Proceeds from the event are devoted to a Kiwanis Club college scholarship and various charities to which funds are contributed by the Marshall County Horsemen's Association.

Culver's Lancer Platoon is made up of 25 young riders enrolled in the School of Horsemanship during the current session of the Culver Summer Schools. The Lancer Platoon is the honor organization of the Black Horse Troop and its members are carefully selected on a basis of their horsemanship ability, citizenship, and general interest in the Troop program. Lancer members must also maintain an acceptable academic record in the summer program.

Best known of the Culver organizations, the Black Horse Troop has, since its inception, served as the escort for foreign and U.S. dignitaries and has made public appearances in many sections of the nation. While the Winter School edition of the Troop is best known for its appearance in five Presidential Inaugural Parades, the summer Troop has made its own reputation by appearing in many important parades and pageants in the Midwest.

The summer Troop, currently celebrating its sixtieth anniversary, also is well known for its 100-mile cross-country hike each year, Members of the Lancer Platoon join with 160 other members of the Troop for a week's trip on horseback through much of the surrounding countryside.

The Naval School band is also well known for its appearances throughout the Northern Indiana area. Directed by Col. Edward T. Payson, bandmaster and chairman of the music and art department, the Culver musicians appear both as a marching and concert band during various events at Culver. The 100-piece band each summer attracts talented student musicians from other high school musical organizations throughout the Midwest.

All receipts should show the type of service rendered by the doctor. The signature of the person who received the Medicare services should be on each claim, together with his address. Where the patient died and the claim for reimbursement is made by someone on behalf of the estate, an additional form must be filed by that person, namely, Form SSA-1660. This form can be secured from the South Bend Social Security Office.

Finally, Mr. Burke advises that since the social security office is equipped to help people file their Medicare claims, it is a good idea for a beneficiary to come to the office to file his first claim and have the request for payment forms checked so that claims can be filed correctly. These precautions will help both the claimant and the organization handling medical insurance benefits in this area to properly process the claim, and expedite the reimhursement of Medicare expenses.


