## CMA Groups To Present "Service Of Lessons And Carols"

The Chapel Choir, Blue Notes and Guild of Lectors will present the traditional "Service of Lessons and Carols" in the Culver Military Academy Memorial Chapel Sunday, Dec. 10 at 5 p.m.

The service will tell the story of the coming of the Messiah as recorded in Biblical texts from Genesis to the New Testament. Members of the Academy's Guild of Lector will read the lessons.

## School's Approve Annexation

Final approval by the Culver Town Board was given Monday to an ordinance providing for annexation the 33 acre site of the new Culver school. Following approval on the first reading of the ordinance, Board members voted to waive rules and approved the second and third reading.

Tentative approval was given by the Board to a proposed agreement that would allow Culver Military Academy to purchase water from the town upon completion of a proposed \$440,000 municipal water improvement system.

Academy officials recently requested permission to purchase water upon completion of the new system. In the proposed agreement, the academy would pay regular consumer rates. Academy officials are now considering the terms of the agreement. Subject to approval of the agreement by both parties, the Board will proceed with plans for completion of the water improvement system.

The Board, at the next meeting, will consider approval of separate ordinances establishing water purchase rates and provisions for the sale of bonds to be used to finance the program. The town will petition the Indiana Public Service Commission for a hearing on the matter upon the passage of the two ordinances.

Board members and the three Board members-elect who will take office next month, discussed the proposed water improvement system with John Downer of Plymouth, the town attorney; and Herschel Umbaugh of Plymouth, certified public accountant.

In other business, Wayne Von Ehr was given permission to grade an alley by a Culver church at his own expense. Von Ehr, who said the alley would be made 16 feet wide, noted that the improvement would not result in any hardship for adjacent property owners.

The Board approved the reservation of two parking spaces in front of Jack's Taxi on East Washington Street. Thomas Walker, owner of the business, said he will provide the signs to be used to reserve the spaces.

# SPORTS CORNER



Delayed ROSES AREN'T USUALLY the topic in late November or early December, but a faltering bunch of roses around the 13 of November suddenly sprouted to the heights of brilliance Saturday night in Southern Indiana. This, of course, came with the an-

nouncement by the commissioner of the Big Ten, that Indiana University was selected as the representative to the Rose Bowl for this year.

THIS DIDN'T COME ABOUT by accident unless you want to call the good hard hitting going

on at Indiana's football stadium and accident as two good football teams came out in a very hard-played, hard-hitting contest. The Hoosiers victory over Purdue was doubly sweet, as a victory in this game for the "Old Oaken Bucket" is always sweet, but put with it the fragrance of the roses and it made it one of the great sports triumphs of this or any other year.

INDIANA'S HOPES FOR that real glamorous season had almost disappeared on the previous week as they fell to Minnesota in a game where nothing went right for the Hoosiers. They then had to play the very strong Purdue II while Minnesota, with whom they were tied, was scheduled to meet winless Wisconsin in the finale. It seemed like the end for the Hoosiers, but this fighting, young offensive team, along with a more mature and stable defensive team, went on the field Saturday with just one thing in mind - WIN! And win they did while Minnesota was winning but not by a large margin over the Badgers. This created a three-way tie for the Big Ten title.

PURDUE WAS NOT ELIGIBLE for the Rose Bowl after winning the big game last January. This left a vote of the athletic directors of the conferences with several things to consider. First, Indiana had never been to Pasadena for the big game while Minnesota had been their twice in the series. Also to be considered was the fact that Minnesota did win the battle between these two schools, but also, Minnesota fell by a big margin to Purdue while the Hoosiers were victors over the highly ranked Boilermakers. Sentiment probably entered as much as anything and Indiana was selected.

THIS DOES COMPLETE THE relation of the Big Ten Schools. It is strange that over the years of the pact, Purdue and IU were the only two that never had made the trip and now they will be completing back-to-back trips to complete the cycle of all Big Ten teams appearing in the granddaddy of all the bowls. Add to this that next year, if expectations from this season hold true, Indiana and Purdue could battle it out once again for the Big Ten title as both are loaded with underclassmen. Both schools will be hurt by graduation, but both have a lot of established stars returning and now that IU and Purdue both know the sweet taste of victory, they could rise to great heights for a period of years.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL IS A hard sport to figure out. It seems that going undefeated is almost a thing of the past. With a lot more players learning the game in high school all the time, the colleges have found the ranks getting more even. It takes a rare team any more to dominate for a few years. This is true in all levels of the sport whether it be the Big Ten, Pacific Conference, Hoosier Conference or the Independents. Balance has added a lot to the game.

