What an outrage it is to society that humanity has become so indifferent, that it will sit quietly and see a damnable crime go unpunished. We regret to chronicle this state of affairs in Marshall county.

**He Gets 12 Years.**

The trial of Leroy Brockus that has been before Judge Capron for several days past has attracted considerable attention. It was generally conceded that he had a very weak case, and would without doubt be found guilty by the jury, but the length of sentence was the sticking point. The case went to the jury at 4:50 Saturday evening and it did not arrive at any satisfactory verdict until Sunday morning at 7:30. As soon as it was known that a verdict had been arrived at, the court house bell was rung at 9 o'clock the Judge took his seat on the bench and received the jury.

The jury found the prisoner guilty and fixed his sentence at twelve years in the penitentiary. Brockus did not seem to be affected by the sentence but took the matter in a cool indifferent way.

The jury, it is said, when first polled were in accord as to the guilt of the prisoner, but considerably different as to the length of sentence. Three were in favor of twenty-one years, while the remainder of the jury were divided in the number of years. The verdict was really one of compromise.

In a few days Brockus will be taken to Michigan City to work out the justly rendered verdict, and ere twelve months roll by the shadow of forgetfulness will pass between him and the outer world, and none but those who have heart-burnings over his past acts will remember him as he was when among men. —Plymouth Independent.

**One Sewer Proves to Be a Failure.**

The town which occurs here Monday afternoon and looks over the hills in my basements and cellars in different parts of the town caused many citizens to compare the manner in which some of our streets are drained this causing much damage to some of our citizens. We will only mention the way in which Main street is prepared for drainage through the business part of our city along the front of the new brick block on the west side of the street. The walk is considerably higher than along the east side of the street, and for the convenience of those on the west side. The street was graded considerably higher and no gutter provided on that side above the ground to carry off the surface water, but a sewer has been put in along the front of the business places on the west of the street that has been proven to be far to small, having been placed at a depth sufficient to drain all the basements adjacent thereto and for the purpose of receding and carrying away all the water that comes from the north and west part of the city, but is a failure and proven to be disastrous and unprofitable as the mouth of the sewer is much larger than the outlet, consequently the lead pipes in a basement to sewer received the water into the basements until the pipes were filled to an overflowing capacity, then the east side of the street being so much lower the water rushed to that side of the street thus creating disaster all along the line. After the storm then the water receded through the little sewer and again the basements were drained. Now when such rank failures as these are made at the expense of the people our officials should not be surprised or offended because as American citizens we do not approve of such manipulation, and shall resent them whenever opportunity offers. There has been quite a dispute as to who bore the expense of putting in the said sewer, many of the people having the impression that it was jointly between the town and parties owning basements adjacent thereto, but we understand that one of the councilmen denies the town ever paying one cent of that expense, and also says he will give five dollars to any one who will show him where the town ever paid one nickel towards that expense. Now we refer the councilman to the president of the town board, Wm. Guiselman, who says that the town board did pay to John Osborn \$10 toward the expense of putting in said sewer, and the order book shows that amount paid; and we also refer him to Blacksmith Wilson who says he received from the town board \$5 for graters furnished in said sewer, and how much tax was worked out there we are unable to say, but understand the aforesaid state of facts the same is a dead failure.

The Supreme Court has handed down its decision on the Nicholson law and this act, which has become one of the most famous excise enactments of recent years, is sustained at every point. The fight for the enactment of this measure in the last Legislature was a memorable one and though a strenuous effort was made to make a political measure out of it, it was not successful. The Legislature was Republican, but party lines were not drawn in the vote and it was approved by the signature of the Democratic Governor. It is now sustained by a court with a Democratic majority. The court had before it a large number of cases and the decision is an omnibus opinion covering all the phases of the law and all questions that seem likely to arise under it. The majority opinion was written by Judge Jordan though he joins Judge Hackney in dissenting from it where it sustains Section 2, which provides that no other business can be carried on in the same room where liquors are sold by the drink. These are the only dissenting opinions and they touch only this one phase of the law.

