#### Culver Community School Board

The Board of School Trustees Culver Community Schools Corporation unanimously approved a resolution joining other area school corporations in a Feasibility Study regarding the need for a Joint Vocational School at their meeting here this week.

The Board also authorized the Superintendent to advertise for additional appropriations in the amount of \$4,700 to meet yearend expense, including \$2,200 to Instruction and \$2,500 to Pupil Transportation. The funds will transferred from other budgetary accounts that have year-end balances.

In other business the Board heard reports on ditch grading at the new high school site, the installation of rip rap in the ditch and removal of silt, and the installation of a gate at the State Road 10 entrance.

Payment requests on the high school building were reported and the trustees discussed a study to be made immediately on developing school operated service maintenance for busses. The School Bus Fleet numbers twenty-three.

Implementing the school policy, the Board approved a resolution concerning the participation of special students as it relates to graduation ceremonies.

A proposal for an evaluation study of the school program as it relates to 1969-70 was presented to the Board. The scope of the study will touch on presof erings from ent p.ogram Kindergarten through Grade Twelve, special services - 18 areas, and an evaluation of the professional staff as well as noncertificated personnel, use of facilities and equipment, transportation, and detailed costs of operation. The study-review will be cancled out by on administrative committee in cooperation with the staff.

A further report on equipment installation, new high school, a financial report, detailing payment of transfers, bond payment and lease-rental poyment, and calendared Board activities for the remainder of December were detailed.

Three members or the Board, including President Ray Winters, Jack Croy, and Robert Berger will attend the Indiana School Board Association Legislative Conference at South Bend December 17, 1968. The regular Board Meeting will be held on December 18th, with an altermate year-and date set for December 27th.

Cornerence requests including Principal John Hayes' request to attend a conference at Purdue, December 5-6, and Mr. Rust's request for Indiana State University. December 5-6, and at Indianapolis on December 9th were approved.



#### Cavaliers Gain Two Victories Last Week End

Culver's Cavaners scored a pair of lepsided victories over two Starke County foes last week end, defeating Knox, 74-53, and North Judson, 76-58. The triumphs were the third and fourth for Coach Dave Huffman's crew, which has lost only to Bremen.

In the Friday night encounter at home, Culver clicked 6" eleven straight points early in the second quarter en route to a 37-19 halftime lead over Knox. The game was close only in the first quarter when the Redskins managed a brief 9-8 lead, but a free throw and field goal by John Wamsley, and another quick basket by John Szponar gave the Cavaliers the lead for

Knox staged a mild comeback in the third stanza by scoring five straight points, but Steve Snyder, who turned in a sterling performance in relief of foulladen Rick Pugh, sandwiched three buckets around baskets by Wamsley and Szponar to give the local squad a 49-29 lead. Hu?fman cleared his bench with four minutes left to play and the reserves promptly gave Culver its biggest lead of the evening, 69-41, before several Redskin free throws in the waning moments made the score more respectable.

Szponar, whose kangaroo-like activity around the basket earned him a game high of 13 rebounds, topped all scorers with 20 points, rollowed by Wainsley with 17, John Bauer with 13, and Snyder with eight. Rick B.own was high for Knox, now 0-3, with 14 points.

At North Judson on Saturday, Pugh, who spent the whole week end in foul trouble, came off the bench to score 12 lourth-quarter points and spark the win over a determined Blue Jay five.

Judson held short-lived le 7-5 and 8-7 before the Cavaliers came alive and took the lead 11on two quick baskets by Baurer. Culver led by as much as ten points in the second quarter and although the Jays whittled the lead to 33-26, a 30footer at the horn by Kerry Haenes gave the blackclads a nine-point bulge at halftime.

Early in the third quarter, a free throw by Snyder and five straight points by Szponar made the score 47-31 and it looked like the game was on ice. But Coach Jerry Hoover's quintet never gave up and narrowed the margin to 55-49 with five minutes to play. Afater a free throw by Szponar, Fugh scored from the corner, stole the ball and fed Haenes for an easy layup, scored on another layup, canned a pair o. free throws, hit from the corner, sank two more charity tosses, and hit again from the corner. All the while, Judson could manage only five points, and after a basket by Scot Van Horn, Szponar ended the game with a spectacular tip-in.

