

THE CLASS OF 1961

Yes, it's hard to believe we're finally Seniors. We are now standing on the threshold of the future, perhaps a little bewildered. Before we leave our Ivy Halls let us take a few moments to recall some highlights of our high school years.

As bouncing freshmen we began the year 1957 with a total of 51 members. Our officers were: Lance Overmyer, President; Earl Mishler, Vice President; Roberta Easterday, Secretary; Gary Dillon, Treasurer. Our main source of revenue was fudge. We sponsored afterball-game dances, which we thought were better than ever.

Ham and a contented smile were common sights at our Ham Supper, April 2. Soon after we sponsored a Record Hop with Jack Meyers as moderator. It was hard to decide on a Prom theme, but our final choice was "Shangri-La"! We surrounded our dream world with luscious shades of lavender and silver. After a day of frantic preparations, we "floated on pink clouds" to the music of the Keynotes. The after prom party was the climax for a great evening. The highlight of

the party was, much to our dismay, our baby pictures being projected in front of an amused audience. This was a perfect ending for our Junior year.

In September of 1960, our Senior class included 48 members. Class officers were: Lance Overmyer, President; Leo Lojewski, Vice President; Nancy Ervin, Secretary; and Cathy Overmyer, Treasurer. We were soon plunged head-long into our magazine drive, having set our goal at \$6,000. Though never reaching our goal, the drive proved a great success.

On October 6, we were the guests of the Culver City Club, for a special program and lecture on Africa. Slides accompanied the talk and were enjoyed by all.

From November through the basketball season we delightedly increased our trip fund by selling concessions. Also at this time Senior cords were commonly seen on the persons of proud Seniors. During this month we also chose as our class flower, the red rose, and as our colors, lavender and silver. Our motto had not yet been decided upon. Soon after, we were measured for caps and gowns.

It was with a sigh of relief we saw the dates of December 3, and January 14 pass by. They were the days spent in taking College Board Exams. The "Snowball Hop" was one of the happiest and most glamorous events of our last year.

The last half of our Senior year came in with the new year of 1961. Five, four, three-two-one! Yes, the big day of April 27 finally came, and with excited "goodbyes," we departed at 6:15 bound for New York City, and Washington D.C. All good things must come to an end, and thus we returned home May 3, after an unforgettable experience.

It was on May 19, we attended our last C.H.S. Junior-Senior Prom, and we thank the Juniors for a wonderful evening.

Baccalaureate service was held on May 21, then came our last step toward the open door of the future, Commencement. On May 26, with smiles and tears, we received our diplomas and thus ended the most wonderful and fun-filled time of our lives, our high school years.

The 1960-61 season of basketball brought great hopes to Culver High School, some of which the Indians fell short of, others of which they accomplished with flying colors.

Head Coach Tom Benbrook, in his second year at the reins, saw many of his top prospects fall by the wayside before the season even began, including veterans such as Jim Hall, Phil Gretter, and Corky Walter. But by opening night he had assembled a solid starting five. Returning regulars Lance Overmyer and Gary Dillon, who had finished second and third in scoring last season, formed the nucleus for this year's Tribe. A third senior, Larry Davis, and juniors Tom Boswell and John Benedict, all of whom saw considerable action last season, rounded out the starting unit.

Culver played host to Francesville in the first game, and found the visiting Zebras too tough to handle. Francesville, who went on to compile one of the best records in the area, pulled away in the fourth quarter for a 75 to 67 victory. Dillon and Boswell led the Culver attack with 19 and 18 points, respectively.

Aubbeenaubbee Twp. visited Culver the following week and became the first victim of the young season, 60 to 43. Benedict scored 17

to pace the balanced Culver attack, a feature which was to become an Indian trademark this season.

The Indians racked up a 78 to 58 home court triumph over Tyner in their next engagement. Dillon sparkled for the local Tribe, accounting for 26 Culver tallies.

On the road for the first time, the Indians were defeated by rugged North Judson, 47 to 38. The host Blue Jays, one of the top teams in the area, stifled the Culver offense, which was led by Boswell's 14 points.

Knox's undefeated Redskins, a team which was to lose only two games all season long, had their hands full with our Indians, but salvaged a 74 to 68 victory. In this game a long string of injuries to the Culver players began as Boswell suffered a minor brain concussion.

