OLD WATER TOWER TO BE GIVEN AWAY

In old business at Monday's Town Board meeting, it was announced that the street lights on College Avenue had been repaired. George Becker also announced that he had contacted the Park Board in regard to the pier they possess which the town wishes to use at the Davis Street beach. Board member, Esther Powers, reported she had placed an ad in a contractor's magazine in regard to the old water tower which the town no longer has use for and wishes to give to anyone that is willing to tear it down and haul it away.

Sue Mattox reported to the Board that one refrigerator at the sewage plant was unrepairable and that the other needed repair work. The Board decided to inquire about obtaining another used refrigerator.

Verl McFeely relayed a request in regard to the street condition in front of Sperry's Restaurant. Donald Osborn, board president, informed him that the street would be repaired by Easterday Construction Co. and the town as soon as possible. Mr. Sperry also requested permission to dig a well on his property inasmuch as the 'ish bait he sells cannot survive in town's water. He was advised to contact the State Board of Health since the town has no authority in this matter.

A complaint was registered in regard to the condition of the Town Park. Osborn agreed to investigate the matter and request a Park Board member be present at the Town Board meetings.

Sam Madonna brought to the Board's attention that his office was damp. He also requested safety flares for emergencies be purchased. Mrs. Powers was instructed to inquire about a dehumidifier for the police office and approval was given to purchase the flares.

Payment of bills concluded the meeting.

Student disorders seem to be the order of the day and from coast to coast we have heard stories of these from mild protests to major problems involving injury and destruction.

The Indiana universities have announced increases in tuition for next year and with this has come the protest and demands.

The timing was poor for a letter to arrive just two days after \$600,000 of damage was done in an arson case at IU.

The increase of tuition has been necessitated by the fact that the Indiana General Assembly couldn't offer more help to the state universities.

They must realize that this money comes from the taxpayers of the State of Indiana and these people are pushed to the limit already without taking larger hunks out of pay-

checks. There is a limit to how far an individual can be taxed and there is also many other phases of the state to be supported with this tax dollar other than education.

There would not be much need for our state universities if the state cannot get the younger children through high school. The demands of teachers in every community are getting to the point of extreme hardship on the school districts and further financial bites cannot be handled at this time.

The students point out that the last session of the Indiana Legislature let down not only the students, but the people of Indiana. This might be true, but only through the action of the governor can any correction be made in this situation now.

It is true the increased tuition will hurt... but so does the continual increase in the prices of foods, building materials, automobiles, and about everything that any person buys.

It is an unfortunate situation that the tuition fees must increase... but it is also an unfortunate situation that the student representative concerned feel they must tell the universities "either or else" to their demands.

If this is to be the toughest hurdle they have to handle through the course of life, they will be lucky. There are forces behind them at home who have faced many larger obstacles and will continue to do so to extend the opportunity of a better education to these students of today.

6. The last session of the Indiana State Legislature let down not only the students of I.U. but also the people of Indiana.

The sixth point outlined above is a most important one. A dynamic system of higher education is necessary for the expanding economy of Indiana. It is vital that qualified college-age persons in Indiana be provided with the opportunity to attend public institutions of higher learning.

We need the support of every citizen in the state in furthering our effort toward open, and better education.

