### Echooner Sunrise Run Down by the | tion is a dangerous practice. Whaleback Barge 133.

The schooner Sunrise was cut in two by whaleback barge 133, in tow of the steamer W. H. Gratwick, some sixty miles northeast of Chicago harbor. Thursday morning. The schooner went to the bottom so quickly that the crew had barely time to launch the lifeboat and get clear of the wreck. They were taken on board the whaleback and were then transferred to the Gratwick, which arrived at Chicago the next morning. The Sunrise left Chicago Wednesday night, bound for Cockburn island, Lake Huron. for a cargo of cedar. She was in command of Capt. Duncan Buchanan, one of the old-time navigators of the lakes. Just after daybreak Thursday morning, when a dense fog hung on the lake, the three blasts of a steamer's whistle were heard. The Sunrise was then running before the south wind. Capt. Buchanan had taken in all the light canvas, and the schooner, one of the fastest on fresh water, was jogging along some five miles an hour. By the sound of the whistle blasts, Capt. Buchanan found he was clear of the steamer. He heard no bell or anything to indicate that she had another boat in tow. The next thing he realized was that his boat was struck by the whaleback barge on the starboard bow. The crash was terrific. The whole bow of the schooner was cut off clean, twelve or fifteen feet back from the stem. town the second

Child Causes a Sensation. A profound sensation has been caused among medical men of Germany and France through the fatal effects attending the administration of the famous antidiphtheritic serum in the case of a child of an eminent Berlin physician. A servant in the physician's household, showing signs of diphtheria, the doctor, to prevent his child from contracting the disease, administered an injection of the serum and the child died in a few minutes. United States Commercial Agent Mocre at Weimar has made the incident the subject of a special report to the State Department, in which, after telling of the various theories put forth by the medical authorities to account for the fatal action of the serum, he declares that the child died from nervous shock, although it has been concluded that the injection of the serum into a healthy person for preven-

### European Crop Outlook.

The foreign statistics gathered by the Agricultural Department show the crop conditions throughout the year. The summary follows: Great Britain-The crop outlook everywhere is good and promises a harvest about two weeks earlier than unual. This would diminish the imports for the remainder of the current cereal year by about 5,000,000 bushels. France -With normal weather until harvest the wheat crop will more than suffice for home requirements. A surplus for export is confidently predicted by French agricultural journals and statisticians, some expecting that it will amount to 40,000,-000 bushels. This quantity would affect prices, especially if the French Government should pay a bounty on exports. Aastria-Hungary-The weather has been fevorable and the crops promise well. Roumania-Cold weather in April retardeft the crops, but the outlook is generally promising. Russia-Excellent prospects o" a crop above the average in quantity and quality are generally reported. The unfavorable March weather in the south Is found to have done no serious damage. Spring sowings have been completed under good conditions.

### IMMIGRATION BILL PASSED.

### By Its Terms Illiterate Aliens Are Barred Out of This Country.

After two days' debate the House Wednesday, by the overwhelming vote of 195 to 26, passed the Bartholdt-McCall immigration bill as modified by the Corliss amendment. The Stone consular bill, which was offered as a substitute, was defeated 75 to 131. The bill as passed adds to the classes of aliens excluded from admission to the United States all male persons between the ages of 16 and 69 years (except parents of persons living in this country) who cannot both read and write English or some other language. The Corliss amendment added to the bill excludes aliens who come across the borders year after year to perform labor in the United States with no intention of settling therewithin the jurisdiction of the United | a few elephants on its hands. ### Full Dozen Wichita People Take the Pasteur Treatment.

