



Arsenic Found in the Well. The county coroner is investigating what seems to be a mysterious poisoning case. The 12-year-old child of Chris Eislin, living in Knight township, died. The doctor who was called at the last moment said death had resulted from poisoning. Arsenic was found in its stomach. The other afternoon the family of Eislin, seven in number, and the family of John Curry, five in number, were taken suddenly ill. They drank water from the same well and an examination of the water showed arsenic.

The government permits each Indian | basement. brave, squaw and pappoose that was thirty days old or over when the bill passed on June 6 1900, to select a quarter -section of land. This will take 470,000 acres, and the Indians are each given another 160 acres, to be allotted in large bodies for pastures, in total another 470,000 acres. In addition the government pays to the Indians over \$2,000,000 for the remainder of the land. This gives to each Indian, man, woman and child, over one month of age, \$711. When the reservation finally is opened the Indian no longer will be the ward of the United States government. He will be forced to depend on his own exertions the same as any other resident of the country. The officials of the general land office expect that the lands will be opened to settlement about Aug. 1 of this year. By the terms of the act of Congress opening this vast region, six months from June 6 last are allowed in which to make al lotments, and the surplus lands must be opened within six months thereafter by proclamation of the President. The date has not yet been fixed, but there is little -doubt that the official proclamation will be issued in the near future. For the last thirty years the United States troops have been busy keeping prospectors and settlers out of the "prom-Ised lands," as they have come to be known to those people familiar with their fertile character. DEATH ENDS DISGRACE.

Two Bank Officials Take Their Lives. Together.

Charles Brown and E. L. Canby, president and cashier, respectively, of the First National Bank of Vancouver, which was closed Saturday by the order of the Comptroller of the Currency, committed suicide Friday night two miles from the city by shooting themselves with a revolver. Their bodies were found Sunday morning lying together in a small clump of bushes.

Vandals Ruin a Monument.

Vandals did serious damage to the Thomas A. Hendricks monument in the State House grounds in Indianapolis. One of the large granite ornaments, weighing about 100 pounds and surmounted by a heavy piece of bronze, was broken from its base and thrown to the ground, a bronze shield, crossed with a piece of bronze, representing a laurel leaf, was forced from its place high up on the monument and carried away, and the scales which the figure of justice held in her hand were stolen.


Miss Florence Harper, music teacher in the Goshen schools for several years, died of consumption.

On the Fort Wayne the worst trouble was a snow blockade between Salem and Massillon, Ohio. This began Saturday morning and tied up the road in twenty-four hours. At 9 o'clock Sunday morning the track was cleared and trains began moving. The same trouble kept the Cleveland trains of the Pittsburg and Lake Erie late, five trains having been blockaded at Windom, near Leavittsburg, for twenty-five hours. This snowfall did not extend east of Newcastle, but at Youngstown, Ohio, it was two feet deep, and the drifting in the cuts north of that city were up to loco-

Big landslides occurred on the Pittsburg and Lake Erie, the Baltimore and Ohio at Soho, on the Panhandle, on the south side, the Bessemer at several points, and the Allegheny Valley near Franklin, Pa. The slide at Soho was 150 feet long, and it required fourteen hours' work to clear one track.

At Skobo, between Monaca and Aliquippa, the Lake Erie received its most serious landslide. One hundred feet of the west-bound track was carried fifty feet down the steep bank, the whole face of the bank slipping down into the river. On the lines of the Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio to Wheeling great damage is reported, and both lines were tied up for several hours. Five miles of the Pittsburg, Bessemer and Lake Erie tracks were either under water or mud. The submerged districts in Pittsburg and Allegheny are a scene of abject misery. Cellars and in some instances the first floors of stores and dwellings were covered with water. When the flood subsided it left behind a greasy, yellow scum two to three inches deep. The damage to furniture and buildings in Allegheny is estimated at about \$100,000. It will take two months of hot summer weather to thoroughly dry out these houses. In Pittsburg the loss to residences and stores and goods and the cost of cleaning up will amount to about \$250,000 A great deal of damage was caused by the storm in Cleveland, Cincinnati and other Ohio cities.

LOGAN EQUESTRIAN STATUE IN WASHINGTON.

The bronze statue of John A. Logan, which was recently unveiled in Washington with impressive ceremonies, is a handsome addition to the monuments of the capital city and one of the most unique. It is the conception of Franklin Simmons, a distinguished sculptor, and is one of the finest memorials of the equestrian style that have ever been unveiled in this country. It is the only monument wholly of bronze to be found in America. Both pedestal and statue were made in Italy and, while on exhibition in Rome, was viewed with curiosity by thousands. Its beauty so impressed King Humbert that he knighted Mr. Simmons for his work.

money. I've got enough, or will have The pedestal is about twenty-five feet in height. On one side is a group representing Gen. Logan in consultation with the officers of his command. These are portraits of the leading generals of the Army of the Tennessee, namely: That would keep us very nicely, and Dodge, Hazen, Slocum, Leggett, Mower and Blair, and of Capt. Strong. On the opposite side of the pedestal Gen. Logan is represented as taking the oath of office as Senator of the United States before Vice-President Arthur. Grouped around are Senators Cullom, Evarts, Conkling, Morton, Miller, Voorhees and Thurman, of whom there are now living only Gen. Dodge and Senator Cullom. On the front of this beautiful pedestal is an ideal figure, about life-size, representing the "Defense of the Union," and on the other end a figure of the same size representing "Preservation of the Union." These allegorical figures are beautifully and appropriately draped and are stately and imposing. Surmounting the pedestal is the equestrian figure, which measures 141/2 feet in height. Gen. Logan is represented as riding along the line of battle, his sword unsheathed, and the horse moving forward at a gentle trot, slightly held in check. The general's appearance exhibits great force and energy, and the whole impression given by the statue is one of dignity, beauty and power.

The Supreme Court has so held. Judge Monks, who delivered the opinion of the court, said that the highways and streets are not for the exclusive use of vehicles propelled by animal power, nor are travelers confined to the use of such power and to ordinary carriages on highways. The use of any new and improved means of locomotion must be deemed to have been contemplated when the highways and streets weer laid out or dedicated, he said, whenever the general benefit requires it and such new means of locomotion cannot be excluded therefrom.
