## Tribute Paid To General Spivey; Black Horse Troop

Editor's Note: The following is a copy of the insertion by Congressman Brademas in the Congressional Record of Aug. 17, 1967:

RETIREMENT OF MAJ. GEN. DELMAR T. SPIVEY, U.S. AIR FORCE, RETIRED, AS SUPERINTENDENT OF CULVER MILITARY ACADEMY; 70TH ANNIVERSARY OF CULVER'S BLACK HORSE TROOP

Mr. BRADEMAS (at the request of Mr. Pryor) was granted permission to extend his remarks at this point in the Record and to include extraneous matter.)

Mr. BRADEMAS, Mr. Speaker, I take this opportunity to note the end of the 11-year tenure of Maj. Gen. Delmar T. Spivey, U.S. Air Force, retired, as superintendent of the Culver Military Academy, located at Culver, Ind., in my congressional district.

During General Spivey's superintendency, Culver has become the largest and one of the best known college preparatory schools in the Nation. Its graduates, 99.6 percent of whom go on to college, are attending more than 80 colleges and universities throughout the Nation. General Spivey has brought prominence to Culver, to independent education and to the Midwest through the same special brand of leadership that marked his outstanding 32-year career in the Armed Forces. It is fitting that the last official function over which General Spivey will preside before he retires will be the 70th anniversary of the Black Horse Troop. Though the smallest unit of Culver Military Academy, the troop is the best known in both winter and summer programs. As the largest remaining mounted military organization in the Nation, the Black Horse Troop has participated in inaugural parades for Presidents Wilson, Eisenhower, Kennedy, and Johnson, and has served as escorts for foreign dignitaries. Several hundred former troopers, many of whom have ridden in one of the five presidential inauguration parades, are returning to Culver for the anniversary celebration which takes place from August 17 to 20, 1967.

Members of the troop have the same pride in excellence that General Spivey has inspired throughout all of Culver Military Academy. For those who are returning to Culver for the reunion, there is an opportunity not only to pay tribute to Culver Military Academy, General Spivey and the Black Horse Troop, but also to mark the importance of the horse in the growth and development of this Nation. As such, the troop remains as one of the last units to continue in the noble tradition of the U.S. cavalry.

Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to pay tribute today to Culver Military Academy, its retiring superintendent, General Spivey, and to the Black Horse Troop and its members from virtually every State in the Nation and many foreign countries.

I wish also to take this opportunity to welcome General Spivey's successor as superintendent, Brig. Gen. John W. Dobson, USA, retired. As a Culver alumnus and a distinguished military officer with a deep commitment to education, General Dobson assures the continued growth and excellence of one of America's great independent schools.

## Col. E. T. Payson Retires After 41 Years At Academy

A bronze plaque honoring Col. Edward T. Payson, veteran bandmaster, has been presented to Culver Military Academy by members of the summer Naval School band.

Col. Payson, chairman of the music department and holder of the Hough Family Chair of Fine Arts, retires at the end of August after 41 years of service to the Academy.

The bronze plaque was designated by Academy Artist-in-residence Warner Williams and will hang in the Music and Art Building, where winter and summer bands rehearse. It was presented at the final band concert in which Col. Payson conducted. It reads:

"Col. Edward T. Payson — from his Summer School Bands in grateful appreciation of his unceasing effort to bring out the best in us."

A Culver graduate, Col. Payson returned to teach music at the Academy after his graduation from Harvard College. He first served under the late Col. William O'Callaghan, and then became chairman of the music department in 1939. He directed the winter and summer bands in thousands of parades, concerts, and recitals along with teaching music to Culver students. His students came from every part of the nation and many foreign countries, and particularly in the summer program, he has worked with top student musicians from other good high school bands.

Colonel Payson is well known as a composer and arranger. Many of the marches played by the Culver band were either written by Col. Payson or arranged for band by him. He has also written compositions other than hand music. One of the best known of these compositions is "Maxinkuckee Sketches."

Along with his own conducting, writing, and arranging, Col. Payson is also an accomplished musician. A cellist, he joined with John and Frank Gaska and Patricia McHenry to form the Recording Trust Fund Quartet, which is now known as the Michiana String Quartet. The Michiana group has appeared in many cities in the Northern Indiana area and plays regularly in the South-Bend-Elkhart area. Said the Culver Alumnus, official publication of the Academy upon Col. Payson's retirement:

"The Michiana String Quartet has played far and wide, and in this world Ed Payson is a 1,000 miles from the 'Stars and Stripes Forever.' In chamber music recitals, the Payson cello emerges with force and beauty. What he has believed in for 41 years is concentrated in those moments in a piece of polished wood and a few strings.

