

#### EXPLANATION OF CULVER SCHOOL HISTORY

Culver Union Township School has for many years been under the age-old township trustee system with the top professional administrator a county superintendent of schools. Culver's situation was somewhat unique in that it was a consolidation of a town and township under the auspices of the elected township trustee. As is recorded Indiana school history, the legislature in 1959 passed the Indiana School Rearganization Act which invited many small schools to incorporate as larger schools. This was to be directed by a county committee for reorganization. The people in and around Culver wanted as early as 1961 to consolidate Aubbeemaubbee Township, North Bend Township, and Union Township under the Indiana Acts of 1947. Suchaa plan was presented to the State Committee for Reorganization and was promptly refused. The county committee presented the Marston Plan consolidation of Argos, Aubbeenaubbee Township, and Culver-Union. The people in a public vote showed their contempt for this plan by voting it down to the tune of approximately 85%. This action was so strong

that in a public meeting the leaders of the three communities who had presented the original plan under the 1947 law decided that it might be worth while to approach the state committee once again. These community leaders selected five men to appear before Dr. Kohlmeyer and plead the Culver case. These men were Ralph Osborn, Jr., Kenneth Olin, Frank McLane George Stevens, and Kenneth Cole. The committee of five returned home after a pleasant but non-committed interview with Dr. Kohlmeyer. The Culver patrons were very pleasantly surprised when notified by the state committee that the consolidation of Aubbeenaubbee, North Bend, and Culver was legal and would be effective as of December 27, 1962. This gave Culver quite a variety of administrative heads during one school year for it was operated under Trustee Eugene Benedict and Trustee Glenn Overmyer, Frank McLane County Superintendent, Frank McLane Superintendent of the now Culver Community Schools, and a school board consisting of Cedric White, Donald Taylor, Eugene Benedict, Judd Stinchcomb, and Vernie Bowen.



It is our pleasure to dedicate the Tomahawk to one of Culver's more valuable staff members, Mrs. Ruth Warner.



Hopes for the future look bright, as the Indians only lose one man. With eight returning starters, Culver should have another fine season next year.







Still smarting from their loss to Judson, Culver played

a tremendous game against tall and talented Knox, but again we were denied the victory, 49—45. Ferocious rebounding and spirited floor play kept us in the game. Ervin led all scarers with 14 points and was backed by White's 11.

North Caston became our next conqueror, 78—59. After scoring 20 points in the first quarter, the Culver gears bagged down and failed to mesh until the final quarter, when it was too late. Overmyer tallied 14 and Ervin had 12 to top the Culver scorers.

With sophomores Jim Boswell installed in the starting unit, Culver came close to their second win, but again was defeated, this time by Rochester, 49–48. Ervin's 9 points topped a balanced Indian attack.

In the last game of 1962, Walkerton came to town, and left happy. The score was Walkerton 53, Culver 43. Lemar's 11 points were the most by any Culverite.

With the County Tourney coming up, Culver journeyed to Bremen. The Indians played another fine game until the final minutes, where they again faltered. Bremen scored 12 straight points in the last two minutes to win, 54—42. Overmyer and Lowry each scored 10 points.

Culver traveled to new Paris and the Cubs, who were Elkhart's County champs, downed the local squad, 77-60. Lowry poured in 21 points and White helped out with 13.

Royal Centre visited Culver in the next game and left with a hard fought 55-49 victory, Overmyer tallied 16 and Lawry scored 11 to lead the scaring.

The following night, the Indians met a tall, good-shooting squad from North Miami. The Warriors' bulk provided their 74-69 win. White hit for 21, Lowry 16, and Ervin 13 to top the scoring.

Against Winamac, Culver displayed a full court press that resulted in stealing the ball numerous times. The Indians took a 31-18 halftime lead and won 55-51. Overmyer scored 16, Ervin 14, and Lowry 11, for Culver.

With three regularly scheduled games left, with Lakeville, Mentone, and Bourbon, Culver compiled a 5-12 record. It must be taken into consideration that Culver's schedule is extremely rugged as compared to the rest of the county teams. The outcome of the last few games will appear in the Tomahawk at a later date.

After seventeen games, Thad Overmyer topped the scoring with 191 points. Sam Lowry was second with 180, followed by Rick Ervin with 177, Paul White with 146, and David Leman with 111. Obviously the scoring was well balanced.

Rick Ervin led the team in rebounds with 182. Thad Overmyer collected 175, and David Lemar added 103.

At this point we would like to pay a special tribute to Coach Gene Crosley, Although his record is nothing wonderful, Crasley has developed mediocre bollplayers into good ballplayers. With a friendly attitude, Crosley stressed teamwork very strongly. His point was well taken as no one Culver player led the scoring in more than three consecutive games. #### BASKETBALL

In their last home game, the Indians lost to Lakeville 81-61. Lowry scored 18 points while Overmyer added 16 for the losing Culver squad. This was the last home game of their high school careers for the six seniors on the team.

For their next contest, the Culver tribe ventured to Bourbon to face the highly rated Comets, After a "give and take" first half they lost pace to the hot hands of the Bourbon five and last 69-51. Overmyer led the balanced attack with 14 points while Boswell and Lowry papped in 12 and 10 points respectively.

In the final game of the regular season Culver challenged the Mentone Bulldogs. Ervin, playing the finest game of his career, scored 27 points which was the highest single scoring feat for the Indians all year. The Mentone team came through with another victory by defeating our Indians 89-65.







