Elect Downing Treasurer Of School Board

Charles Downing, Administrative Assistant of the Culver Community Schools Corporation, was elected Treasurer for the year 1969-70, at the Regular Meeting of the Board of School Trustees held here this week.

Mr. Downing, who has been assigned as Administrative Assistant and Supervising Principal of the Aubbeenaubee and Monterey Schools for the next school year, has served as Treasurer for the past two years.

Re-elected Deputy Treasurer is Mrs. William Grosvenor, accountant and bookkeeper for the school corporation.

A review of applications for existing vacancies in the elementary, junior high, and senior high schools occupied the attention of the Board in its first June meeting.

The contracts of Vickie Dearth, Fary, Indiana, French teacher, high school; Thad Overmyer, Culver, Monterey School; and Carol Jung, Indianapolis, high school.

Summer rehabilitation projects including a review of bids for two sets of doors for the Culver elementary building, repair of furnace at Aubbeenaubee, work in the Monterey School, shower room floors at the Culver Community building and Dust Collector System for shops at the new high school, together with water treatment were reviewed.

A review of the new laws was detailed to the Board. The new legislative enactment requires Boards of Education to provide annual physical examination for TB for all employees and the new act requires that school officials require parents to furnish written evidence that a child entering school for the first time has been skin tested for TB.

Also discussed were the new laws requiring Boards of Education to provide for Special Schooling.

Based upon a recent State inspection, the recommendations of Inspector Robert Alban that the new unified Culver Community High School be granted a First Class Commission was read to the Board.

Summer Swim Program Announced

The schedule for the summer swimming program has been announced by Bill Orebaugh, water front supervisor. By popular demand an evening class for adults has been included. Diving classes will also be offered for the first time. Two sessions of swimming instruction will be given with the first sessions of swimming to begin June 16 and closing July 11. The second session will begin July 14. There is no charge for the Red Cross swimming lessons.

To facilitate record-keeping, pre-registration is required. Registration will begin Thursday, June 12 from 1-5 p.m. Registration will continue through the weekend and conclude Monday, June 16, at 9:00 a.m. The forms are available in the beach lodge at the concession stand. The minimum age for swimmers will be 5 years.

The instructors for this year's program are fully qualified, Red Cross certified Water Safety Instructors. Sharyl Welsh, Indiana University senior, will teach Lifesaving and Advanced Beginners. Debbie Dunnell, a sophomore Water Instructor from Ball State University, will instruct beginning and intermediate swimming. Bill Orebaugh, former Ball State gymnast and diver, will instruct beginning and advanced divers and assist with the Lifesaving class. Steve Kelly, Western Michigan University freshman, will assist in the swimming classes and lifeguard each afternoon.

Culver residents are reminded that a family may purchase swimming passes at the beach lodge for 25c per family. These passes will be available until June 16. After that date persons will be required to pay the daily admittance of 25c per person, per day.

The Board also heard that the preliminary allocation of Title I, ESEA fund for the 1969-70 school year is \$26,256.00. This is approximately 16 per cent less than last year.

Fire Causes Extreme Damage To Grace Church

Defective wiring in the ceiling of the basement social rooms was believed to have started the estimated \$75,000 fire at Grace United Church of Christ last Friday afternoon.

According to Fire Chief Dave Burns, heat and smoke went up the stairway from the hall into the sanctuary and blew open the doors of the church at approximately 5:15 p.m.

Bible classes had been held in the basement rooms that morning and although people had been working there earlier in the afternoon, no one was in the church when the fire started.

Rev. John Krueger, pastor of the church, was attending a church conference in Indianapolis at the time of the fire.

The most extensive damage was caused by smoke and water. One stained glass window in the sanctuary was buckled.

Except for two Sunday school rooms and the furnace room, the basement of the church is a total loss. Choir robes, books, pianos, and an organ were included in the church's loss.

Church services this Sunday will be in the form of a family worship service and picnic and will be held at the American Legion home west of Culver. An announcement will be made next week concerning arrangements for further worship services.

AS WE MOVE THROUGH the month of June, the 1969 major baseball season is now two months old and the first year of divisional ball with both leagues expanded in its trial run. So far the races are fairly close in three of the four divisions which is better than one league out of two being close. However, it takes the average fan a little while to get used to this and even the baseball men themselves are eyeing this year very closely.

THE CHICAGO CUBS HAVE been the talk of the baseball world so far this season. They jumped to a big lead early and have held it and only a long winning streak by the New York Mets has kept it from being a run-a-way in the National League's Eastern division. At the time of this writing, a seven game lead is enjoyed by the Chicago Northsiders with the trailing Mets second, 3½ games ahead of the third place Pirates. St. Louis, the team to beat according to all baseball people, is struggling along four games under the .500 mark.

