Basketball Season Opens at C.M.A. Sat.; Meet Glenwood School

The Academy will open its basketball season here against Chicago Glenwood next Saturday afternoon. Game time is 2:30.

Head coach Russ Oliver is faced with the problem of building a completely new cage squad. Only two lettermen from last year's team are among this year's hopefuls.

Indians Face Michigan City Red Devils Saturday

Can the Indians make it five wins in a row? That is the question local basketball fans are asking this week. The answer won't be known until Saturday night when Culver takes on the always formidable Red Devils from Michigan City in the Culver Community Building.

In their attempt to remain undefeated the Indians will also be out to avenge the 49 to 35 drubbing handed them last year at Michigan City.

Little is known of the Red Devils strength. The fact that they lost their opening game of the season last week to Frankfort, 49-37 is not enough to go on since they were probably still wearing their football legs.

Coach Serings 1950-51 squad of small but fast players will undoubtedly continue to improve. Their victims to date have been Flora, Lapaz, Winamac, and Akron. Other opponents to be met before the Christmas holidays are John Adams, Plymouth, Winamac, Knox and Washington (South Bend).

A look at the record to date discloses that the team has hit 78 out of 227 tries from the field for a percentage of .344. The 1950-51 team can stand plenty of improvement from the free throw line since the record shows a weak .398 average based on 41 out of 103 chances. Opponents average in the same department is .408 per cent.

Jim Kowatch, Bill Snyder and Captain Eddie Davis have been the big guns in the Culver offense scoring 51, 41 and 39 points respectively.

Winter's Early Blast Here Brings Heating, Traveling Problems

The weather has been the biggest news item throughout the nation during the past week and judging from broken records and from the antics of the weatherman it has been the biggest news of the week in this locality.

While the daily press infers that northern Indiana has been on the "fringe" of the devastating storm which struck Michigan, Ohio and the Appalachian region on Saturday, folks in the Lake Maxinkuckee vicinity have been faced with some major storm problems.

One of the coldest Thanksgivings on record left streets and highways coated with a sheet of ice and those who had gone out of town to spend the day with friends found the going treacherous on Thursday night when the temperature dropped to 4 below. As if that weren't enough the temperatures skidded to 5 below on Friday night.

Saturday's Blizzard

As the mercury slid lower and lower, overcoats were hurriedly taken out of mothballs, and fuel supply became the "order of the day" for many home owners. Saturday afternoon northwest gales whipped up one of the worst blizzards in many a year here. Huge drifts made driving practically impossible and the "order of the day" on Sunday was snow shovels, and galoshes suddenly came into vogue.

Things were appearing a bit brighter on Monday. Just as traffic in and out of town was getting back to normal the first flakes of an added six inch fall came in on another northern wind. By ten p.m. streets and roads from town were difficult to negotiate, to say the least. The old saying "Do unto others as you would want them to do unto you" became the "order of the day" as autoists helped one another in getting started.

Car Parking Problem

In fact late Monday night and yesterday morning every one became conscious of the necessity for parking their cars facing downhill with one tread on the packed snow. Even then they were having some difficulty getting away from the curb. In a lighter vein one merchant suggested that he believed he would offer one free push with every purchase; another who heard the remark chimed in to say that it should be the other way around, that the customer should offer a free push to the merchant at the close of the day's business.

The large crowd here for the festivities at the Culver Military Academy were snowbound with many patrons and guests still unable to get started to their destination yesterday noon. Ten families started out Sunday morning for their homes but bad highway conditions forced them to return to the Maxinkuckee Inn. Many persons left their cars here and returned to their homes by train. Many others who started out were stalled on the way to their homes it was reported.

