Citizenship And Educator Awards To Be Presented By Culver Jaycees

For the fourth year the Culver Jaycees will honor a local citizen with the Distinguished Service Award and for the first time the organization will reorganize an Outstanding Young Educator. The honors will be given at an Award Banquet to be held January 11, 6:30 p.m., in the Culver Community High School Cafeteria.

Featured speaker for the evening will be Dr. Ottis Bowen Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Indiana General Assembly. Dr. Bowen will speak on the important issues to be faced by the Assembly in the coming session. Dr. Bowen has recently taken a position in favor of a local option taxation provision in the sales tax laws and is just one of the items which will be of interest to everyone as Bowen discusses the future of our state.

The Outstanding Young Educator award is a new honor being bestowed by our local Jaycees. The OYE Program is designed to spotlight outstanding achievement in the teaching profession among educators between 21 and 35 years of age. Both male and female teachers of the first through twelfth grades are eligible. The recipient of the local award will be entered in the state OYE program. The state program this year is being conducted jointly by the Culver and Plymouth Jaycees with the state award to be presented at a state wide meeting to be held at Culver Military Academy in May. The state winner will be entered in national competition.

Tickets for the dinner are priced at \$2.50 and may be purchased from any member of the Jaycees.

She is attempting to reach those individuals, both children and adults, who are in need of the services of the Center and not now receiving those services.

Mrs. Bowman received her B. S. Degree from Indiana University in 1959. In 1966 she completed a Master of Arts degree from the Indiana University School of Social Work.

She has worked at the Hamilton County Welfare Dept. in Cincinnati, Ohio, the Monroe County, Dept. of Public Welfare at Bloomington and the Marion County Dept. of Public Welfare at Indianapolis prior to receiving her degree. She had field work at La Rue Carter Psychiatric Hospital in Indianapolis. She had also worked for the Indianapolis Public Schools during the 1966-67 school year. Local Highlights Of 1968 Year Are Reported

January 4, 1968

John R. Hayes was named principal of Culver High School and John Nelson was named director of athletics Donald P. Osborn was elected president of the newly elected town board; George Becker, vice president; and Esther Powers, member. Ordinance 203 establishing new water rates for the town of Culver was passed at a special meeting of the Culver Town Board. Postmaster W. S. Mattox reminded postal customers of the increase in mail rates as of January 7. Dr. Ernest Norris announced his retirement from the practice of medicine.

January 11, 1968

Residents of Culver were without water for several hours when a car knocked over a water hydrant on Jefferson St. The Culver Jaycees announced that Richard D. Wells, State Superintendent of Public Instruction would be their keynote speaker at their 1968 Distinguished Service Award Dinner. Culver loses to LaVille by 68-48.

January 18, 1968

Thieves broke into the Cardinal Service Station and made off with the safe and two tires. Miss Joyce Morrison was hospitalized after her car struck a Plymouth Community School bus. W. O. Osborn, president of The State Exchange Bank, reported that the banks had recorded a new high for deposits, loans, net operating earnings, and total assets in 1967. Free throws gave New Carlisle a win over Culver 65-61.

January 24, 1968

Miss Linda Reinholdt was installed as worthy adviser of the Rainbow Girls. Miss Pam Welsh was the vocal winner of the Marshall County Federation of Clubs Music Contest. Culver fell to Triton 66-45. Culver Wrestlers defeated Plymouth B team grapplers.

February 1, 1968

Robert Rust, Superintendent of the Culver Community School Corporation was the recipient of the "1967 Outstanding Citizen of Culver Award" presented by the Culver Jaycees. A fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the interior and the contents of the Theodore L. Ervin home at 726 Peru Court. The Raymond Gangloff home at Jarrah and E. 7th roads was heavily damaged by fire and all of their possessions destroyed. The Little Gallery, 211 E. Washington St., opened for business Jan. 29. Culver's wrestling team out-scored Pioneer 38-20. Culver's basketball team lost to Plymouth 77-51.

February 8, 1968

Mrs. Charlotte Walker has been named chairman of the committee to consider a name for the new high school. Masons from the Henry H. Culver Lodge 617 presented 50-year pins to Henry L. Henning, Russell J. Miller and Perry F. Overmyer. Culver Band students made fine showing in the Northern Indiana State Band Orchestra Vocal Association Contest held at the Argos Community School.

February 15, 1968

Jack Spencer has purchased the LP Gas Business from Al Poppe. The Food Stamp program was extended to Marshall County. Members of the Maxinkuckee Junior Woman's Club presented a Bell and Howell Language Master to the Marshall - Starke Development Center. The Culver wrestling team was defeated by North Judson 39-23. CMA topped the Indians in basketball 67-52.