Twelve people from Wichita, Kan., are now being treated for hydrophobia at the Pasteur institute in Chicago. There is a mad-dog scare of the wildest description at Wichita. About 250 dogs have been killed and the Common Council has ordered that all the animals be muzzled for sixty days. Almost every citizen carries a revolver, which he is free to use on any member of the canine population he sees on the street. As fast as the victims of the rabid animals can be found they are sent to the Pasteur institute at the expense of the Commercial Club of Wichita. On the afternoon of May 10 a valuable coach dog developed rabies and started on a tour of inoculation. It is not known how many people and animals were bitten, but the dog was at liberty for several hours and used its teeth on almost everything that it approached. 

from the much-advertised distribution of free seed by Congress. It is for this that the Government is paying out \$80,000 this year, without counting the cost of sending the packages by mail. The cost of such a package to Uncle Sam, including the envelopes and printing, is 3-7c. The actual expense of delivering it by mail is 4c in addition. For this expenditure the farmer receives a little gift which he could purchase at the country store for from one to three cents. In any such store will usually be found on the counter several boxes of assorted seeds, retailing at from two cents to five cents a paper. They are just as good as those furnished by the Government and the papers are apt to hold about twice as much.

\$165,000 Wasted Every Year.

In every third package of vegetable seeds sent out this year is a paper containing about one-sixth of a pint of peas or corn. Imagine how useful that is likely to be to the farmer. But as has been said, it is not intended to be useful to him; it is designed as a compliment from the Congressman and to please the good wife and the children. The seed contracts enforced by Congress call this year for 10,125,000 papers of seed, costing the Government \$75,000, to which must be added \$89,000 for postal expenses. In other words, the so-called "free seed" this year will cost the people of the country nearly \$165,000, besides injuring the legitimate seed trade to an extent representing an equal amount. The distribution is made in order, as a member of Congress said during the recent discussion, to show the poor toiling farmer at home that Uncle Sam remembers him and desires to assist him in his struggle for existenceto the extent, forsooth! of three-quarters of an ounce of seeds, which he must in the end pay for himself. The recent fight in Congress has attracted so much attention to the seed distribution that applications for free seed have greatly increased in number. The distribution of seeds by the Government began in 1839 with the appropriation of \$1,000, which was given to the patent office for the purpose of collecting and giving away rare and improved varie- father is a retired colonel in the Spanish ties. Since that date, with the aid of steadily increasing sums of money furnished by Congress annually, every seed that could be found anywhere offering a reasonable prospect of usefulness in any part of the country has been purchased and liberally distributed. People all over the United States have already secured nearly all of the vegetable and field seeds, plants and trees that are adapted to their peculiar soils and climates. It goes without saying that the obtainable number of valuable and uncommon seeds is limited. Although a request is sent with each package for a report as to the result, not one recipient in 1,000 makes any response.

### HARRISON M'KEE'S ILLNESS.

His Condition Remains Unchanged-His Fame as "Baby" Mckee. The condition of Benjamin McKee, ex-President Harrison's grandson, who is suffering with what is believed to be pneumonia, was unchanged at last reports. Master McKee's serious illness recalls

William Coglin, who was killed by a Big Four train at Muncie, did not live in Cumberland, Md., as he said just before he died. He had been working at the Union steel works in Alexandria, Ind., and leaves a widow there, to whom he was married only three weeks ago. He came to Muncie on business and was killed an hour after his arrival.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction announces that the coumeration of persons of school age, taken under the law of 1895, shows a total falling off of 65,000 persons. This is taken as proof that much dishonesty was practiced under the old law. The falling off is all in the cities, so that the country districts will have longer school terms than heretofore.

The Terre Haute Council has passed an ordinance fixing the maximum bicycle speed on the business streets at six miles and on all other streets at eight miles an hour. Children under 12 years are not allowed to ride on Main street. Lights are to be carried and warning bells sounded at crossings. An unsuccessful effort was made to include a section prohibiting the carrying of infants on wheels.

The Indianapolis sanitarium has addressed a note to the superintendent of the city schools, and among other things suggested that kissing as practiced by women school teachers among their pupils be interdicted, because disease is thereby apt to be communicated. He also condemned the habit of pupils of drinking from a common vessel and of using the same lead pencils. The superintendent has promised compliance with these suggestions.

Their majesties entered the chapel and knelt in prayer before the image. At the conclusion of their devotions the czar remounted his horse and the czarina re-entered her carriage and they passed through the gate into the Kremlin, where they were received with all the ecclesiastical pomp possible.
