## Culver Lions Achievement Night To Be April 23

The annual Achievement Night, recognizing 1969 leadership and academic attainment of Culver Community High School students for the year 1968-69, will be sponsored by the Culver Lions' Club in an all public-school district wide dinner program at the Eagles' Lodge, Wednesday evening, April 23, 1969, at 6:30 p.m.

The program will feature a panel discussion with audience participation according to Robert Rust, program chairman, Charles Downing, Administrative Assistant, Culver Community Schools Corporation; John Hayes, High School Principal; Ruth Shanks, Guidance instructor, and selected students and parents will participate in the presentation.

Achievement in Art, Audio Visual, Band, Choir, Business, English, French, Spanish, Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Latin, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, and Library will be recognized. Student leaders of Sunshine Society, Student Council, Pep Block, Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America, Future Teachers of America, Girls' Athletic Association, National Honor Society, Spanish Club, French Club, and Latin Club will be honored.

The public is urged to join for the recognition program honoring students of the newly unified high school, James McCombs, president of the sponsoring Lions' Club stated.

The all-community affair honoring the outstanding 1969 achievement designates has been an annual feature for the past several years of the Lions' Club. In announcing plans for the meeting, it was pointed out that this is an all-school district affair and the public is invited to participate.

### CPL. PHILIP SCRUGGS WOUNDED IN VIETNAM

Marine Lance Cpl. Philip Scruggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. M. Scruggs of Culver, was wounded in action in Vietnam March 19. He is in the 12th Air Force Hospital at Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam, with an injury to his foot. He expects to be dismissed from the hospital on April 25.

## School Board Rejects Junior High Merger

The Board of School Trustees, Culver Community Schools Corporation, has approved a Notice to be published, announcing that bids for bus driver's services on 20 routes will be considered at the regular meeting on May 6.

The bids will be opened in the Superintendent's office and the individual routes described have been worked out and will be available to bidders on or by April 18th.

Continuing studies of state support as it refers to the local school district discloses that there will be little if any additional income over the year 1968-69 during the next biennium. In its continuing study the Board has considered recommendations for reducing administrative units, extension of contracts, and some modification of the summer program.

The consideration of merging the 7th and 8th grade units at Aubbeenaubee, Monterey, and Culver was rejected by the Board. The enrollment at Culver is 190; at Monterey, projected figures indicate 40 in grades 7 and 8; and 44 at Aubbeenaubee. The consideration involved programming and certain economics with relations to the state.

The resignation of Norman Tanksley, Librarian, Culver Community High School, was accepted. Mr. Tanksley, who has been ill, has served for 45 years in Indiana schools and the Board was joined by the administration in expressing appreciation for his services and contributions to education. Mr. Tanksley will retire at the close of the present school year.

The Board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Mary Frances England, English instructor, who will join the Culver Military Academy staff next year; Mrs. Gillian Wallis, English instructor, who will return to her home in England; and Mrs. John Krueger, instructor in Latin.

Among tenure contracts sanctioned by the Board were those of William Harris, Carolyn Kline, Barbara Winters, and Jerry Wolfe.

A review of new state laws as they affect school corporation, as outlined by State Board of Accounts, was held.

Plans for the Pre-School Round-up at Aubbeenaubee, and Monterey on May 5th, and at Culver on May 7th, involving parents of children who will be enrolled in school for the first time next September, were reported.

Conference requests approved included: Helen Friesen to attend the Art Educators' Association of Indiana's annual convention, April 24th and 25th, in Evansville, Indiana; John R. Hayes, Spring Meeting, I.A.J.S.H.S.D., at Indiana State University, April 10th and 11th; and Naomi Kaiser, Indiana School Librarians' Association Meeting, Muncie, on April 25th and 26th.

An Intent to Employ was issued to Stephen D. Vitosky, of Linton, Indiana, for English and Speech teacher, and a contract to JoAnn Ringer, Matron.

## Peter Onesti, Owner Of Lakeside Grocery, Dies

Peter Onesti, 67, 622 Lakeshore Drive, Culver, died at 3 p.m. Sunday, April 13 at the Parkview Hospital where he was rushed by ambulance following a heart seizure at 1 p.m. Sunday at the Lakeside Grocery which he owned and operated.

Mr. Onesti was born October 5, 1902 at Lugo, Italy and had lived in Culver for the past 16 years coming from Chicago. He was married to Pearl H. Kline on June 1, 1935 in Chicago. He was a member of the Henry H. Culver Lodge 617 F & AM, the South Bend Scottish Rite, the South Bend Shrine Club and the Culver Lions Club.