NOTRE DAME CLOSED OUT their season Friday night with a night game at the Orange Bowl Stadium against Miami. The Hurricanes were pre-season picks as one of the teams in the country and after a slow start, began to pick up momentum, finishing strong. The Irish edged the Hurricanes 24-22 in a game that could have gone either way and with this win, finished with an 8-2 record after a season that many couldn't see how they could lose a game. Something went a little different this year. Playing a team better than they were, could really lay it on, but against a team of equal or better ability, the Irish didn't look so good. The season found them beating very few teams with a winning record, depending on the outcome of the Army-Navy clash this Saturday. California, Iowa, Illinois, Navy, Pittsburgh, Georgia Tech and even a much weaker than expected Spartans team offered very little threat to the Irish. The only teams that rally gave them a contest were the big winners on the schedule,

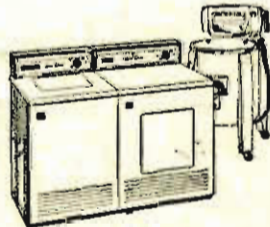

# Culver Wins First 45-44 Over Judson

Culver's Indians won their first game of the season Saturday night as they edged North Judson's Blue Jays in a thrilling nip-and-tuck battle. The win gave Culver a 1-4 record to date.

Despite giving away a lot of size as is the usual case with the Indians, Culver managed to play a fine ball game against the taller Blue Jays and used what size they have to much more advantage than did North Judson. A lot of hustle and desire paid off with a good hard-working defense to bring home the win.

The Indians broke in front in the game and although they never were able to pile up much of a lead, did manage to hang on

to a small margin most of the game. Stu Lowry paced the Indians offensively as he was a consistent scorer all night and certainly turned in his best effort of the season. Lowry's steady scoring was broken down this way, six in the first and third periods, five in the second and four in the tight fourth quarter. The scoring was also more balanced in this game with five others about splitting the balance of the points evenly.

North Judson was lead by Vermilyer and Mathews as these two totaled 16 and 12 respectively in this contest. Culver finished the night with a very respectable 18 of 43 for 42 per cent while the Blue Jays, who outshot the Indians with 52 attempts, only made good on 15 for a cool 29 per cent.

# Culver Community School Board News

A review of the Purdue Survey-Report on the reorganization of the Culver Community School districts was discussed in the regular meeting of the School Board held this week.

Board decision with respect to reorganization will be made in the near future. The survey recommended the new high school be used for grades 9-12, that grades 7-8 be established in the present Culver building, and at Monterey and Aubbeenaubee, and that as soon as feasible seventh and eighth grades at Monterey, Aubbeenaubee, and Culver be joined in a single Junior High School.

Additional appropriations and applications for mechanical maintenance of the new school building were among items covered in the meeting.

In airport to the Board, the Superintendent, Robert Rust, told of the meeting with school officials of two counties earlier in November to discuss the possibility of a cooperative venture to provide a program for trainable retarded children. He stated that there was a definite need to educationally recognize the need for such a program which is too costly for the individual school districts.

In other reports, he told of construction progress on the new building, pointing out that colors had been selected for the walls and tile for the floor, that steel bar joints were in place on the gym, that whether has hampered work to some extent especially in closing in the building for winter.

In the series of reports, it was pointed out that the electric line work in three phases at the Monterey School is nearly complete, the fire alarm system at Aubbeenaubee has been installed, and that notices to bidders for fuel oil, gasoline, and coal had been published.

