Plenty of good material but team work is what counts.

G. B. Taylor, business manager at Culver military academy, visited Logansport Tuesday.

The catalogues etc., for the Culver naval school are out and they are gems of beauty and a joy forever. Applications for admittance are rolling in daily, and the prospects are that the school will be filled to overflowing when it opens. The government has furnished two more cutters, and all the other paraphernalia necessary for drill work on the classical waters of Lake Maxinkuckee. This will be one of the great attractions at the lake this summer, as it will be a grand sight to see the naval cadets, dressed in their flashy uniforms, fitting here and there in their cutters, with the stars and

stripes flying at the mast head, over the crystal waters. It is also the intention of the management to give the cadets several trips during the season upon a government man-of-war, on Lake Michigan, where they can in addition to the training received at Culver, gain a knowledge of real life on one of Uncle Sam's gun-boats. The Culver naval school is bound to be a success, for who ever heard of the present management making a failure? Indomitable energy and steadfast purpose are the essentials that have made the Culver Military Academy stand preeminently in the lead of all similar institutions. The naval school must succeed because of its environments, and men at the head who never spare no expense or pains to do just what they promise to do. We say, hurrah for Culver naval school, and may it become second to none.

Joseph M. Bergman and his friend John W. Elue of Peru, were Culver visitors Tuesday and Wednesday. These gentlemen were here on a business trip and were highly pleased with Lake Maxinkuckee and surroundings, and it is rumored that one of the gentlemen took an option on the Palmer House and if the deal is made he will make it one of the largest and most attractive hotels in northern Indiana, in fact will make it one of the most modern hotels in the state. Mr. Bergman is connected with one of the largest traction companies in the state, and was here in view of running an electric line to the lake. He is satisfied that such a line is a foregone conclusion, and the first line here will reap the benefit of a great patronage. The gentlemen also visited Culver military academy and were greatly surprised at the immensity of that worldrenowned institution. They were well pleased with the work of the cadets, and wondered at the accuracy of the boys in all military drills.

While at Logansport Tuesday, the editor had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Chas. B. Laasalle, one of the oldest residents of Cass county, who has resided in said county for the past 70 years. He was familiar with the scenes around Lake Maxinkuckee 65 years ago, when the Indian braves held full sway, and the country was one vast wilderness. This aged gentleman is perfectly familiar with the history of Lake Maxinkuckee and has a historical knowledge of the various tribes of Indians found in northern Indiana at an early date. He denies emphatically that Aubbannabee ever lived at the lake, and states that he will in the near future furnish THE HERALD with a historical sketch which will cast light upon many matters now in obscurity. Mr. Laasalle published one of the first papers ever launched in Logansport and is probably one of the oldest living editors in Indiana, being over 83 years of age. His mind is still clear as a bell, and he is a most agreeable gentleman.

The Lakeside Hotel, after being newly painted and thoroughly renovated throughout, has been opened and is now ready for business. 



**OBITUARY.**

On Monday evening, April 13, Wm. Jones passed from earthly scenes to that eternal rest, after a long and painful illness. Funeral services were held at the Evangelical church Wednesday at 11 o'clock a. m., Rev. Upson of the U. B. church, Plymouth, officiating. The young and talented divine preached a most excellent sermon and unconsciously took the same text used at the services over the remains of Mr. Jones first wife years before. The church was crowded with friends and neighbors who paid their last tribute to the honored dead.

He was born in Kentucky Aug. 13th, 1820, being at his death, aged 82 years and 8 months. When about nine years of age, he moved with his parents to St. Joseph county Ind., where he remained for some time, when he went and lived with an uncle near Greensburg, Ind., for a short time, then he returned to St. Joseph county where he owned his first farm. He was married to Miss Susanna Hathaway on Dec. 12th, 1839. To this union, 10 children were born, four of the number preceeding him to the other shore. His first wife died Dec. 16th, 1877, and on March 9th, 1882, he was united in marriage to Mrs. Martha Robinson but no children were born to this union. The deceased has been a

resident of Union township for the past 52 years, and with the exception of the past two years, residing upon his farm south of Culver all of that time.

Wm. Jones did much to help develop Union township. He was a man of great force of character, and was thoroughly admired by all who had the honor of his acquaintance. He was invariably a kind hearted man, and his great heart swelled with sympathy for all suffering humanity. Wm. Jones leaves a record of good deeds for his children and others to emulate. He was a member of the United Brethren church having united with the same when 19 years of age. He passed peacefully away with great hope for eternal joy beyond. During the past two years he has been nearly totally blind, but was always cheerful and contented with his lot, hoping for a greater light in the by and by.


