He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Downing, R. R. #1, Wolcott, Indiana.

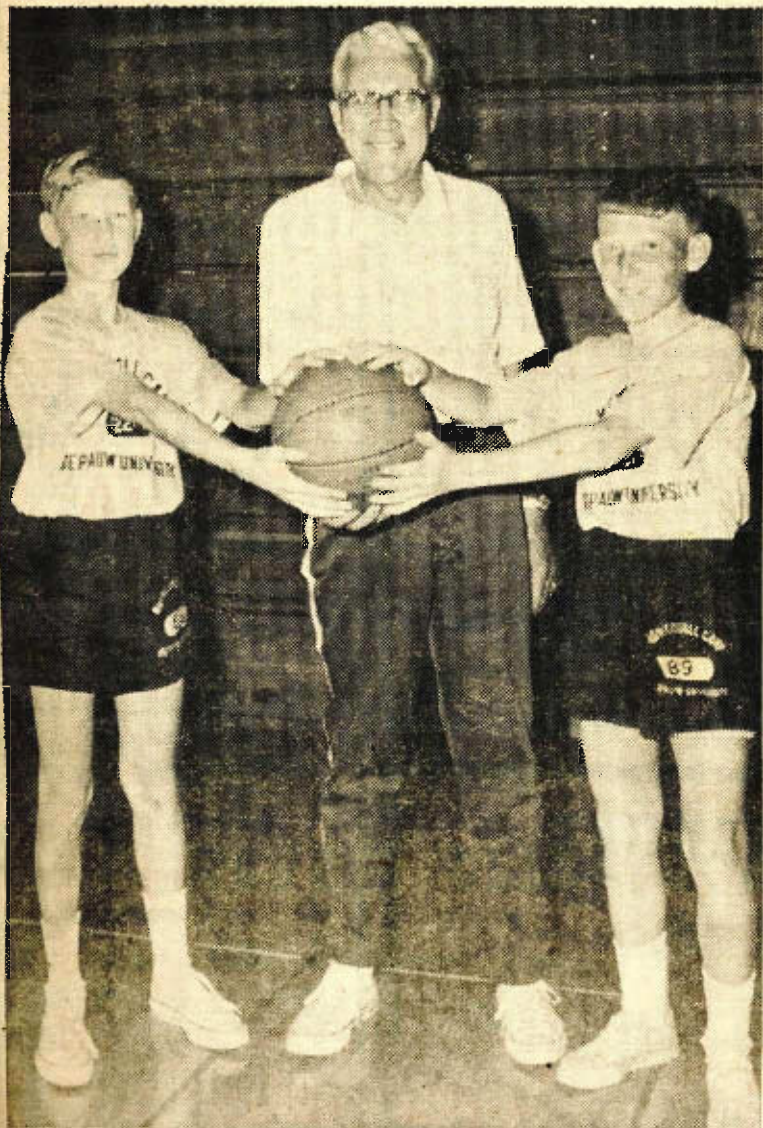

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