Memorial Fund For Scholarships Is Approved

The establishment of a Memorial Scholarship Fund to assist graduates of Culver Community High School has been approved by the Board of School Trustees of the Culver Community School Corporation.

Plans for the Memorial Scholarship Fund were developed by the guidance department of the unified high school under the direction of A. Judson Dillon. Working with him on the drafted proposal were Ruth Shanks, John Nelson, and Principal John Hayes.

Preamble of the approved resolution states the purpose as follows: "Recognizing the need of and importance of post high school education and in recognition of financial costs of advanced education and in the belief that alumni of four former high schools and friends of the school district, North Bend Township, Aubbeenaubee, Tippecanoe, Unfon, and the community of Culver) would be interested in establishing a Memorial Scholarship Fund to assist graduates of the unified high school to contimue their education beyond the secondary level."

The Fund is created to accept and administer giêts, receive contributions in memory of persons living or deceased, and to receive grants for the purpose of establishing scholarships to assist graduating seniors to further their education in college or technical schools.

Contributions will be deposited in The State Exchange Bank, which will administer the fundin trust; memorials will be acknowledged; and all memorials will be inscribed in a Memorial Scholarship Book to be on permanent display in the foyer of the new high school building.

Scholarships awarded will be paid from income earned. Believing that the intent is one of practical significance and not necessarily a tuken of good wishes for the success of the recipient, no award will be made until the annual income amounts to \$100, and no award will be less than \$100 and limited to that amount per recipient.

Scholarships are renewable for a period not to exceed the equivalent of eight consecutive semesters, or three years, school of nursing, or two years on the completion of an organized course of study in an accredited business or technical school.

Applicants will be selected by a representative seven member Ity Memorial Scholarship Committee headed by the director of guidance. The committee will, in addition to reviewing applications of seniors, review apclications of those eligible for renewal. Awards will be made on the basis of competency and need.

In a busy meeting of the Board of School Trustees, Culver Community Schools Corporation Board members purchased two new busses, approved conerence requests, heard various reports and approved maintenance programs.

After deliberation and consideration of two chassis and four body bids, the school corpora tion awarded the purchase of the chassis to Gates and Calboun Chevrolet, Inc., for two 60 passenger busses at a low bid price of \$4,083.10 per unit.

The bid of the Kerlin Bus Sales and Service, Silver Lake. Indiana, Thomas body, was accepted, the bid price being \$4,560 with \$350 for each of two trade in busses.

The Board considered a report of the Superintendent with respect to filling a vacancy at Monterey, Grade 1. Mrs. Potter, the present teacher has asked to be relieved from her contract so that she can rejoin her husband who is in the armed forces on' the west coast.

Kay Dawn Miller, of North Manchester, a graduate of Manchester College, will assume this position. Miss Miller will plan to work with Mrs. Potter during the week before Christmas va cation so that she can take over the work on January 5th.

In an effort to relieve the over-crowded sections of first grade pupils in the Culver Elementary School, another teacher will be added beginning the second se mester, January 21, 1970, according to present plans, so that sections will not be larger than 26 or 27 pupils. Effort is being made to fill the post held by the late Rex Good, Senior Teacher and Mathematics instructor at th Aubbeenaubbee School.

The school central administra tive offices and files will be moved to the recently acquired prop erty at 222 North Ohio Street, Culver, on or before Janua v 17th, it was reported. With the exception of currection of duain age and some minor work in cluding installation of four ceal ing lights and cleaning, the of fice is ready for compancy.

The Board heard reports on the follow up of the intent to notify bonding firms concerning corrections and deficiencies in flushing, roofing, incinerator flus and punch list of the new high school building.

Also reported was the preliminary work to develop plans for the Athletic Field on the grounds of the new high school building the matter of safety as it recess to the parking lot of the new high school, and the finalization of installation of dust collecting equipment in the high school shops. Correction of the audio system in the high school gymnasium was reported.

Adult Education Board News Classes To Begin In January

The preference survey to determine interest in Adult Edueation classes for 1969-70 in the Culver Community Schools district is being completed during the next ten days.

A memorandum developed by director of Adult Education, Gene Crosley gave details on offered courses. The memorandum stated that the program will begin the week of January 12, 1970, closing March 20th. Classes will meet on specified evenings. The memorandum was distributed widely throughout the school district and patrons were asked to fill out and return the survey sheet on or before December 15th.

