Clown Kelly Booked For Harvest Festival At Kewanna August 24-26



Pat Kelly, famous tramp clown and son of Emmett Kelly, has been booked for the 1967 Kewanna Harvest Festival, according to Francis E. Sanders, general chairman.

He will be on the Festival midway all during the three-day event, Aug. 24, 25, 26 and also will appear in the parade on Aug. 26.

Kelly comes from a long line of circus performers. He started performing as a clown when he was a child in his father's act and carried on in the business as a teenager and while he was in the Marine Corps.

After discharge from the service, he toured with circuses in Canada, Mexico, Europe and the United States. He was with the Hamid Morton Circus for several years and will join Ringling Bros. & Barnum Bailey later this year.

Eva Lewis, a female clown who has traveled with all the large circuses in the United States, also will be in the Aug. 26 parade, Sanders said.

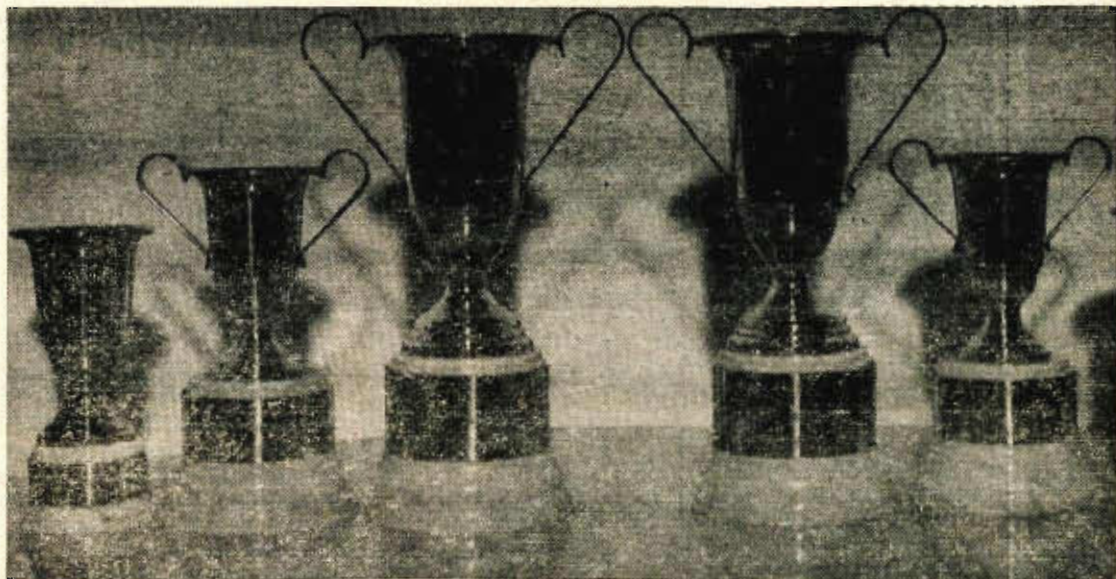
Sanders said he expects this year's parade to be bigger than any of the previous ones. It will include bands, animals, horses, floats, marching units, queens from surrounding areas, twirling and flag corp and celebrity guests. Over 500 units are already entered in this year's parade to date.

The Harvest Festival will begin the night of Aug. 24 and end the night of Aug. 26. The parade will be Saturday at 2 p.m. Special Kids Parade and contests will be Friday afternoon.

Outboard Races To Be Held On Lake Maxinkuckee

More than 50 top outboard racing pilots, representing a seven-state area, will compete for coveted prizes in the quest for 1968 national honors and \$500 in cash awards in the 1968 outboard races to be held here on Lake Maxinkuckee off the Town Park and beach Sunday, Aug. 6.

Earl D. Overmyer, Culver Lions' Club Chairman for the benefit race, indicated today that this year's eight-race event will attract one of the largest entries in the history of the Racing Regatta which is being renewed this year after a lapse of 10 years.