THE NATIONAL LEAGUE'S west division is a pretty tight race. At present, Atlanta is leading by a couple of games over the Dodgers with San Francisco and Cincinnati another game back. Even Houston, after a recent surge, isn't out of it just 7½ back of the leader.

IN THE AMERICAN League it looked like Baltimore was going to run away with the East division, but Boston again is trailing by only 3½ games. Detroit, the defending world's

champions, hasn't put together their game yet and is third a distant 9 games back with New York and Washington about a dozen behind. The West division has appeared all spring to be a two team race between Minnesota and Oakland. Three games separate the clubs now with Minnesota leading, but Oakland cannot be counted out of this race.

THE DIVISIONAL PLAY IS expected to do one thing, that being to keep interest right to the end. It doesn't matter how much a team wins their division by, they still have to win the playoff of the divisions to get into the fall classic and this could be the real pinch for baseball. It is conceivable that a team that has dominated a league could be beaten in the playoff by a team with a much lower record. The two leagues are set up little different, the National league plays each team in their own division 18 times and the six teams from the opposite division 12 times while the American League is playing 18 times in their own division and just 11 times in the opposite division. This split of games should keep the front runner closer, not allowing one division to have say possibly the best four records in that league.

BASEBALL WILL BE GAINING momentum now that the better weather is coming and school is out. At present, attendance is running very well in some parks and very slow in others. It still takes a winner to keep the fans turning out and without that winner, the teams will hurt at the gate.

BASEBALL IS PICKING UP little more competition on the tube as well as now AAU track is being televised and we see that a regular schedule of automobile racing is going to be carried this year. Both are growing spectator sports and the extended coverage of TV will cause more interest in both events. Golf has made its image an accepted one and now on most week ends have a choice of several sports once more.

Whenever it is ofered to millions of people on TV, expense is there and money is needed. TV pays very well the rights to televise these events and your choice of program to watch. CCHS won its second summer league game of the season without a loss beating Triton Thursday evening by a score of 3 to 2. The Cavaliers garnered only four hits, but turned them into their three runs.

The winning run was plated with two out in the sixth inning on a long double by Steve McCombs to left field. The blow, the only extra base hit, drove in Jim Bauer from second. Bauer reached base on a Texas League single earlier in the inning and advanced to second on a walk.

Shaffer struck out 10 Trojan hitters, mainly employing a good curve ball. He gave up no walks. In 14 innings to date, Shaffer has allowed only one earned run and has 17 strikeouts with only 1 base on balls issued.

Culver, having its best offensive showing of the season, was led by Bruce Snyder's 4 singles in 5 tries and John Bauer's 3 RBI's. Larry Shaffer and Steve Crowel also chipped in with two hits apiece.

Culver now has a Summer League record of 2 wins and 1 loss. The next league game will be at LaVille on Thursday of this week, when the Cavaliers will attempt to get back on the winning track.

