Work began in Culver this week on a \$29,000 telephone installation equipment project which will add 12 circuits between Culver and South Bend, Indiana Bell Manager James H. Rader announced.

"We are undertaking this project at this time because of an increased demand for communications services between these two communities," Rader said.

Technicians from the Western Electric Company, manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System, are installing the terminals, carrier equipment and other facilities needed to provide the additional circuits.

Troop And Band To Appear In Horse Show At Plymouth

The famed Lancer Platoon of Culver Military Academy's summer Black Horse Troop and the Naval School marching band will make special appearances at the Plymouth Horse Show on Friday, July 28.

The Lancers will perform in a 20-minute precision mounted drill at approximately 8:30 p.m. The horse show begins at 6:30 p.m. at Centennial Park and is sponsored jointly by the Kiwanis Club and the Marshall County Horsemen's Association. Proceeds from the event are devoted to a Kiwanis Club college scholarship and various charities to which funds are contributed by the Marshall County Horsemen's Association.

Culver's Lancer Platoon is made up of 25 young riders enrolled in the School of Horsemanship during the current session of the Culver Summer Schools. The Lancer Platoon is the honor organization of the Black Horse Troop and its members are carefully selected on a basis of their horsemanship ability, citizenship, and general interest in the Troop program. Lancer members must also maintain an acceptable academic record in the summer program.

Best known of the Culver organizations, the Black Horse Troop has, since its inception, served as the escort for foreign and U.S. dignitaries and has made public appearances in many sections of the nation. While the Winter School edition of the Troop is best known for its appearance in five Presidential Inaugural Parades, the summer Troop has made its own reputation by appearing in many important parades and pageants in the Midwest.

The summer Troop, currently celebrating its sixtieth anniversary, also is well known for its 100-mile cross-country hike each year. Members of the Lancer Platoon join with 100 other members of the Troop for a week's trip on horseback through much of the surrounding countryside.

The Naval School band is also well known for its appearances throughout the Northern Indiana area. Directed by Col. Edward T. Payson, bandmaster and chairman of the music and art department, the Culver musicians appear both as a marching and concert band during various events at Culver. The 100-piece band each summer attracts talented student musicians from other high school musical organizations throughout the Midwest.

Students who will appear in Plymouth on July 28 are part of an overall Culver Summer Schools' enrollment of 1,735 boys and girls from every part of the nation and 20 foreign countries. Culver is the largest summer educational-recreational program of its type in the nation.

Medicare

Now that Medicare has been in operation for almost a year according to Mr. Charles E. Burke, District Manager of the Social Security Administration, South Bend, Indiana District Office located at 125 S. Lafayette Blvd., many people are wondering if there is a time limit on submitting bills for reimbursement of payments made to hospitals or doctors. Some people who paid medical expenses in 1966 believe they should have submitted their bills as of December 31, 1966; others believe they can wait until June

30, 1967, a year after Medicare started, and still others believe that there is no time limit at all. The fact is that an application for reimbursement must be filed by the end of the year following the year in which the expenses were incurred. For example, if a patient received medical services in August 1966, and paid over \$50 at that time, he would have until December 31, 1967, in which to file an application for reimbursement.

When a claim is filed, continued Mr. Burke, certain things can be done to expedite processing and insuring speedy reimburse-

ment. The claim number should be shown in all cases, and should be shown on each receipt received from a doctor. This is necessary to identify the claimant. All receipts should show the type of service rendered by the doctor. The signature of the person who received the Medicare services should be on each claim, together with his address. Where the patient died and the claim for reimbursement is made by someone on behalf of the estate, an additional form must be filed by that person, namely, Form SSA-1660. This form can be secured from the South Bend Social Security Office. Finally, Mr. Burke advises that since the social security office is equipped to help people file their Medicare claims, it is a good idea for a beneficiary to come to the office to file his first claim and have the request for payment forms checked so that claims can be filed correctly. These precautions will help both the claimant and the organization handling medical insurance benefits in this area to properly process the claim, and expedite the reimbursement of Medicare expenses.

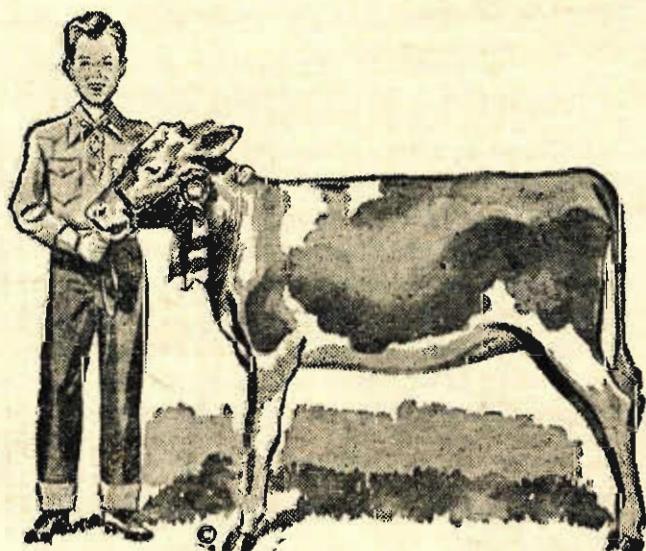
