## CULVER TOWN BOARD NEWS

The town of Culver will remain on E.S.T. until the official ruling is handed down by the federal agencies investigating the time split in Indiana. Town Board President, Donald Osborn; George Becker and Esther Powers decided this after consulting with Robert Rust, the Chamber of Commerce, and other interested citizens. Mr. Rust stated that the schools would remain on E.S.T. because a change would conflict with the two other counties in the school system. Admiral Bays of CMA also appeared and was satisfied with the board's decision.

At Monday night's Town Board meeting, Mr. Rust also asked for assistance from the town marshal in regards to placing traffic signs around the new high school. Mr. Rust has five stop signs and will soon have "parking" and "no parking" signs to install at the school. He has been assured by the county highway dept. that signs designating a school area will be placed on State Road 10.

Mrs. Rust then extended an invitation to the Town Board to hold a meeting in the new high school conference room. The room has been offered to local civic groups thereby enabling people to see the building who ordinarily would not have the opportunity.

Verl McFeely expressed doubts concerning the installation of certain pumps in the new pump house. He also stated that in his opinion the new set-up would not provide for a standby pump. According to McFeely, a power shortage could leave the town helpless. The Board decided to contact the engineering firm in charge of the project to investigate this matter.

Mr. McFeely also asked about the patching of the streets which has been done by the construction company after laying the new water lines. The Board intends to inspect the patching before approval is made.

In other action the board gave approval to David Burns to have a dusk to dawn light installed on State Street across from the fire station.

The Board approved a motion to put a light atop the new water tower.

Ruth Lennen, town clerk, reminded the members that the tax hearing by the State Board will be Oct. 28th in Plymouth.

Verlin Shaffer was appointed to the Culver Town Plan Commission and the Board of Zoning Appeals to fill the unexpired term of Robert Boswell.

## BAND UNIFORM FUND GROWING

Plans to purchase uniforms for the Band of the Culver Community High School are being developed by parents, band members and school officials.

The Band of the new unified high school, numbering 70 pieces, is directed by Charles Byfield. President of the Band Council is Gary Byfield. Other student officers are Richard Snyder, Vice President, and Debbie Triplett, Secretary-Treasurer. Assisting Mr. Byfield in instrumental instruction in the school district is veteran instructor, Clayton Moon.

Funding the cost of the uniforms will involve approximately \$10,000. ## Large Cricken Coop Destroyed By Fire Wed.

The Culver Fire Department was back in action this past week after a relatively quiet period of several weeks.

The department was called to the Paul Beaver farm on Wednesday of this week at 5:30 a.m., where a large 160 by 40 foot chicken coop was found burning. Cause of the fire was undetermined but it was believed to have started near the center of the building where hay was stored and rapidly destroyed the structure. Mr. Beaver had used the building for storage only and said it was covered by insurance. Firemen were able to save the house and surrounding buildings in spite of the high winds.

On Friday afternoon of last week, they were summoned to a farm off the Behmer road, just across the old Shoemaker bridge, where a truck hauling beans had caught fire. The truck was a total loss and part of the beans were destroyed.

Late Wednesday afternoon of last week, the alarm was sounded when a corn picker on the Pat Keller farm started to burn. Damage to the machine was not estimated.

## Culver Schools To Stay On Eastern Standard

The Culver Community Schools District, comprised of four townships in four counties, will operate on Eastern Standard Time during the current year, school officials have announced.

The action was approved by the Board of School Trustees this week after a study of proposed action of neighboring communities, together with other factors involving transportation and schedules of teachers assigned to more than one school in the district.

In doing so, the Board recognizes that the singular time schedule may work a hardship on some school patrons and if it were possible to operate on a flexible time schedule, this would be done but such is not the case, the statement pointed out.

The time will remain the same as it has during the past twenty months.

Parents are also reminded that schools will not be in session this Thursday and Friday, Oct. 24-25, dates of the annual State Teachers Association Conference.

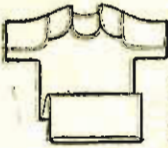

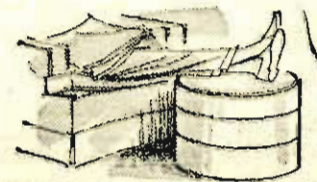

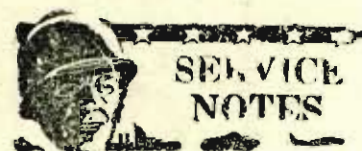
