Customs and trends come and go, but in Culver as elsewhere, Valentine's Day remains a day for presenting one's sweetheart with flowers. This Valentine's Day, as has been the case for a decade now, Elizabeth's Garden is the place in Culver to facilitate that time-honored tradition.

The florist and gift shop, at 104 Plymouth Street, will celebrate its 10th anniversary here on April 9. Before Elizabeth (Beauchamp when she first opened, but Thompson since 2006) opened her business, it had been several years since Culver had a local florist.

For the past five years, too, Santa Claus has made a stop at Elizabeth's on the first Saturday of December for photo shoot opportunities with Photography by Jayme. Easter photos are another popular attraction, now in their third year here, and there are live bunnies and other accessories on hand for the occasion.

As for flowers, they aren't just for Valentine's Day, of course. Fresh arrangements for virtually any occasion -- from parties and proms to weddings and funerals -- are available. Thompson has, in fact, come to specialize in coordinating a variety of

"I love, love, love to do events," she adds with obvious enthusiasm for a service she says is a more recent addition to the store's offerings. Thompson's knack for

coordinating made a fullpage spread, in fact, in a large metropolitan newspaper in 2006 after she applied her touch to her own wedding to husband Thad, at the Memorial Chapel at Culver Academies in September of that year.

"I've had an opportunity to meet and work with a lot of people (in coordinating events)," she recalls. "There have been some parties that really stand out...as fun and fabulous.

In fact, a new event planning area is currently under construction at the store. The Culver Antiquarian Society interviewed a group of relatives and friends of the Vonneguts and thoroughly researched the family. Bittersweet and poignant moments are included in this honest book about the complicated man known as Kurt Vonnegut. Kurt stayed an active and kind friend to both the boys and girls with whom he had gone to high school as they grew older. One littleknown letter from Vonnegut was found in the Culver collection: a reply to high school gal friend Mary Jo Albright Bradley. Mary Jo was working to help document Culver's lake history and wrote to Kurt asking for input on the Vonnegut cottages.

He details cottage history and then adds:

The B. Vonnegut Cottage was in my time owned by my grandfather's three children, Kurt, Sr, Irma Lindener and Alex. They sold it to the Concert Master of the Indianapolis Symphony, whose name I've forgotten, right after World War II. Jane and I honeymooned there, and we were the last Vonneguts to have anything to do with it. . . As for famous people having spent time there, you couldn't prove it by me. I never saw one.

tober -- it's "big in the city," she says, "but not as much here."). There are the obvious standouts like Mother's Day, poinsettias, holiday centerpieces, or custom decorated Christmas trees for that time of year. Easter, she says, used to be "a huge flower-giving time of year. Everybody wore a corsage to church, but it seems as if that just fell off the

And as one would expect, delivery is always available from Elizabeth's, at least within Culver and a reasonable outside town.

Thompson, who grew up between Culver and Knox, started out young in her gardening life, doing floral arranging in 4H as a youth and coming from a family flower gardeners. 'I always knew gardening and flowers," she recalls. I was going to be a special educa-

Then of course came the war, Vonnegut's tion teacher, and I took a part-time job in a flower shop. I decided that would be what I would want to do. 'There was no florist in Culver," she continues, looking back at the genesis of the idea

for her business here. "We used to come to Crowels (florist in Culver) when they had their store. I was familiar with Culver, there was an open market here -- it seemed like a

Those who've dropped by Elizabeth's Garden or ordered flowers delivered are likely to be familiar with Elizabeth's mother, Barbara Beauchamp, a retired librarian with Knox Schools who has worked intermittently with her daughter "since day one."

The staff at the store, says Thompson, fluctuates as does the flow of customers seasonally in Culver. There may be as many as 13 designers on-staff there at peak season, or only one during slower times. As one might expect, business is booming here -- and the store is open seven days a week -- from April through October, but with some exceptions, including February 14, things are much quieter during the post-Christmas months, when Elizabeth's doors are open six days per week.

This coming Sunday the 13th, however, will be an exception. Valentine's shoppers can order their flowers from noon to 4 p.m. that day. Thompson encourages orders by Sunday or Monday noontime. By the afternoon of the big day, they're often sold out of flowers.

She notes mixed bouquets are popular and practical for many customers hoping to charm their sweetheart on the 14th. "We can match those to the client's price point," she explains. "Those are what we find

to be the most popular at Valentine's Day. Long-stemmed red roses are traditional, but a mixed bouquet is not as pricey.' Elizabeth's roses, she says, have greater longevity than some others, and certainly more

than at groceries or other stores where they aren't kept in cool storage. She and mom Barbara point out Elizabeth's has an unusual method of storing flowers which they believe adds to the freshness and longevity of their offerings, even if it's unconventional by many florists' standards.

They don't cut their flower stems under water, and their flowers are placed in the cooler right away (rather than leaving them to sit out two or three days for hydration); the cooler at the store is set to 38 degrees instead of 42. Beauchamp notes large-headed flowers are wired to allow better hydration flow as well.

Thompson and Beauchamp attribute these practices to many customers telling them their roses last up to two weeks, rather than the more common three to five days. She also cites Elizabeth's "great, great supplier" for the quality of their flowers.