THE REVISED LOOK OF basketball tournaments in the northern section of the state, has been announced with a couple of direct changes made that will effect area teams. As no surprise to anyone, the new Notre Dame Athletic and Convention Center is the site of the South Bend Sectional Tourney with the same eight teams involved as was the case last year. This is simply a change of sites.

HOWEVER, THE BIG switch will be made for the Regionals the following week. A regional tourney has been given to South Bend, also to be held at the Notre Dame structure, but also present will be a regional tourney at Elkhart. This makes a drastic change in team alignments at this point.

GONE WILL BE THE REGIONAL in the much out-dated Berry Bowl in Logansport. The teams that will then come to South Bend will be the winners of the South Bend, Michigan City, Chesterton and Knox. This leaves the Elkhart regional hosting the sectional winners at Elkhart, LaVie, Warsaw and Columbia City. Following the regional alignment, the South Bend winner will travel to Lafayette, to play in the Purdue Fieldhouse and the Elkhart winner will continue to go to Ft. Wayne.

THIS WAS THE ONLY REGIONAL realignment in the state with the semi-state and of course the finals remaining at the normal spots. Several other Sectional changes were made as the continuing decrease in schools in Indiana forces changes from year to year. This year 463 schools are aligned by the state officials in Indianapolis, 25 fewer than last year.

IT SEEMS STRANGE TO talk sectional action at this time when most teams still have well over half their schedule remaining. Also, always a highlight, is the coming Bi-County tourney at LaVie for the teams of St. Joseph and Marshall counties which this year figures to be a real humdinger.

BASKETBALL'S POPULARITY may have dwindled some in many locations, but this seems to be the larger cities where domestic problems are forcing the decline in attendance. It has come to the point that South Bend is almost forced to have a big reversal in the trend or some non-supporting sports may be dropped from the various school schedules. The financial problem of the South Bend Community School athletic fund isn't by far the best and all the trouble one reads about attacks and so forth after athletic events, has been instrumental in the drop of attendance.

AT ANY RATE, THIS YEAR promises to be another great tournament year. As we said,

the Bi-County could go to almost any team. Sectionals will have some great action with kind of a thinning out on the following week in the regionals, but by semi-state time, the action will be first class all the way. A couple of real outstanding teams are bound to be heard of this year including Indianapolis Washington and Marion. These two have proven themselves as outstanding, but that often is the time trouble starts as everyone is after the top dog. It will take an outstanding team to stop these teams and fine action is assured regardless of who wins or loses.

February 22, 1968

Lloyd Allen, mayor of South Bend, will address Marshall County's annual Lincoln Day Banquet to be held at the Culver Inn. Mentone's basketball team defeated Culver 85-60 in the last game to be played in the old gym. Culver wrestlers defeat CMA 32-26. Judge Sheneman has appointed Harry Edgington to the planning commission and Peter Trone to the board of appeals.

February 29, 1968

Residents of the community received instruction on mouth to mouth resuscitation and external chest resuscitation from Dr. Howard and the Tri Kappa instruction team. The Culver Press finally made the move to Plymouth to their new location at 1650 N. Oak St. and is known as The Indiana Press. North Judson defeated the Culver Indians by a score of 58-44.

March 7, 1968

"Culver Community High School" is adopted as the official name of the new high school. The Robert Warner Kurtz Memorial Scholarship has been established in memory of Major Kurtz who was the first Culver man to give his life in Vietnam. The Lake Shore Clinic announces that Dr. Michael Deery will join the staff in April. The W. A. Fleet Post 193 held a dinner meeting commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Legion.

March 14, 1968

The annexation by Culver of a subdivision developed by the Culver Military Academy was ruled legal by the Indiana Supreme Court. Approximately 225 people enjoyed a carry-in supper for the annual Cub Scout Blue and Gold Banquet.

March 21, 1968

Randall Harper died as a result of smoke inhalation after having been rescued from his burning home. Miss Debra Triplett was named as this year's representative of the Hoosier Girl's State and Miss Bonnie Albert was chosen alternate. Frank

M. Setzler has been named as the Chairman of the Marshall Co. Will Erwin for Congress Committee. The Culver Fire Dept. extinguished a blaze in the kitchen of the Culver Military Academy.

March 28, 1968

The Marshall Co. Crime Alert was put into effect March 19 in a meeting of law enforcement officials at the Plymouth Police Dept. The Culver Lions Club held a banquet honoring the Culver High School Basketball team.

