

A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, July 23 at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Room of the State Exchange Bank at Culver, Indiana, regarding the planned improvement and partial relocation of a 3.9-mile section of SR 10 near Culver in Marshall County, as proposed by the Indiana State Highway Commission.

The discussions will involve a new 24-foot wide pavement, with 11-foot sabilized shoulders positioned adjacent to each outside edge. Also involved is a new and wider right-of-way corridor, featuring a control of access where feasible.

The route section to be considered commences at a point on existing SR 10, about 0.2 mile west of its west junction with SR 17, and proceeds eastward for the first 0.5 mile along existing alignment. The proposal then veers to a north-easterly direction, prior to reaching the northsouth Tamarack Road, and follows this course to a point about 0.5 mile north of existing SR 10 and 0.25 mile east of the east junction with SR 17. From the latter location the proposed highway bends to an easterly direction and runs more or less parallel to the present route, partially following the alignment of east-west County Road No. 16c.

About 0.3 mile east of the Pennsylvania Railroad the proposed project curves to the southeast and rejoins the existing roadway, before terminating at a point 0.27 mile west of Marshall County's north-south Pear Road, approximately 2.0 miles east of Culver.

At least five previous plans for improving SR 10 through the study area have been developed and discarded for various reasons since 1949. Two more were developd as a result of studies which were completed by highway engineers in November, 1967.

Short portions of some of the older plans were used in the more recent studies. In the final analysis, one aligment appeared to be more feasible than the alternate route considerd, and it will be recommended at the public hearing, with reasons given as to why it was selected.

Highway study engineers indicate that futher improvements on SR 10, particularly in other areas of Marshall County, should also be considered as soon as possible. They forecast that traffic on the highway will more than likely increase to nearly 5000 vehicles per day within the next twenty years, and, since the existing pavement is not capable of carrying this volume of movements, present planning should take this into consideration.

A public hearing is necessary when matching aid from Federal Trust Funis has been requested for a planned road undertaking. Estimated total cost for the proposed project is \$1,498,000. Field surveys and design plans will get underway soon, if the hearing results are sufficiently favorable. The 3.9-mile project section is carried in the State's 1967-1969 Statutory Biennial Program for completion of preliminary engineering, with construction possibly to follow in a succeeding biennium.

The hearing will be conducted by Mr. Oral S. Craig, the Com-mission's Chief Hearing Officer, assigned to the Division of Planning.

It is urged that all interested citizens appear at this hearing and comment as to be economic effect it is felt the recommended alignment will have upon the area it will serve.

Marries Gregory Patrick In South Bend William Kurosky Appointed Director **Of Four County Mental Health Clinic**

William Kurosky, ACSW, has been appointed Acting Director of the Four County Mental Health Clinic in Warsaw, according to an announcement by Donald Patton of Plymouth, President of the Clinic's Board of Directors. The Personnel Committee of the Board, consisting of Lawrence Castaldi of Warsaw, McCabe Day of Huntington, Mrs. Mildred Hurford of Plymouth, John Smith of North Manchester, and Dr. John Wilson of Columbia City, is actively recruiting for a Psychiatrist-Director for the Clinic to fill the position vacated by Dr. Frank D. Hogle's recent resignation.

Mr. Kurosky has been employed as Psychiatric Social Worker at the Clinic since June, 1964, and Chief Psychiatric Social Worker since August, 1965. He holds a Master's Degree in Social Work from Indiana University. He resides with his wife, Arlos, and two children, Barbara and Paul, in Fort Wayne.

Dr. Hogie, whose resignition from the Clinic was tendered April 1, effective July 1, is one of three psychhiatrists added to the staff of Beatty Hospital in Westville under the administration of the newly - appointed a superin-tendent, Dr. TheodoreIII.

Dr. Hogle became consulting psychitrist since February, 1962. During the past six-and-one-half years, the Clinic has moved twice to larger quarters and is now housed in the modern facilities of the Murphy Professional Building, 422 South Buffalo, Warsaw Huntington County was added in 1966 to the original service area consisting of Kosciuso,k Marshall, Wabash, and Whitley Counties

When the Clinic opened in 1961, the professional staff consisted of one full-time psychologist, one full-time psychiatrie social worker, and a consulting Psychiatrist.

At the time of Dr. Hogle's resignition the saff had gown to include, in addition to Dr. Hogle, a full-time psycholost, three f ull - time psychiatric social workers, a medical consultant, and a consulting psychologist in group therepy.

Expansion of clinic service accomplished in the last few years has included closer work with public health and school nurses, improved arrangements for aftercare of patients released from State Hospitals, the active coopration of the Clinic staff in mental health associations, closer liaison with other agencies equipped to give needed help to clinic patients, an increased use of group therapy, the formation of association of community an clinic directors of Indiana for discussion of common problems, reduction of the Clinic's treatment waitng list.

As a result of careful Adminstrative planning, the Four County Mental Health Clinic has

consistently been rated near the top among the 22 similar clinics in Indiana (regardless of size) as to efficient use of profssional time in service to patients and to the community. The number of interviews with or about patient has increased from 4000 in 1962 to approximately 6500 in 1967.

Another Bite

The surcharge is going into effect. Many employers started using the new tables for figuring the withholding tax the first of July. This takes one more bite out of the weekly pay beck but the way it is set up, can take a much larger bite out come next year when the 1968 taxes are dué.

The surcharge was just re-aloyers were asked to start taking the additional tax out 15 days after the president's signature was affixed to the bill However, the bite that can hurt, is the fact that the surchange is to be applied from an individual's mings since the first of April. Three months that the extra '0 per cent is due already has expired and that hasn't been tken out. This will have to how up when the final taxes are figured for each person.

The ten per cent figure has aused a lot of comment that is mnecessary. What it basically

boils down to (not 100 per cent accurate through) is that the amount of money now withheld will have about 10 per cent of that amount taken out again. The tables figure out roughly to this. For example, a single person with no dependents, making \$100 per week, prior to the surcharge would have \$16.80 withheld weekly. With the surcharge, this will jump to \$18.40, or approximately the 10 per cent.

This surcharge, put into law, along with a spending cut in Washington to supposedly head off chances of more inflation, is originally scheduled to last only until June 30, 1969, However, a lot can happen in this time and the future of the surcharge will he known when further action takes place.

Regardless of the future after a year of this, right now the pay checks of all will show slightly less in take home pay as another tax bite must be accepted by all of us.
