Special Music to Feature Easter Sunday Program in Local Churches

List Details Of Services; Expect Large Audiences To Worship Together

Culver and Union township churches will join religious groups throughout the world in observing Easter. The services on Sunday will climax the Lenten season and particularly the Holy Week programs. Tomorrow evening members of the Methodist church will observe Maundy Thursday with Holy Communion. The service is planned for 7:30 p. m.

Reverend George Vance of the Leiters Ford Methodist church will be the speaker for the Good Friday services at the Methodist church. Details of the program to be sponsored by the Culver-Union Township Council of Churches are contained in an article elsewhere in today's Citizen. Special music, speakers and programs will feature the special Easter morning church services which are expected to attract large audiences.

E. U. B. Services

The Youth Fellowship is planning a sunrise service at the Emmanuel Evangelical United Brethren church next Sunday. The service scheduled for 6:30 a. m. will feature an Easter breakfast for youth. "The Power of the Resurrection" will be the theme for the Church School program at 9:30 a. m.

Rev. I. G. Roederer, pastor, has selected for his morning sermon the topic "The Three Resurrections." Baptism and reception for members will occur during the morning service. A story and song service entitled "The Victor of Bozrah", by S. Trevena Jackson, will be presented by the choir at the evening worship service. Mrs. Everett Young will serve as reader.

Reformed Easter Service

"The Resurrection Within" will be the subject of guest speaker Dr. Hardigg Sexton at the worship service at 9:30 a. m. at the Grace Evangelical and Reformed church next Sunday. Mrs. Robert Rust will direct and Miss Margaret Swanson, organist, will accompany the choir in a special Easter anthem, "In the Lillied Garden."

Culver Methodist Circuit

Rev. Prentice Douglas will speak on "The Message of Easter" at the 11 o'clock service at the Santa Anna church on Sunday. Sunday School is scheduled for 10 a. m. at the Mt. Hope church and Rev. Douglas has announced that he will speak on "Proof of His Presence" at the Sunday evening service at Zion.

The Culver Methodist Church

The Easter sermon by Reverend Quentin Hand at the Methodist church on Sunday morning will be "Led Into Eternity." The scriptural reference will be John 20: 1-10. The choir will sing two numbers: "By Early Morning Light," and "As It Began to Dawn."

Burr Oak Church of God

A special sunrise service is being planned at the Burr Oak Church of God. The early morning service will feature special numbers by the choir and Mrs. Albert Overmyer. Harry A. Sheets, pastor, will speak on "Th Open

Special Good Friday Devotional Services At Methodist Church

Rev. George C. Vance, pastor of the Methodist church in Leiters Ford, is to be the speaker for both Good Friday services in our community. The Men's meeting will be held at 12:30 p. m., preceded by a luncheon in the basement of the Methodist church. The general service will be held at 2:00 p. m. Both services are to be held in the Culver Methodist church.

Rev. Vance held pastorates in southern Indiana, a pastorate near Rensselaer, and served the Francesville Methodist church before his appointment as pastor at Leiters Ford. He has served six years in the ministry of the Methodist church. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Indiana University in 1945. In 1949 he was awarded the Bachelor of Divinity degree from Garrett Biblical Institute, a theological seminary of the Methodist church. He was ordained to the diaconate in 1948, and received full ordination as an elder in the Methodist church in 1949.

The Good Friday meeting for men will be held in the sanctuary of Culver Methodist church at 12:30 p. m. on Friday, April 7. The meeting will end at 12:55 p. m. Merle Crabb will furnish piano accompaniment for the service; James Miracle will lead the singing of the hymns.

Preceding the meeting a luncheon will be served in the church basement by the Mary Circle of the W. S. C. S. This is for the benefit of those men who would otherwise have to return to their homes for the noon meal. The luncheon is to consist of ham and beans, cornbread, pie and coffee.

Class To Use Profits For 1951 Educational Trip; Campaign Starts April 14

The opportunity to subscribe to The Culver Citizen and at the same time benefit the Junior Class of Culver High School will be extended to everyone in the Lake Maxinkuckee area, it was announced today. Profits from the subscription campaign will be utilized by the class for a planned educational trip to be taken in May, 1951.

