Dr. M. J. Sprunger Named Pastor of Reformed Churches

Dr. Meredith J. Sprunger of Elmhurst, Ill., has accepted the appointment as pastor of the Evangelical and Reformed Church here at Culver it was announced at the meeting of the congregation here last Wednesday evening. The new pastor will serve the Zion and Grace churches which comprise the Culver charge. Claude Newman, chairman of the joint church boards announced the appointment.

Dr. Sprunger is a member of the staff of the Elmhurst College where he is head of the Department of Psychology. In addition to his teaching duties he is pastor of the Highland Avenue Methodist church.

The newly appointed pastor of the local church received his Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity degrees from the Mission House in Plymouth, Wisconsin. He also holds a Master of Arts degree from Princeton University and he completed the requirements for his Ph.D. degree at Purdue University.

Before going to Elmhurst, he served as pastor of the Mulberry, Ind., Evangelical and Reformed Church for eight years.

Mr. Newman indicated that Dr. Sprunger would terminate his work at Elmhurst College and at the Highland Avenue Church in June and following a brief vacation he will begin his pastorate here in July. Plans are being made for the pastor and his wife, Irene, and daughter, Ruth, to move to their new home in Culver.

Delong Resident Dies After Three-Month Illness

Harry Robert Chaney, age 33, died Sunday afternoon at his home in Delong, after an illness of three months. He was born at Milford, Indiana on May 20, 1916, came to Culver when a small boy and has lived in this community since. He has lived in his present home in Delong for the past five years.

He was a member of the Sharon Holiness church and was a veteran of World War II, serving as a private in the 521st Infantry, stationed at Camp Gordon, Ga.

Surviving are his wife, Nora Mae; five children, Harry T., Kenneth K., Shirley L., Sharon L., and Joyce G., all at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Chaney, Delong; one sister, Mrs. Ruby Thompson, of Niles, Mich.; two brothers, Crissie, Niles, Mich., and Joseph, Delong.

Funeral services will be held at the Sharon church this afternoon at two p.m. Rev. Theodore Meckes will officiate and burial will be at the Monterey Protestant cemetery.

The pallbearers will be Paul, Ralph, Walter, Frank and William Frettinger.

The Culver fire department answered three calls during the past week to extinguish grass and woods fires in the Burr Oak vicinity. Member of C. H. S. Graduating Class Travels 3230 Miles to Attend School

Tomorrow evening members of the graduating class at Culver High School will receive their diplomas at the close of the 1950 commencement exercises. For Wayne Miller, one of the 27 graduates, the important event, will mark the close of 3,230-mile automobile journey. It wasn't a vacation trip like the one in which he will accompany his classmates on their trip to Mackinac Island next week.

On the contrary it was a trip taken by 30 mile stages each day during the past school year, so that he could attend classes in Culver high school. Wayne, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller, resides 3 miles south of Kewanna.

Planning to enter medical school following his secondary school training, Wayne decided

last summer that he wished to complete his high school course in a school accredited by the North Central Association of Schools and Colleges, to insure that his course and credits would be acceptable by medical schools. It meant that he would either enter Culver High School for his senior year or Logansport high school with the result that he matriculated at the local high school last September.

Each day during the year he has traveled 15 miles each way to school. A faithful car has seldom let him down in his daily trek to Culver. The journey meant leaving home every morning at 7:30 o'clock. In addition to being an outstanding student he has found time to participate in various extra-curricular activities at the local school. Next fall he will enter the IU medical school at Bloomington.

Accidents Prove Fatal to 2900 Hoosiers Each Year, State Board of Health Says

About 2900 accidental deaths occur in Indiana each year and the number is increasing as compared to five years ago.

Falls kill about 900 persons each year, running a second to motor vehicle accidents which claim over 1,000 lives a year, the statistics division of the Indiana State Board of Health points out.

Over one hundred Indiana citizens die yearly of drowning, and from burns; electric currents and firearms each kill about 30; mechanical suffocation as many as 70 and lightning claims 5 to ten lives a year.

Each year several Indiana residents are victims of unusual circumstances such as in the case of the switching of a train when the engine fell over and mashed a parked car and its driver. One man was killed when a pencil pierced his body while he was fixing a flat tire.

