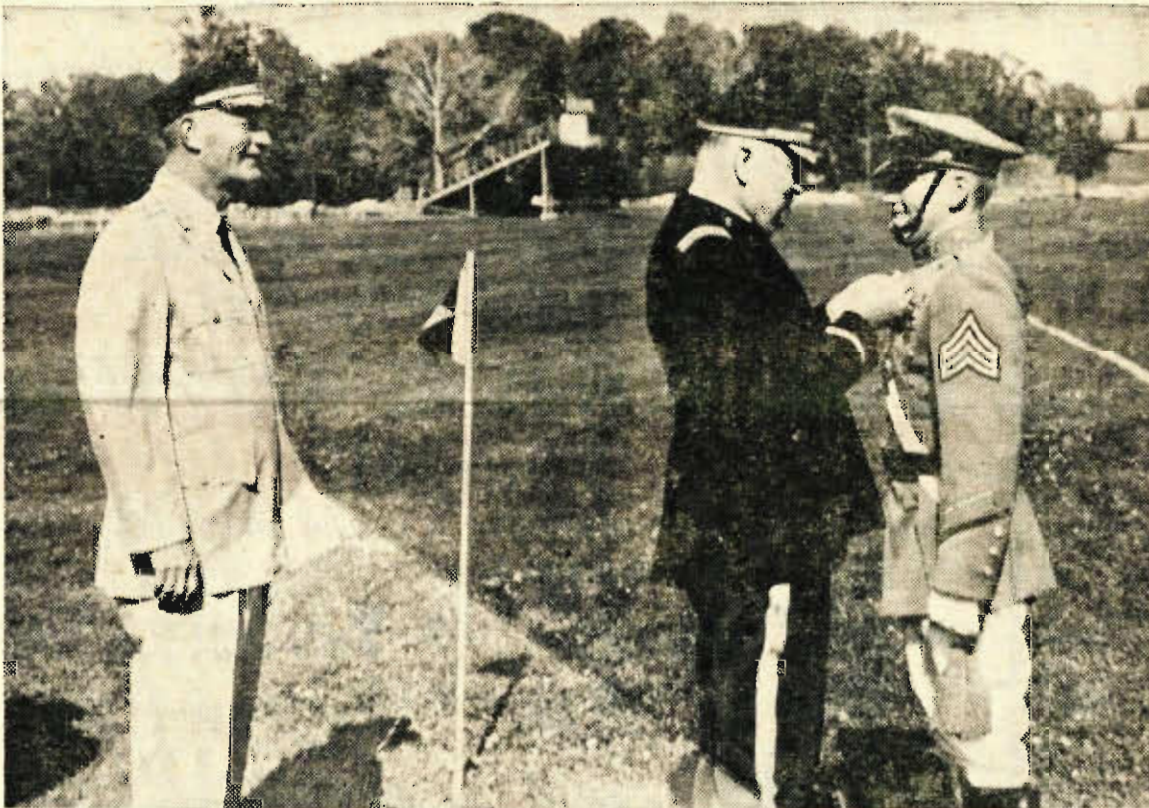

## Deadline Nears For Sales Tax Credit

Indiana Revenue Commissioner, William L. Fortune, announced today to residents of Indiana that the statutory deadline for claiming the \$8.00 sales tax credit for the 1967 tax year, is June 30, 1968. Mr. Fortune pointed out that any resident, including one who earned less than \$1,000, is eligible for the \$8.00 sales tax credit. If any resident has not previously claimed the \$8.00 sales tax credit, he may do so by filing an Individual Income Tax Return (Form IT-40) which may be obtained from any of the Department's 16 field offices or by writing to the Indiana Department of Revenue, State Office Building, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204.

The Van Zandt Key is given by Richard K. Zandt, Class of 1928, to the cadet "who by his effort and example has increased an awareness among the corps of cadets of the importance of

moral and spiritual values."

(PK0019) San Diego (FHTNC) June 5 -- Marine Private Robert L. McFarland, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry R. McFarland of 444 S. Ohio St., Culver, Ind., was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corp Recruit Depot here.

He will now undergo from two to four weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report to his first Marine Corps assignment.

The intensified Marine recruit training emphasizes rigid physical conditioning and survival

techniques, both at sea and ashore, to develop self-confidence and endurance. Marksmanship with the M-14 rifle and 45-caliber pistol are equally stressed, and close order drill instills the traditions of Marine Corps teamwork.

