#### Indiana's Fish Industry.

State Fish Commissioner Sweeney filed his annual report with the governor yesterday. He thinks the state is pursuing a short sighted policy in not properly taking care of her fish interests. He argues that Indiana has 300,000 acres of water which ought to be made to produce \$15,000,000 annually. He cites the fish pond of Carl G. Thompson, of Warren, which, although but 50 by 120 feet, and stocked in May 1895, with but a few fish, has already yielded fish to the value of \$100. This it is argued is at the rate of \$600 per acre.

Other states, it is pointed out in the report, have begun to appreciate the value of the fisheries. Maine has four hatcheries and appropriates \$25,000 annually, other states make large appropriations and Indiana appropriates but \$1,000.

The report also considers the value of the fisheries from sanitary and moral aspects. If more fish were eaten and farms beautified with fish ponds better results would be obtained.

The report recommends a stop to the pollution of streams and to dynamiting, which should be made a felony, the establishment of a state broodery, and an appropriation of \$7,500 to cover all expenses for the department, including the broodery. He advocates a closed season from May 1 to July 1; permit trout lining from June 1 to Dec. 31; permit seining with a seine not more than 100 feet long nor more than eight feet wide and with not less than two-inch mesh, from July 1 to Oct. 31, suggests that it should be made trespass to enter on any inclosed lands or streams without the consent of the owner; prohibit the catching of black bass under nine inches long; prohibit fishing on the inland lakes of the state; make it a penalty to sell, buy or transport game fish caught within Indiana for the next three years; require all fish sold to be sold with the heads on and without other marks of disfiguration. — Sentinel.

USES OF WOOD PULP.

Now a Substitute for Steel, Stone, Glass and Many Other Things.

It almost looks as if the old saying, "Cotton is king," might be revised to apply to wood pulp. Wood pulp has been used as a substitute for iron, steel, wood, stone, glass, ivory and innumerable kinds of animal and vegetable fiber. As a material for car wheels the manufacturers have found it superior to any kind of metal, being about three times as durable as steel and much more elastic. It has been found available as a material for paving bricks, drain tiling and conduits for electric cables. For ivory, which is becoming scarcer every day, cellulose is the best substitute which has yet been found.

When properly treated it is practically proof against heat and moisture; hence it has been found superior to timber as a material for telegraph poles and screws. Cannon, too, and bicycles are made out of wood pulp in Germany and Chicago, respectively, while a Frenchman has succeeded in producing a thread from the same substance, which he declares can be worked up into all kinds of fabrics.

A Vienna inventor declares that his wood pulp leather is superior to animal leather in fineness and durability. Among the other articles made of wood pulp are boats, canoes, cuspidors, pails, flower pots, tables, chairs, bureaus, barrels, wagons, horseshoes and imitation porcelain ware. The manufacture of silk from wood pulp is now an important industry in England and France.

The Kaiser's Insignia.

A Berlin paper says that the orders of decoration borne by the Emperor of Germany are worth over 1,000,000 marks (a little over \$230,000). His principal and most valuable decorations are the insignia of the Black Eagle, the Order of St. John, of the Garter, and of the Tlosou d'Or. In all he has over 200 crosses, stars, badges, and other insignia. It is said that he takes them with him on all his journeys and voyages, his hunting expeditions excepted. The coffer containing the decorations is in the constant care of an officer of the court, who accompanies the Kaiser everywhere. **The Road Was Not Sold.**

The Indiana & Lake Michigan railway, the Vandalia road between Logansport and South Bend, was not sold Friday. 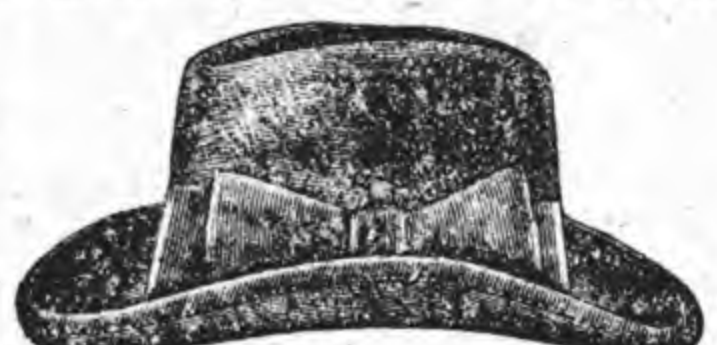