In addition to the commission arrangements are being made to treat the winning team to a "coke-hamburger feast." There will also be a cash prize of \$3.00 awarded to the individual who attains the greatest volume in securing subscriptions.

Although the class already has a fund started for its educational trip in 1951, the forthcoming subscription campaign will mark the first large project which the class has underwritten, and the Juniors have evinced considerable enthusiasm for the approaching campaign. Unlawful To Sell Cigarettes To Minors

Repeated reports of young children purchasing cigarettes locally has caused officials to issue a warning calling attention to the fact that it is unlawful to sell cigarettes to minors.

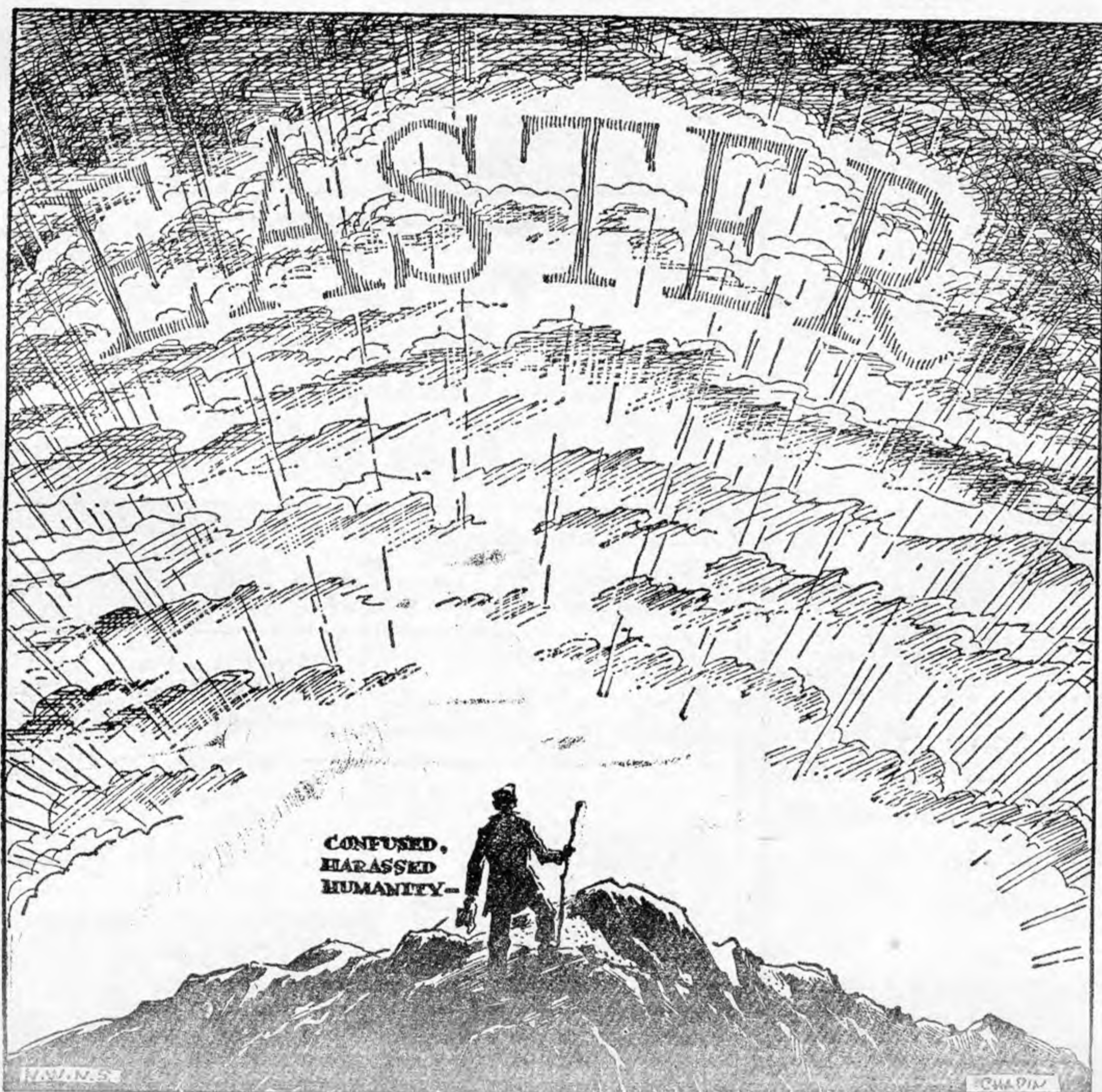
Town Marshall Don Mikesell indicates that law specifies that minors are not permitted to purchase cigarettes under any circumstances. He cited the statutes which say it is a misdemeanor "for any person or persons, to give, barter, or sell either directly or indirectly to any child or children under sixteen years of age cigarettes or preparation of tobacco of any kind."