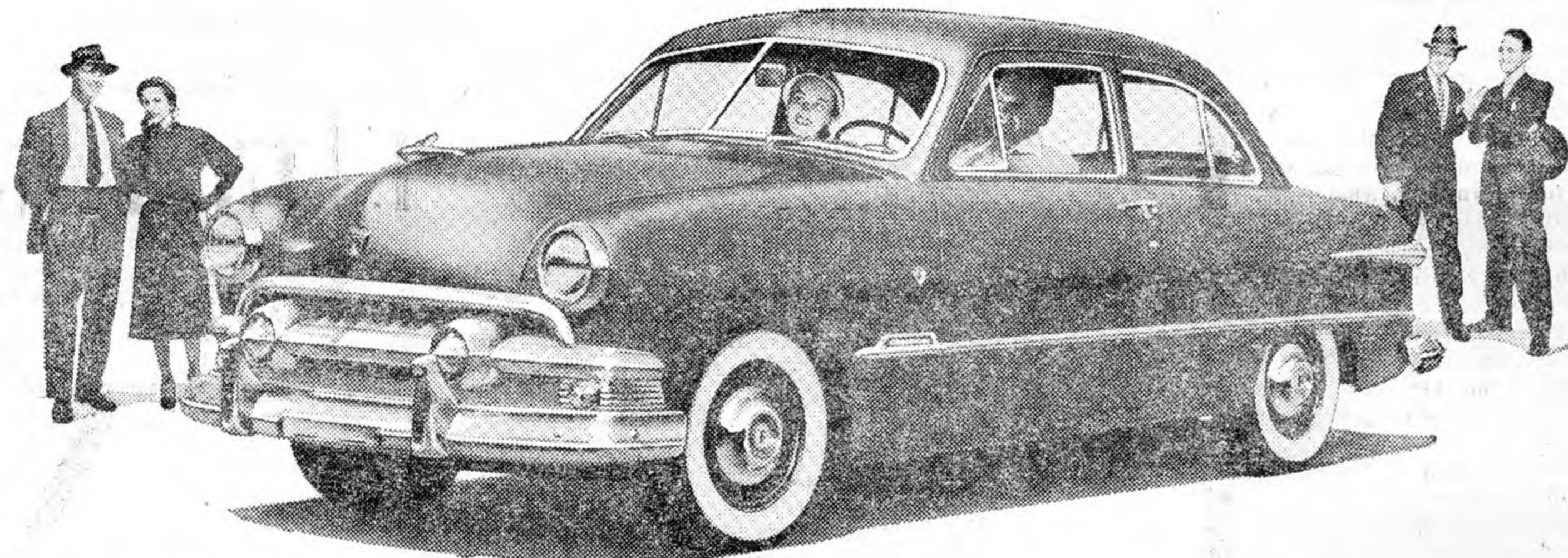
Deane E. Walker Led Democratic Slate In State Returns

Poinsetta Blooming Depends Upon Light

Getting the Christmas flower, the poinsettia, to bloom in time for the holidays need no longer be a mystery for the indoor gardener.

Scientists at the Plant Industry Station, Beltsville, Md., have revealed what practices "pace" the poinsettia so that it blooms within a definite period, Purdue University extension horticulturists report.

The plant requires short days for flowering—at least 13 hours of uninterrupted dark. USDA scientists found that they could slow up the blooming greatly by giving the poinsettias less than 13 hours of darkness and likewise could speed it up somewhat by increasing the dark period to 16 hours. This response of plants to different daylengths is known as photoperiodism to the flower grower.

It was also found how disappointing the poinsettia can be as

a result of seemingly slight interference with its light schedule. As little as half a foot-candle of light for an hour daily in the middle of the 16-hour dark period ruins all prospects for flowers. Change from long to short dark periods, after budding is far advanced doesn't upset the poinsettia. But if such a change is made when buds are in an early stage, the flowers and some of the bracts that would have become red drop off and those bract leaves that do not drop never become red.

The time that cuttings were made also have an effect on the rate of bud formation, late cuttings taking more time. If cuttings are started after Oct. 10 received daily dark periods of 14 to 16 hours with no breaks, the flowers and red leaves would be out to adorn Christmas without fail.

Twelve per cent each year goes to the Indiana Tuberculosis Association to coordinate, unify and stimulate tuberculosis control work throughout the state. The remain-

ing 82 per cent is all spent in Marshall county and is available for use where it is needed to every resident of our county.

LeBlanc Tells How Advertising Paid

Senator Dudley J. LeBlanc, owner of Hadacol, speaking before the Kansas City Advertising and Sales Executives Club recently described how he took \$2,500 in borrowed money two and a half years ago and parlayed it into The LeBlanc Corporation for which he recently turned down a cash offer of \$12,500,000.
He told how he had a net profit of about \$170,000 in December of 1949, and spent it all in advertising between Christmas and New Year's of last year. As a result his sales were \$2,500,000 in the first six weeks of this year, more than he sold in the entire year of 1949. He had a net profit before taxes of \$2,700,000 by July of this year and tried to spend \$500,000 of it on his Hadacol Caravan with leading movie stars.
Instead of spending the profit, he sold another \$3,000,000 worth of Hadacol on the Caravan, and his net profit for the year is now between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 before taxes. He gave much of the credit of his success to newspaper advertising, explaining that he uses ads almost daily in 850 daily newspapers and twice monthly in more than 6,000 weekly newspapers.

The Titanic, White Star liner, was on her maiden voyage from Queens-town, England, when she struck the "berg" near Cape Race on April 14, 1912. The S S Carpathic summoned by wireless SOS arrived in time to save 712 of the 2201 persons on board.

Until 1941 he was Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds at Culver Military Academy. Later he inaugurated a seed and landscaping service in this vicinity. For the past two years he had been in charge of the grounds at the State School in Ft. Wayne.
