




Elza Hawkins Dies At Age 86

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
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Unfortunate Situation

Student disorders seem to be the order of the day and from coast to coast we have heard tories of these from mild protests to major problems involving injury and destruction. week, the Indiana Uni-Last versities were beset by students demands and also destruction as the Graduate Library at Indana. University was burned in what has been labeled an arson and two homemade fire bombs were thrown at Purdue, only to have a minimum of damage cone at this University.

The Indiana universities nave announced increases in tuition for next year and with this has come the protest and demands. The students at IU gave the University heads an ultimatium and class boycotts are the result. They also sent to every newspaper in the state, open letter entitled: "An Open Letter To The People Of Indiana.'

The timing was poor for a letter to arrive just two days after \$600,000 of damage was cione in an arson case at IU. It is true, this is not the work of the average student, but reitner is demonstrations. Probably the group that compiled the letter had absolutely othing to do with the fire . . . but someone certainly did.

The increase of tuition has been necessitated by the fact that the Indiana General Asembly couldn't offer more help to the state universities. This is perhaps an unfortunate ituation, but these same students must realize that the 1969 legislature and governor ad a hard time doing anything progressive. Help needed . . . but help is going to e needed much more so on a high school and elementary evel first. To date, many Inpublic school districts nurting financially. in this letter that the Constitution of Indiana calls for a free education of the State Indiana. This doesn't necessarily mean through a codege level.

They must realize that this money comes from the taxlayers of the State of Indiana and these people are pushed to he innit already without taking larger hunks out of pay-

checks. There is a limit to how far an individual can be taxed and there is also many other phases of the state to be supwith this tax dollar other than education. It is true, that possibly none is anymore important, but nevertheless, all phases have to have money.

There would not be much need for our state universities if the state cannot get the younger children through high school. The demands of teachers in every community are getting to the point of extreme hardship on the school districts and further financial bites cannot be handled at this time.

The students point out that the last session of the Indiana Legislature let down not only the students, but the people of Indiana. This might be true, but only through the action of te governor can any correction be made in this situation now.

It is true the increased tuition will hurt . . . but so does the continual increase in the prices of foods, building automobiles, materials. and about everything that any person buys. The state universities do give to Indiana residents a break in tuition. definate Should these same students desire to go to a private school, they would find a much steeper tuition charge. This should be obvious to them by the increases now and next year to the out-of-state student.

It is an unfortunate situation that the tuition fees must increase . . . but it is also an unfortunate situation that the representative student concerned feel they must tell the universities "either or else" to their demands The students in question should appreciate the opportunity they have to acquire an education and first and foremost, should extend some of this appreciation at home . . . to the parents who are basically paying this tuition for the students.

If this is to be the toughest hurdle they have to handle through the course of life, they will be lucky. There are forces behind them at home who have faced many larger costactes and will continue to do so to extend the opportunity of a better education to these students of today.



Following the club creed, the roll call was answered by thirty-two members and two guests, Mrs. Alice Helt and Mrs. Howard Shoch.


