

#### Applications For Navy's **NROTC** Qualification Test Now Available

Applications for the Navy's twenty-second annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to A. Judson Dillon, counselor, at the Culver Community School, This nationwide examination will be given on Dec. 9, 1967, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Mr. Ditlon explained, over 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on June 30, 1968, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of col-This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree

requirements and naval training. graduates are commissioned as officers in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NRCTC midshipmen participate in three summer atsea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close Nov. 17, 1967, 1968 NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Mr. Dillon or the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station at South Bend.

THENTER

ARTHRITIS

DEGENERATIVE arthritis is sometimes called senescent arthritis because it occurs especially in middle-aged and elderly persons.

A disease of the joints, arthritis may 'result from injury, overweight, faulty posture or hard labor. Just as the teeth wear down in elderly persons, so do the joints. Injury is a chief factor as a cause of arthritis in the weight-bearing joints, and commonly the knees, hips and lumbar spine are most affected.

Obese persons nearly all have a faulty posture that imposes a strain on the joints and brings unequal pressure on the joint surfaces. Incorrect posture in standing or sitting puts a strain on the lower spine, and an uneven gait puts an unnatural tension on the leg, particularly the knee and ankle joints.

Laborers and mechanics are affected frequently with arthritis, for any joint subjected to constant strenuous usage is likely to develop signs deterioration as one grows older. Rest for the affected joints is part of the treatment, with massage, moist heat and some daily moderate exercise. Aspirin often relieves the pain.

There is really no cure for joint disease where there has been destruction of cartilage and permanent change in the bone. But the progress of arthritis is usually slow, and the situation comparatively less severe than in many cases of rheumatoid arthritis, involved with inflammation.
