Staff appointments and assignments in the Culver Community Schools have been completed and all positions are filled with the exception of those to be assigned as Teacher's Aids and the Music position at Monterey-Aubbeenaubee Schools, Robert Rust, Superintendent, announced today.

David Burkett, Route 3, Rochester has been named Coach and Supervisor of Athletics at Monterey School. Mr. Burkett will teach Physical Education, Grades 7-10, and Social Studies. A graduate of Richland Center High School, Burkett attended New Mexico University before entering Western Michigan where he graduated this month with a B. ## Culver Community Schools To Open Thursday, Aug. 31

The 1967-68 academic term at Culver, Aubbeenaubee, and Monterey Schools will begin at 1 p.m., Aug. 31, administrative officials of the Culver Community Schools district announced today.

Students new to the schools will enroll during the week preceding the formal opening. The book stores and the offices of the principals of the four schools are open daily.

Students of grades 1-12 are to report at 1 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 31, at Culver and Monterey, and at 1:40 p.m. at Aubbeenaubee. School will be dismissed at 3 p.m. on the opening day.

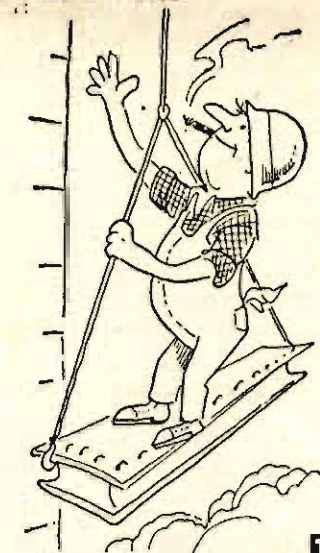
On September 1st, academic classes will begin. School will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. with the regular session in effect on Tuesday, Sept. 5.

## THE STORY OF LABOR DAY



Light up a cigar on Labor Day in honor of our country's working men. And when you and the family are making plans for the long Labor Day weekend, you may appreciate this special occasion more if you know something about its interesting origin, and how to make this Labor Day an especially safe and enjoyable one for the whole family.

Labor Day was founded in 1882 by Peter J. McGuire, a co-founder of the American Federation of Labor. At a meeting of the Central Labor Union (better known as the Knights of Labor), in New York on May 8, 1882, McGuire proposed a celebration in honor of "those who from rude nature have delved and carved all the great grandeur we behold."

When the first Labor Day was observed, Tuesday, September 5, 1882, 10,000 workmen marched down the streets of New York City. The first proposal for Labor Day observances suggested a parade followed by amusements and picnics for workers and their families. From 1883 to the present, Labor Day has

been observed on the first Monday in September.

Today, Labor Day is a legal holiday in all of the 50 states and the Territories. While it's still celebrated with parades and picnics in many places, a large number of Americans also take advantage of the three day weekend Labor Day offers to take long drives to visit friends and family, or just to "see the sights."

## Indiana Press, Inc. Will Construct New Plant In Plymouth

Plymouth Industrial Development Corporation has sold the first parcel of industrial space in its 167-acre Plymouth Industrial Park, 3.3 acres purchased by Indiana Press, Inc. which will break ground soon for a new building.

The Indiana Press building will house the executive offices and printing facilities of the new company, recently formed by the merger of The Culver Press, Culver, and Town and Country Printers, Plymouth, according to PIDCO president, Charles O. Glaub. The new facility will contain 11,250 square feet.

Officers of the company are John A. Cleveland, Culver, president, David B. Cleveland, Indianapolis, vice president, and Archie McLiver, Plymouth, secretary and general manager.

Executive offices of Indiana Business & Industry magazine, a statewide monthly publication for management, will also be located in the building. L. W. Bellamy, formerly with the Plymouth Pilot-News and recently with Pure Oil Company's home office in Chicago edits the magazine. Indiana Press, Inc., prints IB&I.

