EXPLANATION OF CUIVER SCHOOL HISTORY

Culver Union Township School has for many yeors been under the age-old township trustee system with the top professional administrator a county superin. tendent of schools. Culver's situation was somewhat
unique in that it was a consolidation of a town and township under the auspices of the elected township trustee. As is recorded Indiana school history, the legislature in 1959 passed the Indiana School Reor ganization Act which invited many small schools to incorporate as larger schools. This was to be directed by a county committee for reorganization. The people in
and around Culver wanted as early as 1961 to con solidate Aubbeemaubbee Township, North Bend Township, and Union Township under the Indiano Acts of 1947. Suchoa plan was presented to the State Com The county committee presented the Morston Plan consolidation of Argos, Aubbeenoubbee Township, and Culver-Union. The people in a public vote showed tune of approximately $85 \%$ This oction down to

that in a public meeting the leaders of the three communities who had presented the originol plan under the 1947 low decided that it might be worth while to approach the stofe cormmittee ance again. These corm. munity leaders selected five men to appear before D r Kohimeyer and plead the Culver case. These men
were Ralph Osborn, Jr, Kenneth Olin, Frank Mclane George Stevens, and Kenneth Cole. The committee of five returned home after a pleasant but non-commined inferview wint Dr, Kohimoyer. The cuver porions state committee that the consolidation of Aubbeenaubbee, North Bend, and Culver was legal and would be effective as of December 27, 1982. Culver's Baseball Indians became Marshall County Champions for the first time in mariy a year. In compiling an 8-1 record, Culver's stout defense and booming bats dominated the county teams.
Culver started the fall seaton with a 4-0 win over Richlond Center, Poul Liette was the man of the day os he fired a one-hitter of the Wildcats. Som Lowry's wo hits led the offensive attock

Bourbon became the first county feam to fall to our dians, 5-2. Sam Lowry's clutch pitching held the Comets in check while back-to-back two-run doubles by Rick Ervin and Dave Lemar sank Bourbon in the first inning.

Hopes for the future look bright, as the Indians only lose one man. With eight returning starters, Culver should have another fine season next year.