"Culver will find other bandmasters and chairmen of the music department, but Ed Payson's influence on thousands of young musicians isn't easily replaced."

Col. Payson is a native of Lanesville, Mass., but prepared for college at Alexandria, Ind.

Earl R. Rieck, 61, Monterey, Ind., died at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 19, at his residence in Monterey.

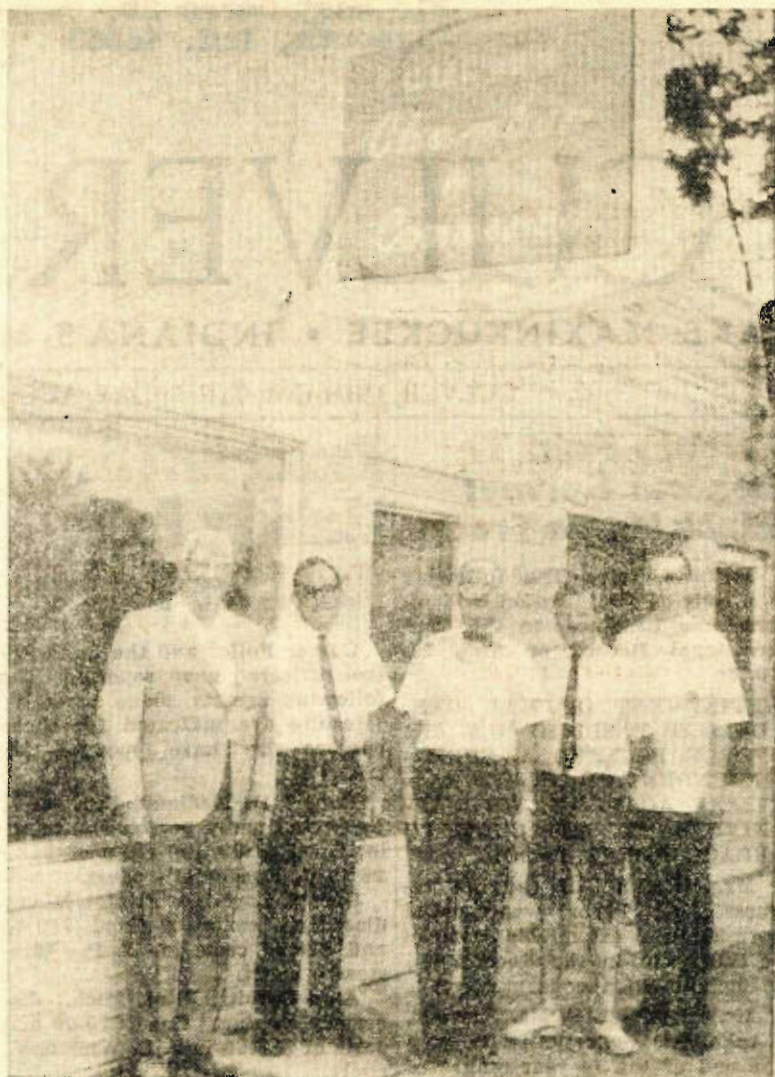

### COMMUNITY FLOWER SHOW TO BE HELD DURING BLUEBERRY FESTIVAL

"For the Beauty of the Earth" is the theme chosen for the Community Flower Show to be held during the Blueberry Festival, Sept. 3 and 4, at Plymouth.

Sponsored by the Marshall County Federation of Clubs officers, the show will be in conjunction with the Arts and Crafts Show. It will be held in the Jefferson School.

The schedule, staging, entries, hospitality, judges and clerks, publicity, and dismantling committees will come from twelve federated and four affiliated clubs.

The Rules Committee has set a list of rules which will be fol-

lowed in all phases of the Flower Show:

1— Entries are open to amateur flower growers in Marshall County.

2— Only one entry to each class is permitted, but exhibitors may enter as many classes as they wish.

3— Horticulture (specimen flowers) must be grown by exhibitors. Exhibitors must furnish containers for single specimens.

4— Neither the club nor the committees are responsible for any loss or damage. Name and address should be on the bottom of containers for identification.

5— Arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor.

6— Decisions of the judges are final. Ribbons will be awarded

for first, second and third places, and for honorable mention.

7— No artificial flowers or greenery will be permitted.

8— Accessories may be used in all classes.

9— Entries must be in before Saturday, Sept. 2, and must be removed by Monday, Sept. 4.

10— Late entries may be displayed, but will not be judged.