April 4, 1968

The Culver Town Board accepted the resignation of Marshall, Charles Groce. The local churches announced their Holy Week plans. Will Erwin, candidate for Congressman from the Third district was the main speaker at the Culver Chamber of Commerce meeting. Mrs. James McCombs was appointed to the Park and Recreation Board for a four year term by the Board.

April 11, 1968

Jeff Kueger, Terry Gentry and Stu Lowry were named award winners at the Lions Club Basketball dinner. The Eddie Amonds opened their home to introduce David LaRett, Republican nominee for Congress, to a number of local citizens.

April 18, 1968

Rev. Harold Hohman resigned as pastor of the Grace United Church due to ill health. Culver High School's delegates to the 31st Annual Hoosier Boys' State are Steve McCombs and Carl Strang; alternates named are Richard Snyder and Steve Kelly. Mrs. Eddie Amond has been selected for the directory of the 1967-68 edition of Who's Who in American Education. The Culver Town Board has ordered enforcement of all ordinances concerning stray dogs. Mr. Edward Torok has been elected president of the Culver P.T.A. for 1968-69. Roger Wise was elected head of the District Rural Mail Carriers.

April 25, 1968

David Huffman of Swazee, Ind., has been named Head Basketball Coach of the new unified Culver Community High School. Work on the improvements of the Culver water system was started last week with the laying of a new eight inch main on Obispo St. Communion service was held to celebrate the merger of the congregations of the Culver Methodist Church and the Culver Evangelical United Brethren Church. Culver Tri Kappa's donated \$1,000 to Parkview Hospital.

May 2, 1968

Not Ready For Vehicle Inspection

Indiana's new vehicle inspection program is now underway . . . that is if the inspection place of your choice has their forms and paper work ready to go. This new inspection designed to take unsafe cars off the roads and put into safe condition any Indiana licensed vehicle that is used.

As is usually the case, a lot of bugs will have to be worked out of this program before it can be smoothly put into operation. It seemed to be a hurry-up law without a careful study of the situation being made before it starts into operation. Already there is complaints concerning the vehicle check.

In all, 11 points of the vehicle will be checked to see that the same is in safe working condition. It has been estimated that 70 to 80 per cent of the cars and trucks will not pass on the first attempt. This is going to add more confusion to the already confused inspection in Indiana.

It seems that the careful study of the plan was overlooked and henceforth, several items of the proposed inspection will be shortcoming. The law calls for all vehicles to be checked by June 30 . . . a time that is much to rapid as there is not at present enough inspection stations set up to handle all of Indiana's vehicles. This is the first real problem.

It also appears that the inspection points are being short-changed on the program. To properly inspect a car, a station will be losing money if com-

petitent help is used. At a price of \$2.50 per car, with 50 cents of this going to the state, the inspection station cannot afford to pay a qualified man to do this work unless they can in turn pick up work of correcting the programs found.

There will be hard feelings and problems concerning this inspection that is justly unwarranted. An inspection station stands to make "enemies" possibly of good customers when cars are rejected. For instance, what will the feeling be if a person with a good, late model car is told new brakes are needed, or that the car is out of line, forcing the owner to within five days, correct this situation? It has already been reported that one car in Indianapolis was rejected because it was out of line and after repair work was done to correct this situation, it was rejected again as still being out of line.

The vehicle inspection program will be necessary as the Federal government is pushing this all over the country. However, to put it into operation without proper study and time to get the program going, is almost worse than not having it at all. The 1939 legislature better revise the law a little to make it fair to all, the vehicle owners and inspection stations as well. To date it appears to be on the inadequate side and unless revision and corrections are made, Indiana will be in for another confused issue that effects the majority of the residents of the state.

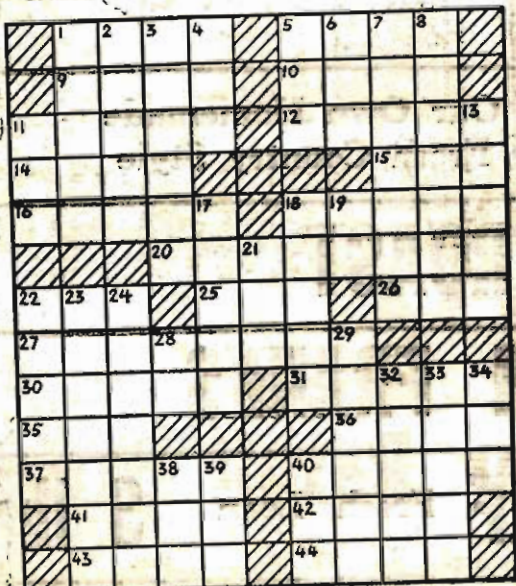

SERVICE NOTES

DAU TIENG, VIETNAM (AHTNC) — Army Specialist Four Robert Rossow III, of Culver, Ind., whose parents are with the U.S. Embassy at Rome, Italy,

was awarded three awards for heroism, two involving actual combat, (the Silver Star Medal and Army Commendation Medal) and one not involving combat, (the Soldiers Medal).

