Murder investigation narrows down

The Lela Hildebrandt murder investigation has been "considerably narrowed down," according to Detective Sgt. Robert Burns of the Peru Indiana State Police Post.

Late last week a \$10,000 reward was offerd by the parents of Mrs. Hildebrandt, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Donnelly and her parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John Hildebrandt, for the apprehension of the individual responsible of the 26 year-old worman's death

Due to the reward offer, officers received several leads which are bringing the investigation closer to its solution, Sgt. Burns indicated.

He would not specify how many suspects are in the case; he did say over 50 persons have been excluded as suspects for the murder death. Those excluded were eliminated through an around-the-clock investigation being headquartered at the Culver Police station.

"No immediate arrests are planned at this time," Sgt. Burns said, adding that he must obtain probable cause information before charging anyone with the murder of Mrs. Hildebrandt.

The victim Lela Donnelly Hildebrandt, RR 1, Winamac, was found dead in her auto Oct. 14 on State Road 17 just south of State Road 110 in Fulton County.

She was first believed dead from massive skull injuries sustained when her auto hit a tree 126 feet off the west side of the road. An autopsy Oct. 16 rev shotgun pellets imbedded in her skull and the cause of death was changed to murder.

Indiana State Police, the Fulton County Sheriff Department and Culver police began an investigation to determine the motive and the person responsible for the death of Mrs. Hildebrandt.

Sgt. Burns, who said he has been working sometimes 20 hours a day on the case, told the Citizen the murder weapon has not been recovered, but laboratory reports concluded the type of shotgun used in the murder. According to Burns, the reward will be in effect for six months.

Burns, as well as Fulton County Sheriff's Department member Bruce Baker and Culver police officers Richard Woodward and Jack Caudill, have interviewed over 400 persons regarding the case according to the detective.

"We are still interested in people contacting us about the case or Mrs. Hildebrandt," said Burns.

"We have received a few calls already which have opened a few new leads in the case," Burns said, adding he is sure there is information being withheld by persons who know something about the case.

"In any community, including Culver and many others I have worked in, a police officer's hands are tied unless he receives the cooperation of the public. We have received some cooperation as to information and we feel more is available in the community." Burns stated.

Police have asked that anyone with information about the shooting death call the Culver police, 842-2525 or Indiana State Police at the Peru Post, 317-473-6666 or the Fulton County Sheriff's office, 222-2802 at Rochester.

Mrs. Hildebrandt, wife of Greg Hildebrandt, a Winamac artist, was graduated from Culver Military Academy and Indiana University. Her father is a retired member of the CMA faculty, where he taught mathematics for a number of years.

She moved to Winamac just before her marriage and was employed at the Winamac Public Library.



Succulents: easy to raise

Foliage plants are common in American homes, but there is always the individual who wants to grow something different.

'Succulents are plants with fleshy stems and generally no leaves," reminds John A. Wott, Purdue University extension home environment horticulturist.

"A few are cacti, sedums, sansevierias, aloes, euphorbias and crassulas," he says, "but the varieties are almost endless.

Almost everyone knows the common hen and chicks. It comes in more than 100 shapes, colors and sizes. Other common succulents are the jade tree, crown-of-thorns and snake plant or mother-in-law's tongue.


All of these plants are easy to grow, says the horticulturist, by tart with a soil system of equal parts coarse sand, organic matter such as leaf mold or peat moss, and soil. "Many people believe these plants desire little water," says Wott. "The truth is these plants require frequent waterings. The soil mixture loosens the process enough to allow the water to drain almost instantly.

Place the plant in a container which will restrain root growth to

a certain degree. This encourages more top growth and bloom. Almost all succulents have a period of rapid growth, followed by a period of dormancy-usually during the winter months. Most will flower in April, May or June after they have been brought to a warm, well-lighted area.

Propagation of these plants is usually easy, says Wott, by emove a shoot, leaf or cutting from the mother plant and allow the cut end to heal over for a few days. After being set in a welldrained soil and water, new roots should form within a short time. Certain types of succulents will also send off-sets which can be cut away from the original plant. Often these will have attached roots.

One of the problems associated with growing succulents is rot. This usually begins with overwatering the plant.



Plans underway for vocational offerings

Within a few years, Culver, as well as six other nearby school systems will have an active vocational educational program directed by Stephen Rusnak.

Rusnak has been hired as administrative director of the North Central Area Vocational Cooperative (NCAVC) by the seven school superintendents involved in the cooperative. He officially began his duties as the NCAVC director Oct. 15.

Rusnak, whose office is in the Culver Community Schools administrative building, 222 N. Ohio St., was hired by the superintendents of Culver, Argos, Plymouth, Triton, Union-North, Oregon Davis and Knox school systems to begin implementing the vocational education program as a joint venture of the seven schools.

"It's not something which will happen overnight." Rusnak said. "Little has been done in the area regarding vocational education and I have to start from scratch with planning a program."

Rusnak explained that vocational education is a practical program where students gain experience and training in a specific field while they are still in high school.

"This doesn't mean they will be apprentices or should be licensed for certification in a field with the experience gained from the vocational education program. But training will give them a basis for post-high school education in a vocational field," he added.

Vocational fields include automotive occupations, construction crafts, business occupations, health careers, metal trades, medical services and electronics occupations, just to name a few, according to the administrator.

Initially his job will be to find areas of student interest and attempt to create programs, order equipment and hire instructors for those areas.