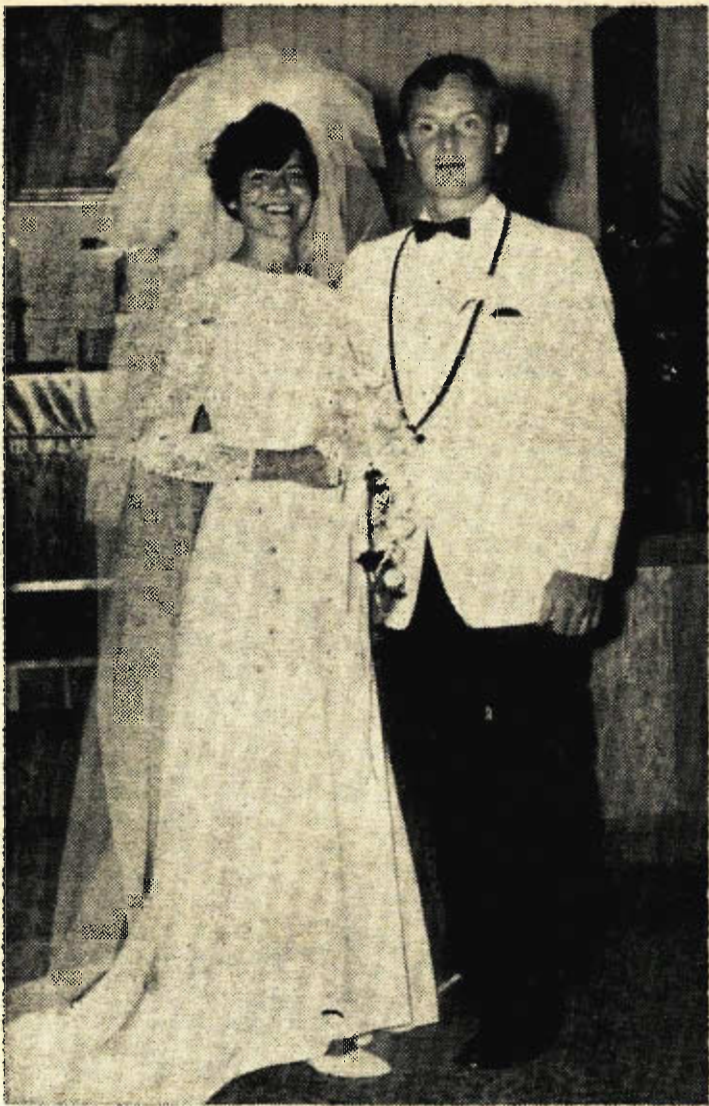

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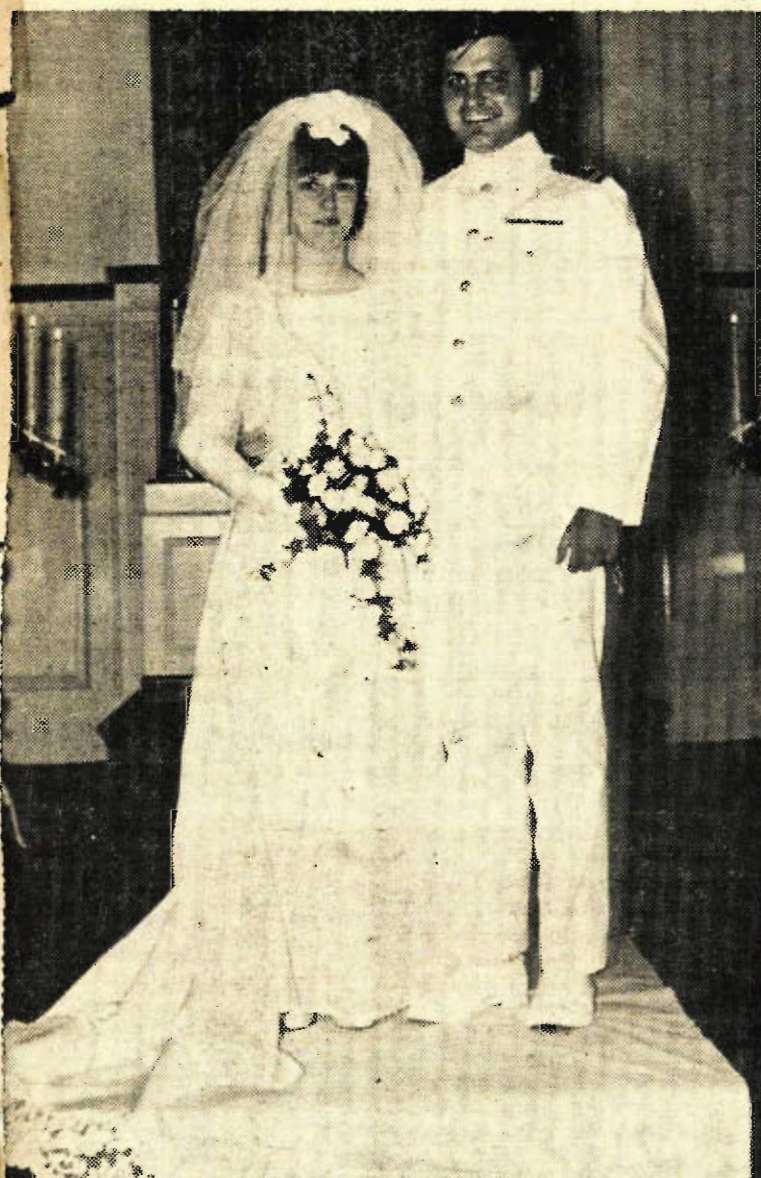