Several children died from lead poisoning from fumes of discarded burning battery cases; the explosion of paint thinner resulted in a man's death, and an 81 year old woman died of a bite by a poisonous insect, probably a tarantula.

United States Armed Forces Day to Be Observed on Saturday, May 20

Worldwide observance of the first Armed Forces Day, Saturday May 20, will afford millions of Americans an opportunity to pay tribute to the might and the glory of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps.

Patriotic demonstrations have been planned by community groups throughout the country and everywhere United States forces are stationed abroad — on land and on the ships at sea. Uncle Sam's bugles, hailing the dawn of May 20, will carry a reveille around the world.

Martial parades, mass meetings, balls, banquets, luncheons, and "open house" celebrations at mil-

itary installations and aboard Navy craft have been planned. President Truman, Vice president Barkley and Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson will head the list of Government speakers.

"We want every citizen to know our defense forces better," said Secretary Johnson. "We want every citizen to know the men and women, the equipment and the organizations in which is invested a major share of their tax dollar. For it is upon this combination of manpower and weapons that we base our hope for the safety of democracy and of our survival as a free nation."

CULVER FISHERMAN FINDS EVIDENCE OF LAMPREYS

Paul Kaley has proof that lampreys, a predator of game fish are in Maxinkuckee waters. Last Thursday evening the Culver fisherman with his brother Ermil, speared a two pound sucker, in the outlet, south of the railroad bridge. A small but mighty lamprey had firmly attached itself to the fin of the sucker.

The report that the U. S. fish and wildlife service with the Indiana department of conservation, has been catching sea lampreys in Laporte county, leads to the question as to whether this specimen caught by Kaley is one of the varieties now invading the northern waters or was it one of the six varieties of common lamprey eels.

The sea lamprey attaches its vacuum like mouth to the side of a fish, at the same time operating its rotar like teeth so as to break through the scales. Then it sucks

the blood and body fluids from the victims. A solution with which the lamprey is supplied prevents the fish blood from coagulating thus robbing the fish of any protection. When its appetite is satisfied the lamprey drops away.

Frank Schmidt, Culver, Ind., is among a group of dairymen whose ideas are cited in the June issue of Capper's Farmer.

"Dust-tight chutes for chopped hay reach from ceiling to floor of Schmidt's dairy barn," says a story in the nationally circulated farm magazine. "After the herd

gets a feed of roughage in winter Schmidt throws down hay to fill the chutes a foot or more above mow-floor level. That keeps cold air from pouring down into the stable to make cows uncomfortable."

PRIZE DACHSHUND WINS LAURELS AT NATIONAL SHOW

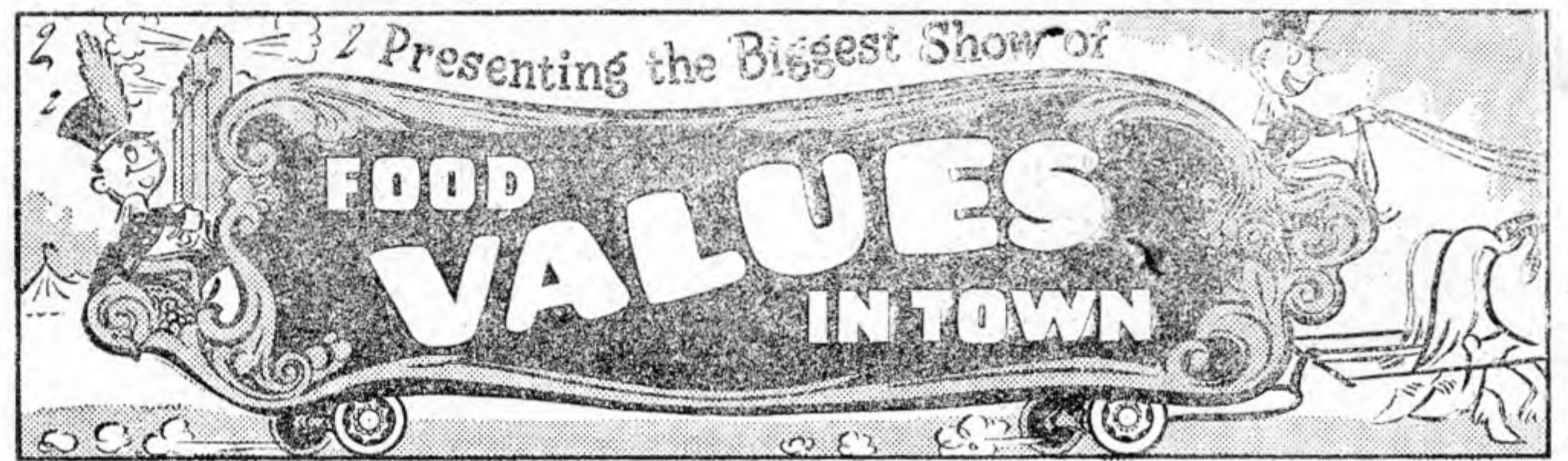
Vern Flosenzier of Plymouth showed the Grand Champion female.