Mr. Crosley indicated that it is suggested that the survey be completed promptly so that plans for the Adult Education Program

Innocent Until Found Guilty

The "instant experts" are already painting verbal pictures in psychodelic colors of the alleded My Lai massacre. The extreme left has been quick to use the incident for the lowest of political motives, in order to attack the administration, the United States, the military and nearly everyone in sight. This, despite the scant concrete bit of news; that the incident took place on March 16 of 1968, and that an Army Lieutenant has been charged, under the new administration, with the murder of South Vietnamese villagers. This is indeed a serious charge, and therefore a legitimate news-worthy story.

But what disturbes us is that certain element of the Press have, in print and on the nir, tried, convicted and condemed the accused without the stighest regard for the fundamental American rule that a nan, any man, and no matter now strong the evidence may uppear to be against him, is to be considered innocent until he as proven guilty, by law. "Witnesses" have been interviewedbut not under oath, and therefore not subject to the penalmes of perjury should their stories be false. So far as we an tell, no effort has been

fact be members of the Communist apparatus, and hence eager to condemn by falsehood, if necessary.

One writer, in the WASH-INGTON POST, having reached the "verdict", declared: "The government shouldn't get away with sentencing a handful of men, and letting the others es. cape . . The others . . include Lyndon Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, Walt Rostow, the Bundys, and all the rest, Democrats and Republicans, from three different Administrations, and seven Congresses. Throw in the people who make napalm, M 16, and the other instruments of liberation, and we might have a trial that is logical and goes after the real villains. I know just the place to hold it. It's a town called Nuremburg."

This is irresponsible journalism at its worst. As (we hope and pray) responsible journalists, we condem such lynchmob hysteria. This is just the sort of abuse of freedom of the press to which Vice President Agnew has publicly complained.

As vet, the accused have not been given the benefit of trial. They have not been found guilty, and therefore are to be con. sidered innocent. Let us have no hangings by the news media,

I frequently read the "Voice of the People". One letter in particular caused me a great deal of concern, the moratorium supportter of the November 20th edition of the "Culver". I would like to know where the originator that letter received so much insight into the Vietnam War.


Like much of the literature of moratorium supporters nothing is proffered constructively at what should be done in Vietnam, only what has not been done. One can go on endlessly counting the blunders made in becoming involved here. I do not think that should concern us at the present time. Our withdrawal from Vietnam at the earliest possible time with the highest degree of Victnamizotion. however, should concern learn by our past mistakes and solving ourselves of this war. I'm watching the Vietnamization process work, and I believe that before long America will be free of most of her responsibilities here. Why cry for immediate withdrawal?! How utterly stupid and senseless. Leave these people now and let every gain they have made slip and crumble? Establishing democracy is a long and harrowing process while communism

can be effective in a matter of a short time. Maybe democracy will not work in Southeast Asia, but these suffering people deserve the chance and the time to make it work. Maybe their are people here who do not care what system of government they live under, but someday their children may care and many here care now. The course we are ensuing gives them that chance to prove their commitment to democratic ideals while at the same time free us of responsibility. Why not let it work? Referring again to that letter

from the moratorium supporter, 1 would like to know what underground newspaper the originator used to come up with this and I quote, "We are fighting there to protect the people from destruction by the Communists, yet w destroy their villages, uproot and separate families and kill people at a rate almost the same as that of the Communists". I would hate to see what would happen to the people of the villages and hamlets of South Vietnam if they were entirely exposed and left undefended to communist tactics. It would make the German blood baths of World War II seem like mere child play. One only has to look at what happened at Hue, the old capital of Vietnam, and observe the mass burial grounds of victims of communist terrorism. Each day more graves are discovered. Each day intelligence uncover communist documents directing the Viet Cong to kill and terrorize so many ciwilians in different districts just to control the masses through fear. One only has to see a small Vietnamese child left alone in a state of shock and utter nightmare, nearby his mother's head, breasts and limbs severed and his father hanging by his genitals. We ARE here to defend these people to the best of our a bility, and it is truly regretfu that mistakes are sometimes made by our forces and innocent people are killed. It has happened in every war. If we are destroying these people as you say we are then I would hate to see what the enemy is accomplishing. You may be well justified it

protesting this war. You do have a right to dissent, no one denies that. I sharply disagree on the way the dissention is being car nied out. One only needs a little common sense to see that Hano can keep her troops thriving of American dissent and uncertain ty. It does give the enemy en couragemnt to carry on his ef forts. The louder you are (yo can be quite loud), the less will ing the enemy is to slow it's ag gression, and the more puzzling it is for an American GI. I ad mire your willingness to sav America, if it needs saving, bu I deplore the far-reaching re sults of your actions.