A thorough study of basic military subjects, hygiene, first aid and sanitation, and the customs,

courtesies, history and mission of the Marine Corps serve to polish the new Marine's recruit education and prepare him to join the Marine combat forces.

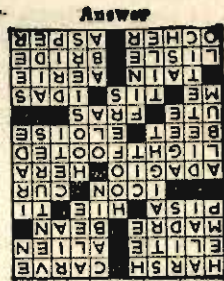

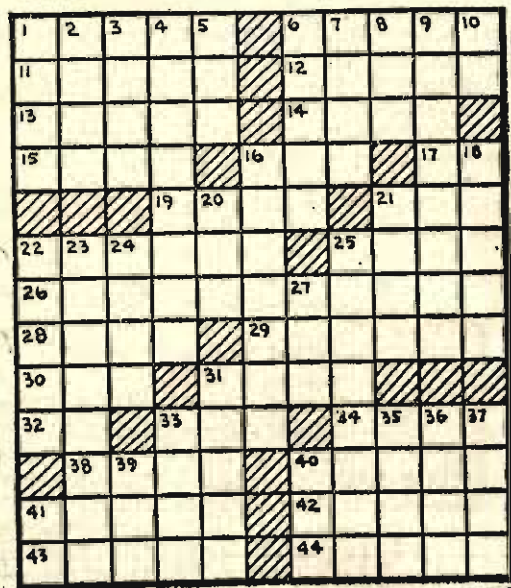

## New Electronic Laboratory To Be Added At CMA

30- booth dial-access electronic laboratory is being installed in the library of Culver Military Academy.

The dial-access laboratory will provide oral information of all types to be used in instruction in all departments at Culver. Said Dean of the Academy Ernest B. Benson:

"The acquisition of a dial-access laboratory increases the flexibility of Culver's storage of information of all kinds and is a step toward an electronic learning center being considered over a long-range basis."

Each of the 30 independent study carrels contains an easily-operated control panel with a telephone dial that enables a student to select any of 120 taped programs. The tapes are located in a remote area of the library, and the student may record the program he selects as well as his own responses on another tape deck, also removed from the carrel.

Through the use of control buttons, Culver students may evaluate their responses to taped academic programs by re-listening to them. They may also re-record the lesson or their own responses. While initial emphasis is placed on the study of foreign languages, the installation of the dial-access system makes it available for speech and drama students and other disciplines as well.

Dean Benson said an important feature of the new system is its

use as a testing device. Academy faculty will be able to test orally and simultaneously an entire class. The unit records only the answers of the students and allows the teacher to listen later to each student. No hand need touch a tape or a machine throughout the operation.

The new learning system is specially designed for Culver and offers the Academy an opportunity later to expand it or, with minor changes, to add closed-circuit television. The installation should be completed at the end of May and will be ready for use during the 1968 session of the Culver Summer Schools in July.

The installation of the dial-access laboratory is the second step in Culver's acquisition of educational hardware to supplement classroom teaching. At the start of the current academic year, the Academy put into academic use its 1401 computer. The 1401 was purchased by the Academy mainly as an academic tool and is used in the teaching of computer mathematics.

## Let's Go Boating

By Barbara Cooper  
(Women's National Water Ski Champion 1966; Seven time holder of the Women's National Jumping Title; mother of a 4 1/2 year-old boy who also skis; beauty contest winner)

Water skiing started as a family sport with me. My parents came home one day with a complete rig — boat, motor, skis, the works — and right away we started skiing as a family. But it didn't take me long to make up my mind to try to become a champion. I wanted to make the U.S. World Championship Team and to be the first woman to jump 100 ft. on water skis.

With the support and encouragement of my parents, and good instruction and hard work, I made both these goals.

For anyone to learn to be a good water skier, they should find someone who is a good skier and ask them questions, watch them ski, and get all their help they can. It's easy to learn to do things the wrong way, and then it's very hard to break the bad habits.

I never developed a style I could call my own, like some tournament skiers do. I am always watching others ski and compete, trying to figure out what I might be doing wrong. By trying different techniques, you can find the one, or the combination, that works for you.

