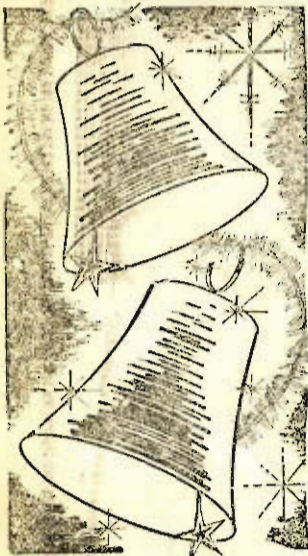

STILL ROOM AT THE INN

Almost 2,000 years ago, a young couple-Mary and Joseph-rousted an innkeeper in Bethlehem to request a room for the night. There was no room at the inn. But the innkeeper did allow them to make themselves as comfortable as possible in his stable. Thus was born the story of the Nativity and the scene of a child lying in a manger.

Over the centuries, this scene has been represented annually as a part of the Christian celebration of the birth of the Christ child. It is a scene of peaceful serenity. The gentle donkeys, cattle, sheep and the other animals surrounding the Holy Family is one of simplicity and beauty.

During the Pageant of Peace in the Nation's Capital, and in other cities and towns across the country, the scene is recreated in all sizes and degrees of simplicity or splendor, often with live animals in the setting.

Leave it to someone to inject an ugly, offensive, ratty deformation to the glow of beauty and holiness which radiates from the manger scene to be enjoyed by all people, the non-religious as well as the religious. In Washington, D.C., a law

suit was filed against a nativity setting. The intolerant group, we are told, included a Catholic priest, an Episcopal clergyman, a rabbi, an atheist and a member of a "church" calling itself the Ethical Culture Society. Their claim was that "separation of church and state" should extend to the banning not only of the use of public funds for the manger scene, but the use of any "public" parkland to display a "religious reproduction".

We haven't bothered to check the ideological background or bedfellows of the protestors, but we would be willing to bet that in, among, and associated with them we would find those who oppose freedom in Vietnam, those who are against prayer in public schools, those who apologize for all things communist, those who support the sale and distribution of pornographic movies, literature, and the like.

Fortunately, the U.S. Court of Appeals as well as the District Court had the good sense to reject the anti-Nativity group's call for an injunction against the scene of the manger, that in spite of the intolerance of a small minority, there is still in our country room at the inn.

THE FIRST TREE ELECTRICALLY LIGHTED IN U.S.

One of the most famous hotels that dot the California coast line is the luxurious Hotel del Coronado in California.

Few people know that it is the birthplace of the first electrically-lighted living Christmas tree.

The event goes back to 1904, the gaslight era, when electric lights were still an oddity. It was during that year on Christmas Eve that colored electric lights were strung on an evergreen tree growing on the Coronado's lawn.

The occasion was so momentous that none other than Thomas Alva Edison, the father of the electric light, directed the placement and stringing of these first Christmas tree lights.

Every Christmastime since that date, with the exception of World War II years when a blackout was imposed on the coastal region, that same evergreen is festooned with a multitude of gay Christmas



lights to commemorate the occasion. As a matter of fact, the lighting of that particular Christmas tree has become a festive Christmas tradition in Southern California, attracting hundreds of people each year.

The use of the fir tree as part of the tradition of Christmas dates all the way back to the 8th century, when Boniface, an English missionary, introduced the idea of a Christmas tree to the pagan Germans.

Martin Luther is said to have adorned the first Yule feast.

Christmas tree with lighted candles eight centuries later and German Prince Albert, consort to Queen Victoria, took the idea to Great Britain 300 years later.

Boniface suggested decorating the fir in honor of Christ to substitute for sacrifices to Odin's sacred oak. This came 400 years after the Christian church adopted Dec. 25 as the time for celebrating Christmas. This date coincided with the Mithraic rite of the birth of the sun, and the Teutonic

Not a train could run between New York and Washington from Christmas Eve until Monday afternoon and trains from the West arrived in Chicago 12 hours late.