In the same ceremonies near Dau Tieng, Vietnam, held on Nov. 23, he also received a Bronze Star for meritorious service and his second award of the Purple Heart for wounds in combat.

The action for which the nation's third highest award for heroism, the Silver Star medal, was presented, occurred last January.

Spec. Rossow was serving as a machine gunner with his present unit, Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion of the 25th Infantry Division's 22d Infantry, on a combat operation.

When the enemy launched a massive attack on the fire support base, Spec. Rossow refused to stay out of the action raging on the perimeter. Despite a painful wound he continuously exposed himself to the hostile fire to help see that the enemy was thrown back.

The action for the Army Commendation Medal occurred last February while the specialist was serving with the same unit. He was riding on an armored personnel carrier when his unit came under intense enemy fire. He immediately dismounted and began firing. While moving to a better position he was wounded by a shell fragment but, ignoring the pain, threw hand grenades into one Viet Cong bunker and destroyed it.

With the same unit, Spec. Rossow earned the Soldier's Medal for bravery and devotion to duty during a fire last December which threatened to destroy much military equipment. Disregarding personal safety, he repeatedly re-entered the area to remove that equipment.

Spec. Rossow entered the Army in February 1967 and completed basic training at Ft. Knox, Ky. He holds the Combat Infantryman Badge and Purple Heart.

The 26-year-old soldier graduated in 1960 from Culver Military Academy, Culver, Ind., and received his A. B. degree in 1967 from Indiana University, Bloomington.

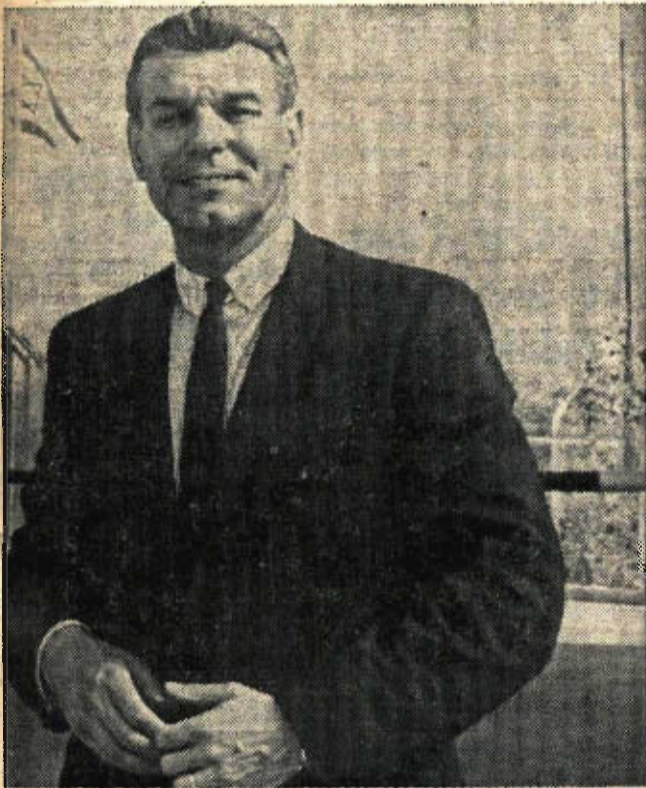

John Hlavacek To Speak At CMA



Award-winning foreign correspondent John Hlavacek will address students and faculty in Culver's Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium Jan. 16 at 3 p.m.

Award-winning foreign correspondent John Hlavacek will address students and faculty in Culver's Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium Jan. 16 at 3 p.m. His topic will be "The Young Break Through: Eastern Europe Today."

Hlavacek is the third in a series of speakers to appear at Culver in the America's Democratic Heritage Program. The purpose of the program is to prepare Culver students to face the problems and issues confronting citizens in the world.

The second correspondent to speak in the series, Hlavacek bases his talks on his coverage of the world's trouble spots for NBC, the New York Times and the United Press.

Winner of a Carnegie Fellowship from the Council on Foreign Relations and a Silver Anniversary All-American Award for career achievement from Sports Illustrated, former football letterman John Hlavacek, a graduate of Carleton College, makes constant news jaunts around the globe. His assignments have taken him to Viet Nam, Indonesia, Malaysia, India, Pakistan, the Middle East and Eastern Europe.

