Retiefs 12 Years.

The trial of Leroy Brockus that has been before Judge Capron for several days past has attracted considerable attention. It was generally conceded that be had a very weak case, and would without doubt be found guilty by the jury, but the length of sentence was the sticking point. The case went to the jury at 4:50 Saturday exeming and it did not arrive at any satisfactery verdict until Sunday merningat 7:30. As soon as it was known that a verdict had been arrived at, the court bouse bell was rung at 9 o'clock sation in London, Paris, Berlin, the Judge took his seat on the benck and received the jury.

> The jury found the prisoner guilty and fixed his senteece at twelve years in the penitentiary. Brockus did not seem to be effected by the sentence but took the matter in a cool indifferent way.

The jucy, it is said, when first polled were in accord as to the guilt of the prisoner, but considerably different as to the length of sentence. Three were in favor of twenty-one years, while the remainder of the jury were divided in the number of yeras. The verdict was really one of comprise.

The Supreme Court has handed down its decision on the Nicholson law and this act, which has become every point. The fight for the enactment of this measure in the last Legislature was a memorable one and though a strenuous effort was made to make a political measure! out of it, it was not successful. The Legislature was Republican, but party lines were not drawn in the vote and it was approved by the signature of the Democratic Governor. It is now sustained by a court with a Democratic majority. The court had before it a large number of cases and the decision is an omni bus opinion covering all the phases of the law and all questions that seem likely to arise under it. The majority opinion was written by Judge Jordan though he joins Judge Hackney in dissenting from it where it sustains Section 2, which provides that no other business can be carried on in the same room where liquors are sold by the drink. These are the only dissenting opinions and they touch only this one phase of the law.

#### Curious Frogs.

One of the most interesting species that have been described is the one discovered by Mr. Wallace in Borneo a number of years ago. It has been popularly called the "flying frog," from the fact that it has toes of great length, and these are fully webbed to the tips. If the animal wishes to descend from the top of a high tree it has only to make the leap, and by spreading out its toes it converts its feet into four veritable parachutes, and thus this little aerial batrachian reaches terra firma in safety. Among the most curious types are the tree frogs, and Gibson says these "are readily distinguished from all others by having the ends of their toes dilated into knots or disks, generally provided with a sticky secretion, by means of which they can cling to the leaves and branches of trees. They are small, elegant, and exceedingly active creatures, the males possessing loud voices, of which they make copious use during the breeding season and on the approach of rain." Frogs have from remote times been regarded as weather prophets, and at the present day, in some parts of Germany, the European tree frog (Hyla arborea) is used as a barometer. A few of them are placed in a tall bottle provided with minature ladders, the steps of which they ascend during fine weather, seeking the bottom again on the approach of rain.

Anatomical structures of a variety of kinds are characteristic of different species of frogs, having to do with the voice organs. So it is that many croak, some chirp, and some almost bellow. Many emit noises most disagreeable to all ears, while others give vent to sounds that under some circumstances are quite enjoyable.

#### Fifty-Four Years in One Pulpit.

The farewell sermon which the Rev. Dr. Joseph Osgood preached recently to the people of the First Parish Church, in Cohasset. Mass., at the end of a ministry of fifty-four years, indicates that this venerable clergyman, is still on the bright side of active service. but it carries an impression of character that can only be made where one remains for a long period in one place and grows up with the people. Dr. Osgood was singled out not long ago by Harvard University for the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in recognition of his long service in a country parish and of the personal qualities which have given him the ability to remain in Cohasset all his life. Dr. Osgoed was not a college graduate, but he had what is even better-a practical knowledge of people as you find them in daily life, and the story of his career, as related in his farewell sermon, shows that he is the product of those qualities which are first and foremost in the New England character. He is eighty-one years of age. Dr. Osgood took charge of the church October 26, 1842. Four years ago, on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of his occupation of the pulpit, a jubilee was held at Cohasset. Dr. Osgood will continue to live in Cohasset, where he has a comfortable

Bar Harbor, the home of the famous bull-wrestler, has produced another Samson, Dr. F. C. The heaviest of them, weighing 230 pounds, was perched on his shoulders, while he carried the other two, weighing 145 and 150 respectively, in his arms.

In the Penobscot Exchange he lifted a load of 500 pounds and carried it around the room with ease. This feat was witnessed by several well known men. Last winter in Bar Harbor he lifted a load of 775 lbs. The most remarkable feature of this physical wonder is that Dr. Ames was a weak man and a wreck from disease ten years ago, but by dint of careful training he had developed his muscles and body, until to-day he is a perfect giant. One of the most eccentric characters of the State is Allison Dewitt, of Battle Ground, an old bachelor who has lived alone in a little cabin for nearly half a century, and is now an octogenarian, enfeebled by disease and near death's door. Over one year ago he began digging his own grave, which progressed slowly because of his feebleness, and after reaching the required depth he spent several weeks in walling it up, using brick and mortar. Then he contracted with a Logansport firm for a suitable monument. bearing his own epitaph, and this stone has just been placed in position. He prescribed what should be carved on the tombstone, stipulating that no capital letter must be used save in the word God. A literal copy is as follows:

a bachelor lies beneath this sod who disobeyed the laws of Godadvice to others thus i give: don't live a batch as i did live-regret.