The new building will be located north of Plymouth on the east side of Oak Road, just east of New World Products which is one of six industries PIDCO has attracted to Plymouth in the past nine years. PIDCO, capitalized with a \$110,000 stock sale in 1958, purchased the 167 acres for an industrial park a year ago after raising an addition \$120,000.

Procurement of the total \$230,000 has been entirely an in-community program, with all stockholders, numbering more than 300, living in the Plymouth area. PIDCO was initiated in 1958 by a cross-section of citizens from all types of businesses and professions.

The Plymouth Industrial Park is in the process of being annexed by the City of Plymouth, and the area is under extensive development for future industry. Members of PIDCO believe they will be able to add eight to ten new industries there within the next ten years.

PIDCO has been responsible for six new industries in Plymouth, with total employment of more than 400 persons. They include Indiana Press, Inc., Panel-Craft, Inc., Young Door Company, Bomarko, Inc., New World Products, Inc. and Mid-America Containers, Inc.

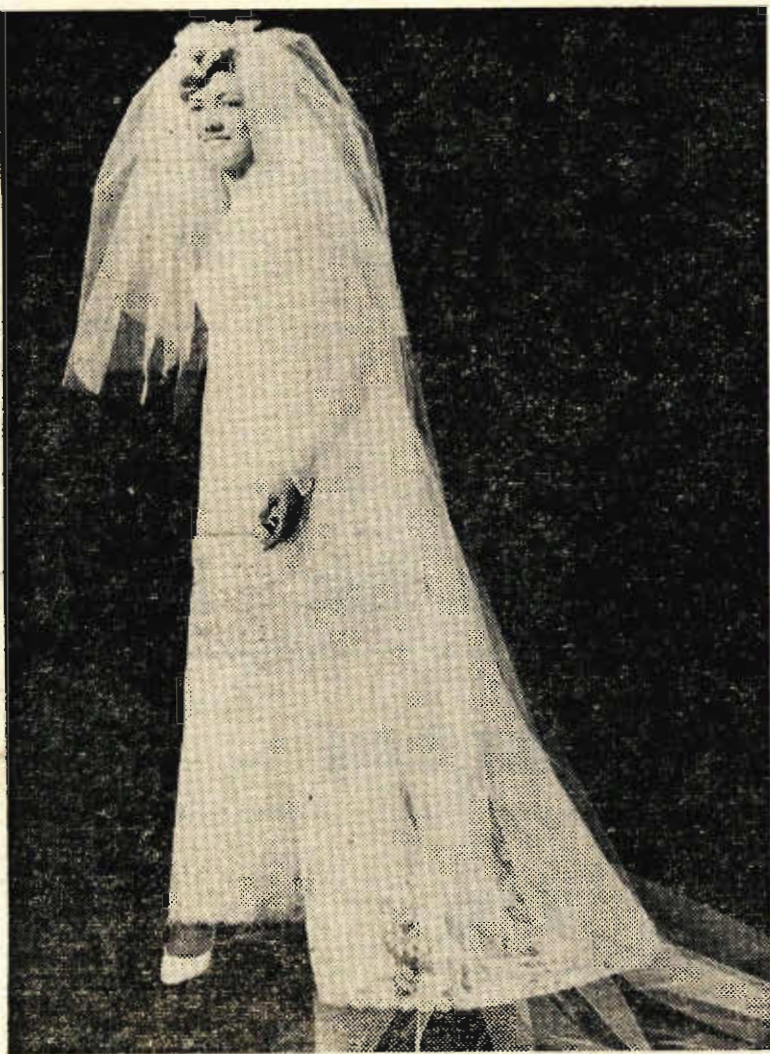

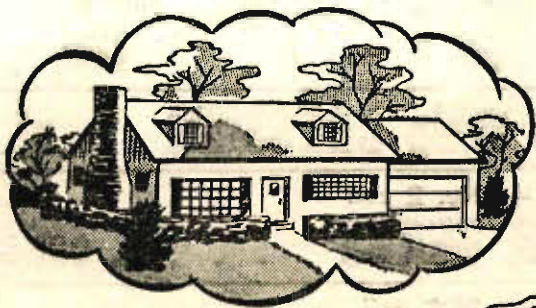

### College Students Attend Biennial Meeting At Christian Science Church

Man's intellectual thrust and religious insight must grow together. They cannot really be separated.