Annual Meeting Of Marshall County Red Cross

Mr. Robert Acock, the new area Field Representative for the American Red Cross, met with local directors, officers and chairmen at the annual Marshall Co. Red Cross meeting. He is replacing Mr. Fredrick Bills who transferred to a new position.

Mr. Acock related his Red Cross experiences during the 40 days flooding in North Dakota. Approximately \$300,000 worth of food, shelter and assistance was given 2900 families in that area.

Mr. Acock also recently served a year in Viet Nam. He stressed that Red Cross is a method for people to help people, knowing what to do, how to do it with organization and cooperation.

The 1969-70 Marshall County Red Cross officers are: chairman, Jack Greenlee; vice-chairman, Bruce VanGilder; secretary, Cindy Zimmerman; and treasurer, Lois Shafer.

Board of directors members now serving two year terms are: Dr. Robert Reed, Robert Gottschalk, Jim Hansen, Hilton Swain, Bill Ralston, Bob Atkins and Roger Wellman.

Directors serving three year terms are: Ann Christianson, Vic Winrotte, Ray Jacobson, Ann Emberger, Viola Alcock, Helen-glen Hollifield, Richard Miller, Floyd Cullison, Mable Murphy, Myrtle Fields and Glen Lemler. Mort Gunderson is a one year member.

James Bonine is the new county disaster chairman and Mable Castro is the new chairman of service to military families.

Mrs. Elmore Winrotte, executive secretary of Marshall County Red Cross reported 161 services to military families were processed this year by 1 and five volunteers. This is approximately 25 cases more than last year.

Larry Holloway, water safety chairman, reported a total of 6 certificates awarded, including Plymouth (147), Culver Beach (114), Culver Military Academy (186), Bremen (99), and Bonbon (92). As of June 20, 1969, persons are enrolled in water safety classes in Plymouth, 5 in Bremen and a prospective 2 at Culver.

Sister Longina P.H.J.C., first aid chairman, reported 23 classes with 399 persons receiving certificates. Marshall County now has 32 first aid instructors.

Mort Gunderson, budget chairman, listed last year's expenditures at \$6,090. The amount needed locally has been estimated as \$6,880. Since there is a percent assessment by National Red Cross, the amount needed is \$13,760. Since all areas of Marshall County are not covered by United Fund, a drive was made in Argos by Mort Gunderson, Hilton Swain, Bruce VanGilder, B. Atkins and Jack Greenlee netting \$257.89. Ray Jacobson headed a drive in the Tyner area collecting \$130.

Mrs. Winrotte reported a total of 970 pints of blood were collected in Marshall County last year. She also announced that Plymouth Jaycees have taken responsibility of the "Ditty Bag" program, setting a quota of 1,000 bags to be sent from this county.

A report was read from Sister Victoriana P.H.J.C. about home nursing classes with people receiving certificates. New classes are being planned for the fall.

Mr. Acock commented on the assessment sent to National Red Cross. Red Cross planes are now taking 9 tons of food and medical supplies each day to the area. Each plane load costs \$2000, and dollar's worth keeping one person alive for three days.

Scot McKinnis' home was the scene of a lively Jr. Livewires meeting on June 26th.

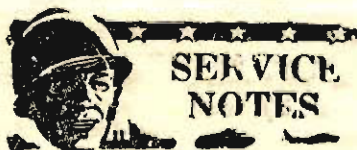
Mark Kepler gave a demonstration on tractor safety rules, complete with a model tractor. He also showed some examples of his strawberry project.