A lot of people have asked me how I keep my complexion and hair from getting ruined by the sun and water. They think if you're in the water a lot and out in the sun your face will get cracked and scaly. But it's not hard to prevent this. I wash my face well every time I finish skiing, and always put a good complexion cream on before going to bed at night. Regular shampooing keeps my hair from getting ruined. It's a good idea to keep it short during the season, too.

Competitive skiing is really great, but it does have a few drawbacks. For one, boys don't like to be beaten by girls. In a 1959 tournament in Alabama I beat Larry Penacho, the current men's world jumping champion. I jumped 90 ft and Larry jumped 87 ft. He said to me afterwards, "That's the last time you're going to beat me!" It was. I think it helped him become the terrific jumper he is today.

Jumping 100 ft. doesn't seem like much. One hundred feet on the ground isn't very far. But jumping on water skis for 100 ft. is like trying to go the speed of sound with a single engine prop airplane. In 1955 the men's world jumping record was 125 ft. That's 5 ft. less than the Wright Brothers' first flight! The current record is just 158 ft. off a 6 ft. ramp at 35 mph. At that speed and off that ramp height, the farthest men will jump is believed to be about 170 or 175 ft. Increasing the speed and the ramp height, most people feel would make the sport too dangerous and competitors would push themselves too far.

My dream is to get water skiing accepted as an Olympic sport. We have all the necessary requirements, so I think it's only a matter of time before the sport is recognized as an Olympic event.

The right hereby granted shall authorize and permit said corporation to engage in the business of operating and providing a community antenna television system in the County of Marshall, Indiana, and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain and retain in, on, over, under, upon, across and along any public highway, road, street, alley, bridge, ditch, or land such poles, wires, cable, conductors, ducts, conduit, vaults manholes, amplifiers, appliances, attachments and other property as may be necessary and appurtenant to the community antenna television system; and, in addition, so to use, operate, and provide similar facilities or properties rented or leased from a public utility franchised or permitted to do business in the County of Marshall, Indiana for a period of twenty (20) years from the effective date hereof.

## Section III

The poles or towers used by the corporation for its television distribution system shall be so erected as not to interfere with the traffic over the said highways, roads, streets, alleys, bridges, ditches, or lands, and the locations of poles towers or other ob-

structions shall be fixed with the prior written approval, and under the supervision of the County of Marshall as to such locations, giving consideration to the reasonable operation of the same; provided further that such location shall not be a vested interest and the same shall be removed by the corporation whenever the same shall restrict or obstruct the operation or location of said highways, roads, streets, alleys, bridges, ditches, or lands.

to the said corporation to attach or otherwise affix cables or wires to the facilities of any public utility company, even though the same may cross over, on, or under the public highways, roads, streets, alleys, bridges, ditches, or lands of the County of Marshall, provided that said corporation secures the permission and consent of said aforementioned public utility companies concerned to affix the said cables and/or wires or other apparatus to their facilities.

#### Section V

All public highways, roads, streets, alleys, bridges, ditches, or land disturbed or damaged in the construction or maintenance of said community antenna television system shall be promptly repaired by the corporation at its expense and to the satisfaction of the County of Marshall.

#### Section VI

The corporation, its successors and assigns, shall be subject to all ordinances now in force, or that may be hereafter enacted, relative to the use of the public, highways, roads, streets, alleys, bridges, ditches, or land of the County of Marshall.

#### Section VII

This franchise and grant may not be assigned without the express and prior written consent of the Board of Commissioners

of the County of Marshall, Indiana.

#### Section VIII

The corporation shall hold the County of Marshall harmless from all claims for damages arising out of the construction, maintenance and operation of said community antenna television system in the county of Marshall. Said corporation shall at all times during the existence of this grant and franchise maintain in force, furnish and file with the County, if so requested, at its own expense, a general comprehensive liability insurance policy in protection of the County, the Members of the Board of Commissioners of the said County, in a company authorized to do business in the State of Indiana, and in the form to be approved by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Marshall, protecting the County and said persons against a liability for loss or damages for personal injury, death and property damage occasioned by the operations of the corporation under this franchise and grant with minimum liability limits of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) for personal injury or death of any one person, One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for personal injury or death of two or more persons in any one occurrence, and Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) for damage to

property resulting from any one occurrence.

