Alters to Benefit Students

The addition of transformational grammar to the curriculum of the freshman, sophomore, and junior English courses was the major change in the English department this year. Transformational grammar is a study of the structure of the English language. It helps the student to better understand and use the language.

A remedial reading project was started by the English department to help high school students to improve their reading ability and rate. Because of the limited facilities available the program was restricted to the use of seniors.

The senior English classes spent much time studying the work of G.B. Shaw. During their studies they fortunately were able to attend a performance which depicted the life and works of Shaw. The program richly endowed the students and filled them with a deep appreciation for the work of George Bernard Shaw.

The English department has adopted new programs to fit the needs of the school and the students.

This year the addition of two new teachers; Mrs. Barrabas, a Spanish teacher and native of Cuba; and Miss McClellan, a French and Spanish teacher who spent last summer in Mexico, provided a change in the language department.

Three French honor students were awarded summer study abroad trips. Patty Overmyer, Cheryll Zink, and Bob Shirrell spent last summer in various parts of France. Upon their return they have enriched other students with their slides, souvenirs, and talks about life in France.

The Spanish department received two exchange students from Argentina who lived with families in the community. The exchange program benefits not only the exchange students but the whole community.

Our school has a language program of which everyone can be proud. Its achievements are not only measured by awards but also by the benefits of knowledge which each student receives.

Science and Math Offer Students a Challenge


This year the mathematics department continued its so-called radical change to modern math. The new math delves into the reasoning and basis for the conclusions which are drawn. This new approach offers the student a better background in math and a greater challenge to himself.

These new teachers were added to the mathematics staff this year: Mrs. White who brought much experience with her, Mr. Schmidt, who is well studied in modern mathematics, and Mr. Wroblewski who taught only the second semester. There were also several substitute teachers who helped our through the year.

The science program was revised this year to include the study of modern science in the courses offered. This new method involves the chemical, organic, and electrical make-up of substances. This gives the student further understanding of the nature of the subject and better prepares him for more advanced work.

History Brings to Life the Past and Present

The history department experimented this year by offering three new courses to the students. Psychology, sociology, and current problems were each offered for a semester. These courses concerned themselves with the problems of the students and the age in which they live. The purpose of offering these courses was to provide the students with insight into their world and into themselves.


On November eighth the history classes joined with the American people by holding a mock election. Students voted for the candidates they preferred for public office. Results of the mock election coincided with the election returns.

The senior civics classes this year spent much time talking about material that was not contained in their textbooks. One topic studied was the government of the Soviet Union; its formation, purpose, and practical application. Comparisons were made between the Communist and American ideologies. Much research was compulsory upon these topics which benefited the students greatly.

Two history students, Susie Donnelly and Dave Kelly, were invited to attend a day-long convocation sponsored by Senator Birch Bayh for students of Indiana high schools. The convocation featured noted men in government and politics as speakers. After the speakers had finished their orations, the students were free to ask questions. The program was very beneficial.

The Benefits of Business Courses Are Numerous

The business department, under the direction of Miss Shanks, prepares students for work in the field of business administration.

Most students take a typing course in their sophomore year. Typing courses require continual practice to attain the speed and accuracy which make typing beneficial. The talents acquired in typing classes are an immense help in other studies.

Bookkeeping is the study of figures and financial standings. In bookkeeping classes students keep actual records of their personal expenses and must report these to the class. Also they practice keeping books for an imaginary company. All figures and statements must be entirely correct in form and in mathematical accuracy.

Clerical practice helps students to attain the basic skills of office work. Filing and mimeographing are instrumental to the course. An application of the knowledge learned in clerical practice can aid a student in everyday life.


The Home Economics II class conducted a nursery school for one day. On this day pre-school children were brought to the home economics department to spend the day. There the children were cared for and entertained by the students.

In mechanical drawing classes the drawings must be constructed with utmost accuracy. Knowledge of the basic geometric forms is a necessity in this course.





Gym Classes Provide Exercise and Enjoyment


The physical education program this year was aimed at developing co-ordination and physical ability to the point that each individual became able to pass minimum physical requirements.