Surviving with his wife are a daughter, Mrs. Judith Marr, Urbana, Ill.; four brothers, Carlo, Scivio, Albert and William Onesti, all of Wittenberg, Wis.; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Houterman of Pennsburg, Pa.; Mrs. Dalia Tichy, Bowler, Wis.; and Mrs. Alga Duffee, Milwaukee, Wis.; and one granddaughter.

Services were conducted Wednesday at the Culver Grace United Church of Christ, with Rev. Harold Hohman, former pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was at the Culver Masonic Cemetery.

The Henry H. Culver Lodge conducted memorial services on Tuesday evening at the Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home which had charge of the arrangements.

## AD1 James Shaw Recently Awarded 16th Air Medal

Aviation Machinist Mate First Class James G. Shaw, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Shaw of Culver, was recently awarded his 14th, 15th, and 16th Air Medal at Point Mugu, Calif.

Shaw who now holds two more Air Medal than he has years in the Navy, was presented his latest medals for successfully completing 27 strikes and six flights in an active combat area.

His citation, as read by Commander James R. Foster, commanding officer of VX-4, said in part: "His professional abilities resulted in the gaining of valuable photographic intelligence of major importance to current and future military operations in Southeast Asia."

The recently awarded Air Medals add to a long list of awards Petty Officer Shaw wears. He has also been awarded the Flying Cross, the Vietnam Air Gallantry Cross, the Vietnam star, Vietnam Service Medal (4 bronze stars), the Navy Unit Commendation Medal (4 bronze stars), the Vietnam Campaign Medal, and the Good Conduct Medal.

On one of his 320 missions over North Vietnam, Shaw and his pilot were shot down. They landed about one mile off a beach and came under severe attack from North Vietnamese gunboats for 25 minutes before a rescue helicopter arrived to pick them up.

Shaw is married to the former Opal Harden of Deland, Florida. He is presently stationed at Point Mugu and resides there with his family.

## Culver Schools Plan Pre-School Round-Up

Plans for the 1969 Pre-School Round-Up in the Culver Community Schools district are being finalized for parents of pre-kindergarten pupils and pre-first grade pupils who have not attended kindergarten.

Parents of Kindergarten and First Grade students who have not attended school this year and who are eligible to enter school in September, 1969, residing in Aubbeenaubee Township, will meet at the Aubbeenaubee School, 9:30 p.m. EDT, May 5, 1969.

Tippicanoe Township parents are to meet at 2:00 p.m. EDT, at the Monterey School, on May 5, 1969.

## It's Hard To Believe!

Each week many stories come across our desk that shock, disatisfy, please, and certainly enlighten us as to actions in different parts of this country of ours. With a crime rate almost to the alarming stage and headlines made of many stories of crimes forcing one to question our laws, two such stories attracted special attention this past week. We would like to pass them on to you in this fashion.

### THE SAME OLD STORY

It was less than a year ago that a Philadelphia man, free on bail after being charged with the death of a police officer, killed a second policeman.

In Washington, D. C., the number of crimes committed by parolees, and accused men set free on bail and awaiting trial, has reached the danger point.

The same problem faces every major city in the United States, and is overflowing into suburban areas.

Many citizens were shocked a few years ago when a plot was uncovered to place bombs in three of our historic shrines the Liberty Bell, the Washington Monument and the Statue of Liberty.

One of the same men who planned that sabotage is again under arrest. He had been found guilty in the bombing plot and sentenced to a term of five years. He had served less than two years when someone decided that he had either paid his debt to society, or had been punished enough. Then, last month, Manhattan Borough President Percy Sutton named the recently released convict to serve as an unpaid advisor to a community planning board. After all, he had shown some flare for planning.

To most people, this would have meant a chance, not only to clear their names, but to show that the parole system can work. But this man did not react as one might guess. It was the same old story once again. He has now been indicted for taking part in another bomb plot. This time the plot did not involve destruction of historic symbols. This time it involved human beings.

Twenty-one members of the extremist Black Panthers, including the parolee, were allegedly plotting to bomb five

New York City department stores, a police station and a commuter rail station. Snipers were to be in position to gun down policemen as they fled the stationhouse.