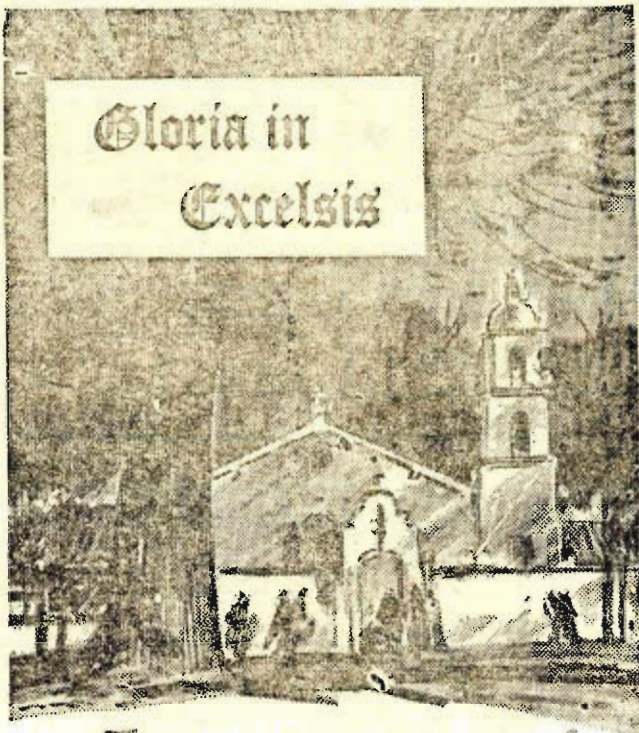

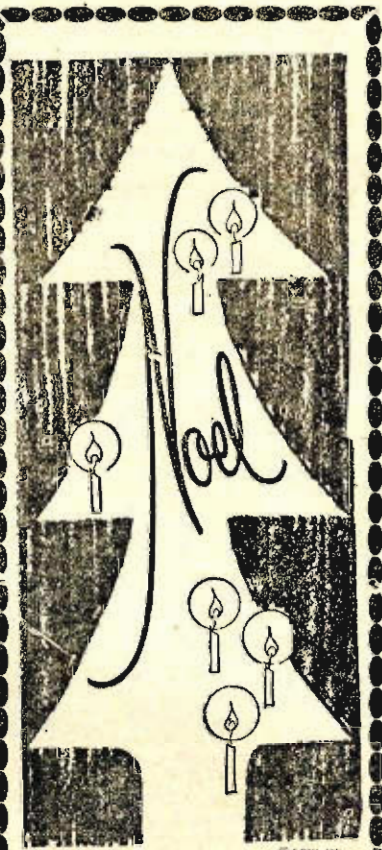

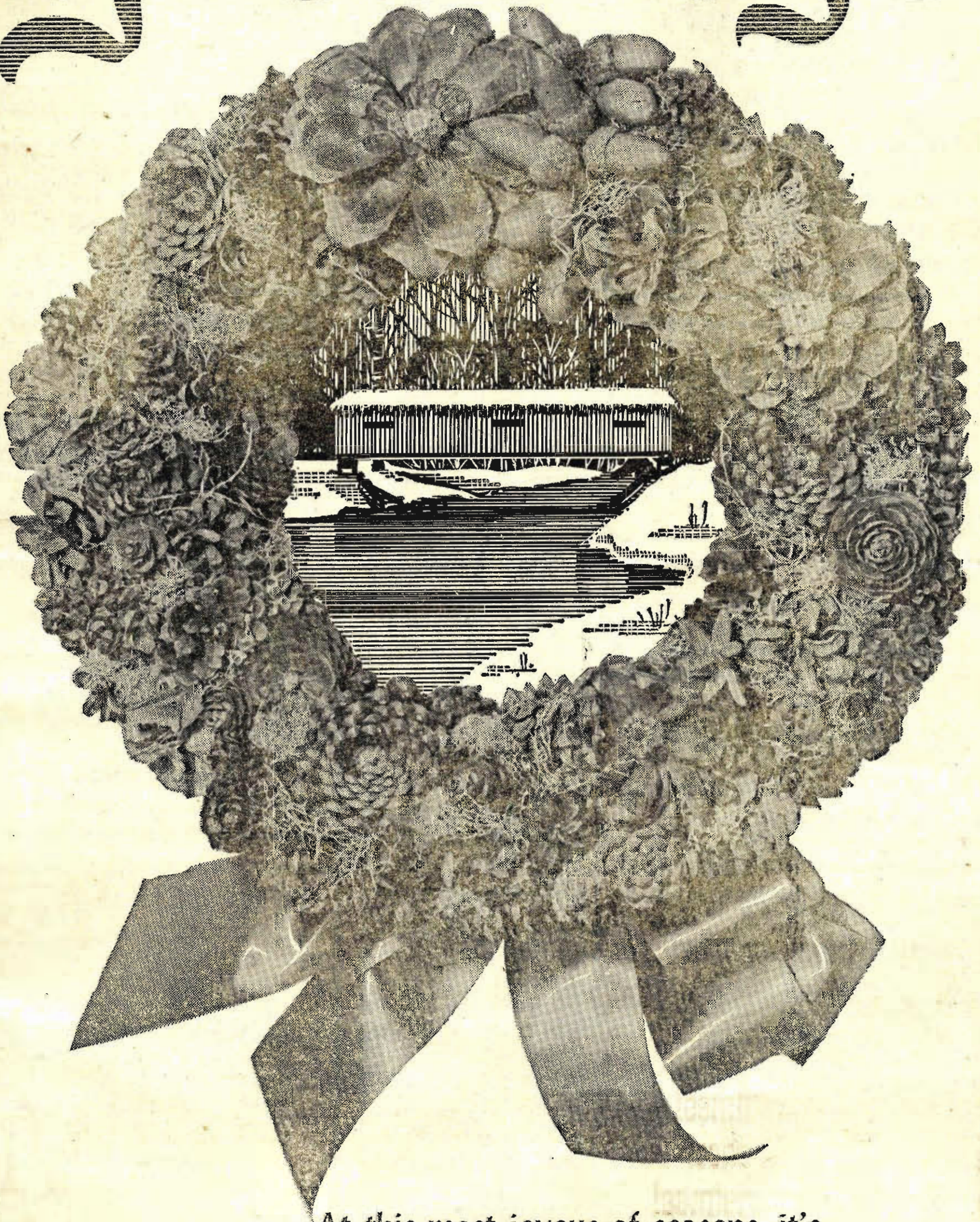

Glenn Hands Culver 72-54 Loss Friday Night

The John Glenn Falcons handed the Culver Cavaliers a 72-54 loss Friday night in a game played at Glenn for the third win of the year for the Falcons. The Falcons broke the game wide open in the second half after a rather loosely, error filled first half found them moving to an eight point lead. The loss was Culver's seventh against one win this season.

Kevin Hanni was the big offensive gun in the game, opening the scoring with a lay in after almost a minute had passed. Don Ehlinger hit a free throw for the Cavaliers, but Hanni came back with a 14 footer. Steve Reinhold clipped in a basket from the left side and Danny Reinhold took a fine pass from Steve and put in a lay in for a 5-4 Culver lead. Culver did cut the margin early in the period as after Hanni hit one of two free throws, Ehlinger hit three in a row. Tom McGee scored on a lay in but Denny Reinhold hit a pair of charity tosses and then a lay in on a nice feed from John Bauer to cut the lead to 21-18. However, back to back baskets by Don Hendricks and McGee moved the Falcons seven ahead and after Rich Ruhnow hit a rebound shot, Hanni and Fletcher scored in succession. Culver picked up seven of the last nine points in the half and whittled the margin to 31-23 at half-time.

