Oldest Community Project

The Culver Carnival is the oldest community project of its kind held continously in Northern Indiana, if not in the whole state. Begun under the auspices of the P. T. A. in 1926, the project was taken over by the Legion three years later, and not a single year has been missed since. The proceeds have been applied to Community improvement, mostly for the Culver Schools.

The proceeds of this year's carnival will be used for the purchase of refuse cans for the Culver streets and for the grade schools to be used for equipment deemed necessary and useful but; not possible to be purchased under the school budget.

In addition to the games, rafflles, and contests, there will be many acts of entertainment sure to appeal to young and old. Perhaps the climax of entertainment will be that presented for the delectation of the Queen and her Court, which will be supervised by Miss Dorothy Reed. Trustee Curtis Announces The Selection of Fort Wayne, Ind., Architect

Another step towards the realization of a badly needed grade school building has been realized with the announcement by Maurice Curtis, Union township trustee, that LeRoy Bradley of Fort Wayne, Ind., has been retained as architect for the new building. Mr. Bradley was named after a careful study by the township advisory board and Trustee Curtis. Five architects were interviewed by the board here on March 6 resulting in the unanimous selection of Mr. Bradley.

The naming of an architect for the new grade school building will undoubtedly be welcome news to all local citizens who have anxiously awaited any action which would indicate some positive step towards the construction.

While no formal announcement has been made during the past several months, it should be explained that Trustee Curtis, the advisory board, and school officials have not been idle, in fact. they have completed exhaustive studies and work which will prove invaluable in the development of the actual construction.

Every effort is being made in the plans to erect a building which will provide adequate facilities and at the same time meet the standards of health, safety. and educational program as set out by the State.

Financially the township has approximately \$83,500 for the construction of the building. As a matter of review taxpayers will recall that township officials established a sinking fund in 1947 in which each taxpayer paid a special tax of \$1.00 for \$100 assessment on their property. Ir 1948 the rate was reduced to 75 cents.

The grade school building was condemned by the state fire department several years ago, but at the time of the action it was impossible to finance construction costs because of the restrictions on bonding. Unable to build because of financial limitations township officials met the repair and structural requirements of the state, but permission to utilize the building was granted in lieu of steps being taken toward the erection of a new building.

Accurate studies of projected enrollment presented a year ago fully disclosed the necessity for a new building. Last fall it was necessary to add another room or class to take care of the increased enrollment.



- ½ cup Pet Milk 1½ teaspoons vinegar
- 2 cups sifted, allpurpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon baking

1/4 teaspoon salt 1/3 cup soft shortening 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 11/2 cups brown sugar

1 unbeaten egg 1 cup shredded coconut, packaged or canned Turn on oven; set at moderate

(375° F.). Mix milk with vinegar, then let stand. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg vigorously. Stir in about 1/3 of flour mixture; then stir in 1/2 of milk mixture. Repeat until all flour and milk are used. Beat until smooth. Fold in coconut. Drop from a teaspoon 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheet. Flatten slightly with back of spoon as batter is dropped. Bake on top shelf of oven 12 minutes, or until light brown. Remove at once. Makes 3 dozen.



tainly means an increased cost of service to the veterans and a serious delay in giving services to the veterans as it will necessitate all business to be handled by correspondence through the Indianapolis office of the Veterans Administration.

"If it takes at least 15 days now to get an answer out of the Regional Office at Indianapolis, just how long would it take were the Indianapolis office load to be doubled and perhaps tripled? A veteran could be dead prior to treatment being authorized, or his hospital authorization being sanctioned. The South Bend medical division has operated efficiently and has given 100% cooperation.

"There is no question in my mind but what the number of veterans in the Northern Indiana area is more than sufficient to make it a paying proposition from the taxpayers standpoint to sustain the present facilities in the Veterans Administration in the South Bend office. If the South Bend unit be disbanded, we will have numerous veterans that will be compelled to journey to Indianapolis and back at a great expense to themselves, to say nothing of the time that said veterans would lose and the poor medium of transportation to the State Cap-

And I will also say that if the big boys of the Veterans Organization will take their noses out of politics and center their attention more on the actual needs of the veterans, they will be acting in keeping with the primary purpose of their organization.

"If there were any reason for transferring the South Bend Division of the Veterans Administration, it would be far better to transfer it to Chicago, which would be much closer and afford better transportation. Sixty per cent of the veterans in the State of Indiana are north of Indianapolis. The South Bend Veterans Administration Office renders service to seven counties, namely: St. Joseph, Elkhart, Marshall, Starke, Pulaski, Fulton and Kosciusko.

"By virtue of the fact that our esteemed veterans fought around the world and, made inestimable sacrifice to preserve our cherished heritage and American way of life, I now can see no reason whatsoever why they should be exploited, pushed around and further inconvenienced. It is time that every veteran of Northern Indiana place pressure on the Manager of the Veterans Administration at Indianapolis and let the gentleman know what you think of the proposed exploitation and inconvenience about to be dished out to you."

Center Of Livestock **Industry Turns To West**

Horace Greeley's admonition to "Go West," now applies to porkers and other meat animals, according to a study of livestock movements in the 11 westernmost States and Texas. Beef animals in pioneer days were trailed northwest from Texas "to stock the range." But since that movement dwindled, the general impression has been that most livestock from the range country has traveled eastward to market, many making a stopover in the Corn Belt for feeding and "finshing." This was true up to 25 years ago but the incervening years have shown a marked change, a current study shows. A westward movement has developed, and an increased packing house slaughter within the area. The result is a marked reduction in the eastward movement of meat animals | Far West, the study shows. from the western States, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture.





Gangland Death Claims Culver Bank Robber

Another chapter in the historic robbery of The State Exchange Bank of 17 years ago, was written last week when the daily press reported the death of Emmett Kearns, better known to those who remember the local robbery as Edward Murphy.

Kearns, age 48, was found last Tuesday (March 21) near Hammond, Indiana. His body was sprawled over a barbed wire fence near a farm driveway five miles south of Hammond. Agriculture In Iceland

On the way home from the International Grassland Conference in Holland last summer, Dr. Olaf Aamodt, forage crop agronomist of the U.S. Department of Argiculture on "Point 4" duty, stopped off and took a good look at Iceland, a country that is a cameo of grass agriculture. Most grazing on native pastures is by sheep, but the major farm activity centers around dairy cattle usually maintained from a limited pasture-hay-silage acreage (2 per cent) close to the farm buildings.

On this small proportion of Iceland's soil, says Aamodt, "lies the major opportunity for expansion and improvement of her only renewable resource-grass." Aamodt has listed what he thinks the Icelanders might do for the maintenance and improvement of their "grass" including white clover as the principal legume. Accelerate the draining and leveling of the hummocky bog soils, use chemical fertilizers as well as barnyard manure; establish improved strains of forage crops so as to make the most of other improvements; make better ase of the "grass" by making

more of it into silage (which is Report Deaths Of easier to put up than hay in the face of adverse weather:) grow special silage crops such as a mixwind erosion on the loose "sandar" soils by fertliizing them and establishing adapted grasses.

Such changes, Aamodt thinks, would result in more and better winter feed, from which would come more milk and bigger crops of lambs, and would create the opportunity for developing beef production. .

Results of experiments and demonstrations on the island could be made more useful, he says, "Field Days" and other extension methods were given more attension. Also, he thinks Iceland needs more research on fundamental agricultural matters and specific problems, "much of which might be done through international co-operation."