Szponar was again high scorer for the Cavaliers with 24 points, Pugh added 18, Bauer 12, and Haenes 10, while Wamsley and Szponar each contributed 12 rebounds. Larry Nielson had 16 points for the Blue Jays.

Culver's B-team, though much improved, lost to Knox, 40-33 and to Judson, 46-39. Against Knox, Coach Gene Crosley's JV's trailed the whole game, and had moved within one point on a 40footer by Jim Bauer at the end of the third period. But the Redskins pulled away near the end by outscoring Culver 13-7. Perry White had 10 points for the Cavaliers.

At Judson, the B-teamers rallied from a 22-point de icite to pull within five with 1:28 to play, but were unable to overcome the baby Blue Jays. Don Ehlinger and Hank Barrabes each had 10 for Culver.

#### Social What?

The following article came to us from the National Federation of Independent Business, Inc., and certainly is an article that can provoke some thought. The information involved came from testimony to Congress by a famous professor concerning the Social Security system that is one tax that is growing and growing over the vears, not so it is greatly noticable at any one time, but never-the-less one that is sapping much more money at a rate. With another inrease scheduled for 1969, and more in the future as set forth by Congress, this once meager animal is now in monsterous porportions.

It has o'ten been said that old men create wars for young men to fight. But regardless of the validity, of this long standng claim it now appears that old men are voting larger and arger Social Security benefits for their contempories and puting the financing burden on the young.

Under Social Security, a man etiring this year will "break even" within 31/2 years. At most, he and his employer have ontributed \$5,235 on his behalf n 31 years.

On the other hand, a 25-yearold starting work this year and vaying the maximum tax for the next 40 years, may not get "fair return" even if he outlives Methuselah despite paying x times as much.

This young man and his boss will contribute \$31,293.60, during the four decades ounting the Medicare portion) ınder maximum rates passed eently by Congress. Accumuating interest at the low rate of 4 percent per year, this would grow to \$73,275 by the me the employee is 65.

To deplete such a fund in maximum ruture Social Securty benefits, a man and his wife would have to live past his 1-8th birthday. Benefits would be little more than the interest, of first.

However, if he is single or a widower at age 65, he cannot ossibly recover his equity in ayments. His maximum benefit of \$218 would be less than the interest that would accrue on \$73,275, so he could draw this amount indefinitely without even touching the principal. even Methuselah, reputed to have lived 969 years, would ave been short-changed by this plan.

This startling prospect for young worker is reloday's realed in a study by the rewarch staff of the National Independent Federation Of Business. It shows that whirl Social Security is a boon to many Americans now drawing penefits, today's young worker will pay a premium tax to support his elders.

Even discounting 20 percent of the Security taxes to cover the disability and survivors' insurance portions of the plan, today's young people will have to defy life expectancy tables to collect in retirement benefits. fraction contributions made in their

Discounting this 20 percent, maximum employee - employer contributions for the next 40 years will be \$25,036 which, at 4 percent interest, would swell to \$58,620.

Comparable figures for the first 31 years of Social Securily are \$4,188 and \$6,201. In both cases, these are maximum figures without Medicare. On the minimum side, it is possible that someone whose employeeemployer tax amounted to no more than \$30 (with interest) is now receiving benefits.

The Social Security tax paid by the employee and matched by his employer began in 1937 as 1 percent of the first \$3,000 of annual income, or a maximum tax of \$30 on each. It remained that way for 13 years, but has increased at an accelerating pace in the last decade. Ten years ago, the maximum was \$94, three years ago it was \$174, and today it is \$304.20, not counting half a percent (\$39) for Medi-

Since the current rate (without Medicare) is 3.9 percent of the first \$7,800 of income, and this will reach 5.1 percent within five years, today's young wage-earner may well pay 5 percent of his lifetime earnings to Social Security. And his boss will pay an equal amount.

Under persent law, passed in December, if his income remains at or above \$7,800 a year, today's young employee will personally pay \$15,646.80 in the next four decades . . . six times the maximum paid by anyone now receiving benefits.

Today's young employee may be asked to pay even more, for Congress has repeatedly increased the tax base or rate, or both. Thus, while the tax base is fixed at \$7,800 indefinitely. Congress has heard proposals for a \$10,000 or even \$15,000 base. Last year, the Senate approved a \$10,800 base for 1972 and thereafter, but yielded to conservative House members in the final version of the new Act.

