CMA Homecoming This Week; To Lay Chapel Cornerstone

Homecoming activities at Culver Military Academy this next week end will include not only the traditional social and athletic events, but also on Sunday morning at 10:15 the cornerstone laying ceremonies for the \$1,000,000 Memorial Chapel which will be ready for dedication next fall.

Members of the Foundation Board of Directors, the presidents of the Legion, Summer School Alumni Association, and Fathers Association, and representatives of the corps of cadets will participate in the program. E. R. Culver, President of the Board, will deliver the main address; B. B. Culver, son of the founder and Chairman of the Board, will deposit the traditional box of significant documents in the cornerstone itself.

All members of the cadet corps and faculty will attend the ceremonies.

Other events on the week end calendar on Saturday include a meeting of alumni association officers and Board of visitors, Homecoming luncheon, football game with Kentucky Military Institute and cross country meet with Howe Military Academy.

On Sunday morning the ceremony at 10:15 will be preceded by a business meeting of Culver Legion officers and followed by chapel at which the new officers of the Legion will be installed. A full dress parade at 12:40 p. m. will be in honor of the returning grads.

Henry T. Cook, '23, of Providence, Rhode Island, will be installed as the new Legion president.

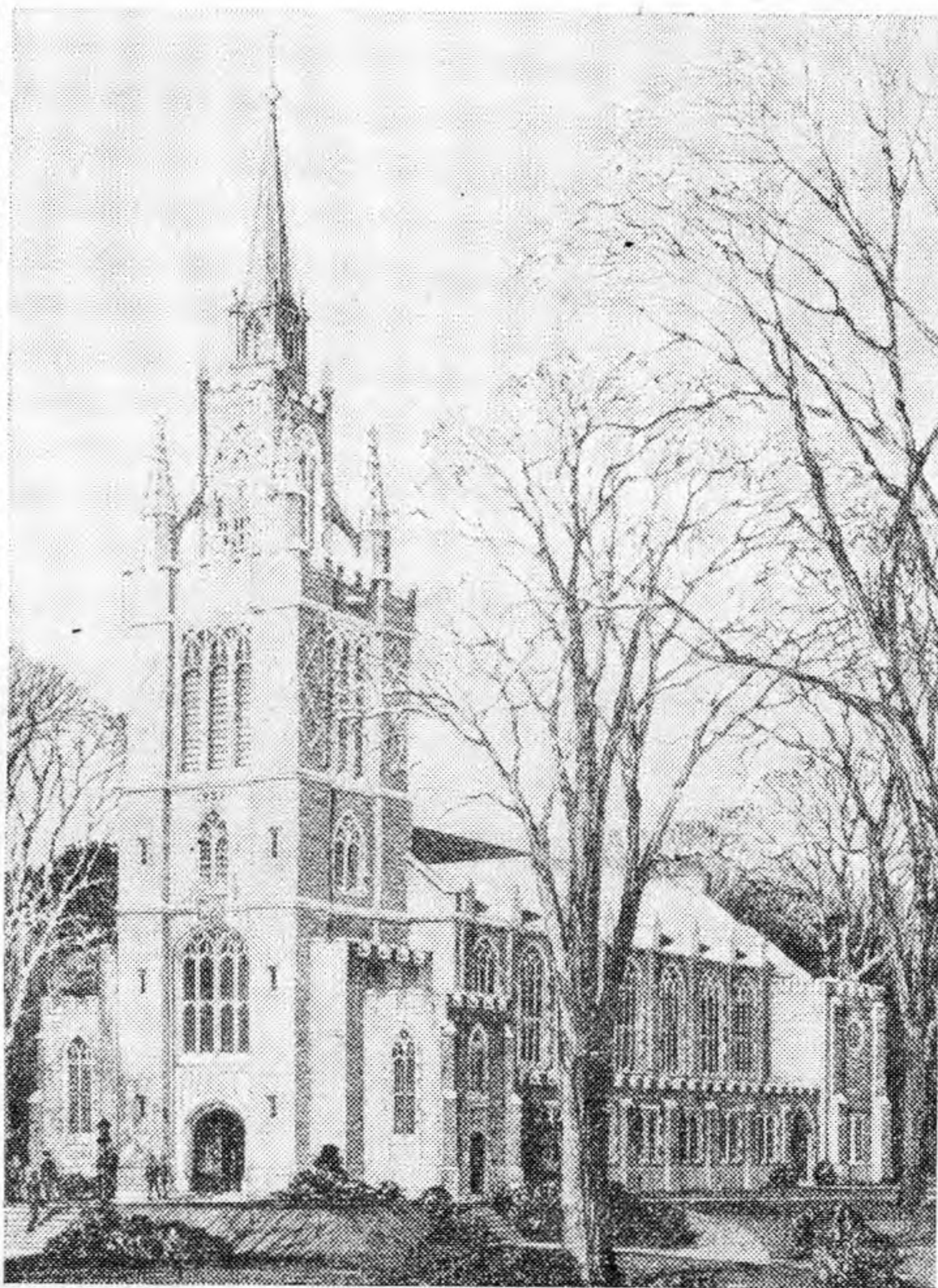

EXTEND CRUSADE FOR FREEDOM CAMPAIGN

Plan Observance Of United Nations Day, October 24

A film entitled "All the World's Children" will be shown in the basement of the Library on United Nations Day, Tuesday, October 24th. United Nations Day marks the anniversary of that day in 1945 on which the United Nations Charter came into force as world law, expressing the mandate of the people of the world that THERE SHALL BE PEACE.

