Culver School Dedication This Sunday

The Culver Community High School, in use since September 2, 1965, as classroom facilities for the newly unified district high school, will be officially dedicated in ceremonies in the school's auditorium, beginning at 1:15 p.m. EDT, Sunday, April 27, 1969.

A concert by the high school band and chorus is programmed from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. Tours of the building between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. will be conducted by students under the direction of John Hayes, principal, and the staff, as a feature of the open house-dedication.

Members of the student body, headed by the Student Council and class officers, the High School's Future Homemakers of America and the Future Farmers of America will greet parents and visitors and serve as hosts for visitor tours of the building.

Mrs. Gordon Traiclet heads the Reception Committee composed of twenty-seven mothers-patrons who will greet visitors. This group, assisted by Mrs. Anna Waite, high school head cook, and the Future Homemakers of America and their Home Economics advisor, Mrs. Barbara Winters, will serve refreshments in the cafeteria from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. Future Farmers of America, supervised by Stephen Brown, Vocational Agriculture instructor, will supervise the parking of cars for visitors.

Phil N. Eskew, Indiana High School Athletic Association Commissioner, will be the main speaker for the brief formal dedication rites which will open with the presentation of the colors by the Color Guard of the Culver Military Academy.

Two district clergymen, Reverend Norris King, pastor, Letters Ford Methodist Church; Reverend Ellsworth Routson, pastor, Burr Oak Church of God; Linda Shirrell, president, Student Council, representing the high school student body; Ralph A. Osborn, president Building Corporation; Ray Winter, president, Board of School Trustees; Principal John R. Hayes; and Superintendent Robert Rust have been assigned program roles.

School trustees, Building Corporation directors, former School Board members, school officials, the architect, attorney, trustee, and those who have had a role in the development of the building will be recognized.

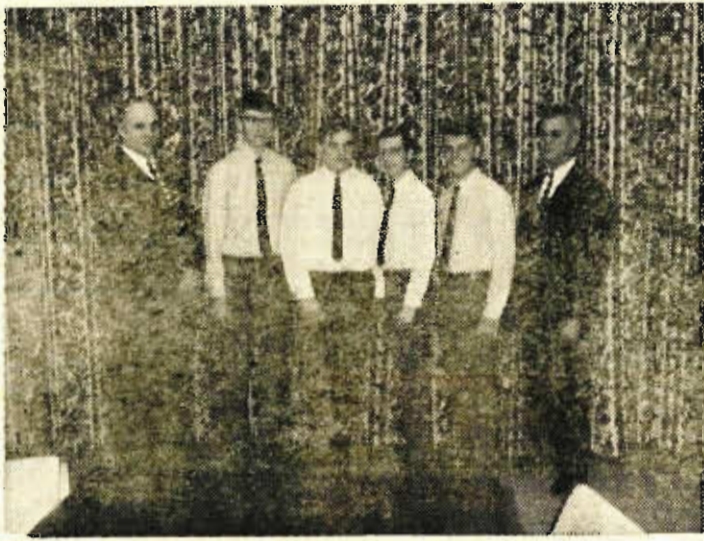

Culver Clocks To Move One Hour Ahead On Sunday

The Culver Town Board unanimously passed a resolution at Monday's meeting that the town of Culver will observe Eastern Daylight Time as prescribed by the United States Office of Transportation in compliance with the Unified Time Act. This resolution will go into effect as of 2 a.m., April 27.

In other business, Vert McFeely reported on the condition of the pier off Davis Street in the south part of town. He stated that the pier would be dangerous to use in its present condition. It was noted that the Park and Recreation Board had in its possession a pier which had been donated to the town. The Board instructed Mr. McFeely to contact the Board to see if this pier could be used at the Davis Street location.

Town Board president, Donald Osborn, stated that he had been contacted by Northern Indiana Public Service Company in regard to the street lights on College Avenue. Since the lights are not operating in full capacity, a short in the wiring is indicated. The Board instructed the town clerk, Ruth Lomen, to contact a Mr. Schoner who is known to have a device which can check and determine just where the problem originates.

Mr. Osborn noted that the necessary papers requesting State and Federal aid for the Sewage Plant renovation had been signed and returned to the engineering company.

Wayne Von Ehr was present at the meeting and requested the street light in the alley behind the former Crabb's Furniture store be changed to Cass Street which is a half block north, placing it in a more effective location. The Board agreed to this action.

Mr. Von Ehr also requested the possibility of blacktapping over the drop-off between the curb and brick street in front of his property on W. Washington Street. The Board agreed to look in to this matter.

Vert McFeely informed the Board that all the streets in the town had been swept for the first time with the town's new street sweeper.

In final action at this week's meeting, the Board approved the Lions Club's request to hold boat races at the Town Park on Sunday, July 27.