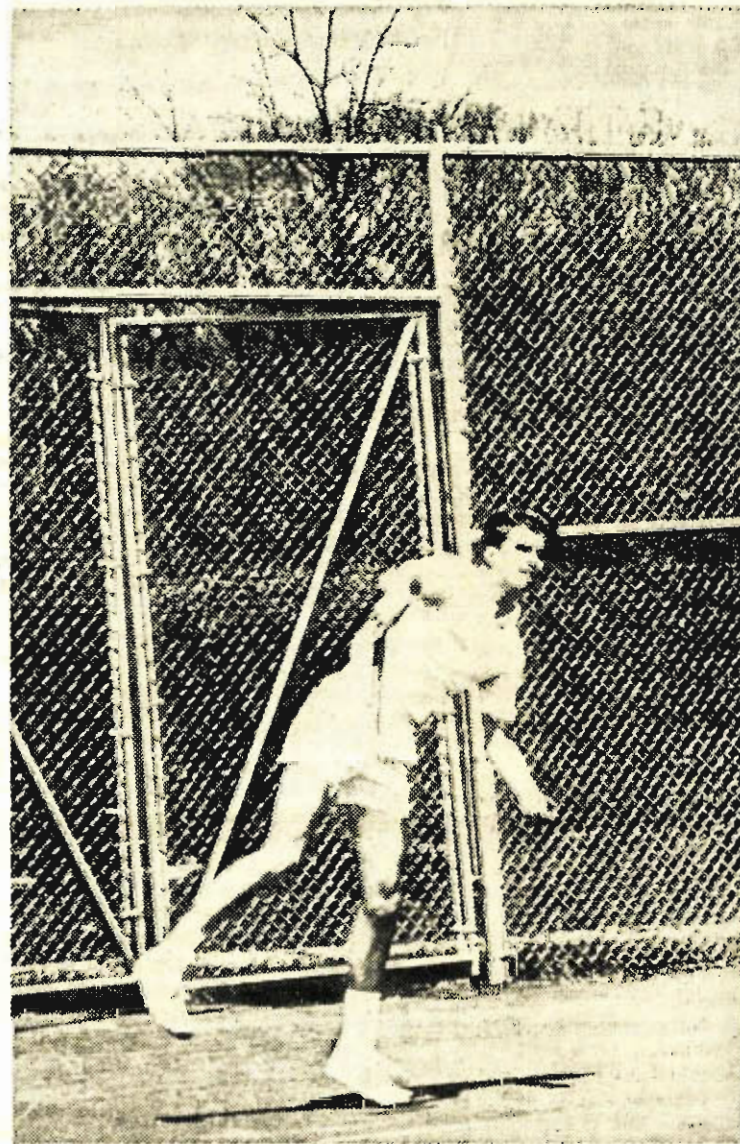

Answer", as a parent it is gratifying to learn there is a solution. As Judge Gonas stated, "Problems created by man can be solved only by man."

Judge Gonas served as Judge of the Juvenile-Probate and Appellate Courts, also Representative, Senator and Chief Justice of the Indiana Appellate Court. During his long tenure as Judge of the Juvenile Court he attended many conferences on crime and delinquency, both in the U. S. and abroad, gaining national and international recognition. He was honored in 1955 by the Secretary General of the United Nations when he was invited to participate in the First United Nations Conference on Crime and Delinquency, Geneva, Switz. He spoke on the value of religion and was commended by the European press as the Judge from the U.S. who brought religion to the U.N.

Judge Gonas advocates PREVENTION via Education and Legislation. He proposes a philosophy of friendship, guidance, treatment, security, employment, understanding with sternness and nourishment with the bread of life in lieu of casting stones, to all children. He exercised this philosophy in his home and in the Juvenile Court with a PREVENTIVE and rehabilitative procedure which brought about the lowest delinquency rate in the state and nation. Thus, a tremendous saving to the tax payers, for it is a known fact that it costs 10 times more to institutionalize a child than to supervise. Delinquency parents, adult neglect and immorality involving children were dramatically reduced.

Judge Gonas proposes a Delinquency Prevention Commission with authority to carry out a state and local system of pre-delinquent programs in the interest of all children. His lectures to students and civic groups has brought a strong response in favor of this program.

I have personal knowledge that a Governor of a western state, Dean of Law School and University Dean, after reading the book made the following comments: "He touched base with some real problems, but what's more important has found some solutions", "Creating legal structures and procedures for prevention certainly is a constructive contribution to the field", "I hope that this concept would be more widely accepted and practiced in the American Criminal Justice system".

We have tried everything else, why not this? Several states are studying this approach, I sincerely hope that Indiana would be the first to adopt this program. Judge Gonas has always said, "There is a place under the sun for every child."

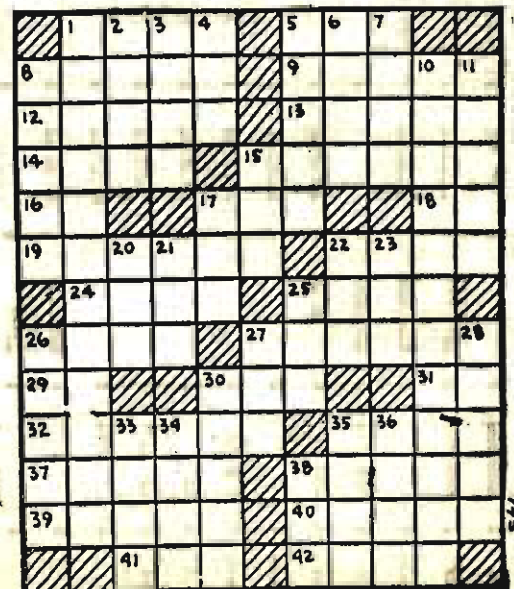

Commencement Set For Monday At The Academy

Culver Military Academy honored its 211 graduating seniors and two of its most famous alumni at a commencement convocation on Monday morning. Author Ernie Gann, class of 1930, and U.S. Rep. J. William Stanton, Class of 1942, were given honorary membership in Cum Laude Society, the preparatory school equivalent of receiving an honorary degree.

Congressman Stanton delivered the commencement address. Novelist Gann said only one sentence: "I sincerely mean it when I say Culver Military Academy was the greatest single influence on my life."

Another Culver alumnus, vintage 1898, Murchison D. Lightfoot, of Xenia, Ohio, brought the audience to its feet for two standing ovations—once when he was introduced and gave a perky salute and again when Brig. Gen. John W. Dobson, superintendent, gave him a plaque naming him "Mr. Alumnus" during Culver's 75th anniversary June Week.