In 1954, the maximum tax scheduled for 1968 was set at 3 percent of \$3,600, or \$108. But subsequent Congressional action almost tripled this.

It may be argued that today's young people will receive much higher benefits than now provided by law by the time they are eligible for pensions, since benefits have also been increased frequently by Congress. But higher benefits and higher taxes have gone handin-hand, and it is doubtful that the ratio now facing young people will change much. The grim fact is that, after 31 years of pay roll deductions, Social Security fund reserves remain at an amount less than one year's benefit payments. Current benefits are heavily dependent upon current tax revenue.

Furthermore, many experts in the field believe that the Social Security tax rate is approaching a practical limit. The combined employee-employer tax including Medicare will reach 11.8 percent within 13 years.

Financing much higher benefits 40 years hence may thus prove impractical. An alternative proposal, suggested by Professor Colin D. Campbell of Dartmouth College, is finance higher benefits from general revenue of the Federal government. This was proposed by Senator Winston Prouty, Vermont, but defeated, in the Senate last year.

Suppose our young man does live to the age of 65. (It is possible, by the way, for him to die deaving no qualified dependents and no one will receive any benefit, except the of \$200.1 burial allowance Average life expectancy at age 65 is now 14 years. Withdrawing annual amounts equal to maximum old-age benefits from a \$58,620 fund drawing 4 interest would still leave some \$28,000 in principal after 14 years.

The Social Security Administration disputes his reasoning, asserting that a person can receive buck his tax contributions if he live a full life expectancy atter reaching 65. However, the agency uses only the employee tax or its computation, and ignores any reasonable allowance for interest.

The employer's is an important consideration, however, not only as a cost of doing business, but also because it is money which otherwise might be spent on a private pension plan for the employee.

Social Security if often compared with private insurance or an annuity.

Today's 25-year-old could purchase \$50,000 of cash-value 'whole life" insurance with the money which will go to the old age benefits portion of Social Security. Or, after banking the money for 40 years, he

could purchase an annuity which would pay him \$440 a month beginning at age 65; this compares with a future maximum Social Security benefit of \$323 if married, or \$218 a month if single or widowed.

The conclusion to be drawn is that Social Security is more welfare than insurance, and young people should not view Social Security taxes as dollars put away for their own benefit in later years.

The taxpayer who works most of his lifetime will pay a substantial amount to provide benefits for others who qualify for · full beneits by paying smaller taxes - either because they are older, or because they will not work so many years.

1. "Thug Drays Woman in Purse Grab." This concerned the injury and losses of a 56 year old woman Saturday afternoon between a bus stop and her home.

"Purse Taken in Store 2. Lot." A 73 year old woman was the victim of this act in a Kroger parking lot at 201 E. LaSalle, just a block from the middle of South Bend. She also was forced to the ground.

3. "Couple, 82, Terrorized By Robbers." A man and his wife, both 82 were terrorized and robbed of about \$400 in their home. Both were treated by doctors.

4. "Two Beat, Rob 76 Year Old." A 76 year old man was robbed and knocked to the ground in the afternoon.

5. "Beat and Rob 80 Year Old." An 80 year old man was knocked down and robbed in his yard at 3 p.m. in the after-

Despite the fact that it is expected to have incidents for some odd reason in a city, such as this is almost unbelievable. Five seperate incidents, no arrests, and this was all just Saturday, mostly in the afternoon.

Such incidents as this have grown and grown in recent months and years as less and less respect for the law and law officers have been given due to rulings in favor of criminals, robbers, attackers. etc. It is true that the police can't be everywhere, but such as this is just a definate reason people consider the streets and unsafe place.

This terrific crime rate was a political issue in the recent election, but it seems that this is a matter for each and every town and city to fight on their own. Everytime something like this happens, the Federal Government can't be called in to investigate the case. The backing the Federal government must give howto force stricter ever, is enforcement, conviction and punishment for those who do wrong.

If it could only be known, it is very probable that some of the guilty ones in these cases could be living off other people's money. Welfare cases and poverty conditions seem to go hand in hand with crime, despite the fact that in most cases if the desire to take care of ones problems and get a job, these same people would not have to be on welfare.

It is about time that some of the many dollars the taxpayers are paying for about everything, that some guarantee of protection and safety will be given. It certainly isn't encouraging to read so many stories of this line day after