This was the message that 5,000 Christian Science college students heard from a leading British historian, an American diplomat, and a theatrical director. They were among the speakers at the Biennial College Meeting held Aug. 24-26 at The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston. Students from nearly 40 countries around the world attended.

It's a mistake to segregate the intellect as something distinct from spirituality, said Sir James R. M. Butler, a former member of the British Parliament and chief historian for Great Britain's World War II archives.

There are even some, he observed, who regard the intellect as "an obstacle to spiritual progress."

But the real obstacle, he suggested, may often be limited concept of what intellect is. It is more than a process of "brain and nerves, . . . more than reproduction at second hand of the thoughts of others."

From a deeper standpoint, man's "ability to think and know is . . . an expression of divine in-

telligence available to all as their inherent birthright," declared Sir James. He described this as an "open-ended" view that eliminates pride of intellect and helps to bring out freshness and originality of thought, in "our neighbors as well as ourselves."

Howard P. Jones — Chancellor of the East-West center at the University of Hawaii and former U. S. Ambassador to Indonesia — told about his experiences in major diplomatic situations in which spiritual insight played a decisive role. He indicated this role will grow bigger in the future.

"The most important development on the international scene in this generation," he said, "has been the acquisition of freedom by the new nations . . . stepping forward to claim their place in the sun, although many of them represent ancient civilizations and cultures. They are breaking their bonds of whatever kind — colonialism, ignorance, superstition, poverty. They are claiming the heritage of all free men."

This presents the world with a "great opportunity" for developing new and fruitful relationships, Mr. Jones indicated.

But with it comes a challenge: "the overwhelming, all-pervasive problem of our time is the establishment and preservation of peace . . . War saps at the roots of hard won freedom and prevents the realization of its blessings."

Those who seek the insight and inspiration to meet this challenge, said Mr. Jones, will find the increasing necessity of "reliance on God in reaching decisions."

George Hamlin, associate director of Harvard University's

Loeb Drama Center, spoke of the spiritual and intellectual ferment taking place in the theater. It is "in the midst of a revolution," he said, that requires audiences more than ever "to look perceptively, . . . to be mentally active."

Although admitting that much in today's theater is either nihilistic or frivolous, Mr. Hamlin urged the assembled students to look for the deeper values that are also present.

Good drama, he remarked, is a swift and exciting way of communicating ideas.

"Drama essentializes: it simplifies and arranges complicated characters and sprawling events into a meaningful concise design . . . Through plays, men have looked beyond immediate experience, have seen the foibles and triumphs, the grossness and nobility, the comic absurdity and the cosmic profundity in human experience."

Some 900 colleges and universities of many nations were represented among the attending students.