Sanctioned by the National Outboard Association, there will be two heats in each of eight races in the competition of Hydroplanes, Service Runabouts and Racing Runabouts.

Official referee and starter will be Morley Smith, Indianapolis; judges are Joyce Schwieler, Greenfield, and Ruby O'Brien, Indianapolis. Don Dennis, Indianapolis, will be the announcer.

Last minute plans for handling the large crowd are being carried out by the Culver Lions' Club under the direction of Chairman Overmyer. Funds from the Regatta are utilized by the civic club for community service projects.

Lions' officials will ask for donations from people entering the park for the race. There is no charge at any other time for the use of the Culver Park.

Naval School Inspection Set For Friday

Midshipmen of the Culver Summer Naval School will undergo the Navy Department's annual inspection Friday.

Capt. Louis J. Papas, professor of naval science at Notre Dame University, will inspect the 713-member Naval School. He will meet with Academy officials and inspect activities and facilities of the Naval School.

The inspecting party will view a Navy Drill Team exhibition at 9:40 and a garrison parade at 10 a.m. in front of the Riding Hall before inspecting other campus facilities. The inspection will conclude with a reception at the home of Rear Admiral John W. Bays, USN (Ret.), director of the Summer Schools.

The Culver Summer Naval School is the largest of the four honor naval schools in the country, and the format for all naval honor schools was patterned after Culver's. Culver must show annually that it maintains the standards which it helped set.

The Culver Summer Schools operate the largest educational-recreational summer programs of their type in the nation.

Evening Courses Scheduled At Ancilla Domini College

Evening courses for the fall semester have been tentatively listed by four departments of Ancilla Domini College, Donaldson. The Department of Art, English, History and Mathematics have decided to schedule courses for the evening should a sufficient number of students prefer those hours.

The Department of Art will give a two credit-hour course in painting and a one credit-hour course in lettering.

The English Department is offering COMMUNICATIONS, a four-credit hour basic course that is a requisite for all students entering college.

INTRODUCTION TO DRAMA is a three credit-hour course that treats drama from the time of the ancient Greeks to the present.

THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE introduces the student to a history of the language, to semantics, linguistics, theories of grammar, etc. It is a two credit-hour course.

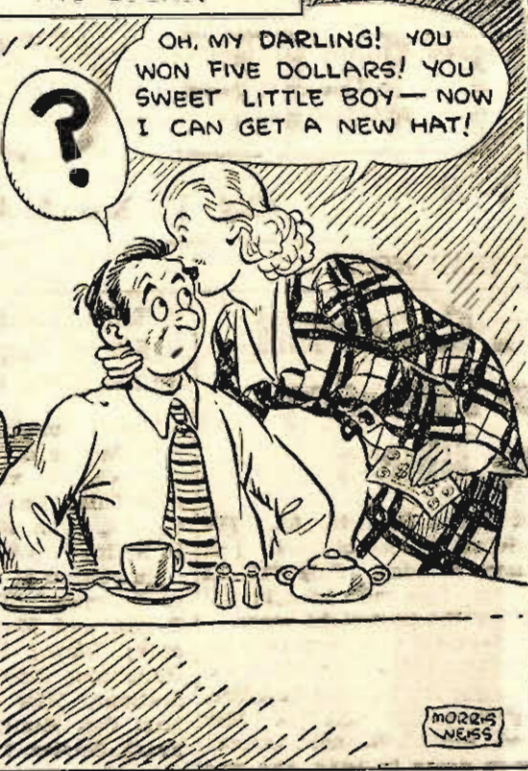
WORLD CIVILIZATIONS I (3 credit hours) will be offered in the evenings by the History Department. It concerns itself with a historical introduction to major societies of the world, both Western and non-Western, tracing the principal aspects of their development from early times to the present.

partment of Mathematics. MATHEMATICAL CONCEPTS I (4 credit hours) gives the understanding of the basic structure of elementary mathematics.