Fresh flowers may be delivered as often as six days per week, Thompson says, and nowadays it's "very rare that something's out of season.

"I feel people appreciate having a local florist in Culver," says Thompson, reflecting

on her decade in business here. "I have a window full of thank you notes from clients!" Elizabeth's Garden may be found online on Facebook and at www.elizabethsgardenofculver.com (the store will soon be part of www.treatsbridalsuite.com, as well), or reached by phone at 574-842-4766.

If these walls could talk: Main Street

Third in a series

We continue our series of semi-regular journeys through Culver's past as we look at the lives of historic buildings in the Culver area. For now, we're strolingl down Main Street's east side in downtown Culver, making our way

You might not know any members of the Knights of Pythias today (though the organization still exists), but in Culver in the early 20th century, you likely would have. If you've ever wondered what the "K of P" lettering engraved into the top of the building which today houses JMC Engineers and Sovereign Grace Baptist Church -- well, that's it. The upper level was the meeting hall of the fraternal organization (one of many enjoying great popularity in America at the time)

1930s. Many will also remember the upstairs hall as the home of Culver's Lions Club from its early days (starting May, 1943), prior to the early 1980s move to the train station-depot on Lake Shore Drive, which the Club had led the charge to restore. For a time in the 1960s and `70s, Culver's Masonic lodge was headquartered upstairs.

There are actually two street addresses at work in the building: 112 and 110 N. Main Street. At 112, the Eagle Store sold groceries in the 1920s and into the 1930s. This became the A&P, which many Culverites today still recall, as it resided there until the late 1960s.

Your editor has memories of being taken (by my grandmother, an avid sewer and quilter) to the Kelly Shop, which occupied both the north and south sections of the building from the mid-to-late 1970s, as operated by Marilyn Kelly (who will likely be glad to reminisce about the shop if you ask her). Carla Jean's Beauty Shop moved into

112 in the 1980s. At 110, Flavey and Foreman -- managed by Earl Foreman -- held court from February, 1928, to the early 1930s, after which J. Earl Foreman ran the store known simply as Foreman's, all the way up to 1955.

Half of the Kelly Shop, of course, occupied the space into the early 1980s, as mentioned above, and a variety of businesses followed, from Tan Bare (mid-1980s) to The Photo Studio & Art Gallery (around the same time); from Final Touch Services circa 1993, to Chris Landskron's Interior Views, launching the same year.

The store space was remodeled in the 1990s into several smaller offices divided by a hallway running the east-west length of the building. Home and Harbor Studios replaced Boetsma Interiors around 2004, and your local newspaper, the Culver Citizen, had "The View from Main Street" from around 2004 until the office closed in 2008 (JMC took over the space). Jan Nanini has owned the structure for several years now, and the upstairs has long been occupied by apartments.





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McBee is all grown up for Culver

Patrice McBee is all grown up.

Not just in a physical sense — although at 6-foot-3, the Culver senior is certainly that, too — but spectators of Lady Cavaliers basketball have seen

McBee's game reach new heights recently.

At last week's Bi-County Tournament, McBee scored a combined 49 points in three games — including a double-double with 14 points and 15 rebounds in Culver's champion-ship game against Oregon-Davis — leading the Cavs to their first tourney crown in more than 15 years and garnering MVP honors in the process.

"We're just really excited," McBee said following Saturday's championship win. "This is our senior year, our only time playing for the championship, and we knew we'd have to beat a hard opponent, which OD is. We've played for four years together, and we've gotten to where we really trust each other. We played defense hard, and that was the key to winning the game."

While the Bi-County may have been her coming out party, McBee's double-digit scoring streak stretches back for five straight games. She averaged just better than nine points per game in her first 12 outings this season, but has been putting up 16 ppg in that latest five-game stretch.

First-year Culver head girls basketball coach Tony Scheub said that, while her progress has been gradual, her 13-point performance in a Northern State Conference win at Triton on Jan. 14 signified a change.

"We played Triton before the Bi-County Tournament and she was good in that game and then at the Bi-County Tournament, it was just — not a different person, but she took herself up to a different level of play," he said. "It was fun watching her play this past week."

Not only have McBee's considerable physical gifts given Class 2A, No. 8 Culver a lift

on the offensive end, but they've also helped with the Cavs' rebounding and pressbreaking — something that came in handy against the turnover-minded Class A, No. 4 Bobcats — and on the defensive end, as well, as McBee and company have limited opponents to less than 40 points in five of their last seven games, including a 64-12 blowout of Caston in the opening round of their own holiday tourney Dec. 21. I would love to say that my defense is great and my philosophy is great, but it helps when you have a 6-3 kid in there controlling the lane, and you've got to give a lot of credit to how our defense has improved throughout the year to our post players."

But while McBee's athleticism and skills tell an impressive tale, Scheub said that's not the whole story.

"As a person, she's hilarious," he said. "She does a little dance routine all the time for the girls to a song "Whip my hair", and it's hilarious.

"She just cracks me up, and I like her more every day so it's kind of sad that the season is coming to an end, but we're going to enjoy it as long as we can."