### SIRHAN IN SPLENDOR

The Los Angeles County supervisor has been quoted as estimating the cost of the trial of Sirhan B. Sirhan as being more than \$858,000 to date. He said that the sum total will be in excess of a million dollars before the trial is finished. In recent months, we have been up to our elbows in circuses. The James Earl Ray trial and the Garrison-Shaw episode set some sort of record for bizarre court cases. They make the Scopes trial look like a small claims case.

It now appears that the astronomical expense of the Sirhan trial is not going to be the end. The California Medical Facility is in process of creating special living quarters for Sirhan in case he is found guilty and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Plans for the special cell appear to be curiously lavish. The quarters will consist of three units. One will be a kitchen-dining room. The others are a living room, a bedroom and a lavatory with shower. This seems to us generous and makes us wonder how the California tax-payer must feel about it. Unfortunately, the press release did not give the cost figures on the cell. It did not even detail what the furnishings would be.

We are not among those who believe that convicted murderers should live a bread-and-water existence. Prisons of today do not contain dungeons with chains and manacles or torture racks, but surely a line should be drawn between imprisonment, as a punishment for a capital offense, and a retirement suite. After all, the assassin is convicted, he should receive appropriate punishment. A man is dead. A woman has lost her husband. Children have been deprived of their father. Punishment in an environment of the sort described might well lead other murderers to seek equal treatment, or to conclude that murder is its own reward.

## Voluntary Vehicle Inspection Continues At A Rapid Pace

Willard L. Walls, Administrator of Indiana's Vehicle Inspection Department said today, more than a quarter of a million voluntary inspections have been made since the beginning of the year. Walls urges motorists to avoid the last minute rush and get their vehicles inspected, now, during the voluntary period. The schedule for the mandatory period is as follows: Vehicles bearing a 1969 license plate ending with the digit 1 or 2 shall be inspected on or before August 31, 1969; those ending in 3 or 4 on or before September 30, 1969; those ending in 5 or 6 on or before October 31, 1969; those ending in 7 or 8 on or before November 30, 1969; and those ending in 9 or 0 on or before December 31, 1969. Self Inspectors shall have all vehicles inspected on or before August 31, 1969.

Walls stated, vehicles inspected voluntarily or otherwise will be due for inspection one (1) year from the month in which they were inspected, provided, that the vehicle is not involved in an accident that the Investigating

Police Officer recommends a vehicle be reinspected.

He pointed out that a rejected vehicle may be operated a period of thirty (30) days to the date of rejection repaired-disapproved vehicles be entitled to reinspection, of charge, provided it is conducted by the initial inspection station and within thirty days of the initial date of inspection.

Saturday's sixth annual Tippecanoe River race is Indiana's first and longest canoe race and is sanctioned by the Indiana Canoe Racing Council. Points will be awarded for the 1969 state championship in the senior men, junior men, mixed doubles, women and C-1 divisions.

Culver's new canoe coach, Francis Lovett, will be counting on his captain, Mike Thrasher of Bloomington, Ind., and his partner, Clyde Killian of Logansport, to make points for Culver. Thrasher was number one in the state junior men's division last year and the Thrasher-Killian team won second in the national junior men's marathon last year.

In pre-season action, at a race on the Barren River in Bowling Green, Ky., during spring vacation, Killian and Thrasher placed first in the C-2 (two in a canoe) sprints, first in C-2 slalom for junior men and second in C-2 slalom for men.

Other Culver paddlers who did well in Kentucky were Frazer Parker of Maysville, Ky., and Richard Gzybowski of Fort Wayne who placed first in the C-2 slalom for men, second in the C-2 sprints and tied for first in the C-2 slalom for men with Killian and Thrasher.

A team of Lew Erwin of Etna Green, Ind., and Raphael Coutin of New Orleans, La., won first in the pleasure craft marathon for men. "That was a remarkable win considering it was the first time Erwin and Coutin had ever paddled together," Coach Lovett commented.

Altogether the six Culver canoeists, who competed as individuals, rather than as Culver team members, earned five firsts, two seconds, one third and two fourths and competed in more than half of the events.

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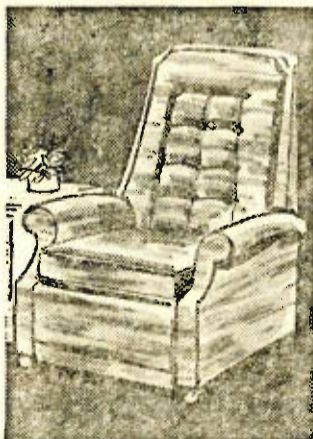
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