"All the World's Children" vividly portrays the awe-inspiring job of the United Nations Children's Emergency Relief Fund (UNICEF) is doing to alleviate conditions of suffering among the needy children throughout the world. Among many services which the United Nations offers, this aid to children is one in which all peoples realize the value, regardless of political opinion.

To promote interest and understanding of world problems among the high school students, the movie will also be shown at the school, marking the beginning of a high school essay contest on the value of the United Nations.

The movie will run in the library basement beginning at 10 a. m. and continuously through the evening. The picture, shown without charge, is sponsored by the Culver League of Women Voters. The public is urged to attend.

Culver Doctors First In County To Sign-Up

First county man to sign up Monday for doctor, dentist, and veterinarian registration was Dr. E. J. Yocum, Jr., Culver veterinarian. Yocum, 33, was deferred from military service for his education at Michigan State College and except for 2½ years in reserve officers training corps he did not see service.

R. L. Witham, Culver M.D., almost was No. 2 man to sign up but he was told men with more than 90 days' active service are not in "priority one" and do not have to register. Dr. Witham, 29, spent 2½ years on active duty during World War II, including Panama Canal Zone service. One of three medical doctors in Culver, Witham is not in an armed forces reserve. Educated at Indiana University, he received nine months of his training under the army specialized training program. —Plymouth Pilot News

The 1950 prizes for the best costumes and sufficient refreshments for all of the kids will be purchased within the next two weeks. The colorful event has always attracted large crowds.

Two-Week Drive Aims For \$4,000 Fund; Chest To Support 14 Services

With a goal of \$4,000, Union Township's annual Community Chest Drive will get underway on Monday, October 23 and will continue through Saturday, November 4, according to plans approved by the Board of Directors of the Community Chest and announced this week.

Preliminary to the actual kick-off in the campaign for the urgently needed funds, Dr. Oscar Wesson, rural drive chairman; Col. Robert Rossow, Academy and Lake Shore chairman; E. W. Carter, Town area chairman; are seeking solicitors and organizing their respective areas for a quick and thorough canvassing. "Every home and family will be contacted," the co-chairmen indicate.

House to House Survey

It is hoped that the actual canvassing can be started early on Monday morning, October 23, with organized groups of workers making a house-to-house survey throughout the community.

"Our theme might well be 'This is our community, Let's Give,'" Ernest W. Carter, chairman of the Board, explained in pointing up the drive. "Our aim during the forthcoming drive is to afford the opportunity to every person in the township to participate in this worthwhile undertaking and everyone should be prepared to help the solicitors by determining the amount of their donation prior to the time of the canvassing."

The local community chest program, first to be organized in Marshall county, was launched in March 1943. The purpose of the local program is to unify the raising of funds for charitable causes, with the exception of Red Cross whose rules prevent their being included in Community Chest Drives, and also to provide for worthwhile local organizations which depend upon popular support for the carrying out of their activities.

Community Chest Board

The Community Chest Fund is administered by a board of directors of nine citizens. They geographically represent four sections of the rural area of the township, the Academy, and the town of Culver. Members of the board are Guy Davis, Mrs. R. Lowry, Glenn Tibbetts, Mrs. J. D. Newman, C. S. McMinn, Col. Robert Rossow, E. W. Carter, Wilber Taylor, and Robert Rust.

Based upon a study of the budget committee the following groups and organizations will be supported during 1950-51 by the Community Chest: The Union Township 4-H Club, The Infantile Paralysis Fund, Cancer Fund, Heart Fund, Salvation Army, the USO, Boy Scouts, School Safety Patrol, Girl Scouts, Brownies, Cub Scouts, YMCA (Hi-Y), High School Band, and the Summer Recreation program.

This year it will be possible to indicate where the donor wishes his particular contribution to go. Each donor will be given a receipt by the canvasser. Contributions to the community chest are deductible from Federal Income Taxes.

Republicans Plan County Wide Round-Up Oct. 26

A highlight of the current political campaign, as far as the county is concerned, will occur Thursday, October 26th, when Marshall County Republicans will stage a county wide Republican Roundup. Plans for the all afternoon and evening affair call for a giant caravan, a free dinner for all voters, and an interesting evening program.

Early on Thursday afternoon, October 26th, the caravan will be formed at Plymouth. The parade of cars is expected to gather momentum as it travels to all sections of the county. From Plymouth the parade of cars will come to Culver and other stops on the itinerary include Argos, Pourbon, Bremen, Lapaz, then back to Plymouth where an exciting program will get under way.

The parade will culminate at the High School Gymnasium where the assembled voters will be guests at a free supper scheduled between 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. Arrangements include provisions for entertainment. The scheduled hours for the serving will permit rural families to attend. Tickets will be available through precinct committeemen and committeewomen.