The second half found the Falcons gaining slowly in the third period, but really picking up momentum in the final stanza. The Cavaliers slipped behind by a dozen in the third period as the Falcons hit for 17 points to the Cavaliers 13. Play was still a little lax due to poor shooting by both teams. However, the Falcons started picking up the tempo in the final period as Culver still had shooting problems.

The Cavaliers got two of the first three baskets with Denny Reinhold and John Bauer hit from

in close while Hanni was sticking one in from 8 foot away. At this point the Falcons hit nine straight to open up a big margin. Bruce Dayhuff hit one of two from the foul line, then Hanni, Fred Bullinger and McGee collected baskets and Hendricks two more free shots for a 59-40 lead. From here on out, the teams played about even with the final margin being 18 points, 72-54.

Hanni Leads Scorers

Kevin Hanni paced the scoring in this game with 25 points, a little over his season average. He had double figure help from Hendricks with 11. John Bauer paced the Cavaliers with 16 and was closely followed by Denny Reinhold with 11.

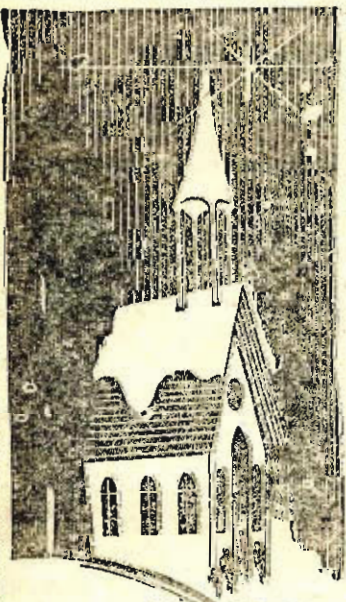
