## Names To Set Deadlines For Buying Plates

(Editor's Note - This is a reapolis News of November 6, 1969, written by Jack Averitt, which is accepted by the license branis accepted by the license brannection with the license plate to effect in 1970.)
The first letter of your last name is going to determine the deadline for buying 1970 auto livense plates, Commissioner Ger-
ald Hablg of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles sald coday
Owners whose last names besin with the letter's A through C will be required to buy them on or before February 28. Other owners will follow these registration deadlines based on the first letters of their last names: Darch 31.
I through N -on or before April 30 .
May 31.
May 31 . $z$ or before June 30 .

1. Registration application forms won't be mailed to motorists this year. They will be fill ed in, instead, by license branch ed in, instead, by license branch
persommel when new plates are personne
2. Personal property tax receipts won't be required to buy plates in person, or by mail, because a court order presentiy prohnts it.
3. Branch personnel will attach special stickers to icense plates indicating which mont flectorized plates will have red fectorized plates wil nave red numerals and letters on a white wackground. Sticker colors wil vary for each month.
4. Any motorist may buy his license plate before his deadline, as zoon as they go on sale Jan. 2. Expiration month stickers however, will be based on this deadline. For example: If a man whose last name begins with $Z$ buys his plates in January instead of June, the sticker will indicate that his new plate won't expire until June of 1971.
5. No determination has yet cen made as to whether license branches will be paid extra by the bureau for extra work involved in. filling in registration applications for motorists.
Motorists who plan to buy au to lieense plates in person under the new procedures merely will take them to the branch, their present registration certificateand money- and the branch will do the rest. Plates still have to be bought in the county of resldence and the price is still $\$ 12,50$ including a statutory 50 cents branch-service-charge fee.
Hablg said anyone can buy plates by mail for an extra 71 cents-a total of $\$ 13.25$-bs sending a copy (from a copying machine) of ris present regisfration certlificate to a branch along with a check payable to to the bureau. In most instances he satd, branches still have all the necessary information making copies unnecessary.

While the deadine for obtain ing plates for privately ownel passenger cars will be staggered next year, the now law requires plates for passenger cars owned by corporations and other business firms to be bought on or before Jan. 31.
The deadline for obtaining plates for trucks, trailers, motorcycles and other vehicles will be Feb. 28, regardless of ownership. The price of mothoycle license plates will be doubledfrom $\$ 3$ to $\$ 6$-and the price of most truck registration plates also will be increased, the amounts varying with the size of the truck.
Some other fees also will go up Jan. I. A certificate of title will cost $\$ 6$ instead of $\$ 2$. including an uncharged $\$ 1$ branch service change. A registration transfer will cost $\$ 2.50$, instead of $\$ 1.50$, including a 50 -cent for delinguent titles, duplicate titles nd duplicate registration plates also will go up