A WORTHWHILE COMMUNITY PROJECT

Culver has new street markers and there are few in the community who have not noticed the attractive identifiers of town thoroughfares by this time. As one old-timer pointed out, the new markings disclosed names of streets with which many long-time residents were unfamiliar.

More than fifty markers have been placed on Lake Shore Drive, Main Street, Ohio Street, College Avenue, and School Street. The project was sponsored by the local Lions Club. Morley Skinner served as chairman of the committee which arranged for the purchase and the installation of the markers.

The hundreds of persons who attended the Lions Club Minstrel last February had a part in the project, for the major source of the funds came from the proceeds of the Minstrel. Another important contribution came from the town of Culver.

The sponsoring group devoted much time to the study of appropriate types of markers, and many persons contributed of their time and effort toward installing the street signs. Actually the project is not complete, for it is hoped that markers can be placed at every street intersection in the community and many have expressed the hope that every rural road in the township will be marked.

As with every community project the installing of the signs has not been accomplished without criticism. Some have complained about the placement of the posts. The committee has pointed out that while it is impossible to satisfy everyone's personal wishes with respect to placement, those signs which have been inadvertently placed on State Highway rights-of-way will be moved.

The fifty markers costing upward of \$500 together with the donation of much labor and materials do mark an extremely worthwhile community undertaking. Culver has hundreds of visitors annually and the very layout of the town has made it most difficult to direct visitors to particular places in the community. Therefore the Lions Club and the members of the committee deserve the heartiest congratulations for carrying out this merited and badly needed community project.

ANOTHER SCHOOL YEAR CLOSURES

This week marks the close of another school year for more than 600 students and their instructors of the Union Township schools. Tomorrow evening 27 seniors will culminate their secondary school training when they receive diplomas from the local high school. They will join a host of alumni who have graduated from the Culver high school during the past fifty-one years.

The township as a whole, and parents and teachers in particular have quite a sizeable investment in the graduating class. It is an investment which might possibly be broken down into so many thousands of dollars, but more particularly it is an investment in the intangible hopes and aspirations which are at best difficult to measure. During the past, Culver high school graduates, on the whole, have done quite well in various pursuits of living and the entire community extends best wishes to the members of the 1950 graduating class.

An exceedingly popular speaker, Mr. Osborn has appeared before civic and banking groups over a wide area and we note this week where he is scheduled to speak at Muncie tomorrow and the up calendar shows that he will address a banker's meeting at Lexington, Ky., on June 16.

Placement of the street signs by the Lions Club reminded George Williams of the placement of Culver street signs some twenty-five or thirty years ago. George points out that the signs were purchased by the town board at the time that he was serving as Clerk-Treasurer. Other members of the town board at that time were Dan Marks, Charles Asper and Fletcher Strang. One of the old street signs is still standing near the Charles Asper home.

Don Davis is rapidly whipping up final plans for the CHS Alumni Frolic to be held next Saturday night. Being president of the Alumni Association is just one of Don's many activities. In addition to operating a large farm, Don is president of three organizations, the CHS Alumni Association, the Marshall County I. U. organization and the Union Township Farm Bureau. He is also chairman of the Culver-Union Township Planning commission.