Congressman Stanton got a chuckle from the crowd when he told them he hoped his constituents didn't find out it took him 27 years to receive what the two dozen Culver student members of Cum Laude had achieved in only two years.

He said that when he was graduated from Culver in 1942, it was the finest preparatory school of its kind anywhere in the world," he added.

There was some good natured bantering between Stanton and General Dobson, too. The Congressman noted that General Dobson had made a suggestion about the topic of his speech. "A term years in the Army," Stanton said, "I know a suggestion from a general is an order. But on the other hand, in Congress today it is a popular thing to question the motivation of generals."

Stanton talked about the rapid changes taking place in the U.S. and told the graduates and their families that "only by change can a person grow spiritually, morally and intellectually." He mentioned that though he has voted for every civil rights bill during the last ten years, he doesn't feel civil rights problems "because you cannot legislate will ever be solved by Congress morality."

Challenging the students to try to make the world better, he urged them to enter public life, though he admitted it is not an easy life. "If you want to change the attitude and face of this country, politics is for you," he said.

In addition to Congressman Stanton and Ernie Gann, author of "The High and the Mighty" and a dozen other books and movie scripts, two Culver faculty members were given Cum Laude membership at the convocation.

Marshall Brown, English, and L. Kingsley Moore, history, were so recognized because of their scholarly attributes and because of their contributions to the intellectual life at Culver.

Tri Kappa State Scholarship Committee Meets

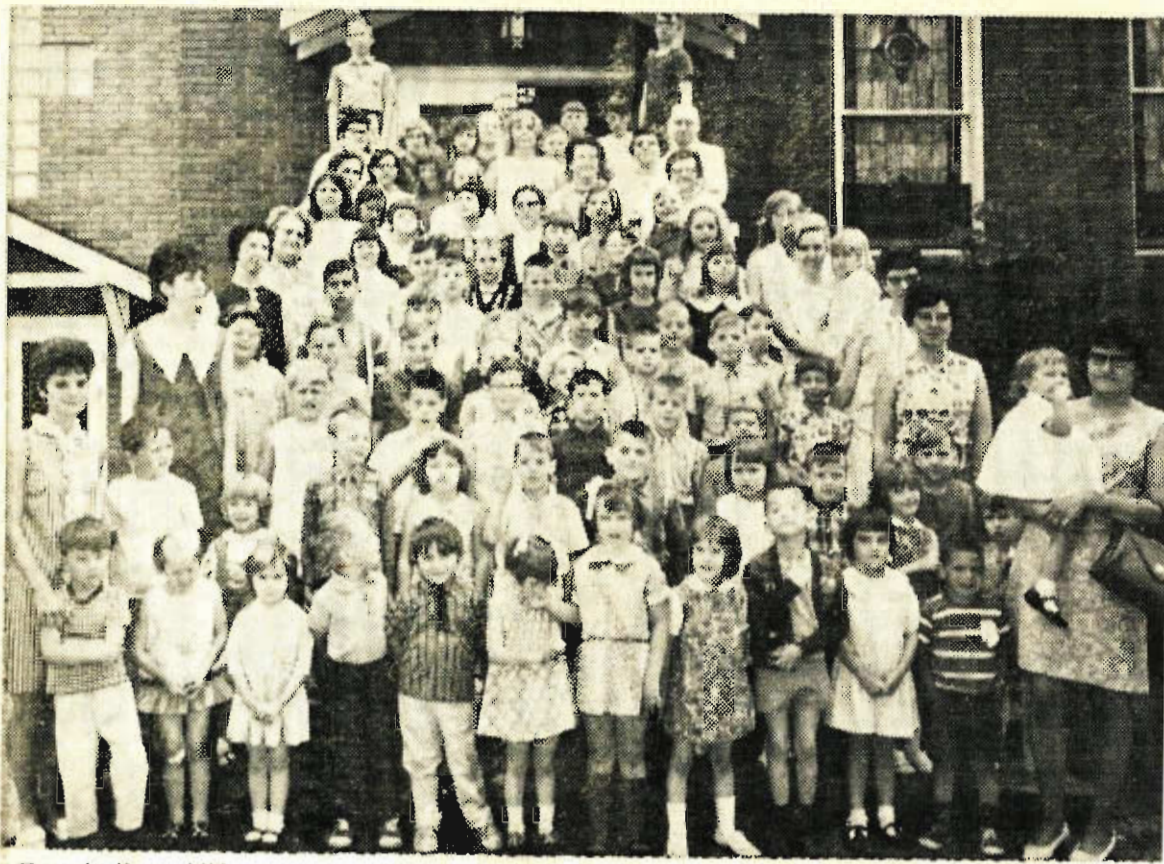