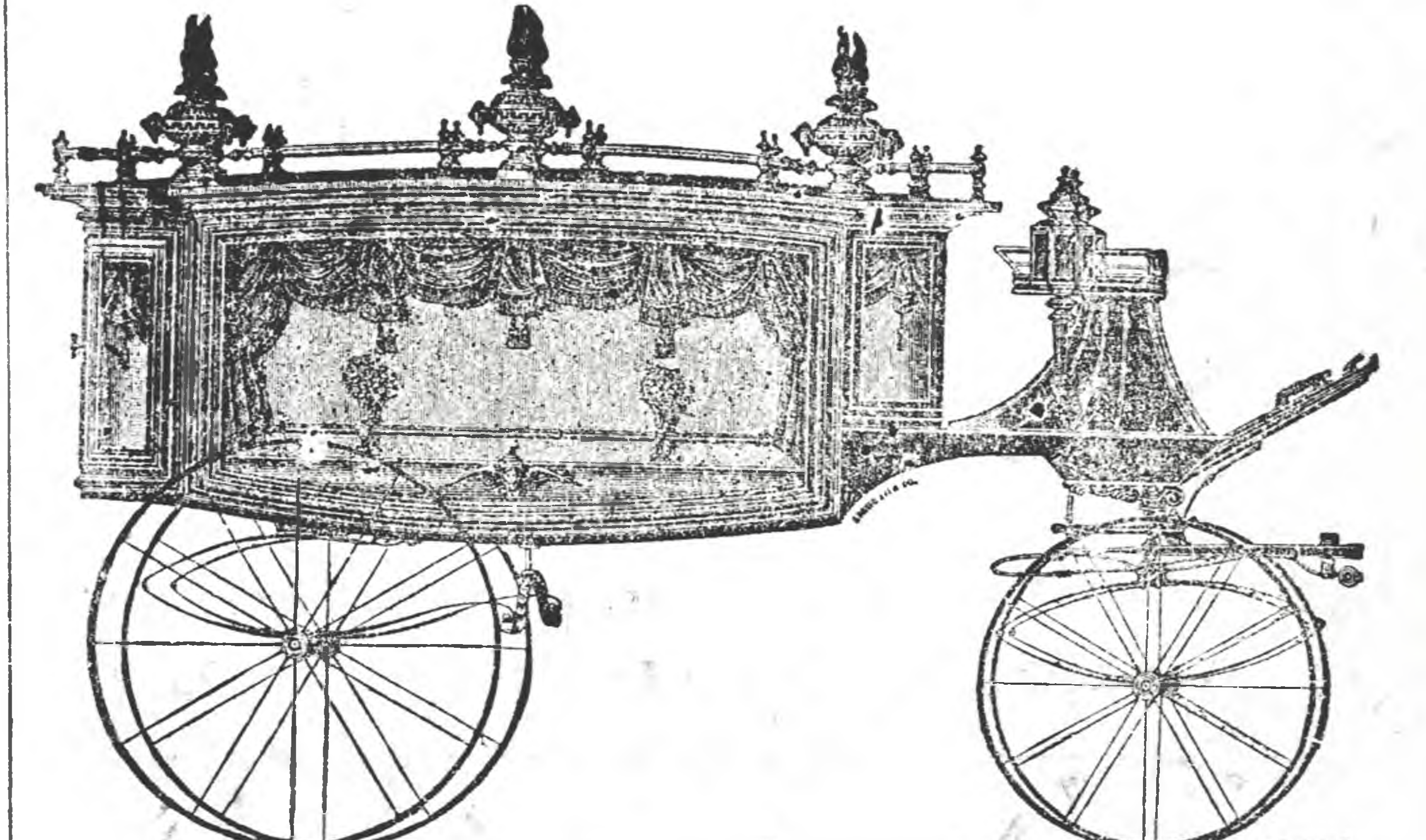