Traveling to Bourbon the following night, Culver nipped the Comets, 54 to 53. Dillon, just recovering from an attack of bronchitis, led all scorers with 21 points. George Baker filled in for Boswell, who spent the evening at home.

The following week, Culver surprised Rochester's highly-regarded Zebras with a 68 to

62 road victory. Dillon suffered a severely sprained foot in the second quarter, but Overmyer and Davis led a stirring Culver surge which overcame a ten-point halftime deficit. Overmyer had 25 and Davis 19.

With Dillon still riding the bench, Culver fell to Walkerton, 81 to 69, in a loosely played home game. Davis was the only bright light in the night as he swished 22 markers.

After a three-week layoff over Christmas vacation, the Indians chalked up a hard-earned victory over the tough Bremen Lions, 45 to 41, on the loser's home court. Davis and Overmyer shared scoring honors with 14 points apiece, but the Indians' victory was a sad one, as it was learned after the game that Benedict, injured early in the contest, would be out for at least a month.

Culver warmed up for the Marshall County Tourney with a 73 to 57 win over La Paz in the local gym. Davis went on a rampage that night, scoring 31 points for the high-water mark of the season. For a while, he had a chance to better the gym record of 37 points, which, incidentally, is shared by Larry's brother, Ed, and Jim Kowatch.

Culver, favored to bring home their first Marshall County title in five years, was upset in the first round by Argos, 47 to 45. Dillon's 13 led all scorers, but the fired-up Dragons were too much for the Indians.

The following week, Culver revenged the tourney loss with a 68 to 47 home court victory over the Dragons. Davis and Dillon hit 19 and 18 points respectively to take scoring honors.

The following night, Culver travelled to Mentone. Boswell's 20-foot jump shot with five seconds to go gave the Indians a thrilling 67 to 65 win. Dillon had 25 points, and Boswell added 20.

Nappanee's scrappy Bulldogs broke the short-lived Indian winning streak with a 64 to 60 triumph at Culver. Dillon scored 24 points in vain.

With Jim Carter still playing in place of Benedict, Culver was drubbed by rugged Plymouth, 62 to 41, at Plymouth. Dillon hit 14 free throws and a total of 16 points to lead the

feeble Culver attack.

Travelling to New Paris, the Indians were ambushed by a hot-shooting band of Cubs, 75 to 60. Dillon continued his fine play, scoring 21 points.

Back home the following night, Culver was stunned by Richland Center, 61 to 56. Overmyer's 16 points led Culver, and Benedict finally returned to the starting lineup.

Benedict made his return a notable one the following week. Although Winamac played an impolite host by beating Culver, 63 to 51, John tallied 19 points to lead the losing attack.

The Indians broke their five-game losing streak with a 59 to 58 win over Lakeville in the final game of the season. Benedict's free throw with eight seconds left to play ended an uphill Culver struggle which saw the hosts come from ten points behind after the third period for the thrilling victory.

Culver drew Tyner in the Plymouth Sectional in a bye round game. The taller Indians showed the fans the best offensive game in the tourney, defeating the Redmen, 88 to 76. The senior stars of Culver, Overmyer, Davis, and Dillon, led the attack with 24, 21, and 18 points, respectively.

However, Rochester revenged an early season loss, by eliminating the Indians in the semifinals, 77 to 69. Davis and Dillon each hit 21 points, to close out a tough-luck, but exciting, season.

Gary Dillon led the team in scoring this year, racking up 322 points in 21 games, although in two games he played only briefly due to injuries. Lance Overmyer, with 251 points, and Larry Davis, with 247 points, both seniors like Dillon, finished second and third. Boswell's 201 points were good enough for fourth place, while Benedict tallied 185 in 15 games.

The B-Team compiled a 5-14 record, but several of these youngsters will be valuable to the Varsity next season. Hopes for the future are bright as Baker, Benedict, Boswell, Carter, Rick Ervin, and George Herr all return.

In that big game, played at Argos, Bourbon's Steve Shively became the first county pitcher to stop the Indians' powerful bats, as Bourbon blanked Culver, 3 to 0, and won the Marshall County base-

ball championship.



Four concerts were held during the year with the Senior Band, Junior Band, and choir performing. Each concert was deemed by the public as better than ever before.


The percentage of music students winning first division ratings at Solo and Ensemble Contest was higher this year than ever before in the history of Culver High School.