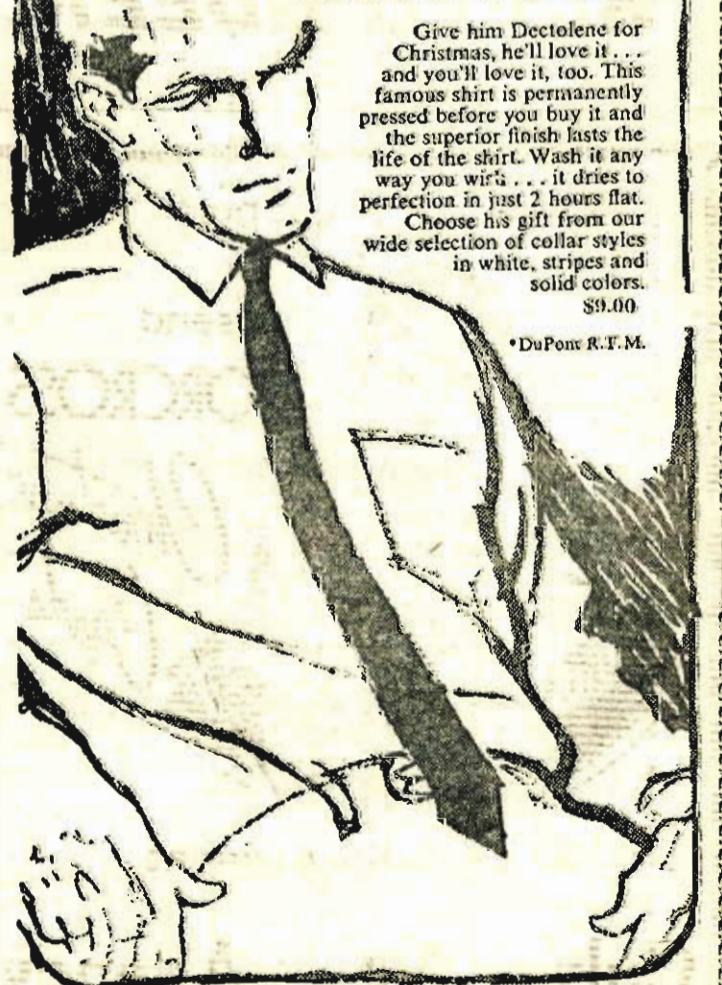

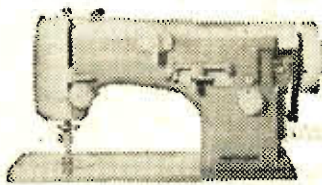

Heavy Mail Deliveries In Christmas Month

During the Christmas rush the postal service carries more mail in a month than most countries do in a year. Because of the heavy nationwide Christmas mailing, it is more urgent than ever that the Culver patrons mail early in the Season to assure that there are no jam-ups in major cities where trains, trucks, and planes converge with their mail.

Postmaster E. W. Mattox reminds local residents that it is just as important to mail early in the day as to mail early during the Christmas season. By mailing early in the day postal employees can assure that gifts, cards, and letters can be sent on their way by the earliest possible transportation. Often there is only one connection per day for many distant points. If mail is deposited after that transportation has left, there can be a one day delay in moving the mail on to its next sorting point.

The postmaster asks that all area residents keep their sidewalks and rural mail boxes clear of snow and ice so that postal employees will not be delayed in delivering the large volume of mail. He also encourages all mailers to use ZIP codes on every piece of mail to assure efficient postal operations.

THE YULE LOG STORY

Oh, how warm and bright that Yule Log burns on our Christmas night. The Yule Log's beginning can be traced centuries back. It is also generally believed that the traditional burning of the Yule Log was handed down to Scandinavian countries from English-speaking countries.

The Scandinavian feast of Winter Solstice was observed by the kindling of huge bonfires to the god Thor. In England the Yule Log was burned amidst great noise and song.

West Vies with East.. Grecian Xmas Customs

There are two Christmas-es in Greece; the Athenian Western Christmas and the Greek Christmas in the Eastern tradition.

The expensive, luxury celebration of upper-class Athens, with decorated Christmas trees, turkey on the table, all-night dancing in night spots, and presents for the youngsters.

And the devout celebration of the villages, with roast pork the traditional fare and the exchange of presents — postponed until the New Year, after Easter the greatest holiday on the Greek calendar.

Difference is a matter of a few miles on a train, but of decades in time.

A village Christmas — which thousands of Athenians seek to enjoy each year, either by visiting relatives or by going on excursions and hoping to find accommodation in a hotel — is still a time of mingled solemnity in the church and festivity in the home.



Usually, there's either a late night Christmas Eve or dawn Christmas day service in the church, attended by the overwhelming majority of the villagers. The Christmas dinner is a ceremony enjoyed at home with the family, whenever possible with all the family reunited. The fare is traditionally roast pork, rarely turkey.

Killing of the Christmas pig, which even the poorest families have been fattening for months, is a Christmas Eve ritual. At Easter, it's the turn of the lamb. As in pagan days, there is still a direct, personal relationship between the feast and the killings that made it possible — a link lost in the towns by virtue of the institution of the butcher.

There are many other pagan reminders, too, in a Greek village Christmas. For example, in many households, libations of oil or wine, or both, are poured in the form of a cross; except for the cross, it is exactly the same as the ancients used to do in honor of Zeus and the other residents of Olympos. Other survivals can be seen in the many and varied ways — most of them involving fire or water — of "taking the omens" at Christmas . . . though obviously there is more of this at the new year.