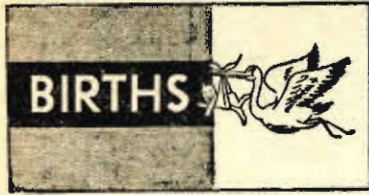

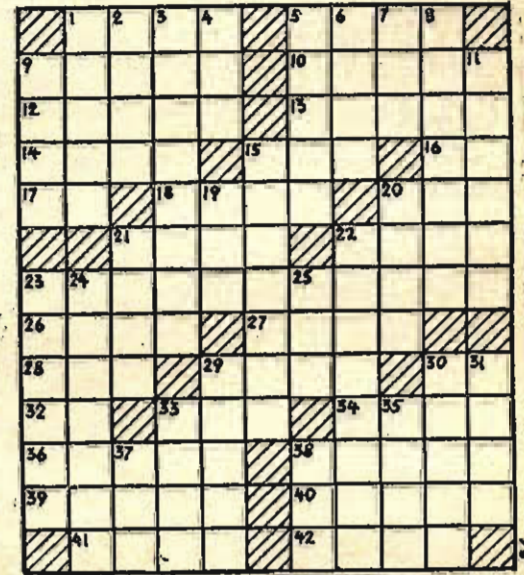

These restrictions are put there for no other reason than to protect each and every person. So, if we are going to have zoning, let's obey its zoning rules and regulations and fine the violators.

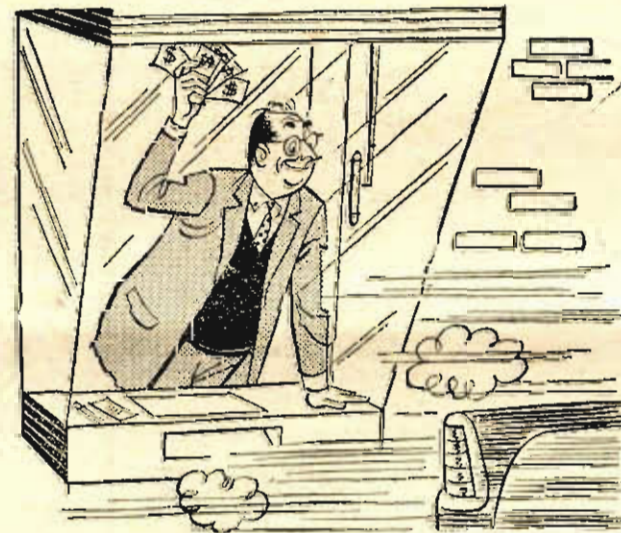
The reason laws are passed are for the few that never think of anyone other than themselves. They feel their rights are being taken away from them, not realizing that the law is also protecting them.

## NOTED MARSHALL COUNTY PIONEER DANIEL McDONALD MEMORIALIZED BY MASONS

Masons in this area will join Lodges throughout the State in simultaneous local ceremonies to decorate the graves of distinguished Masonic leaders, Sunday, Aug. 27.

Memorial Tributes Day is a feature of the Grand Lodge of Indiana's year-long Sesquicentennial celebration. Floral Masonic emblems will be placed on 121 graves in 41 counties and seven states by 76 Lodges. Ten Lodges outside Indiana will perform the ceremony as a courtesy to an Indiana Lodge.

The event will fall on the 150th anniversary of a meeting in Lexington, Ky., which led to the founding of the Grand Lodge of Indiana in 1818.

To be memorialized in this Aug. 27 event in this locality will be Daniel McDonald (1833-1916) who is buried at Oak Hill Cemetery in Plymouth.

McDonald, born May 6, 1833, near Connorsville, came to Marshall County as a lad and, with his family, moved to Plymouth in 1849, where he became the first telegraph operator and subsequently was postmaster, bank cashier, served two terms in the State Legislature, was Clerk of Marshall Circuit Court, member of Plymouth school board, news-

paper editor, author, historian, and also 30th Grand Master of Masons in Indiana.

McDonald died Jan. 9, 1916, and was buried with Masonic honors in the Plymouth cemetery.

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# FUN & FITNESS

In order to accomplish the Backward Lift exercise follow these easy directions.

Stand with your feet well apart and the ball held behind you. Press your shoulders back to lift your chest and at the same time breathe in deeply. Raise your chin and open your mouth to permit neck stretch. Push the ball back away from your seat and legs. This position opens the chest wide so that you may breathe more deeply.

Slowly bend forward from your hips letting all the air out of your lungs. When you get to the bottom of the bend try to force the last vestiges of air out as you lift the ball as high as you can. At first you may "see stars" as very few people really get rid of all the "dead" air that stays in their lungs. Do eight, slowly.