Deacon Nicely in a Bad Fix.

Zachariah Nicely, a wealthy resident and a deacon in the Methodist Church, was arrested at Shelbyville on a grand jury warrant. He gave bond in the sum of \$1,000. Nicely came in 1869 from Lawrence County, Ohio, where he was married in 1849. A few weeks after marriage his wife abandoned him, going to Virginia. He recovered and married Sarah Bales, who proved a good and devoted wife, and who assisted him in accumulating a nice fortune. Hobart, of New Jersey, for Vice-President on a platform that declares for a protective tariff and the single gold standard. The total vote cast for McKinley was 661½. Reed received 841/2, Quay 601/2, Morton 58, Allison 35½ and Cameron 1. No sooner had the chairman announced the result than Senator Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts moved to make the nomination unanimous. Among the first to second this were Gen. Hastings of Pennsylvania and Thomas Platt of New York. Gen. Henderson of Iowa followed. Amid a storm of howls, tooting of fish horns, waving of banners and the playing of the band the motion was put and carried. The pandemonium was so great that the chairman could not be heard.





#### Six Feet Loaves.

The largest loaves of bread baked in the world are those of France and Italy. The "pipe" bread of Italy is baked in loaves two and three feet long, while in France the loaves are made in the shape of very long rolls four or five feet in length, and in many cases even six feet. The bread of Paris is distributed almost exclusively by women, who go to the various bake-

houses at 5:30 a. m., and spend about an hour polishing up the loaves. After the loaves are thoroughly cleaned of dust and grit the "bread porter" proceeds on the round of her customers. Those who live in apartments or flats find their loaves leaning against the door. Restauranteurs, and those having street entrances to their premises, find their supply of the staff of lire propped up against the front door. The wages earned by these bread carriers vary from a couple of shillings to half a crown a day, and their day's work is completed by 10 o'clock in the morning.

Methods of Chinese Thieves Who my dear, and you carry the baby.

Make a Living by Plunder. There are probably more thieves in China than in any other country in the world, and this in spite of the severe laws which have been made for their benefit. The first time a thief is caught at his work he is merely beaten with a bamboo; the second time, however, he is branded with the word "thief," and banished from the country for life. If he comes back again the penalty is death. He also pays for his offense with his life if he uses any personal violence against anyone he may be robbing, even if he merely draws a drop of blood with a finger nail. But the people of Pekin have a saying that every policeman is ten-tenths of a thief himself, so that these laws do not have any marked effect.

The towns of China seem especially adapted to facilitate the work of thieves. The houses, as a rule, are onestoried, and a man can easily slip in through the open windows. There are a number of pawnshops, "where no questions are asked." and most of the towns have a large, idle population, generally on the edge of starvation, who are ready to risk anything for the sake of food. The outfit of Chinese thieves is simple, but ingenious. They go about barefooted and naked to the waist, and oil their bodies until they are as slippery as eels. They do away with the natural uses of the queues by tying them in a knot at the top of their heads and sticking them full with sharp-pointed thorns. Woe to the man that takes hold of them! The only implement they carry, as a rule, is a ladder made of bamboo. This is exceedingly original in device. A string is threaded through a number of short bamboo sticks, which, when drawn tight, thus gives the appearance of an ordinary walking stick. When the string is allowed to hang from the joints it forms a sling for the feet to rest on. Burglars also occasionally carry a miniature lamp, being the smoldering end of a stick, which gives out a faint light.—Pearson's Weekly.

#### Cost of Naval Vessels.

Possibly the following figures regarding the cost of some of the ships of the English navy may be surprising, and of interest. Such a vessel as the Ramilies, a first class battleship, costs about \$4,350,000, excluding stores and guns. Of this amount the propelling and other machinery cost \$519,000; hull and fittings, \$2,827,000; gun mountings, torpedo carriages, gear, etc., \$382,500; and armament, \$375,000.

The hull, etc., of one of their torpedo boat destroyers costs about \$50,000, while the engines cost \$125,000. The disproportion between the cost of the hull and that of the engines is due to the enormous speed required of this type of vessel, and to the fact that they incur no expense for armor, as in the case of battleships.

To build the engines of a battleship, there are something like ten or twelve different trades and professions employed, notably, draughtsmen, patternmakers, moulders, turners, fitters, blacksmiths, erecters, machine hands, etc.