College classes begin Aug. 29. Ordinarily evening classes meet twice a week. They are open to credit and non-credit students.

A fee ranging from \$15 to \$20 per course covers the cost of a non-credit course. The regular tuition fee of \$15 per credit-hour is charged for credit courses.

Application for enrollment in either day or evening classes will be accepted through the mail un-

til Aug. 12. Personal registration is set for Aug. 14. The number of applications received by that date will determine which of the above courses will be given during the evening hours.

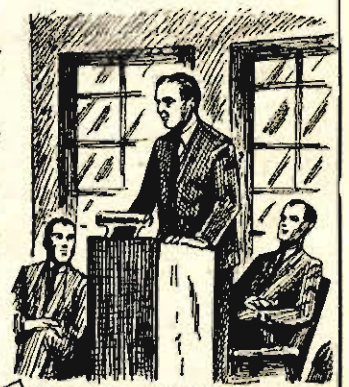

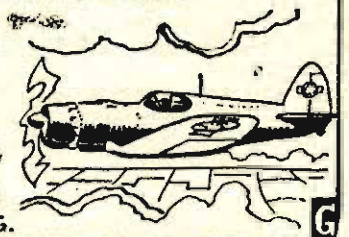

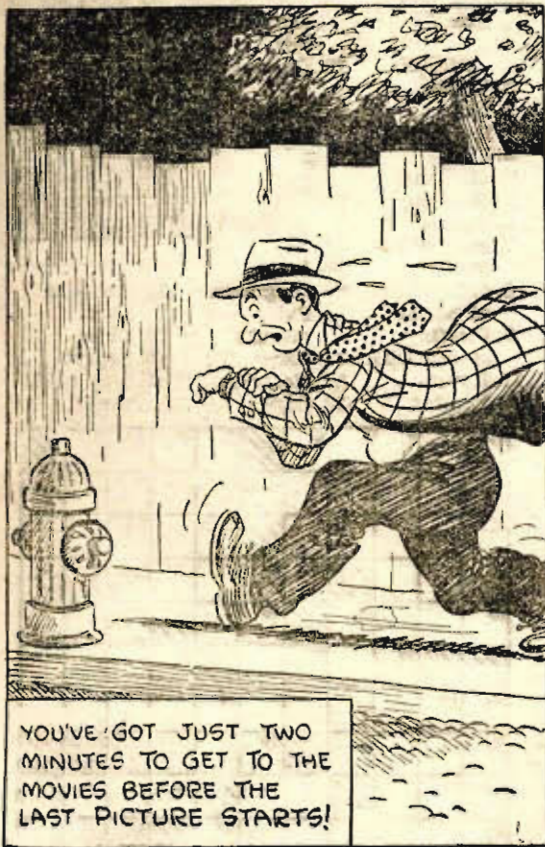

HINTS ON HEALTH

BELL'S PALSY
PARALYSIS of the facial nerve with loss of facial movement and expression is known as Bell's palsy.

There is inability to move the muscles of one side of the face and characteristic distortion, with the mouth drawn toward the unaffected side. The paralysis is usually abrupt in origin although there may be some mild pain behind the ear, or in the eye and face, before the onset.

When the paralysis reaches its peak in a few hours, the facial weakness produces a sensation of stiffness, speech becomes muffled and eating is difficult due to the relaxation of the lips and cheek. The eye on the affected side cannot be closed, there is an overflow of tears, blurred vision, loss of taste and possibly some drooling.

In a mild case, Bell's palsy begins to subside within two weeks and may clear completely in one or two months. When the paralysis is severe, recovery is often followed by some disruption in the movement of the affected side of the face such as a twitching at the corner of the mouth.

There is no direct cure for this affliction. Permanent deformity in the weakened facial muscles can be partly prevented by the patient himself through daily massage. Eventual recovery is reported in more than 80% of cases of Bell's palsy.
