Marshall County Added To Food Stamp Program

Secretary of Agriculture, Orville L. Freeman has designated Marshall Co. along with 171 other counties to be added to the Food Stamp Program.

The Food Stamp Program enables low-income families to increase their food purchasing power by investing their own money in food coupons worth more than they pay. The coupons are spent like cash at retail food outlets authorized under the program.

The exact date when Marshall Co. will begin issuing food stamp coupons to low-income persons will be announced after case-workers are familiarized with Food Stamp Program objectives and procedures, needy families are certified as eligible for the program, coupon issuance is arranged, and retail grocers are notified to assure their understanding of the program.

The Culver Summer Naval has again been named an "honor" school by the Department of the Navy.

The designation continues Culver's long-time position as one of only a few schools in the nation to be so honored. "Honor Naval School" awards are the result of an annual inspection by visiting U.S. Navy officers. Culver's Winter School holds a similar designation from the U.S. Army.

Designation as an honor school means that Culver will again have regular U.S. Navy personnel on campus next summer to teach naval subjects to midshipmen.

Many persons try to use various excuses for one thing and another, but the bulk of the responsibility still lays with the individual involved.

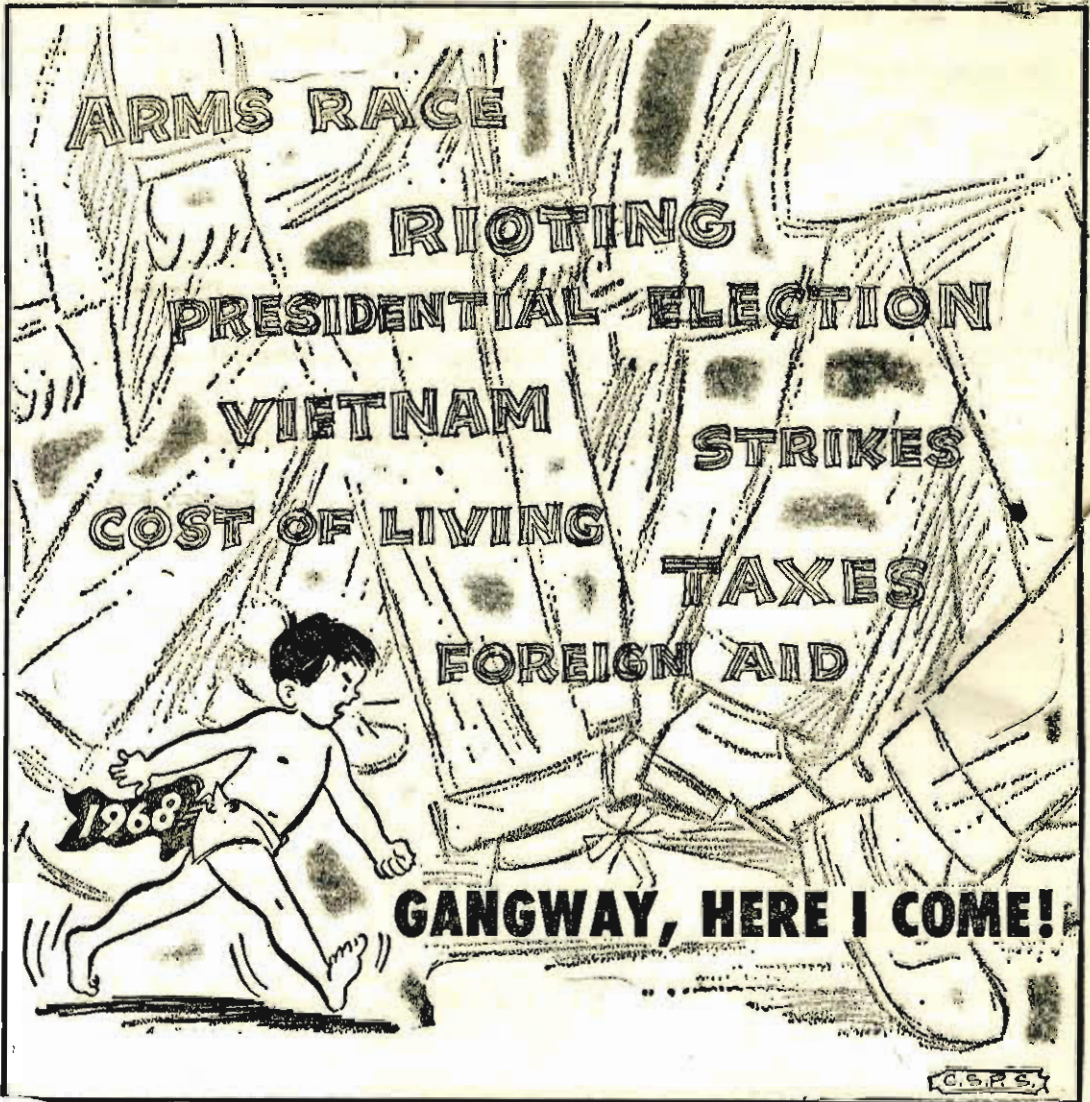
There is no doubt that the way of life is changing for all of us... the emphasis is put on the "bigger and better" pattern.
