Cavaliers Drop Rochester 68-62 Saturday Night

The Culver Cavaliers erased a slim Rochester lead in the second quarter and rolled to a 68-62 victory over the winless Rochester Zebras. The win makes Culver's record 2-1 on the season.

John Szponar led the balanced attack with 17 markers. Rich Pugh, John Bauer, and Kerry Haenes netted 15, 14, and 14 respectively. "Big" John Wamsley turned in a fine rebounding game and ended up with 8 points.

The Zebra's Dave Lloyd took game honors with 18 points. Fellow teammates Jay Elliot and John Shirley netted 15 and 14 points respectively. The Zebras stand 0-2 for the season.

In the first period, things got underway slow until Elliot hit a jumper at 6:17 to give Rochester the lead 2-0. Culver broke the ice at 5:06 when Pugh hit a free throw to make the score 2-1. A basket by Buckingham and one by Hart made the score 6-2 after Pugh hit his second free throw. Another basket by Hart and a long jumper by Culver's Haenes, made the score 8-4. A free throw by Hart and a basket and a free throw by Elliot increased the score to 12-4. At 1:56 Pugh sunk two free throws and Shirley made a lay up at 1:48 to make the score 14-6. Wamsley, Pugh, each made a basket and free throws by Pugh and Bauer made the Culver score 12. Bauer hit a twenty footer and Rochester's Lloyd hit a shot to make the score 16-14. Rochester at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Lloyd and Haenes exchanged baskets. Szponar hit two free throws and Lloyd hit two free throws at 5:54 to make the score 20-18, Rochester. Then "Big" John Wamsley came alive. John hit two long twenty footers to give the Cavaliers the lead 22-20 at 4:45 left in the quarter. Baskets were exchanged by Szponar and Hart to make the score 24-22. Betz hit a shot and Szponar hit two free throws to make the score 26-24. Shirley hit one and Bauer hit a long one to make the score 28-26. A shot by Elliot and one by Wamsley (who made it with only one shoe on) made the score 30-28. A basket by Lloyd and two more free throws by Szponar made the score 32-30, with 1:49 to go in the quarter. A flurry of baskets by Szponar, Haenes, Bauer, and a long 30 footer by Pugh gave Culver 40 points at the half. Two baskets by Lloyd and one from Shirley gave the Zebras 36 points.

Szponar hit a follow up shot at 7:31 and Pugh hit a short jumper at 6:20 to increase Culver's lead in the third quarter. Hart hit two free throws and Shirley added a jumper to close the gap to 44-40. Haenes hit a long jump shot and Lloyd came back and sunk two. Szponar hit a free throw and Elliot hit a lay up at 2:03 to make the score 47-44. Szponar hit another free throw and Shirley hit two and then two more free throws were added by Szponar. A basket by Bauer and one by Haenes, made the score 54-46 at the end of the third quarter.

A basket by Shirley and a short jumper by Lloyd, pulled Rochester within four, 54-50. A "sleeper" by Pugh at 5:59 made the score 56-50. A jumper by Lloyd and one from Elliot pulled Rochester with two points, 56-54. Three free throws by Pugh and a jumper from Haenes, made the score 61-54. Skip Howard of Michigan, a rodeo contestant and performer at the recent Horse Palace Rodeo, is alive today due to an emergency operation performed before 600 people in the Saturday night performance. Skip was injured by his bronc and was unconscious, when a fellow rodeo performer checked his pulse which had dropped to a 15 count.

Asking for a knife, the assisting rodeo contestant cut through to his windpipe and cleared the windpipe of obstruction. He was then able to give artificial respiration until the ambulance carried for a quick trip to Starke Memorial Hospital in Knox.

The quick action of a fellow rodeo performer saved Howard's life. Fortunately this performer was also a medical doctor from one of Indiana's largest hospitals in Indianapolis, who gets his "kicks" from the rodeo. His name is Dr. Shine.

Dr. Shine brought his patient back to life and made sure he was in good hands at the hospital. He then hurried back to the Horse Palace and demanded his bronc. He proceeded to make one of the fabulous rides of the weekend. He then jumped in his car for a return to Indianapolis for his tour of duty in the hospital.

Town Of Culver Cracks Down On Stray Dogs

A number of Girl Scouts and government students were in attendance at the regular Town Board meeting Monday night. A representative of the Girl Scouts requested the cooperation of the town in the erecting of their annual Christmas tree. The Board approved the hauling of the tree by the town truck and the use of town lights.

An insurance agent from Mutual of Omaha was present and presented an insurance plan to the Board for the coverage of town employees. It was suggested that the town employees hold a meeting with the agent for an explanation of the company's policies.

Margaret Carter reported the poor condition of the alley at the back of her property. She requested repair of this alley and the Board stated they would investigate the problem.

The board president read a written report of Mrs. Ruth MacQuillan that they change the name of the street past the new school because the name Tarrack Road is no longer appropriate. She suggested that the name of School Street be extended to State Road 10. The board stated that although the town had annexed the school property, the county commissioners would have to be consulted inasmuch as they are responsible for half of the road.

Officer Sam Madonna read a portion of the state law concerning stray dogs. He stated that the town would enforce the state law rather than the town ordinance. Dogs six months or older must be tagged and all dogs picked up without this tag will be disposed of. Board member George Becker stated that he felt all state laws should be obeyed and that the Board would be behind law enforcement officers in this matter.

In other business, Fire Chief Dave Burns asked that the town's resuscitator be sent to the factory to be checked and repaired since it has leaked and damaged the case and some of the parts. The Board agreed to do this.

Representative of the Chamber of Commerce, Jack Spencer, was present and asked to be brought up to date on the surface drainage work. The Board suggested he examine the blueprints. He also inquired about the legality of the stop light the town had in present operation.

In old business, it was announced that the Easterday Construction Company and the town attorney had met and the wheels had been set in motion to start work on the proposed surface drainage in the east part of town. It was also noted that the heater in the water department had been checked and is now in operation. The appointment of Mrs. Ronald Tusing to the Park Board was announced.