On the nightly "Hlavacek Report" he analyzes major foreign or domestic news stories, and he does a weekly half-hour interview program with national

figures and prominent visitors over NBC's affiliate station in Omaha, KMTV.

Taped reports and six television documentaries emerged from a recent 10-week tour of the Middle and Far East. In the summer of 1966 he spent six weeks traveling through 10 countries in Africa.

In 1967 he toured Eastern Europe to report on Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Rumania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland. In 1968 he traveled via Moscow to Asia, including Afghanistan, India and Viet Nam.

Before joining KMTV's new staff in 1964, Hlavacek was Miami-based correspondent for The New York Times and had been on the NBC news staff in Miami and Havana, where he was resident correspondent until the missile crisis in 1962.

For five years, beginning in 1958, he covered the Caribbean area for NBC, making trips to Central and South America on assignment for the Huntley-Brinkley show.

Hlavacek was United Press general manager for India and Pakistan from 1945 to 1957. It was in Bombay that he married Pegge Parker, a foreign correspondent in her own right who accompanies him on most of his news jaunts. Before American newsmen were barred from China, each of them had reported from that country.

Indiana Singers To Appear At CMA Thursday

Indiana University Chamber Singers have put away their colorful Christmas madrigal costumes so they will wear formal attire for an appearance at Culver Military Academy Jan. 9.

The Singers, who have earned fame with their annual sell-out Christmas dinners in Bloomington, will appear at 8:15 p.m. (EST) in Culver's Eppley Audi-

torium. The show is part of the annual concert-theatre series at the Academy.

Members of the Chamber Singers are all students in Indiana University's School of Music, with their class rank ranging from freshmen to doctoral students. They perform music of all eras, with particular emphasis on the 16th and 20th centuries.

The brief history of this group is marked by high praise for its artistic achievements. In 1961, the group was invited to sing for the American Choral Directors convention in Columbus, Ohio.

In 1962, the singers undertook their first extensive tour off the Indiana University campus, which included concerts at Carnegie Recital Hall in New York City and at the First Baptist Church in Washington, D.C.

The Chamber Singers, a regular ensemble of the School of

Music at Indiana University, organized in 1959 under the name of the Madrigal Singers. The rapid expansion of the repertoire led to the change of title. Annually the singers give concerts on the campus and throughout the state.

The Singers present programs featuring Liebeslieder waltzes, madrigals, Bach cantatas and works by contemporary composers. The director is Dr. Don Moses, instructor in music.

Area civic, social and church organizations are invited to have a dinner-theater evening with dinner at the Culver Inn before the performance by the Chamber Singers. 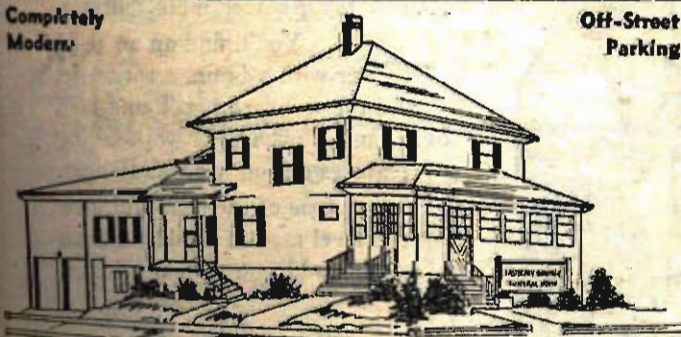

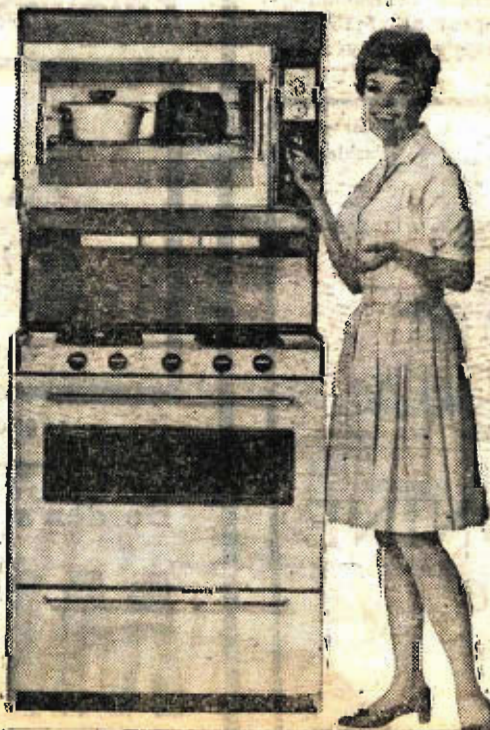
