## Names To Set Deadlines For Buying Plates

(Editor's Note — This is a reprint of an article in the Indianapolis News of November 6, 1969, written by Jack Averitt, which is accepted by the license branches as being accurate in connection with the license plate purchasing changes that go into effect in 1970.)

The first letter of your last name is going to determine the deadline for buying 1970 auto license plates, Commissioner Gerald Habig of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles said today.

Owners whose last names begin with the letters A through C will be required to buy them on or before February 28. Other owners will follow these registration deadlines based on the first letters of their last names:

D through H—on or before March 31.

I through N—on or before April 30.

O through S—on or before May 31.

T through Z—on or before June 30.

Habig said a plan to determine 1970 deadlines for privately owned passenger cars by the last digits of 1969 plates has been discarded because the new staggered sales law is too restrictive.

The commissioner also said:

1. Registration application forms won't be mailed to motorists this year. They will be filled in, instead, by license branch personnel when new plates are bought.

2. Personal property tax receipts won't be required to buy plates in person, or by mail, because a court order presently prohibits it.

3. Branch personnel will attach special stickers to license plates indicating which month they will expire in 1971. The reflectorized plates will have red numerals and letters on a white background. Sticker colors will vary for each month.

4. Any motorist may buy his license plate before his deadline, as soon as they go on sale Jan. 2. Expiration month stickers however, will be based on this deadline. For example: If a man whose last name begins with Z buys his plates in January instead of June, the sticker will indicate that his new plate won't expire until June of 1971.

5. No determination has yet been made as to whether license branches will be paid extra by the bureau for extra work involved in filling in registration applications for motorists.

Motorists who plan to buy auto license plates in person under the new procedures merely will take them to the branch, their present registration certificate—and money—and the branch will do the rest. Plates still have to be bought in the county of residence and the price is still \$12.50, including a statutory 50 cents branch-service-charge fee.

Habig said anyone can buy plates by mail for an extra 75 cents—a total of \$13.25—by sending a copy (from a copying machine) of his present registration certificate to a branch, along with a check payable to the bureau. In most instances, he said, branches still have all the necessary information making copies unnecessary.

## Culver Cavaliers To Open 1969-70 Basketball Season This Saturday



The Culver Cavaliers will open their 1969-70 basketball season on the road this Saturday night as they travel to Argos to play the Dragons in the 11d-lifter. Playing under a new head coach and with only one letterman back, it will be a rebuilding year for coach Terry Haskell and his boys. Motorists requesting special numbers usually are charged several dollars extra, by branches for the extra work involved. Many already are taking special requests.

The now-abandoned plan to determine new deadlines by old license plate numbers had been proposed because the alphabet system ordered by the Legislature makes enforcement difficult, it was explained.

### 'FLEET' DEADLINE

Under the now-definite system, a police officer won't be able to tell whether a 1969 plate has expired until after June 30—unless there's a reason for an ownership check of the car. While the deadline for obtaining plates for privately owned passenger cars will be staggered next year, the new law requires plates for passenger cars owned by corporations and other business firms to be bought on or before Jan. 31.

The deadline for obtaining plates for trucks, trailers, motorcycles and other vehicles will be Feb. 28, regardless of ownership.

The price of motorcycle license plates will be doubled—from \$3 to \$6—and the price of most truck registration plates also will be increased, the amounts varying with the size of the truck.

Some other fees also will go up Jan. 1. A certificate of title will cost \$6 instead of \$2, including an uncharged \$1 branch service charge. A registration transfer will cost \$2.50, instead of \$1.50, including a 50-cent branch fee. The prices charged for delinquent titles, duplicate titles and duplicate registration plates also will go up.

The new excise tax to replace personal property taxes on cars won't take effect until 1971.

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## Further Updating Is Wanted

The State of Indiana has again changed the plans for the distribution of license plates for 1970 in an effort to cut down the tremendous rush at the end of February. Originally the set-up was planned to stagger the deadlines by the last numbers on the 1969 plates, but the change that came about and was released last week sets up the stagger on the first initial of the last name.

The situation in Indiana on both license plates and drivers license has not been the best. There had been talk of doing the plate business by mail as some states do, but that didn't receive much support. This new plan should eliminate the big rush at the end of February, but will take some getting used to. A schedule of the set-up is listed in another location in the paper.