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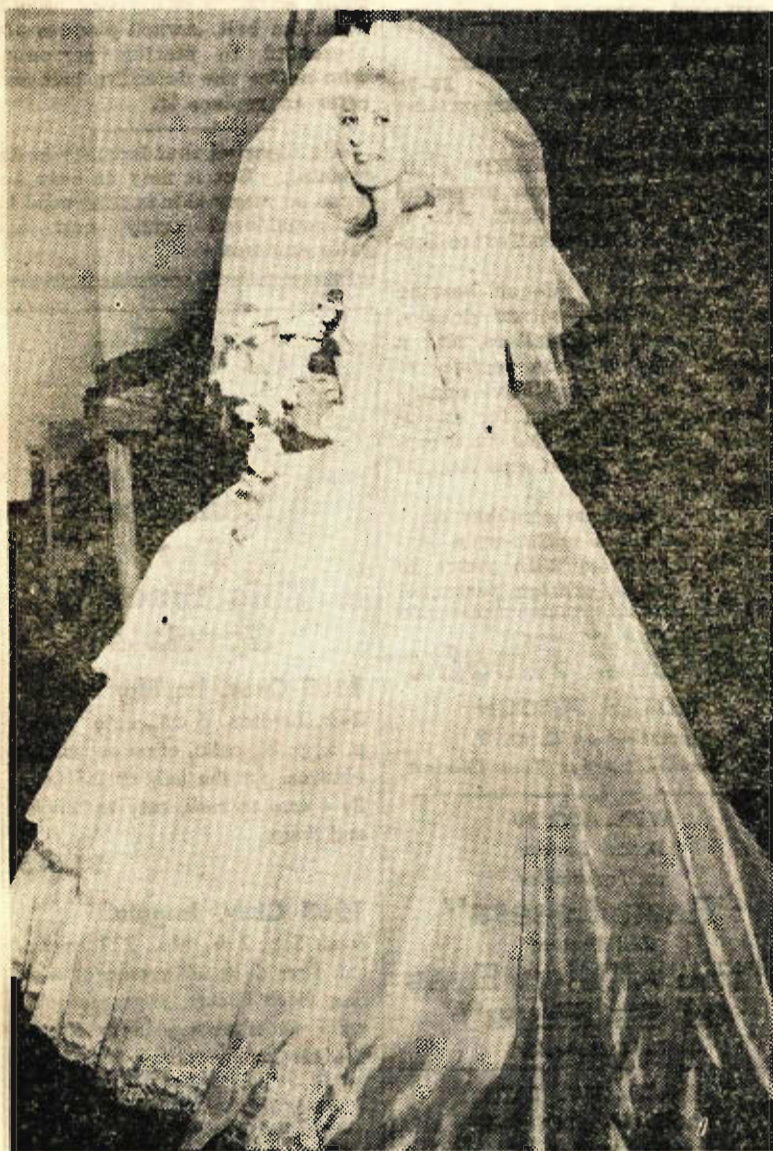

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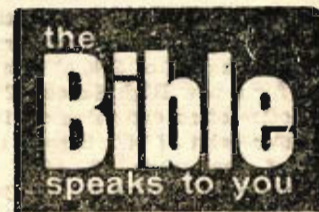

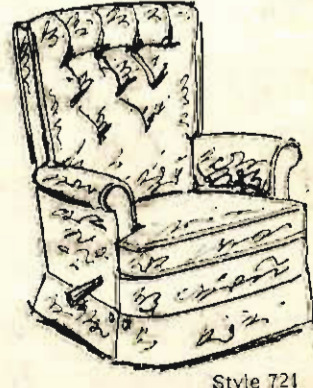

### Social Security

Social security beneficiaries who normally find their monthly checks in their mailbox on the 3rd of the month will no longer have to wait until the next day when the 3rd falls on a national holiday or a Sunday.

Mr. Charles E. Burke, district manager of the social security office in South Bend, said today that starting with the upcoming Labor Day weekend, social security checks will bear an earlier date and will be delivered on the previous mail-service day whenever the 3rd falls on a Sunday or a holiday. In September of this year the 3rd is on a Sunday.

"Most beneficiaries," he said, "will receive their social security checks on Saturday, Sept. 2, instead of on Tuesday, Sept. 5, as would have been the case under the old procedure."

Social security checks are normally released on the 3rd of the month under an agreement to stagger the receipt of monthly checks going out from various Federal agencies, so that post offices, the Treasury Department, and local banks will not be overburdened at any one time of the month.

Explaining the reason for the change, Mr. Burke said, "Since these monthly checks are the main source of income for many beneficiaries, even a few day's delay could be serious, and this new

procedure will eliminate any possible delay."

The new procedure will be used for the second time in December when the 3rd again falls on a Sunday.