"Anyone on conviction is subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for the first offense. Second offense on conviction shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$500 which may be added imprisonment in the county jail or work house not to exceed 60 days."

Taxpayers Receive Notice Of Property Valuation

During the past week all local taxpayers have received statements showing their new property evaluations as based on the re-assessment as ordered by the legislative enactment of the State Assembly as provided for in the "Real Estate Assessment Guide," issued by the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

The statewide re-assessment, marks the first official adjustment in property valuations since 1932. Assessors made a house to house canvass of property last summer. In their detailed survey the assessors followed an outlined procedure to check type of construction, number of stories, number of rooms, apartments, type of foundation, walls, roofing, exterior and interior finish, heating and lighting details, of farm property, etc.

The Marshall county Board of Review initiated hearings this week to hear grievances on the assessments. Culver and Union township hearings are scheduled for April 10.

More Candidates File For Office

Republican candidates, seeking nomination in the forthcoming May 2 primary greatly outnumber democrats who had filed notices of their intention to run for office at the time the filing closed last Saturday night.

In Union township, candidates Maurice Curtis for trustee, James I. Rich, Paul Snyder and Earl Foreman, advisory board, will have no opposition in the Republican primary. This group of present officers are seeking re-election to the posts they now hold.

No Democrats have filed for the township posts. The election laws provide that the party can name candidates to the ballot for the fall election by filing before Sept. 1.

M. R. Robinson of Culver is a candidate for county councilmen from the 2nd district comprised of Union, Green and Walnut townships. Mr. Robinson is the former editor and publisher of the Citizen. Robert Kyle, another newspaper man and Culver resident, is seeking the Republican nomination for state representative from Marshall county.

William Oberlin of Culver is the Republican candidate to succeed himself as county assessor. Dr. C. G. Mackey also of Culver is seeking the Republican nomination in the May primary for the County coroners office which he now holds.

Green township candidates for trustee are William Cronin, republican and Owen Smith, democrat; advisory board candidates are: Raymond Hand, republican; and Orville Voreis, George Reed, and Don Nelson, democrats.

In Fulton county, the Fulton county republicans greatly outnumber the democrats in the well filled slates. In Aubbeenaubee township Charles E. Murfitt is the republican candidate for trustee and Guy A. Shadel is the democrat candidate. Advisory board candidates include: Dale Davis, Richard Brown and Ralph Hunneshagen all republicans; and Wilson Guise, Robert C. Kline and Fred L. Stayton, democrats.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Easter Icebox Dessert

Broadcast: April 8, 1950

3 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
2/3 cup powdered sugar
1 unbeaten egg yolk
1/4 cup Pet Milk (see note)

2/3 cup canned, crushed pineapple, well drained
1/3 cup finely cut nuts
1/4 cup fine graham cracker crumbs

Line loaf pan, holding 3 cups, with waxed paper. Put butter into bowl. Beat in sugar, about 2 tablesp. at a time. Beat in egg yolk. Stir in milk, a tablesp. at a time. Fold in pineapple and nuts. Arrange in layers in pan, having 3 layers of crumbs and 2 layers of pineapple mixture, with crumbs on top, bottom and in center. Cover; chill 12 hours, or overnight. Cut in slices. Makes 4 servings.

Note: It is best to have milk at room temperature.