Following the dinner the group will assemble in the Lincoln High School Auditorium where Leland Smith of Logansport, and Ralph Harvey of Newcastle, will speak. Mr. Smith is candidate for Secretary of State and Mr. Harvey is candidate for re-election as Representative from the 10th district.

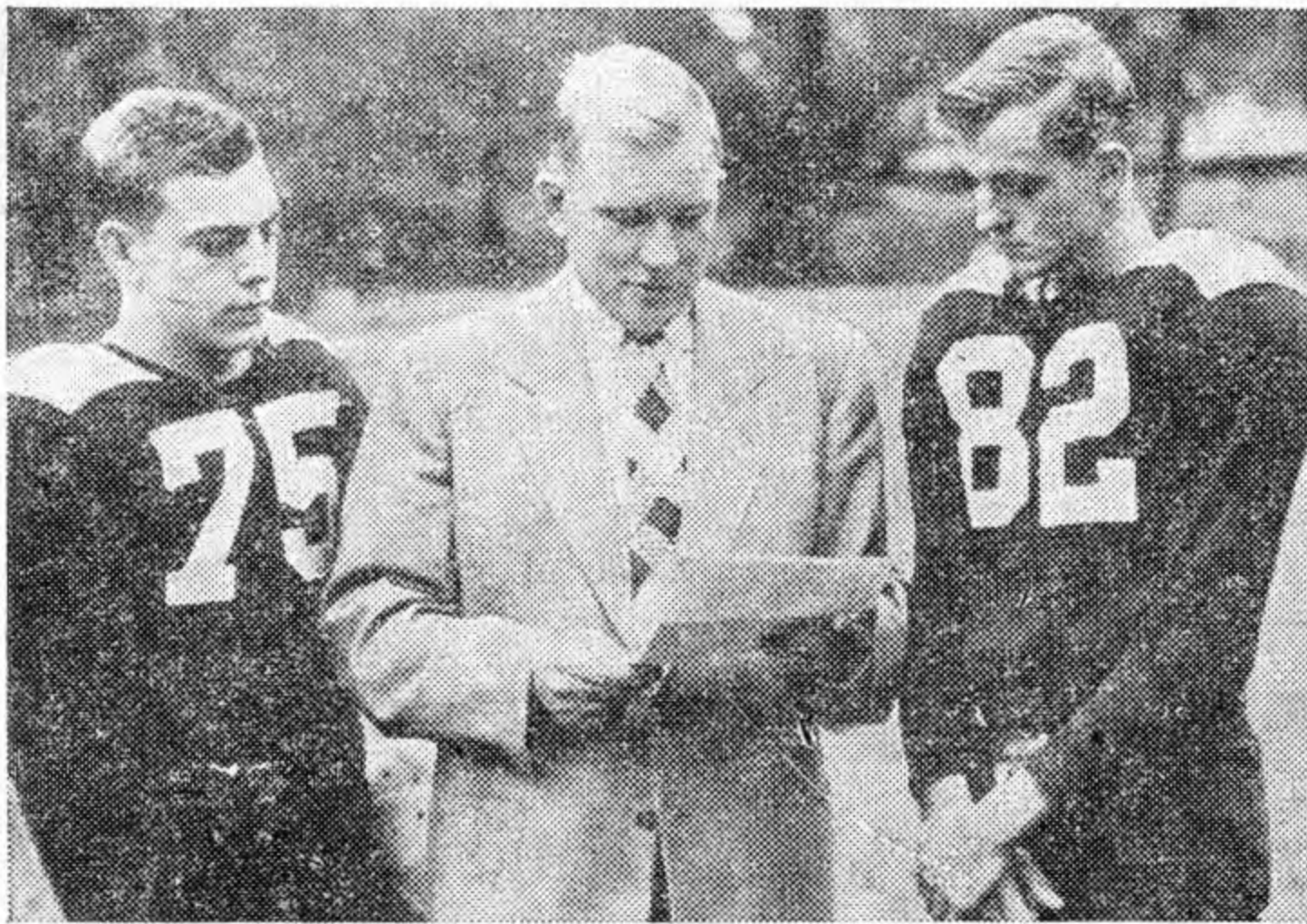

Speaker Urges Conservation of Natural Resources

"The four components of nature are: forests, water resources, soil, and wild life," Major Norman Imrie, well known former Academy instructor, told an attentive audience at the Grace Evangelical and Reformed Church last Thursday evening. "All four of



these components are important, in fact they are inter-dependent, destroy one and you destroy all," the speaker warned.

Of the four components, trees are considered to head the list since they prevent the balance of nature from being upset by controlling the run off of rainfall. Major Imrie, speaking here under the sponsorship of the American Legion Post went on to develop his vital topic "Uncle Sam and the Prodigal Son," by pointing out that modern wars are caused by economic reasons.

He cited Russia as an illustration showing that her population having doubled since 1900, with a dwindling top-soil, has had to expand. The old story of expanding populations and economics on fixed natural resources means that there is only one solution, namely (1) selective cutting of our remaining wooded areas; (2) fire control; and (3) replanting.