Indiana has changed their drivers license period, also, making the license now good for four years. There had been talk of a picture on this license, which is very successful in other states, but that appears to be some time off also. What the state really needs

is to remodel the entire program. Starting in 1971, you will be required to pay your property taxes on the vehicles you have when you purchase the license plates. This is a definite improvement over the present system as it will cut down those who beat the tax situation, which has been quite large in recent years. Now, if they would add to this measure, proof of some type of insurance to get the cars off the road in Indiana that have no insurance, they would pretty well set the program up to a good safe point.

All the safety checks, laws and every other gimmick they try isn't worth a hill of beans when that accident occurs that is caused by that person with no insurance. In towns our size, you would probably be shocked by the number of vehicles that do not carry insurance of any type.

The current trend in Indiana is definitely an improvement... but it is still felt that a couple more additions to the laws to include such as this will be a big asset if and when they come.

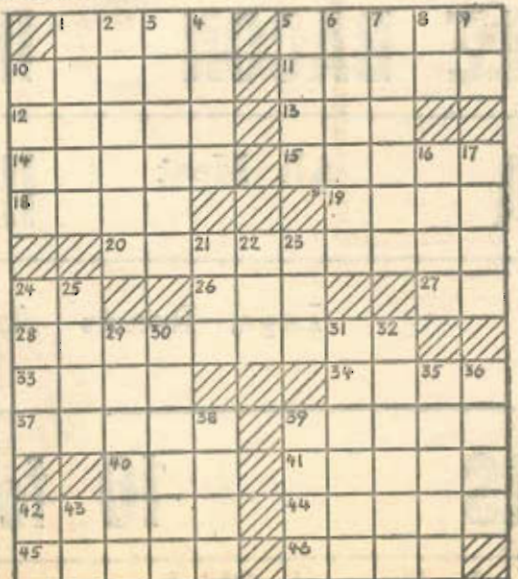

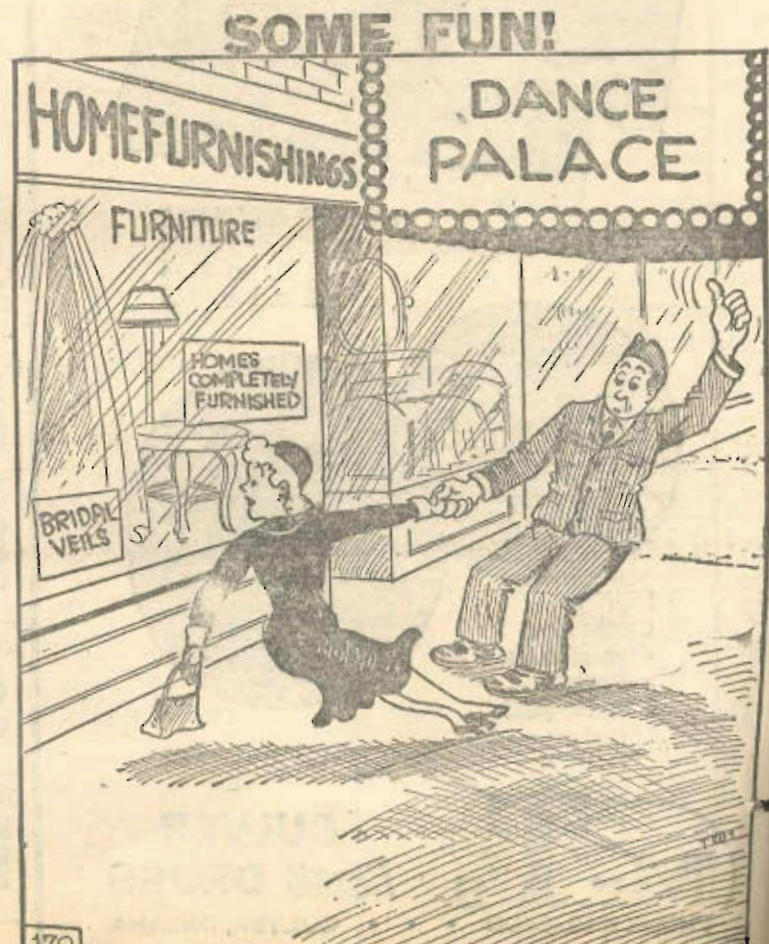