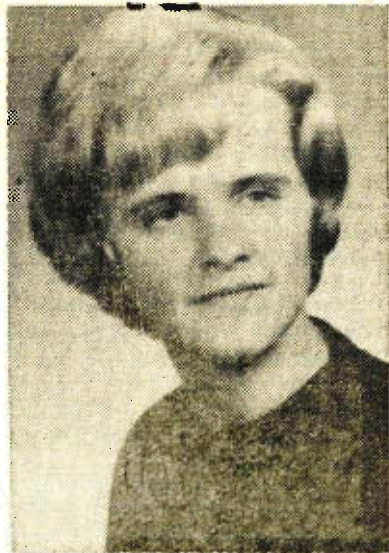

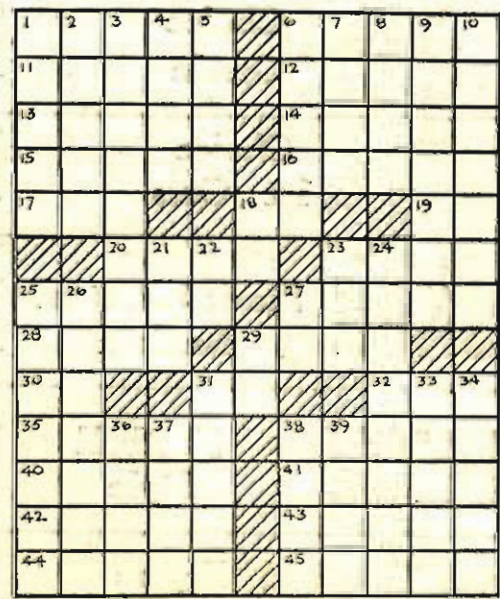

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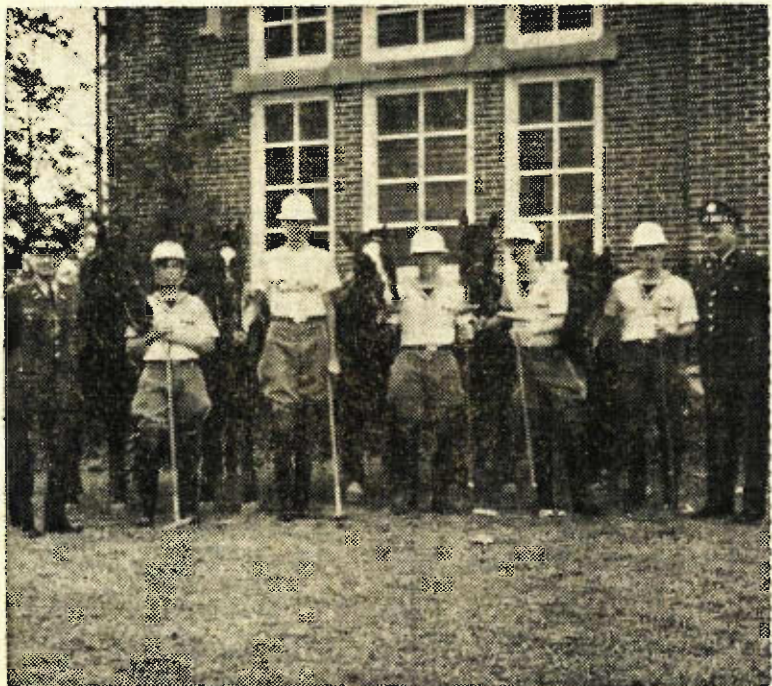
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CMA Polo Team Is Outstanding

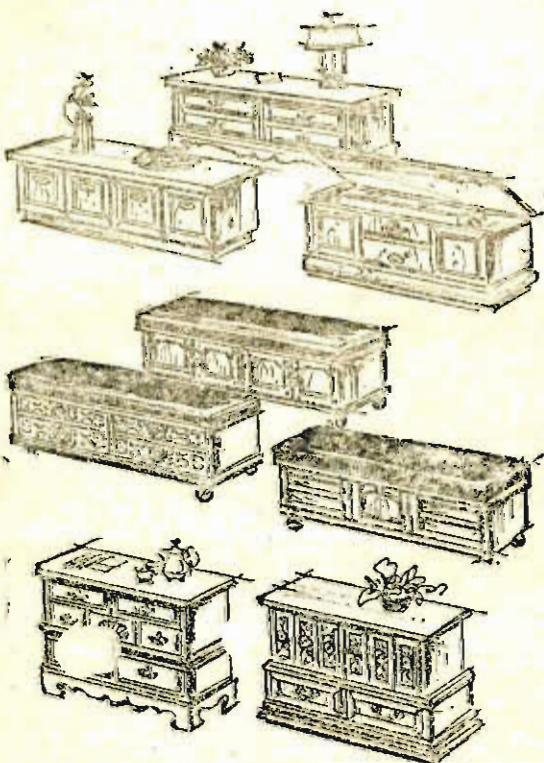