The program, which may take several years for full implementation, says Rusnak, will be open to juniors and seniors on a half day basis. The remaining half day will be used for regular academic instruction.

Rusnak, formerly a consultant in vocational education with the State Department of Public Instruction helped in planning the NCAVC prior to being hired as its director.

"Without a doubt there is a need in this area for vocational education. This is one of the few districts in Indiana without an active program," he said.

NCAVC is one of 48 cooperative districts in the state and is one of the last in northern Indiana to begin the vocational offering.

fn 1969 a feasibility study was made in this area indicating a drastic need for a vocational program. The program did not begin until recently, however.

After Rusnak finds where student interests lie, he will offer the board of seven superintendents a one year and a three year implementation plan showing what priorities should be met.

"I think we need to grow slowly with good, solid programs rather than hurrying into something with just mediocre classes," Rusnak said.

"Over the years the offerings should expand and within three years or so we should have a strong vocational education program in the seven-school district," he added.

Facilities and available space at the participating schools will also be considered by Rusnak. He will then decide which classes could best be offered by each school and suggest they begin those classes. It will then be up to each district's school board to approve and accept responsibility for the program, according to Rusnak.

"I will be the coordinator of the programs and will assist the schools with the vocational offerings, but each school will take financial responsibility for the programs they offer."

Considerable paperwork is involved with the program, said Rusnak, who indicated there are state deadlines and requirements which must be met before a program can begin.

Carol Jean Keldenich, formerly employed by McGill

Manufacturing Company, is Rusnak's secretary.

"A wonderful thing has happened to each of the seven schools making up the cooperative." he said. "Now each of them will be able to participate in a vocational education program they could not afford in the past."

"Most of the schools haven't started vocational programs before because of the financial expenses involved, but with seven schools working together, a wide scope and less expense will be beneficial to everyone," the director said.

With the cooperative venture, the program will enable smaller schools to start programs which would have been otherwise impossible because of expenses.

Although the offices of NCAVC are located in Culver, it does not mean Rusnak will be connected with the system here any more than the other six schools. "Space was available in the administrative offices so the Culver Board assumed responsibility as the physical agent for the cooperative," Rusnak said.



As for a Culver interest in the program, Rusnak stated Culver Superintendent A. F. Allen is "very interested in starting vocational programs in the system," and that the other six superintendents are equally excited to begin the offerings.







I am so proud of every young man who withstood the hard work and discipline it takes to be a football player, a new and different kind of discipline. In our program we have a policy to cut no one from the team and the policy was rigidly adhered to. Everyone that has the

Everyone that has the fortitude to practice every night is on the team. The only reason a person would be dismissed from the squud would be ov.er a matter of discipline.

Contrary to popular belief, a person doesn't have to be big to play football. We had one young man that is 4'11'' and weighs 99 pounds start five games for us this year. A "congratulations" or a "job well done" would be greatly appreciated by these young men. Let them know you are aware of their hard work and dedication.

Our community responded very favorably, considering the amount of controversy

surrounding the football program. There still are people opposed to the program and they are definitely entitled to their beliefs. We must keep in mind that it is possible to hear anything if one will listen hard enough. During the course of the season I heard many stories concerning the program that were completely misconstrued and erroneous. Football is here to stay as part of the total school program. It is embedded within the underclassmen of the student body. We have many young men working tremendously hard for athletic recognition and misconstrued comments serve only to hurt these young people.

There has been much concern regarding football as a dangerous sport, a concept that has accompanied football from its early days. Today that idea still persists even though evidence proves football can no longer be considered a dangerous sport. During one week of this past football season at CCHS, we had more cross country injuries than we did football injuries. To be sure bumps, bruises and muscle pulls are still very much a part of the game as they are in all sports.

Every parent of an aggresive boy who wants to play football, should let him play. Too many parents feel they are protecting their boy by not allowing him to play. In reality, the boy is being deprived of his right to physical contact and loses certain benefits his total personality might have gained. It is the right of every parent to protect his child, but letting him play football does not deprive him of that right.

We have been asked by some people of what value is football? We believe football is preparation, participation, experience. Its results are comparable with the life process as we go about our duties in the home, on the job and in the community.

Football is a game which contributes to the total personality of the participant. It has been given a great deal of credit as a developer of character. However, we must keep in mind that character cannot be developed where none exists. Therefore, it is just as true that it takes character to play football, as it is that football builds character.

Emotionally, a boy must learn how to control himself to operate effectively under pressure. Playing football helps him develop confidence in himself and others. It teaches him to defeat his weakness and fears. He learns that the human body—his body, can withstand considerable punishment and yet overcome in the pursuit of ultimate success.

Socially speaking, football helps a boy learn that he must operate under a pre-arranged system of rules and regulations. Within this framework, he learns how to respect, communicate and cooperate with others who are striving toward the same end. He experiences team play and loyalty—loyalty to himself, his group and his community. Again not all young men can meet this challenge.

Above all, he becomes an industrious person because he learns that laggards in a group are looked down upon.

Football also develops a mental toughness which is seldom experienced in our present-day mode of living. This mental toughness is born of a buring desire to excell and exceed. Football is one of the few bastions of discipline left for the American boy.

Building a strong, winning football program often takes years to develop due to the tough mental and physical attitudes that must be developed.


Volleyball squad now stands with 7-2 record


