search Program. Total University campus enrollment is approximately 7,800.

A total of 58 freshmen will enroll at the University under the Program this fall. They come from 14 different states; Montana and Minnesota have the greatest number, with 14 each.

In recent years, students enrolled under the Program have made notable contributions to the University. One was named a Rhodes Scholar, a number have gone on to graduate study, and 11 have been appointed to the University's Maroon Key Honor Society, which has a limited membership.