## Backward Lift & Bent Knee Situps

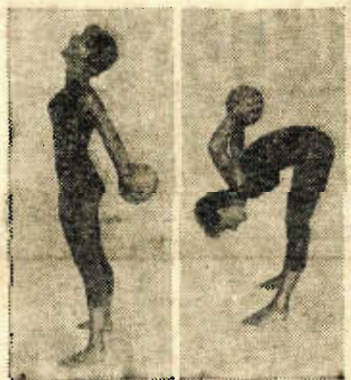

(In this segment Bonnie discusses the Backward Lift and Bent Knee Situp exercises. These exercises are achieved with the aid of a bowling ball.)

### BACKWARD LIFT



### BENT KNEE SITUPS

This is the single best exercise for strengthening the abdominals, for flattening a "pot belly" and for improving the size and shape of the waist as well. Notice the situps are done with bent knees. This position makes it impossible for the seat muscles to help the abdominals pull you to a sitting position. Since they are attached to the pelvis in the back and the top of the thigh in front, strain in this area could give you a backache. But with the seat muscles "out of it" the abdominals get the workout without back strain.



Clasp the ball between your feet and lie down with knees bent and hands behind your head. Roll up to a sitting position with rounded back and then straighten. Roll down slowly with rounded back. Start with five and work up to ten and finally twenty.

The strengthening of the abdominal muscles from the Backward Lift and Bent Knee Situp exercises also occurs in the course of the second step of the bowlers approach. Here, the ball is carried backward while the torso is carried forward heightening abdominal muscle activity.

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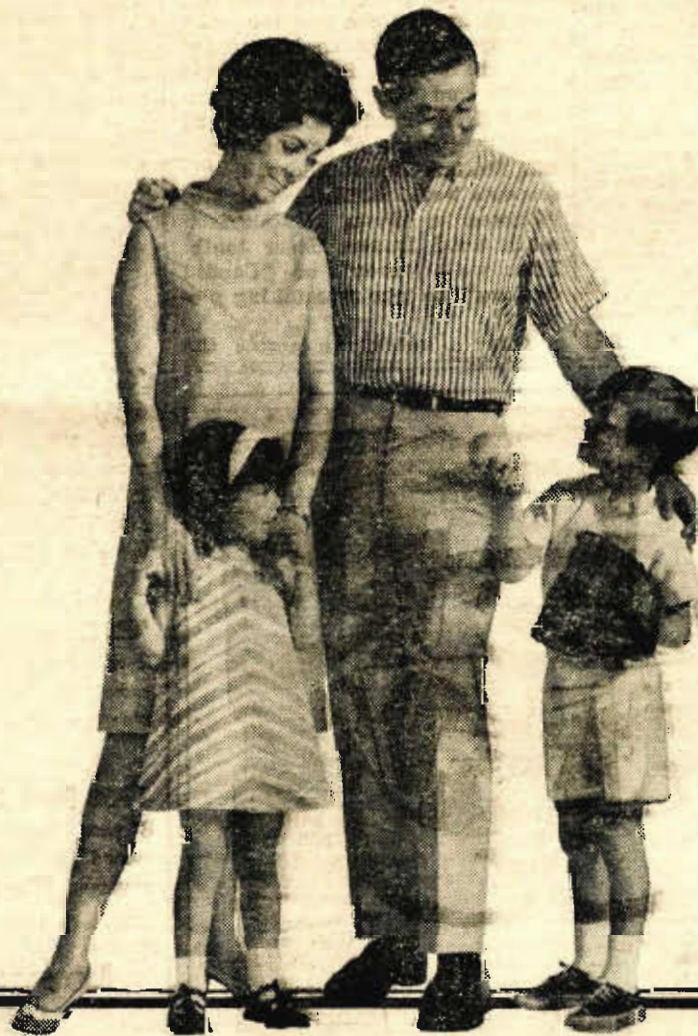
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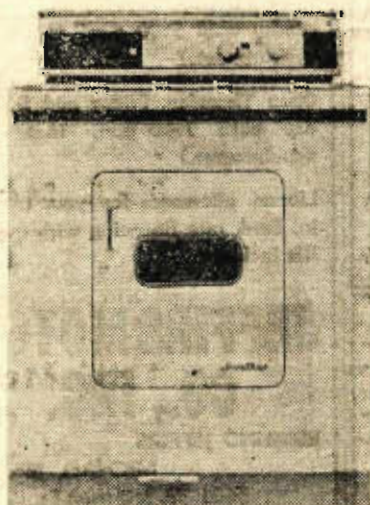
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## On The Right Tack

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### TETANUS

WITH the return of outdoor activities comes the hazard of minor accidents, cuts and scratches. Most often these aren't serious and will heal quickly if properly cleaned and protected. When you are immunized, your body manufactures antibodies that will fight tetanus toxin. A booster is need every ten years and whenever you are injured.

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