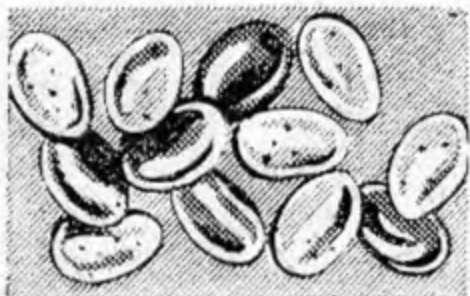

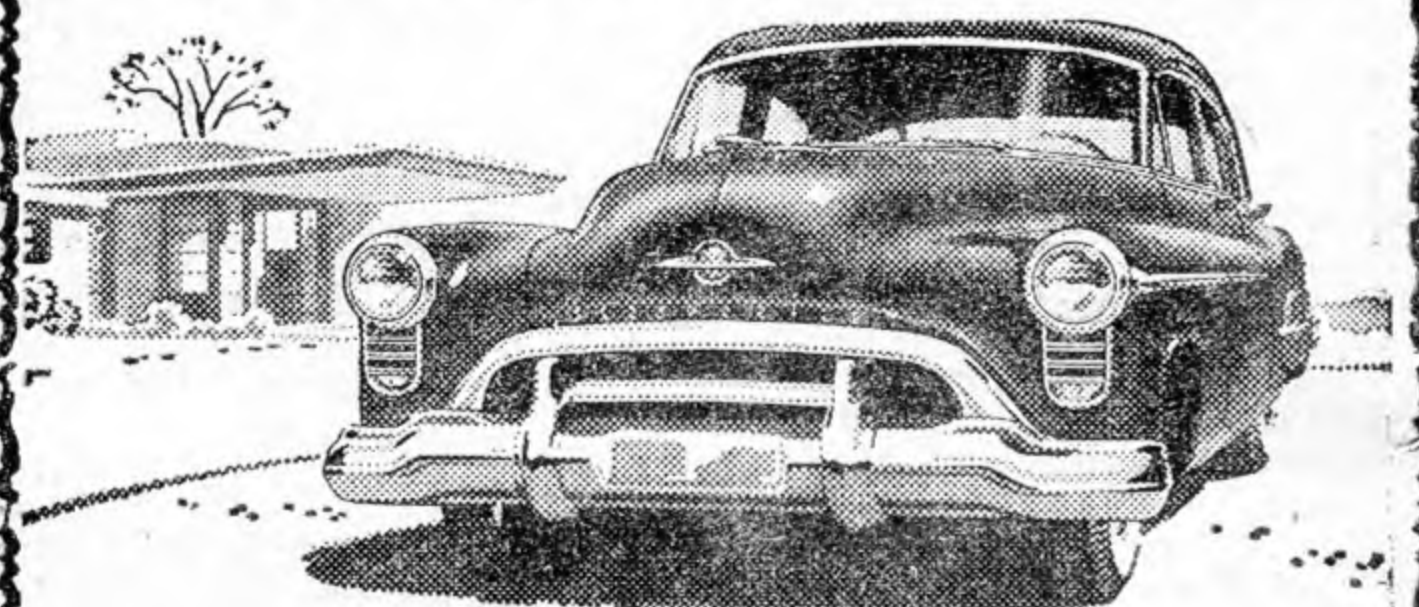

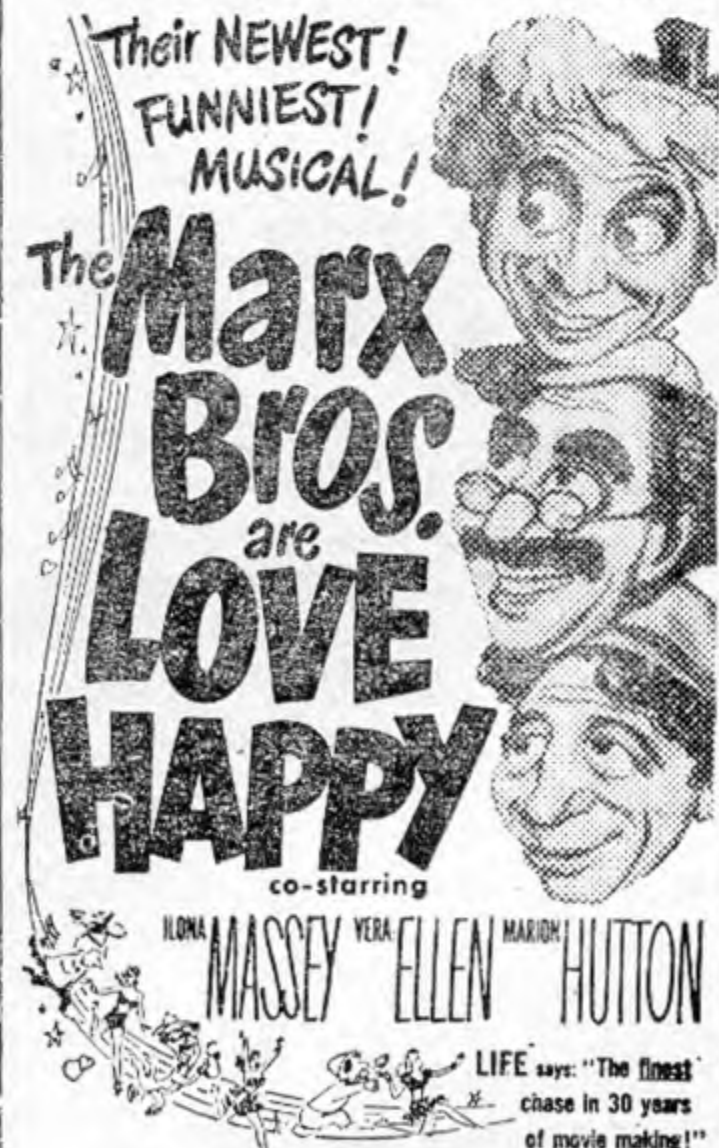

Council Of Church News

Mustering the world's latent resources-spiritual, moral and material-and directing them towards positive goals of human welfare is the best hope of just and durable peace in this atomic age, the Executive Committee of the Federal Council of Churches declared last week, as it examined for the first time the moral implications of the hydrogen bomb.

In urging a strategy based on faith, not fear, the Executive Committee, in a statement on "The Churches and the Hydrogen Bomb," emphasized the need to place primary reliance on the constructive power of spiritually creative resources, rather than on the destructive power of military weapons.

The Council stated that any positive peace program should gain more than immunity from mass destruction or from the moral problem posed by our possession of weapons of mass destruction.

"Peace also means immunity to peoples generally from the systematic mass destruction of minds, wills and sense of personal dignity, by terrorism, by the

insistent repetition of falsehood and by enforced isolation which breaks the bridges of understanding and fellowship among the peoples."

The committee commended Secretary Acheson's recent call at Berkeley, California, to reinvigorate democratic efforts in the doing of constructive tasks which will give practical affirmation to the principles by which we live. Acheson's statement recognized that between the belief in the dignity and worth of man and the beliefs of international communism stand moral issues which can be neither evaded nor settled by compromise of basic convictions.

The Council noted that in his approach to the solution of the tensions between the United States and the Soviet Union corresponds in many important respects with principles advocated by the Council in its statement, "Soviet-Americans Relations," issued October 11, 1946.

The statement also supported the appeal of the World Council of Churches, to the nations for a gigantic new effort to end the present tragic deadlock, preferably through the United Nations. It also commended the spirit and purpose, though not necessarily the details, of the proposal by Senator Brian McMahon for a bold, imaginative approach to the problem of peace, and also President Truman's recent statement indicating a willingness to make a fresh start in the search for acceptable methods of international control of atomic energy.

The committee joined in a prayer that the hydrogen bomb may never be used but found no

unanimity as to whether the weapon of mass destruction should be constructed.

"Some of us feel deeply that the hydrogen bomb does not present a new and different moral issue but sheds vivid light on the wickedness of war itself," the statement said. "Some of us oppose the construction of hydrogen bombs which could be used only for the mass destruction of populations. Some of us, on the other hand, believing that our people and the other free societies should not be left without the means of defense through the threat of retaliation, support the attempt to construct the new weapon. All of us unite in the prayer that it may never be used."