#### Section IX

The corporation further agrees to indemnify and save the County of Marshall harmless from any and all claims for damages and litigation whatsoever arising out of legal actions by third persons or corporations for infringement of trademark, patents and/or copyright infringements arising from the operation of the system herein franchised.

#### Section X

The corporation agrees that in consideration for the rights and privileges herein granted it shall pay to the County of Marshall an amount equal to three per cent (3%) of the annual gross revenue of the corporation received by it for community antenna television service within the County of Marshall, excluding all towns and cities within the County. The percentage payments herein provided for shall be paid by the corporation to the County semi-annually on the 15th day of April and on the 15th day of October of each year during the term of this grant and franchise.

#### Section XI

The rates and charges to be made for services provided by the corporation shall not exceed (1) monthly service charge of Five Dollars (\$5.00) and (2) installation charge of Fourteen and 90/100 Dollars (\$14.90) without the approval of said Board.

#### Section XII

The corporation shall commence construction on said audio and visual transmission system within six (6) months after the approval of the Federal Communications Commission, or other governmental agency and shall complete installation of said system within twenty-four (24) months after the approval of the Federal Com-

munications Commission or other regulatory agency, unless said corporation is prevented from said commencement and completion by rules or regulations of any governmental agency, Federal, State or local.

#### Section XIII

The corporation shall not begin any work that requires the cutting through, across or under any county highway, roadway or alley until it shall have first filed an application with the County Highway Superintendent setting forth the time, place and nature of the work to be done by it and upon the filing of such application the County Highway Superintendent shall issue to the corporation a permit which shall set forth the time, place and nature of the work that is to be done by the corporation.

#### Section XIV

If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portions of this grant and franchise is, for any reason, held invalid or unconstitutional by any court

with competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

#### Section XV

The effective date of this grant and franchise shall be the date upon which an order approving the same shall be adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Marshall, as provided by law.

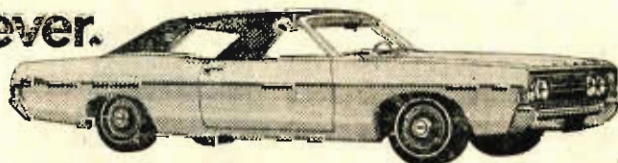

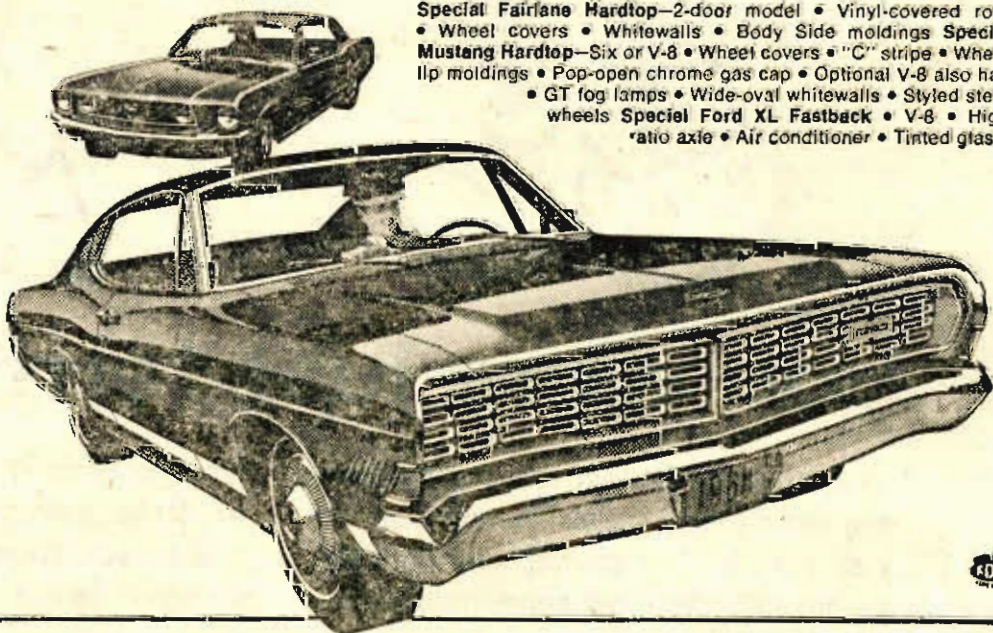


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