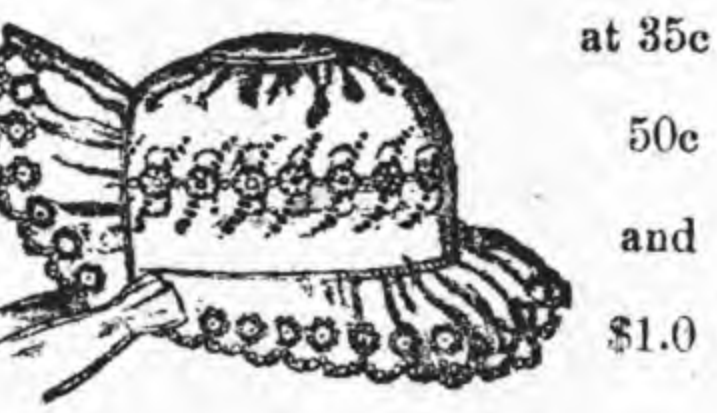

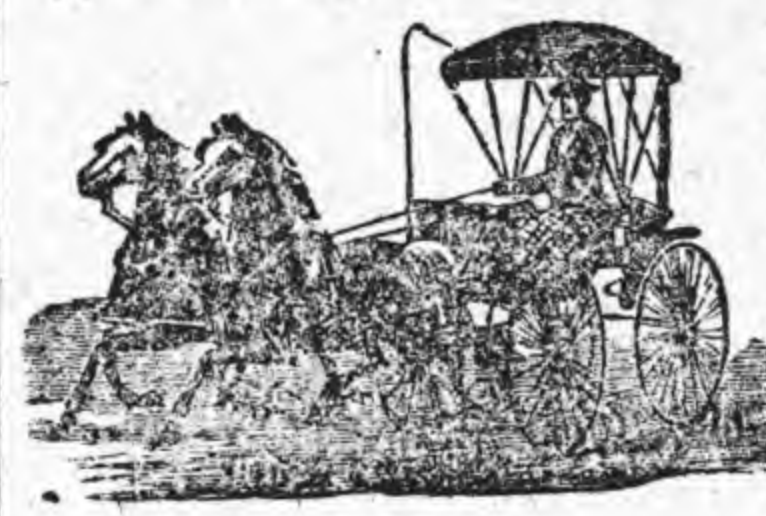

An Interesting Legend of an Italian Bell, Now in This Country.

The magistrate of the city, coming to see who demanded justice, found the old starving horse, and he caused the owner of the animal, in whose service it had tolled and been worn out, to be summoned before him, and decreed that, as his poor horse had rung the bell of justice, he should have justice, and that during the horse's life his owner should provide for him proper food and drink and stable.

Some time ago the bell was brought to this country.

Fatalities on American Railways.

In the year ending June 30, 1897, American railways caused the death of 6,437 persons and injured 36,731 others. That is a sufficiently appalling record, considered merely as an infliction of death and wounds, or even when compared with the casualties of the greatest battles in history, but neither of those ways is the right way to look at the matter. The sensible, and at the same time the comforting, view to take is one which sets these totals, at first view so grim, beside the whole number of passengers carried. Then it appears that only one out of 2,204,708 was killed outright, and only one out of 175,115 injured. Turning to the number of miles which these passengers traversed, it appears that the traveler with average luck doesn't get hurt until his journeyings amount to 4,385,309 miles, and that not until his score is 55,211,440 miles will it be his turn to get killed.

ETIQUETTE OF THE DESERT.

Bedouins Are Very Touchy About the Observance of social Forms.

Social etiquette among the Arabs is a factor in life to be considered seriously if you wish to live among them without friction. Its obligations are not to be completely mastered in a few months. Sometimes when I have had companions with me presumably thoroughly familiar with all things Mohammedan, the harmony of the occasion has been seriously threatened by some thoughtlessness or ignorance on their part which to the Moslem could appear only as a contemptuous want of consideration, says a writer. Thus no greater insult could be offered to an Arab than a friendly inquiry as to the welfare of his wife—to us a natural civility, but to him a gross impertinence bitterly resented. On one occasion I nearly made a singular blunder. I was invited by a neighboring sheik to go over and see him, and was on the point of riding up to his tent door and dismounting there. Fortunately, however, I recollected in time that etiquette demanded that I should halt fifty yards off and call in a loud voice: "Have I your permission to approach?" This gives time to bundle off any of their womenkind who may be about, preparatory to the admission of the stranger. It is curious also to notice that, in spite of the real affection existing between father and son, the sense of respect dominates all other feelings, and the sons will never sit at meat with their father in the presence of a guest, but will wait upon both until the father, rising, allows them the opportunity of breaking bread with their visitor.

Provided, however, that you recognize their social customs, my experience has proved the Bedouins to be genuine, warm-hearted friends; and they really become greatly attached to those whom they know and who know them.

The Prosperous Netherlands.

Though Holland no longer is "mistress of the seas," as it was in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, when the Netherlands constituted the wealthiest commercial nation of Europe, it would be difficult to find a more contented and prosperous people than the Hollanders. Upon the 12,648 square miles of Holland there lived at the close of 1896 not less than 4,928,658 people, or 406 people to the square mile, and not less than twenty cities had from 25,628 inhabitants up to the population of Amsterdam, 494,139 souls. But the colonial possessions of the Netherlands in the East and West Indies embrace an area of about 783,000 square miles. The total population of these colonies, according to the last returns, was approximately 35,000,000, or about seven times as large as that of the mother country. The East Indian colonies include such fertile islands as Java and Madura, Sumatra, Borneo, Celebes and the Moluccas, while the West Indian possessions include Surinam and the Curacao Islands, all famous for their almost inexhaustible tropical products.
