The town of Culver will remain on E.S.T. until the of icial ruling is handed down by the federal agencies investigating the time split in Indiana. Town Board President, Donald Osborn; George Becker and Esther Powers decided this after consulting with Robert Rust, the Chamber of Commerce, and other interested citizens. Mr. Rust stated that the schools would remain on E.S.T. because a change would conflict with the two other counties in the school system. Admiral Bays of CMA also appeared and was satisfied with the board's decision.

At Monday nights Town Board meeting, Mr. Rust also asked for assistance from the town marshal in regards to placing traffic signs around the new high school. Mr. Rust has ive stop signs and will soon have 'parking" and "no parking" signs to install at the school. He has been assured by the county that signs dept. highway designating a school area will be placed on State Road 10.

Mrs. Rust then extended an invitation to the Town Board to hold a meeting in the new high school conference room. room has been offered to local civic groups thereby enabling people to see the building who ordinarily would not have the opportunity.

On Friday afternoon of last week, they were summoned to a farm off the Behmer road, just old Shoemake across the bridge, where a truck hauling beans had caught fire. The truck was a total loss and part of the beans were destroyed.

Late Wednesday afternoon of last week, the alarm was sounded when a corn picker on the Pat Keller farm started to burn. Damage to the machine was not estimated.



IT'S UP TO YOU!

Election time, 1968, is drawing near. This will be one of the most critical elections in many years in this country as neveral key issues are at stake and for the first time in many years, a third party candidate as a chance to really throw a monkey wrench into the gears.

When speaking of a third party, there has been three or four parties on the ballots in presidential elections for many years, but basically, the Reublicans and Democrats are the only parties to contend w th in the election. However, former Governor t is year George Wallace has entered the race and entered it big as the most controversial canditrate possibly ever has caused a lot of talk and possibly concern to not only the American public, but the other major candidates as well.

Wallace, running without a party candidates in races for Senate or House, has aused enough concern and threat to pull votes that severthings could happen. It might not be too far from right to say his support will stermine the next candidate for several reasons.

First, Wallace is going to pick up votes all over the country. If he can pull enough support to swing a state's electrol votes, which is doubtful, it could have a very telling effect on the final decision to made.

Second, Wallace will pull votes . . . but whose? Many y he is winning votes that would be going to Hubert Others say he is numphrey. winning votes that would be fast for Richard Nixon. Just wao will vote for Wallace isn't definate and just who these same people would have voted of Wallace were not in the race is an entirely different However, Wallace question. will pull votes from someone.

Third, Wallace will have edancies to show where some of the segregationists in the country are located. He is very trong in this belief (as everyone remembers) and it will be interesting to see how different reas feel on this subject if the support is strong enough to laww a trend.

This probably is an election of the issues at hand more so dan an elections of just the andidates or partsies. Several important issnes are chough that people will vote or the man claiming the right decision in the voter's mind on

The Vietnam situation has to be big in everyone's mind. This situation has gotten to the point of deep concern for aleveryone. With the United States in Vietnam since 1953, and fighting of a minor and later a major nature ever since that time, people are completely fed up with the way the situation is being handled. Some say get out . . . others say finish the job right. Many more say it should be settled over the peace table, but even this means a "police action" or what ever they want to call it that will still mean our being in that country.