May 3, 1939

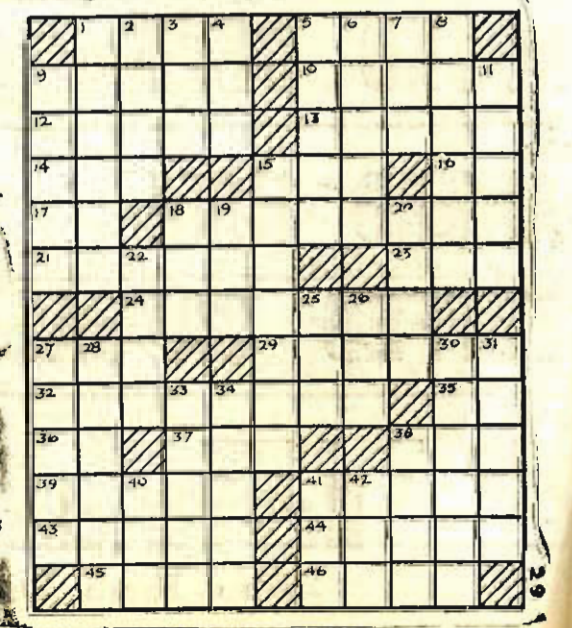

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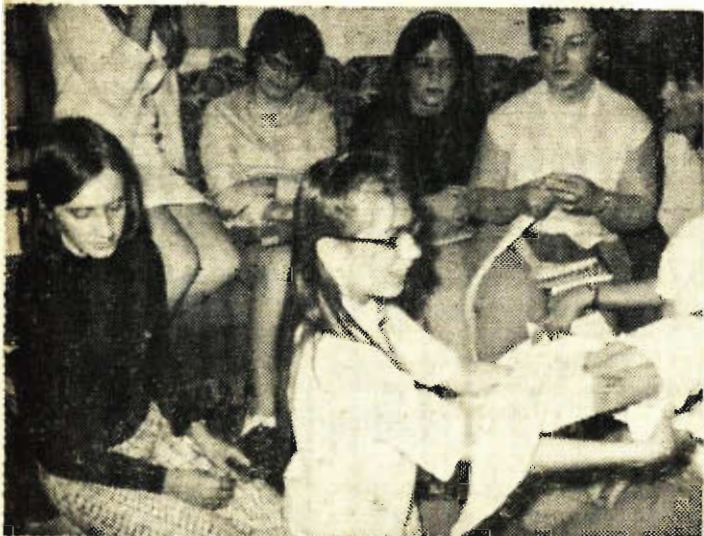

last meeting of the year.

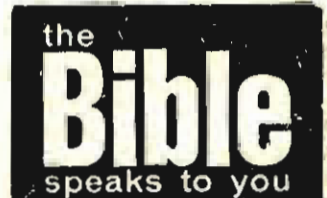

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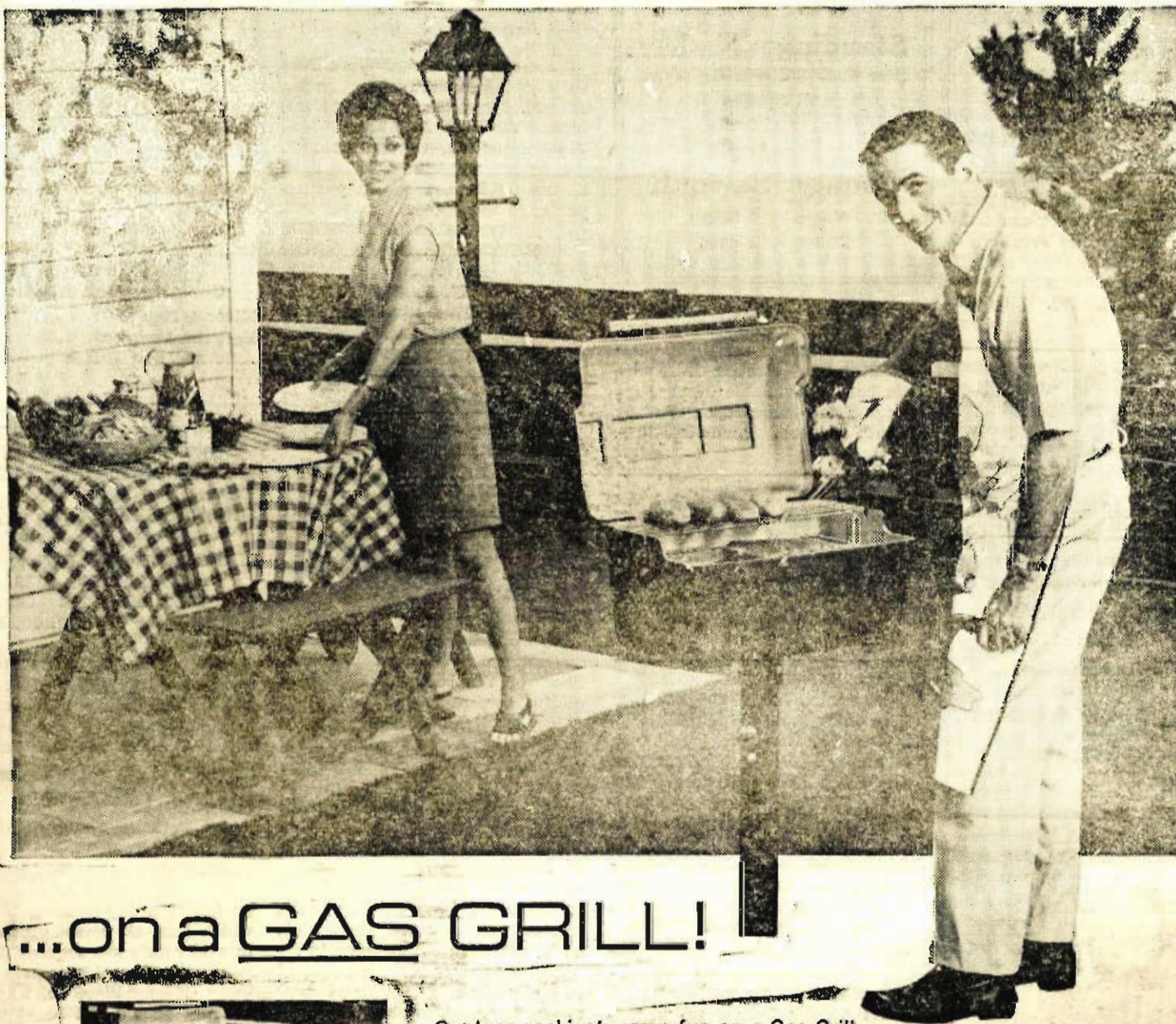