Dave Burns and members of the

Culver fire department are just proud of their renovated quarters in the town hall. Visitors invariably take great interest in the old photographs of the local fire department. Some of them show the old hook and ladder wagon and other ancient fire fighting equipment.

In 1914 the files of the Citizen show that various and sundry projects were under way in Culver. For example, a company was interested in running an interurban railway through Culver to South Bend. It was to run from Indianapolis, through Frankfort, Monticello, Winamac and Culver.

During the year a group of engineers made surveys for the Erie Michigan canal, which was to come through Leiters Ford, then north to Culver, then to Knox. It was also proposed there would be a feeder canal coming from South Bend through Burr Oak and connecting with the main waterway on the Henry Zechiel farm west of Culver.

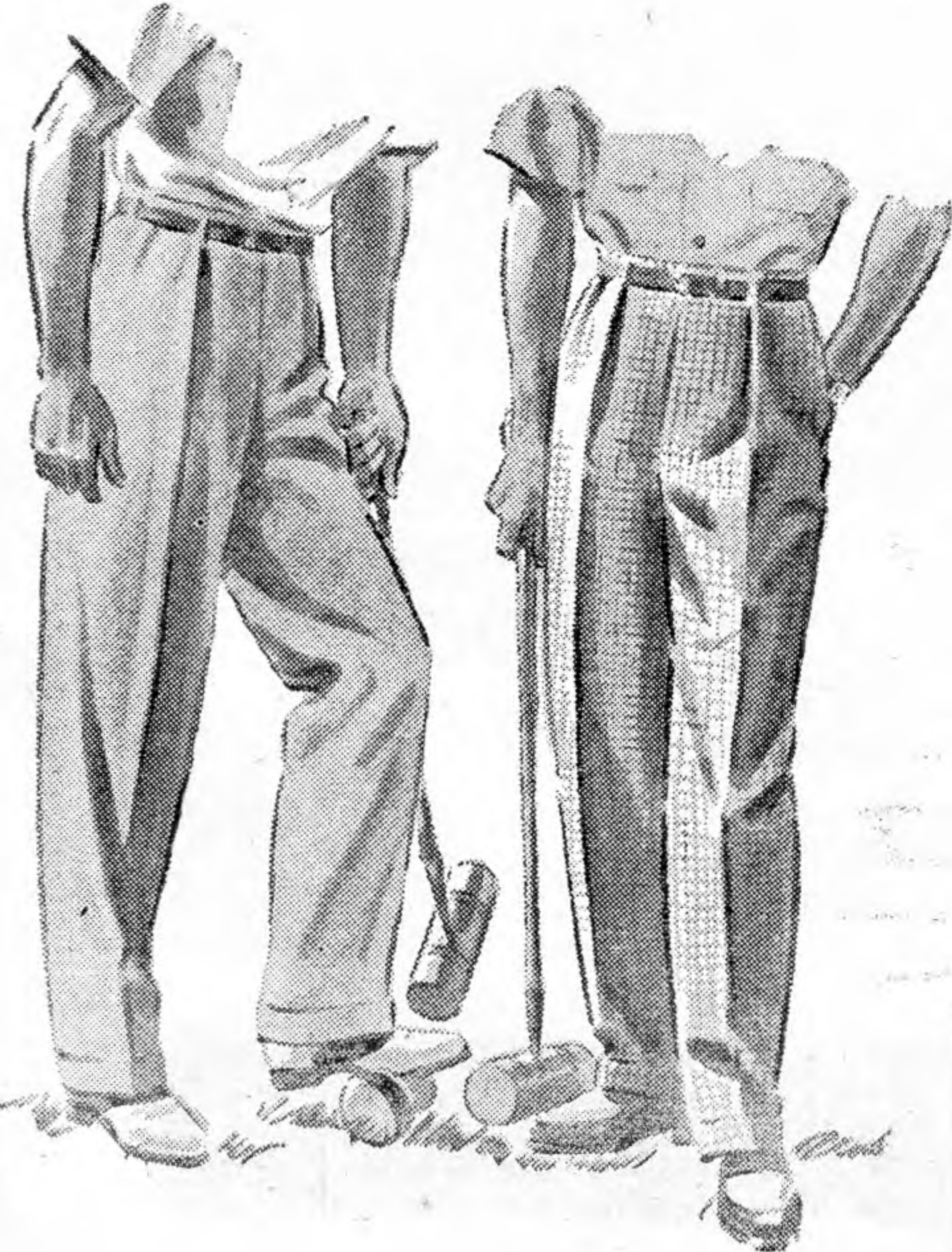

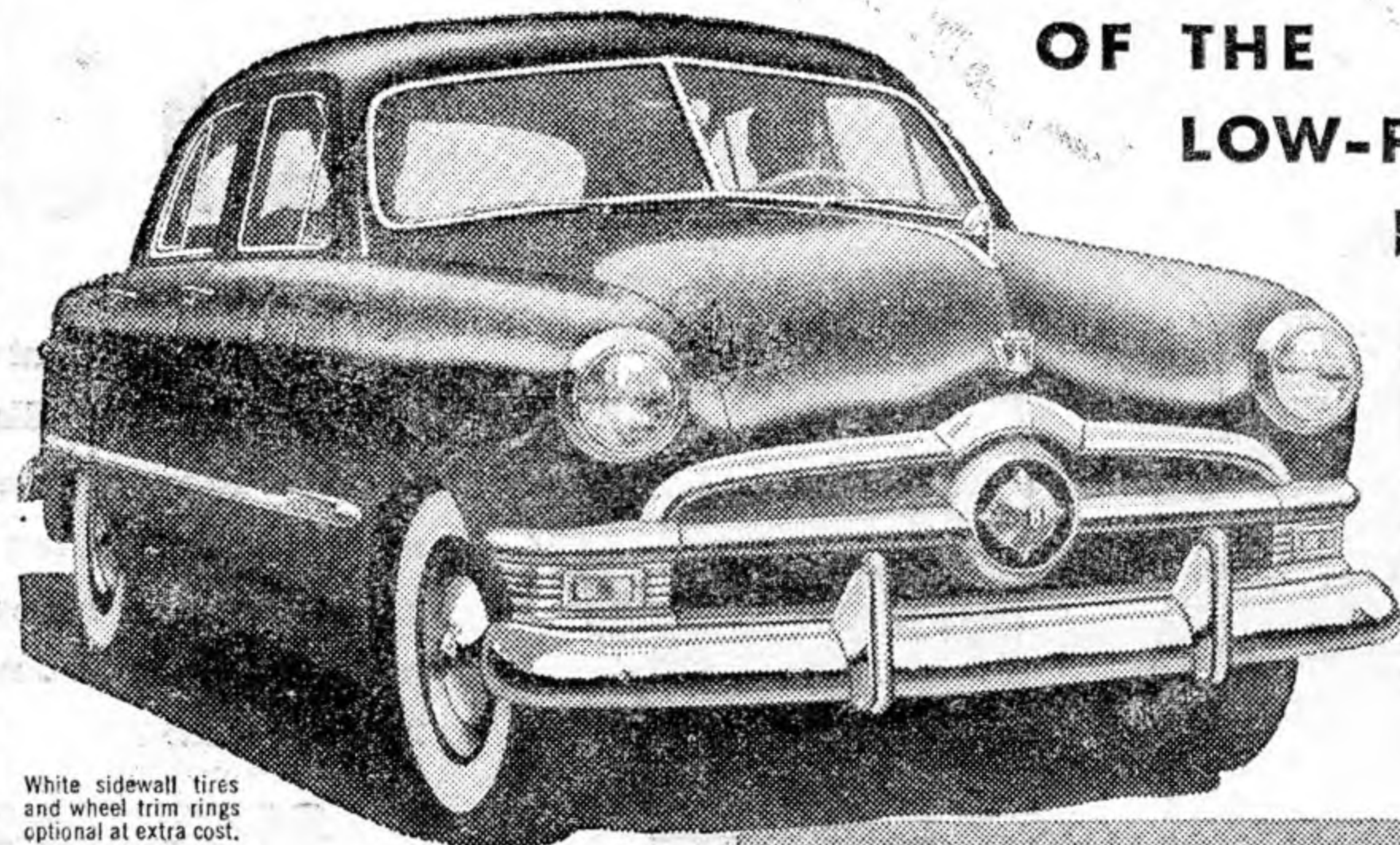
